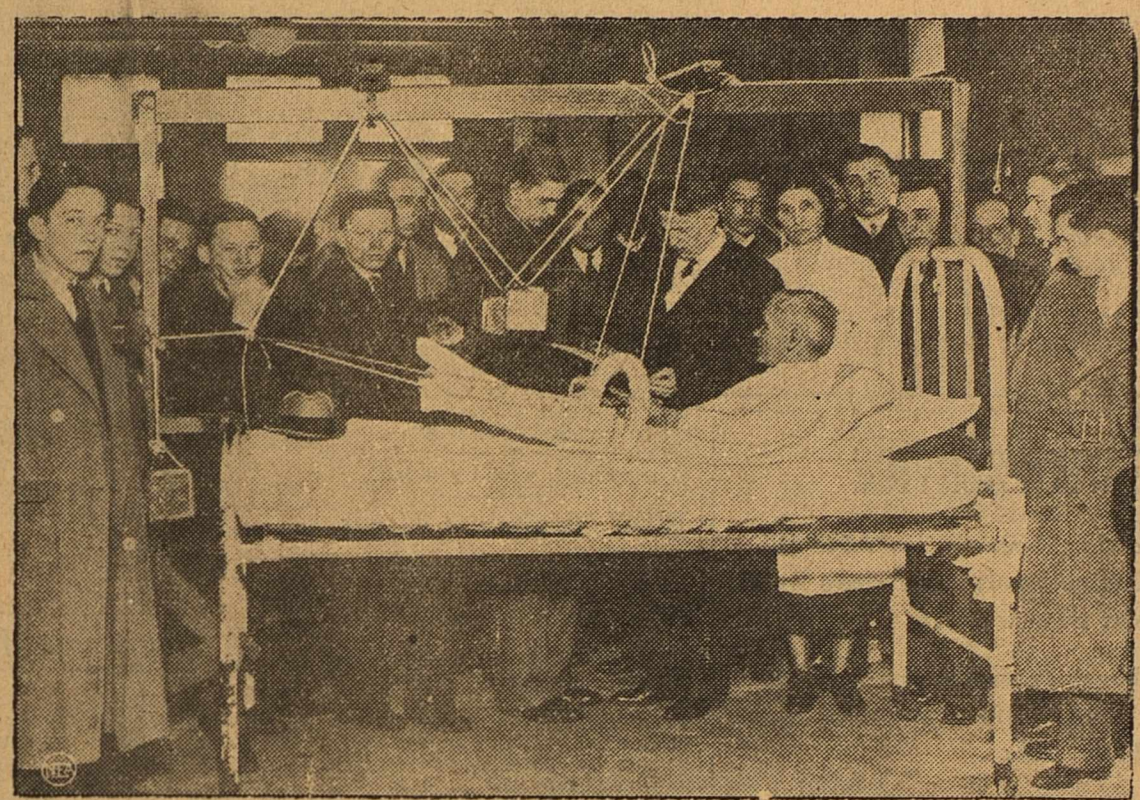
Committeemen Are Appointed by Goodman

Avocados Are Rich In Fine Food Values

Spring is the time to try new food—maybe avocados if you never have. In salad or fruit cup, they will add a note of grateful novelty for the base season.

In Florida the avocado is known as a sailigator pear or midshipman's butter. In California they call it calavo. By any name, it is still rich in fat and vitamins A, B, D, E, and G, not to speak of calcium, iron, phosphorus and assorted minerals.

When the thick-skinned flesh yields to a slight pressure, much a san apple does when we test for mellowness, avocados are ready to eat. The flesh then is as smooth and tender as baked custard.

Stuff Tomatoes With Them
A first course for luncheon or dinner might be tomatoes and avocados (in combination with crab flakes. Choose small, perfectly ripe and unblemished tomatoes—one for each person to be served. Scald and dip at once into cold water and peel. Scoop out seeds and chill in a well seasoned French dressing for an hour. Drain and fill with equal parts of finely diced avocado and crab flakes generously sprinkled with lemon juice. Lime juice can be substituted for lemon if convenient.

The alligator pear combines well with any citrus fruit and forms the base of many piquant cocktails. An "ice" is used to bring out the rich flavor. A simple avocado cocktail is made by dicing the fruit, sprinkling with salt and a few grains of white peppers and pouring over a sauce made of tomato catsup and lime juice. This must, of course, be very cold.

Avocado and grape-fruit pulp is delicious either as an appetizer or salad. Marinate the grape-fruit carrels for an hour in French dressing. Cut the avocado into slices the same size and shape as the grape fruit carrels and sprinkle with salt and lemon or lime juice. The grape fruit and avocado are arranged

Another delicious way to serve alligator pears is to cut them in halves, large ones in quarters and remove the seed without peeling. The fruit must be thoroughly chilled before cutting as it discolors on standing. Eat with a spoon as you would cantaloupe.

Rich In Fats
As the name Mississippi's butter implies, Avocados are rich so, keep this in mind when you plan your menu and above all, serve with a non-fatty meat. Avocados are particularly good with lean fish at this season of the year and are served with roast lamb with good effect, too. A dinner of a crown roast of lamb is well begun if it starts with an avocado cocktail and goes on with fresh vegetables in season and finishes up with strawberry bombe and cocoanut macaroons.

The butcher will prepare the crown roast for you and you roast it just as you would leg of lamb. When done fill the center with hot mashed potatoes and put a chop grill on each bone before sending it to the table.

To carve a crown of lamb, cut through each chop separately.

Says CCC Camps Cut Hazards of Fires

BEAUMONT, Texas, April 14 (AP)—E. O. Siecke, director of the state forestry department, credits CCC forestry camps with advancing the forest fire protection program and the development and improvement of the five forests in Texas at least ten years.

The Texas forest service are located where both federal and state forest service have conducted a cooperative fire protection project for many years. Until October 1935, the number of camps assigned to this area varied from 13 to 17 with an enrollment of from 2400 to 4000 but a general reduction in the CCC enrollment last fall resulted in nine of the camps being discontinued.

The administrator reports that due to the assistance of the CCC boys the acreage burned over the past three years has been reduced to about one percent of the 8,000,000 acres protected.

"historians somehow have overlooked."

"The bent for study of geology," he said, "ran in my family." A doctor-uncle participated in a survey of Tennessee in 1822; the second geological survey to have been conducted in the United States.

His initial interest in the science was, in a measure, accidental. He found the hammer-like kingbolt from an artillery train dropped during the fortification of Nashville, Tenn., his birthplace in the Civil War, and with boyish industry, used it to hammer the outcropping rocks during playtime.

"One day," he recalled, "I broke the corner off a rock and discovered a fossil shell."

An orphan of the Civil War at five, young Hill turned toward Texas as at 15 and stopped at Comanche, "the last town of the frontier and the roughest and toughest of that age." He was at Fort Griffin when Gen. MacKenzie brought in the last Comanche Indians and was present at the killing of the last great herds of buffalo in East Texas in 1874-77. He set the type on his brother's weekly paper.

Every sedentary formation of the great geologic periods, Oil, which originates in these sedimentary rock strata, fundamentally, bacteriologic fermentation in sea muds, of organic material, vegetation and oleaginous animals. Accumulation, however, is more difficult to explain, but it seeps into folds of the earth by water pressure and being cohesive, remains above the water."

Dr. Hill states that the geologic columns in Texas is more comprehensive than in other states and embraces rocks from the most remote origin to the newest.

The northeast and eastern parts of the country, he said, got their topography and soils from glacial action. The rocks in the Texas region mostly were made by the sea, the cretaceous formation demonstrating that the sea twice invaded the Texas area, once stretching from the present border southwest across Mexico and again from the Gulf of Mexico to Point Barrow, Alaska.
