The racial and religious rioting in Palestine becomes more a matter of American concern than comparable situations which have arisen in the Near East by reason of the fact that some of those slain on the side of the Jews were American citizens. Interest is also added by the fact that the Zionist movement, envisioning the return of many Jews to their home land, is largely based in the United States.

But British authority alone will not be enough to enforce permanent peace in Palestine. The Arabs there greatly outnumber the Jews. They have not only religious but economic motives for opposing the growth of Jewish influence.
