The embattled Chinese not only held their own but made a desperate foray, but the Japanese stood their ground.

Dr . Noguchi is dead. Admiral Shiosawa commanded the Japanese fleet that bombarded Shanghai. Shells, bombs and machine gun bullets, at his command, ripped through the houses there and killed scores, hundreds-no one knows just how many. He | It spread death with lavish and relentless hand.
