Cecil R. Biggers of Spearman, has formally announced his candidacy for Hansford County Attorney subject to the Democratic Primary.

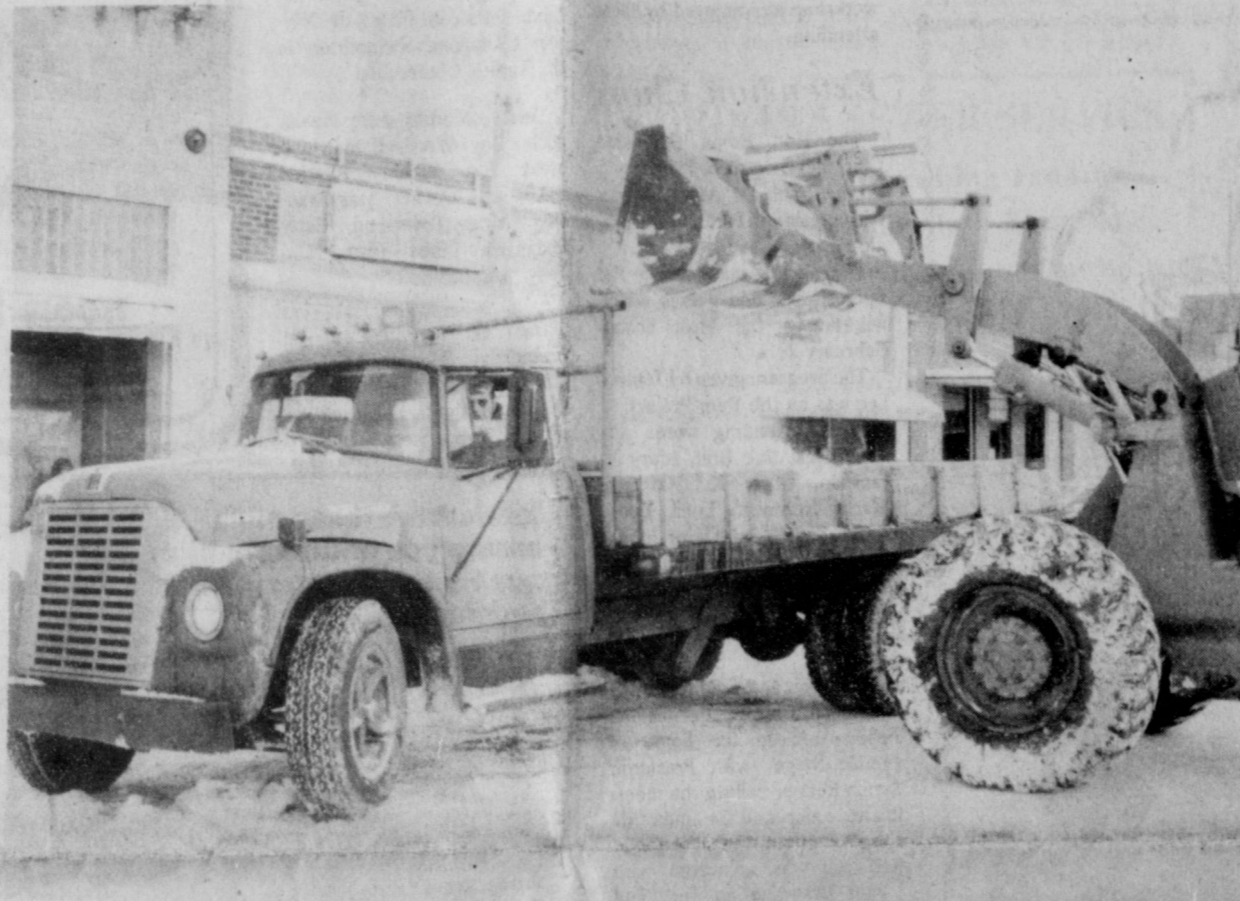
Biggers is currently in the general practice of law and has experience in criminal and civil trials, and is a former Spearman City Judge. Biggers states his reasons for running as being: "I have successfully defended criminal cases for five years and I now desire the opportunity to fairly and vigorously prosecute criminal offenses as the Hansford County Attorney. I know that the actions of the County Attorney's office affect the lives of many of our citizens and I believe that I possess the experience, ability, and common sense to protect our citizens' rights."

Biggers, who is 33 years old, was reared in the Texas Panhandle, received his B.A. degree in Political Science from Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, Texas and received his Doctor of Jurisprudence degree from Texas Tech School of Law, Lubbock, Texas. He is a member of the American Bar Association, the State Bar of Texas and the Northeastern Panhandle Bar Association.

Biggers, his wife, Myrna, and their two daughters--Regina, four years and Hilary, six months--are members of Faith Lutheran Church where he serves as Vice-President of the Church Council Chairman of the Call Committee, part-time Sunday school teacher and member of the dart-ball team. He has also served as the Youth group sponsor.

Community activities include rifle instructor, Hansford County 4-H program; member, past president and past Zone Chairman of Spearman Lions Club.

Biggers is a combat veteran of the U.S. Army. He has served as Armor platoon leader, qualified as Jungle Expert, and served as an Infantry Adviser in the Republic of South Vietnam. He was awarded the Bronze Star medal. He presently holds the rank of Captain, U.S. Army Reserve and serves as the Assistant Legal Officer for the 413th Civil Affairs Company, Lubbock, Texas.

Mr. Stafford died Saturday in an Enid hospital after a period of ill health. He was born on April 27, 1902 in Oklahoma City. He grew up and attended school in the Woodward and Mooreland areas. He married the former Eunice Courtney in 1926 at Gainesville, Texas.

In 1947 he moved to Enid and worked for Enid Packing Co. for several years and then for Caton Lumber Co. until his retirement.

He is survived by his wife, Eunice of the home; two sons, Travis of Wichita, and Orval C. of Spearman; two daughters, Mrs. Oarn Newman of Nash, Okla. and Mrs. Jack Morrison of Enid; 15 grandchildren; one brother, and five sisters.

(Schools and Hospitals Grants)

Jerry Taylor announced today that an Energy Conservation Measure grant application for Hansford Hospital in the amount of \$5800.00 has been recommended for federal funding by the Texas Energy and Natural Resources Advisory Council (TENRAC). Thomas D. Wright, Director of the Conservation Division, announced that Hansford Hospital has been recommended for funding out of a statewide total of 385 in the schools and hospitals category. Grant awards will be made by the U. S. Department of Energy (DOE) no later than March 15, 1980.

DOE's cost sharing grants program for schools, hospitals, and buildings owned by units of local government and public care institutions is administered through the Conservation Division of TENRAC. The purpose of the program is to assist public and private non-profit institutions to save energy and related costs by conducting technical assistance (TA) analyses (detailed engineering analyses) and purchasing and installing energy conservation measures (ECM) recommended by the analyses. Funding for TA and ECM projects is based on a 50 percent federal and 50 percent institutional match, except in hardship cases. This grant cycle provides \$5,645,418 for funding the schools and hospitals grant program.

Application for these funds was made on behalf of the local hospital district by ACR Energy Concepts, Inc., an Austin based consulting firm specializing in energy conservation and management.

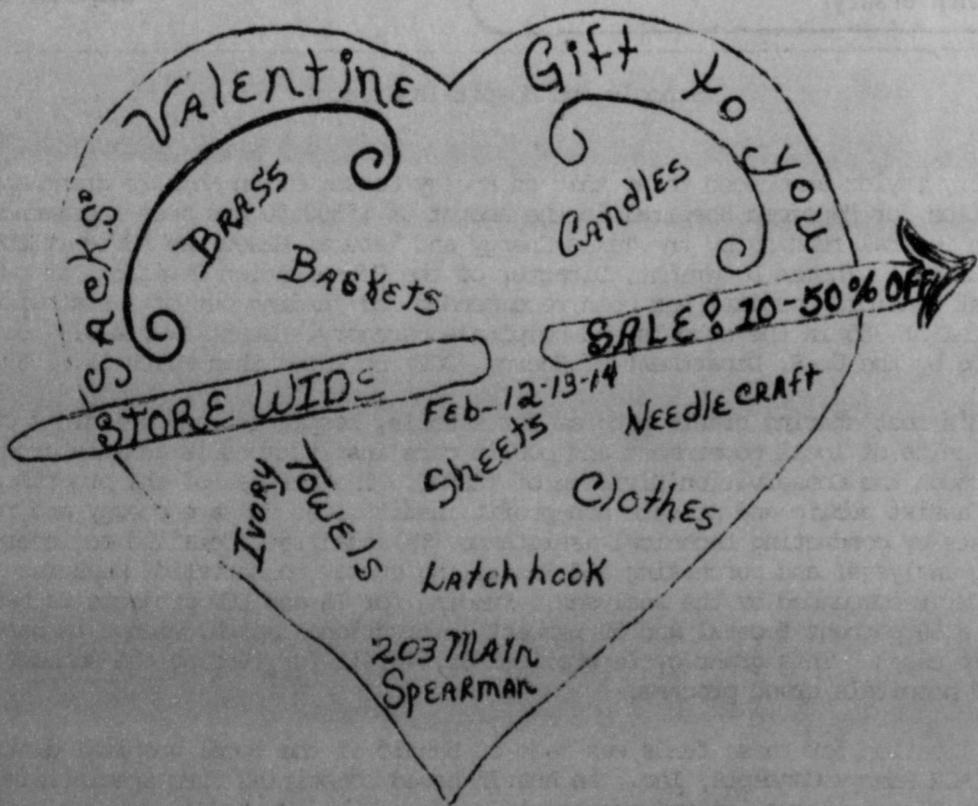

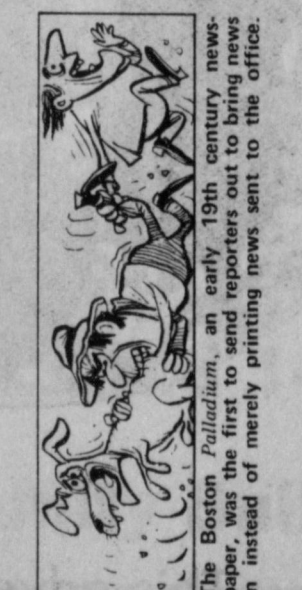
Students On Tech Honor Roll

WTSU Honor List Released

WTSU -- West Texas State University's President's List names 150 students and the Dean's List includes about 619 students for the fall 1979 semester.

To be eligible for the President's List, students must end the semester with at least a 3.85 total grade point average on a 4.0 scale. A 4.0 GPA is an "A." The Dean's List includes students whose grade point averages total at least 3.84 for the semester.

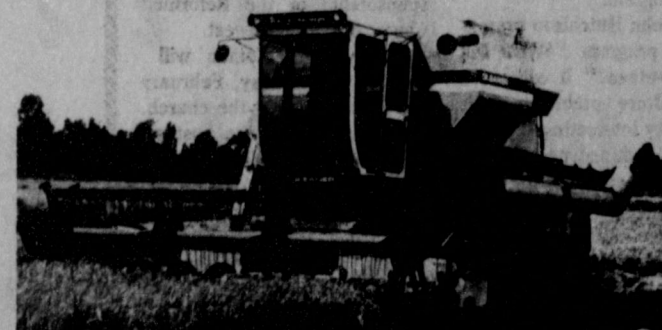

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Peter Marshall Fury In Gods Face To Be Here



The Rev. Peter Marshall, a Presbyterian minister from Boynton Beach, Florida, will be speaking in Spearman on February 17, 18, 19 (Sunday, Monday, Tuesday) in a Teaching-Preaching Mission on Christian growth and maturity.

Born and raised in Washington, D.C., the Rev. Mr. Marshall is the son of the late Dr. Peter Marshall, pastor of the historic old New York Avenue Presbyterian Church in Washington, D.C. and the Chaplain of the United States Senate from 1947 to 1979, and Catherine Marshall LeSourd, author of many best-selling books. He was graduated from Yale University in 1961 and Princeton Theological Seminary in 1964. Ordained in 1965, he served as an Assistant Minister in West Hartford, Connecticut for several years before becoming the pastor of the East Dennis Community Church on Cape Cod in Massachusetts, where he served from 1967 to 1977. He and his wife Edith have two children, Mary Elizabeth, age 10, and Peter Jonathan, age 5.

The Rev. Mr. Marshall will be preaching at the service for the public worship of God on Sunday, February 17, at 11:00 a.m. at the First Presbyterian Church of Spearman. He will be conducting a teaching seminary on Monday and Tuesday mornings from 10:00 a.m. to noon in the First Presbyterian Church. All three evening preaching services will be at 7:30 p.m. Sunday, Monday and Tuesday at the First United Methodist Church.

Peter's particular emphasis is the urgent need for American Christians to press beyond shallowness and superficiality in their spiritual lives. In our Lord's words: "If any person would come after Me, let one deny oneself, and take up one's cross daily, and follow Me." To implement this necessitates facing up to and dealing with our own sinful natures, and the areas of self that block the life of Jesus from flowing through us more freely.

Discovering this as the major key to Christian maturity, coupled with a burden for America's destiny at this crisis point in history, has led to his co-authoring, with David Manuel, a book about God's call on this nation, and His hand in our founding, entitled "The Light and the Glory", a book which is in the Hansford County Library. The central thrust of the book is that God will only be enabled to save our nation if we American Christians take II Chronicles 7:14 seriously, and put God's work to us in action: "... if my people, who are called by name, will humble themselves, and pray and seek my face, and will turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and forgive their sins, and heal their land."

Travis Angel will be the song leader for the evening services and the Chancel Choir of the First United Methodist Church will be bringing special music. George Collard will be taping each service and tapes will be available for sale following each session. Dorcas Collard will be selling copies of Peter Marshall's book before and after each service.

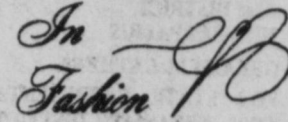

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Whitaker Speaks On Air Lift Experiences

Wes Whitaker, rancher South West of Gruver, spoke to the interdenominational men's prayer breakfast Wednesday morning, February 6, in the garden room of the Cattleman's Restaurant, about his experiences on air lifts to Latin American countries with the Full Gospel Business Men's Fellowship International.

"We've encountered on these air lifts not insurmountable problems. God has placed His anointing on the Full Gospel Business Men for this ministry. It is being led by the Spirit of God and it all involves around several men. Lyndon Payton is a former General Motors executive who has traveled in South America. He is pretty well known by all the governments. He is a man of prayer and fasting. As the door opens, he goes into that country, prays and fasts for a week, until whatever God leads him to do, and then the doors will begin to open. He'll make contact with men who will get him to see the president. All of these air lifts have been a ministry to the leaders of nations. The Bible promises you that God will set you before kings. This is what we are seeing happen.

"We want to Belize in May and met with Premier George Price, a devout Roman Catholic. We went there on the invitation of Bishop Castillo, the vicar general of the Roman Catholic Church and a born again Christian. George Price has been premier of Belize for twenty-five years. He takes communion every morning. He is a bachelor who has never been married.

"Belize is a country that the formerly part of British Honduras. There is still the country of Honduras but they had a split in the government a number of years back and now there are two countries where there formerly was one. Belize joins Guatemala. The capital of Belize is Belmontaine. It used to be Belize City. They had a big hurricane back in 1958 and destroyed a lot of Belize City and they moved the capitol

inland about seventy miles. It's all made of concrete. Twenty-six of us went on the air lift to Belize in May.

"We hosted a dinner there for the Premier George Price, his cabinet, the ambassadors and leaders of all the nations represented there. George Price is a very humble man. He drives around in a British Land Rover. He walks most of the places. He is a man of the people. The opposition party there is mainly Communist. When we entered the country, they began to flood the country with newspapers, radio, and TV ads that were CIA agents, anything they could do to disrupt. We had 800 at our first meeting in Belize City. The men gave their testimonies. The first man to receive Jesus Christ was George Price. Now this was election year. They have elections every five years. This November they had to call this election. George Price had been praying about it. He had real peace about it and didn't do very much campaigning. The opposition party really took after him. He won in November by the largest majority that had had ever won. His party got 18 of the 20 seats in Parliament.

"George Price's first concern is for the people. Thirty years ago, he and Father Castillo both went to Rome to study for the priesthood. Father Castillo stayed there and became a priest, came back to head the work of the Roman Catholic Church for the part of the world.

"After three years, God talked to George Price and told him to go back to lead his people. He came back and that's what he's done.

"Father Castillo had a couple of neices who were in this country and got involved in the Catholic Charismatic Renewal movement. He came here to set them straight and ended up getting born again.

"We went down and held a series of meeting all through Belize. In every meeting we held, we prayed for physical needs, the men gave their testimonies, and there were

countless people healed. About 75% of the people who attend the meeting accepted Jesus Christ as their Saviour.

"We left there and went down into Costa Rica at the invitation of President Carazo. Carazo is a Christian and Costa Rica is the most democratic of all the Latin American countries. They don't even have an army. We again hosted a meeting of all the leaders of Honduras. Through the sovereign move of God, Carazo sent the letters out and these people came. Only God could get the leaders of Nicaragua and Honduras to sit down at the same table. Many other ambassadors also came. There were ten of us there from the Full Gospel Business Men. As the men began to give their testimonies, many of these leaders began to turn over their lives to Jesus Christ. When the meeting broke up around 1:30 a.m. the Nicaragua and Honduras delegations got together around the swimming pool, hugged one another, and exchanged ambassadors between countries, and resumed diplomatic relations. God brought them together.

"We are going back to Nicaragua with a meeting beginning March 19. We are going also to Honduras. A lot of the leaders of other nations around will also be there. God is going to move. God has anointed the Full Gospel Business Men to reach the leaders of the nations.

"Over in Guyana, prime minister Herace Burnham is a born again Christian. We had an air lift to Guyana right after the Jonestown massacre. All religious leaders and missionaries had been thrown out. It was a miracle of God that they allowed the Full Gospel Business Men in. Sir Lionel Acou and his brother Edward were born again. People are seeing that God will do something in their lives.

"This is happening all over the world. It is an awesome thing to see how much God loves people. It is God's will that not any should parish but

the all should be saved. The gospel is going out with power in a tremendous flow of the Holy Spirit. God intended that each and everyone of us should be a soul winner. You need to get involved in what God would be having you do. Don't let anybody or anything stand in your way. It is hard to see people who don't know what God will do for them, who don't know that all the promises in the Bible are for today. We are not using one-hundredth of the power that is available to us. Seek God and the gift of faith. You can set the captives free. When you find division and strife in the body of Christ it is because people are not seeking God's will and are not in God's Word. God's Word will change your heart. You need to be out sharing your testimony with people. You've got to get involved in your community, in politics, and you've got to write your congressman. How are they going to know how you feel if you never say anything? Go out and further the cause of Christ."

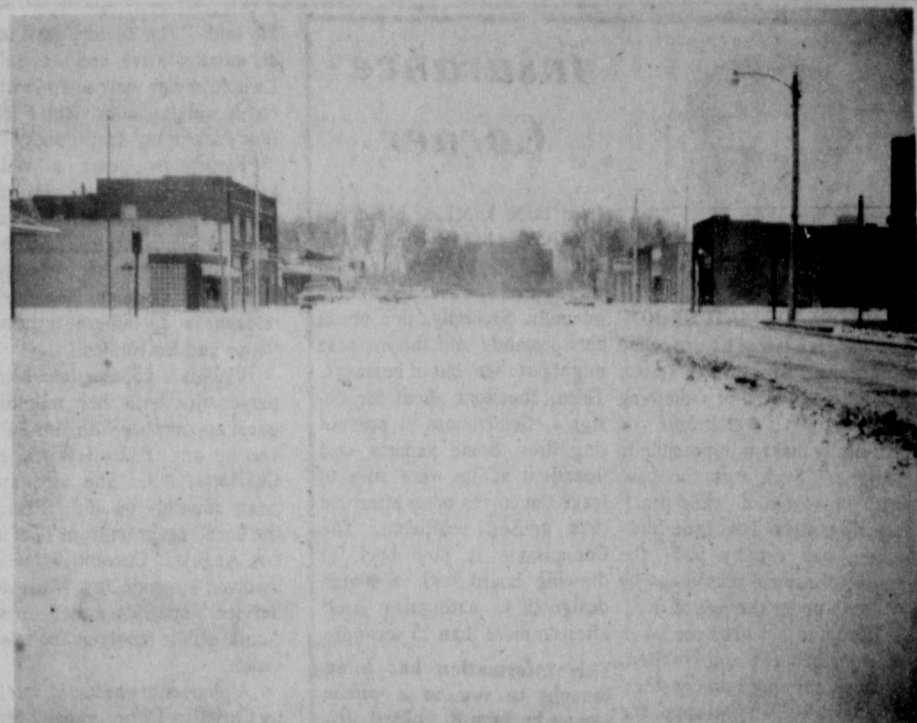

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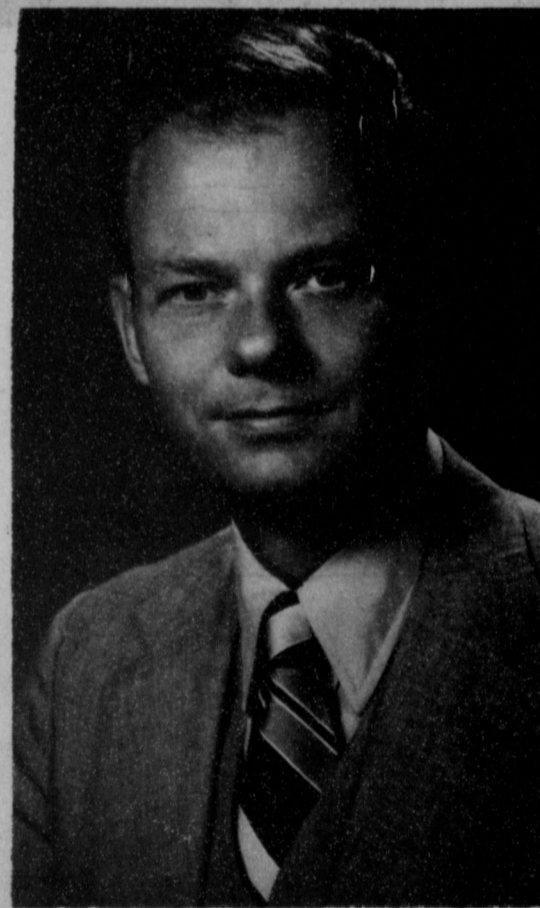



CHILDPROOF MATCHBOOK

There is a law of nature called "Murphy's Law" which states: "If there is a way for something to go wrong it will unless you physically make it impossible to happen." Such was the case with the advent of "child-proof" aspirin bottles. That little innovation has cut by 50% the source of aspirin poisonings by children under the age of five.

The same tack has been taken with matchbooks and children. But it is running into considerable trouble. Two years ago, the Consumer Product Safety Commission announced that matchbooks were to be made safer. It recommended to a skeptical industry a lock-type cover that tiny fingers could not easily pry open. That proposal suffered from three knockout blows before it was hardly even in the advanced stages. First, the cost was figured at about \$68 million annually. Secondly, five producers promptly said the expense might put them out of business.

Third, questions about the design's effectiveness in preventing fires. Some experts said impatient adults were sure to leave the covers open after use (like unused seatbelts). The Commission is now back to drawing board with a match designed to extinguish itself after no more than 15 seconds.
