Amarillo Man Killed As Car Hits Trailer

One Amarillo man was killed and another injured in a car-irrigation pipe trailer accident five miles south of Spearman on Texas Highway 15 at 9:30 p.m. Tuesday night.

Killed instantly in the accident was Thomas Elden Bell, 57, an insurance man who lived at 3319 Lometa, in Amarillo.

In Hansford Hospital in "fairly good" condition is James Wayland Malone, 39, of 6102 Calumet Rd., Amarillo, another insurance man.

The attending physician said Wednesday morning that Malone was in fairly good condition. The doctor said his injuries were confined mostly to lacerations about the head.

Texas Highway Patrolmen who investigated the accident said the foreign car with the two men in it hit a flat-bed trailer loaded with irrigation pipe. The trailer was owned by Gifford-Hill Western.

The officer said the trailer had broken loose about 30 minutes before the accident and went into the ditch at the side of the road. Part of the trailer was still sticking onto the highway.

According to the officer, there was a flagman at each end of the trailer flagging traffic.

The right side of the car hit

the pipe and the pipe went into the car. Bell was pinned in the car by the pipe. The officer reported Malone, who the officers thought early Wednesday was driving, was thrown out of the car.

Funeral services for Mr. Bell will be conducted in Amarillo by Boxwell's of Amarillo.

Flu Epidemic Shuts School And Revivals

An epidemic of flu, added to a large number of cases of chickenpox and other childhood diseases closed the Spearman schools Tuesday afternoon for the week.

The school was closed for three days at the request of County Health Officer Dr. Damon Gregg because of the large amount of illness.

School officials said there were about 25 percent of the students absent Tuesday. The hardest hit were the first three or four grades.

Principal Allen Alford said he had over 100 students out

George Wright Hired As Football Mentor

"I don't believe in three yards and a cloud of dust football," the new Lynx football boss said Tuesday night.

George T. Wright of Goddard High School in Roswell, N.M., was hired as head coach at Spearman High School Tuesday night.

The new football coach said his team will run a multi-T offense with a strong passing attack. A great high school passer, Wright said he likes to throw the ball.

A native of Sonora, he is a graduate of Sonora High School and the University of Tennessee, where he received his bachelor's and Masters' degrees. He has 30 hours toward his doctor's degree in education. He holds teaching and administrative certificates in Texas, New Mexico and Tennessee.

He has been coaching since 1960 when he was football coach at Franklin Jr. Hi in Abilene. His team won the city championship for the first time in 13 years. He coached the Jr. Varsity at Abilene Cooper, then moved to Lubbock High School as varsity backfield coach, assistant track coach and head scout for Carl Spoonmore. In 1962 he coached the defensive secondary for the North All-Star football team. He was also a paid lecturer and demonstrator at the school.

He became head track coach and varsity backfield coach at Lubbock High in 1964.

When Spoonmore moved to Harlingen after 1964, Wright accepted the head position at Goddard High School in Roswell, N.M. The new school was placed in the top enrollment bracket of the state, for

schools of 1,000 or more.

The new coach did not get a football letterman from Roswell High School when the school was divided. The school opened with 875 students and dropped to 802 students. He won two and tied two and lost six in the first year of competition for the school. They tied Roswell High.

Wright was all-state quarterback for two years in high school, he lettered four years and was captain his freshman year.

He still holds the record for best season pass completions (63 percent), best single game record, 15 of 17; total passing yardage, total offense and most points scored in a state playoff game, 42. These records were set in 1954-55.

He was also an all-district basketball forward, lettered two years in tennis, was a state finalist in the shot, 440 relay and mile relay teams.

He selected Tennessee from 25 offers of college scholarships. He went to Tennessee because Bowden Wyatt had in-

vited him to attend Arkansas, but Wyatt moved and Wright followed. He had not signed at Arkansas. Wyatt ran the

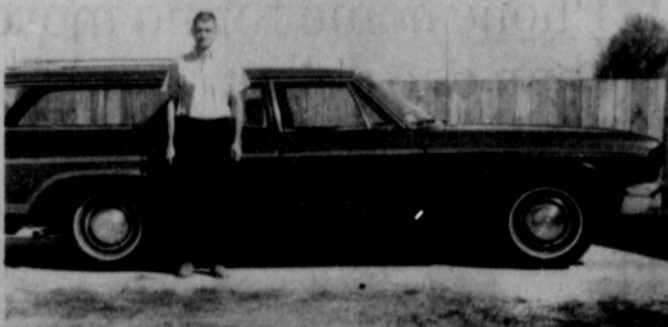
Registration Ends For Little League

Texas University Opened With Eight Teachers

On Sept. 15, 1883, the University of Texas was opened with a faculty of eight professors and four assistants, and enrollment of two hundred students and a physical plant of forty acres of land and the unfinished wing of one building.

Admission to the College of Arts is under the control of the Registrar of the University. The unit requirements for admission to the university are a minimum total of 15 high school credits, with the following distribution: English-3, Math-2, Foreign Language-2, natural science-2, social science-2, art or music or drama-1, or 1 1/2, additional from any group-6.

The University of Texas, being a state supported school, is able to keep tuition fees for Texas residents at an absolute minimum. Tuition for an example would be approximately \$50 per semester.

The College of Fine Arts has four main objectives:

1. To help each student attain the skills of an artist, and, at the same time, the sort of broad general education which is the intellectual foundation of the cultivated man or woman.
2. To develop talent to the highest degree of artistic capability.
3. To train teachers of the arts.
4. To help students at the University of Texas acquire discrimination, taste and sound critical judgement through courses in the arts, art exhibitions, concerts, plays and their association with artists and teachers.

College Offers Best Future

The number of estimated offenses reached an all-time high total of 284,249 for last year. This was an increase of 23,389 individual instances of criminal activity over the 260,860 offenses tabulated in 1964.

The largest increase, percentage-wise occurred in the aggravated assault cases, with a 17.1 per cent rise over the previous year. The number of thefts closely followed with a 10.3 per cent increase over the 1964 mark. Burglary showed an 8.8 per cent increase, robbery decreased 1.0 per cent, auto thefts were down 2.3 per cent, rape decreased 8.3 per cent and murder and homicide dropped 19.3 per cent.

The crime rate, the comparison of the number of crimes to the population of the state, also showed a sharp rise, Garrison stated. During 1965, there were 2,967.2 crimes committed for every 100,000 persons in Texas. This was 244.2 more than the 2,723.0 calculated for 1964, resulting in a nine per cent increase in the crime rate.

The citizens of Texas are being victimized at an ever-increasing rate," Garrison said. "During the past year, on the average, there was a theft every three minutes, a burglary every seven and one-half minutes, an auto theft every 27 minutes, an aggravated assault every 27 1/2 minutes, a robbery every two hours and fifteen minutes, a rape every six hours and a murder every nine and one-half hours.

"This results in a major crime on the average of every one minute and forty-five seconds, with no relief in sight unless major steps are taken to strengthen the police forces of our state."

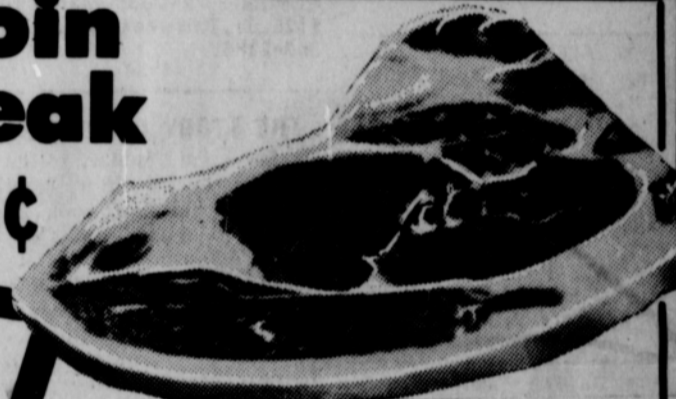
