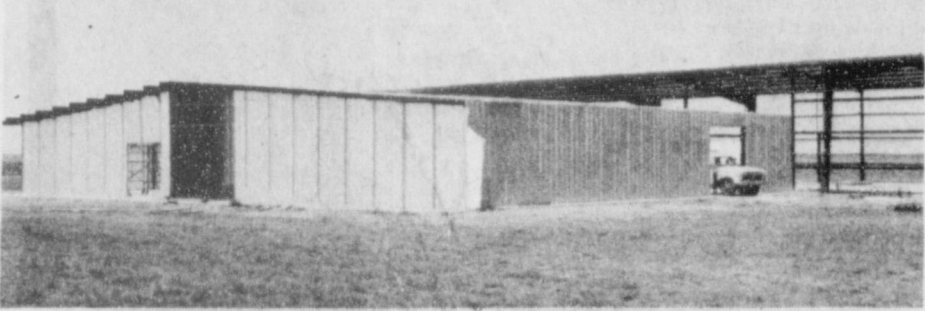
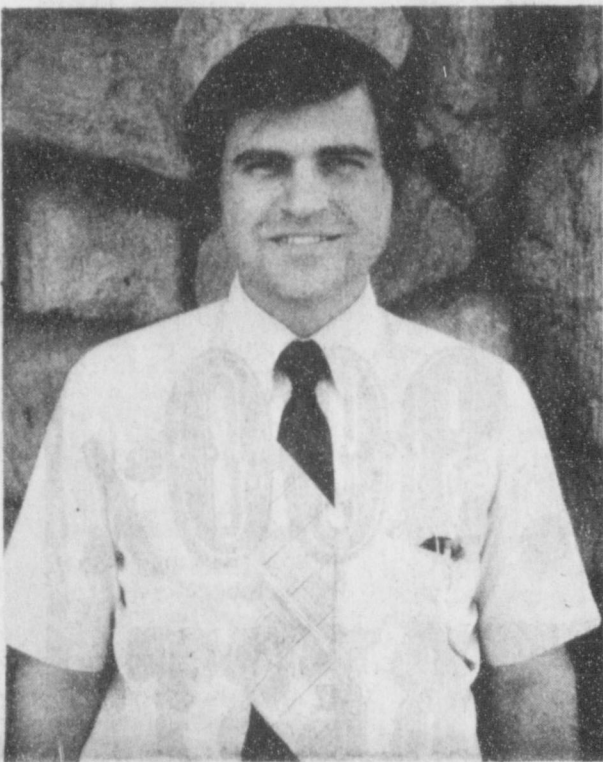


The newly refurbished Carl Archer building in main street is coming along nicely.

## Chiropractic Clinic Here

Dr. Darrell Duke, Booker chiropractor; Ken Maynard, his clinic director there and Mrs. Linda Duke, a fully certified chiropractic assistant and his wife, take a giant step toward a dream come true when they start taking appointments at their new clinic in Spearman, Wednesday, Aug. 26.

It was no hapstance that Dr. Duke named the facility when it opened at Booker a few months ago, the Regional Chiropractic Clinic. The vision that opened the first door to chiropractic patients included the goal of making chiropractic medicine "handy" to a large number of people over a wide area.

The Spearman Clinic is located in the Pittman-Shieldknight building, 511 SW Eleventh Ave. The phone number is 659-5585.

That is important for they will start making appointments Wednesday.

The actual practice of clinical chiropractics will begin Sept. 2, one week later.

Dr. Darrell Duke and his staff are of the modern genre of chiropractics. They are among the first to admit that some problems cannot be helped by chiropractic medicine and they are quick to refer those patients to a doctor of medicine.

But they are also dedicated to the fact that there are some physical problems the human body is heir to that only the science of chiropractics can help

As a matter of record, the facility at Booker was an instantaneous success. Housed in a brick structure 40 by 100 feet, it contains two adjusting rooms, examination room, x-ray room, conference room, doctor's office, business office, reception area, lounge and public and private bath areas.

Duke and Maynard plan to make a full diagnostic lab available to all patients in their practice area. Already in use is a device with the "16-cylinder" title of Derma-therm-o-graph which measures temperatures on either side of the spine and gives a graph printout so the doctor can pinpoint a source of trouble.

The same thermal principle has now been used in medical practice in the work against cancer...a testimony to advances made by chiropractics in alleviating human illnesses.

The Spearman clinic will not be a one-day-a-week operation. Office hours here will be as follows:

Monday: 4 - 8 p.m.; Tuesday: 4 - 8 p.m.; Wednesday: 9 a.m. - 5 p.m.; Thursday, closed; Friday: 2 - 5 p.m.

Should a patient need to see the doctor at other times, the schedule at the Booker facility is 8:30 a.m. - 2 p.m., Monday and Tuesday; Wednesday, closed; Thursday: 8:30 a.m. - 5 p.m. and Friday: 8:30 a.m. - 12.

Superintendent of Schools is Roy Harris. A new custodian to the school is Pete Markwood.

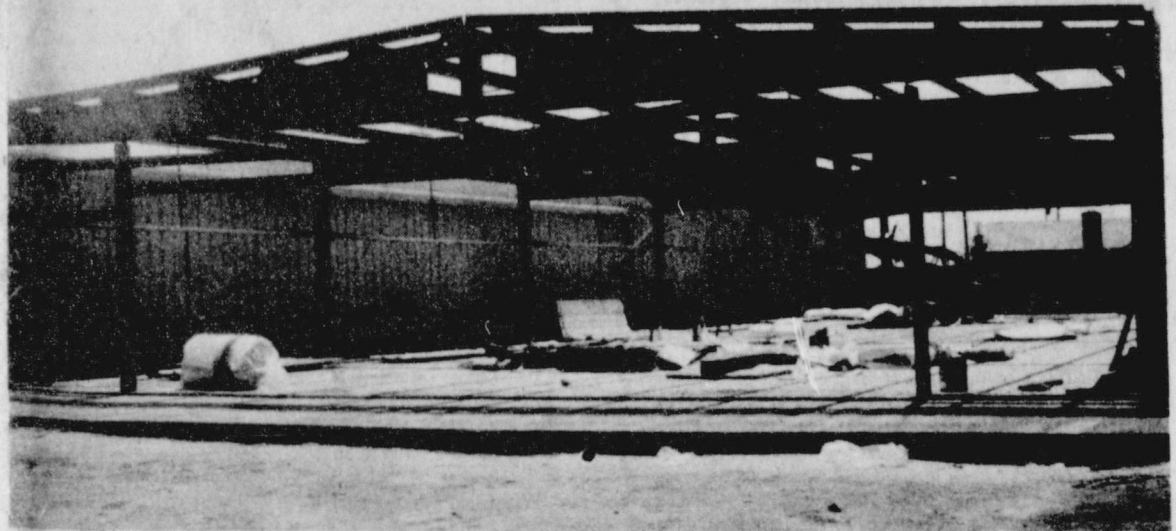

Grades 9 thru 12 will enroll at the high school.

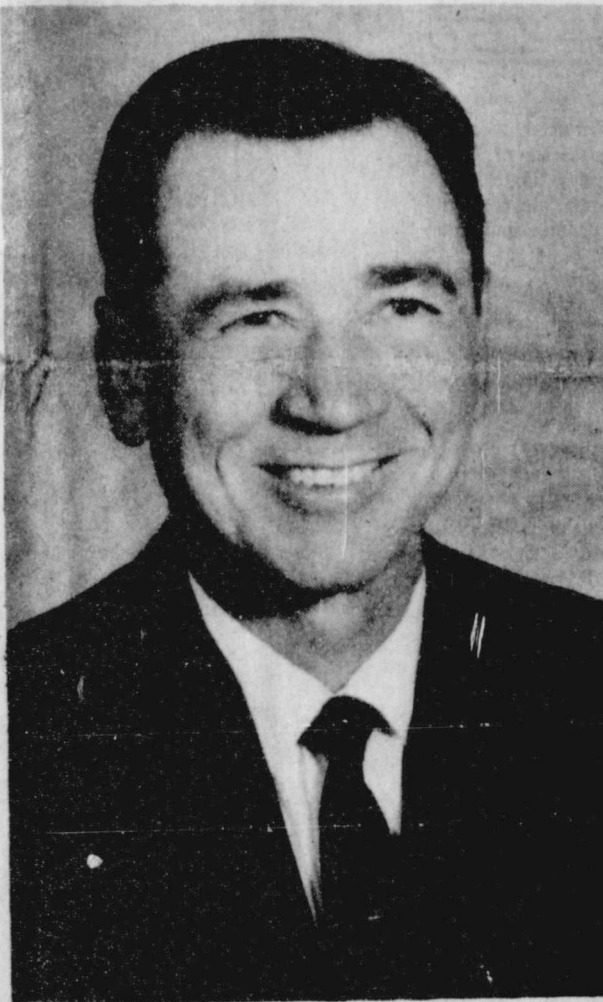
Students to the school must have their immunization records. Students en-

## Marvin Jones On State Tax Board

AUSTIN--Marvin L. Jones, Panhandle farmer from Spearman, today assumed his responsibilities as a member of the State Property Tax Board.

Jones, 61, was named by Gov. Bill Clements to fill a six-year term on the Agency's board.

The new board member for the tax administration agency that is located in the Capitol City has been farming in Hutchinson and Ochiltree counties since 1947. Over the last 34 years he has served on a number of farm-related boards and has been a member of two school boards.

Before Jones entered his lifelong occupation in agriculture, he spent three years in the Tax Accounting Division of the Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission. He was employed there following his 1937 graduation from the Gulf Coast-area Hull-Daisetta High School in Liberty county, where he was born and reared.

After attending Lamar College at Beaumont, Jones served as a pilot in World War II. Following the war, he completed his college education at Baylor University, earning a BA Degree in journalism.

I want you to know how I enjoyed the pictures of the by-gone days of kids we went to school with and the write ups about some of them. I have quite a few pictures taken while we lived there. One of Mr. Wilcox, the Superintendent, and Mr. A.H. Word and Dear Miss Deacon. Also one of the Junior (10th grade) class that year 1927 and 1928, and one of our S. School class at Union Church. They are, Mabel and Myrtle Andrews, Elma Buckley, Zella Davis, Opal Faus, Dot Berner, Velma Hays, Nova Schubert, Bonnie and Julia Snowden, and teacher--Mrs. A.E. Townsend.

I kept the picture of the Church that you ran in the paper on its' 60th Anniversary. We went to the Revival that the Morton Sisters held first, and I have a Song book with their pictures in it. 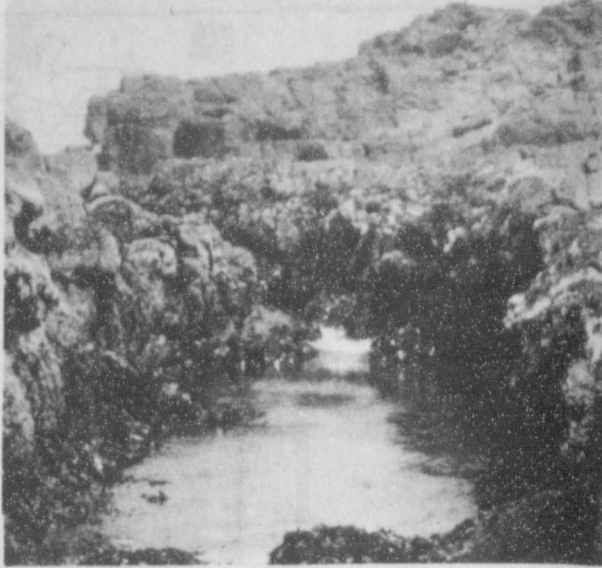

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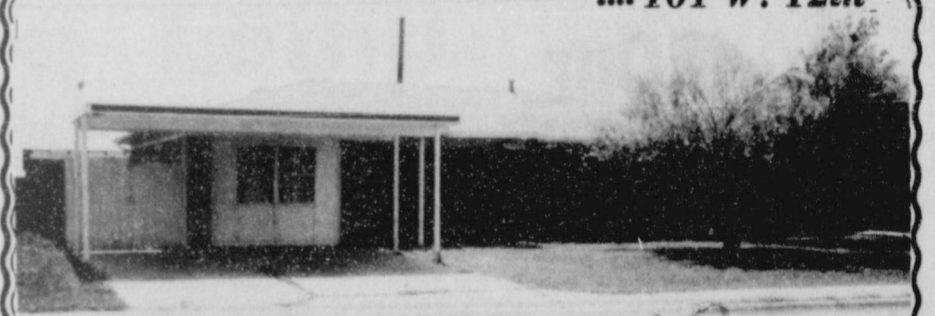
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## Four Teams Still in YMCA Tourney
