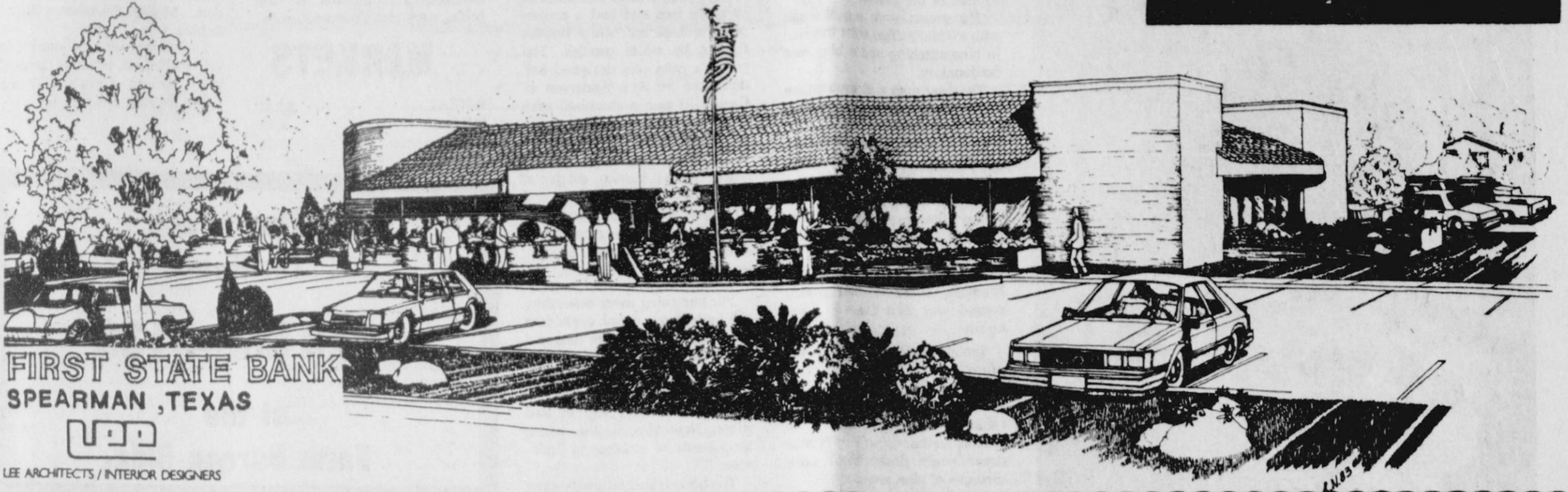
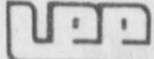

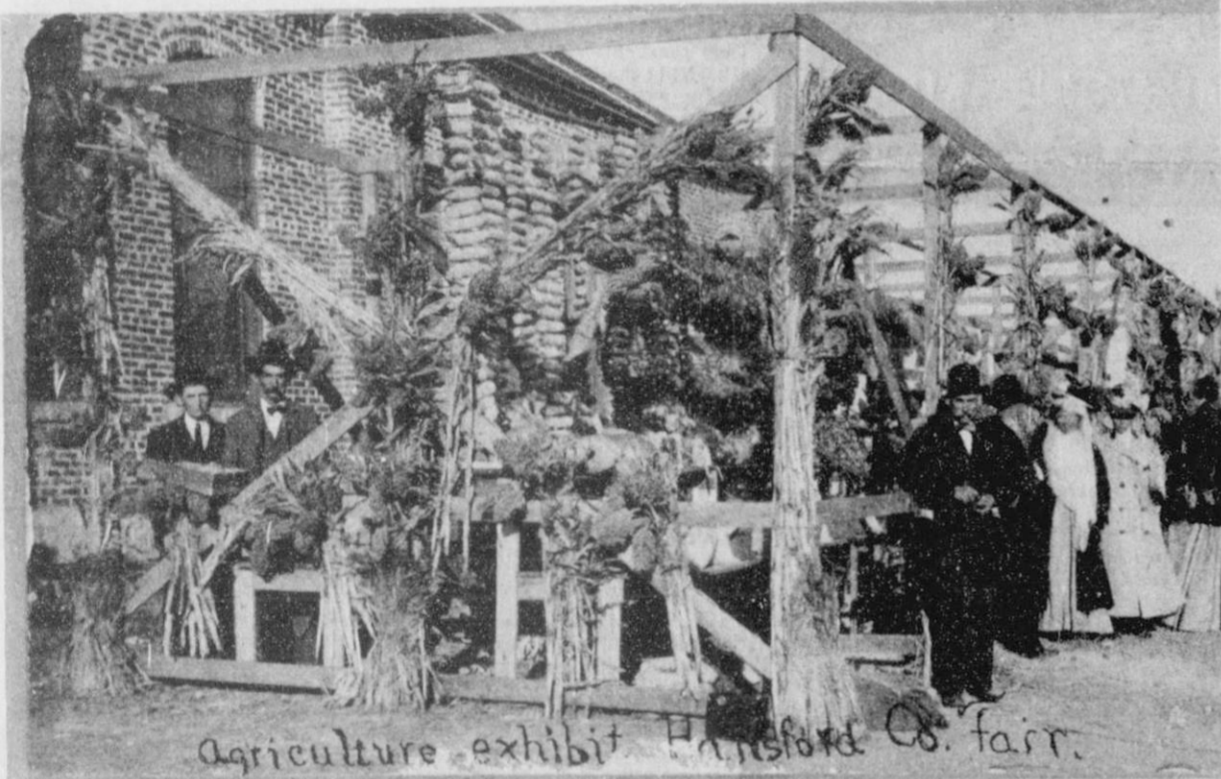

Coach Bobby Jones and his Lynx JV team came from behind in the third quarter to defeat Stratford 26-16.

Mike Pearson scored on an 8 yard run and the extra point try was no good to give the Lynx a 6-0 lead at half time.

In the third quarter, the Elks took an 8-6 lead over the Lynx. Mike Pearson broke lose for an 18 yard run with the extra point no good to give the Lynx a 12-8 point lead. City receives sales tax payments

State Comptroller Bob Bullock today sent checks totaling \$52.4 million in local sales tax payments to the 990 cities that levy the one-percent city sales tax.

"I don't know of a city official in Texas who doesn't lick his lips this time of the month," Bullock said.

The September checks represent taxes collected on sales made in July and reported to the

Comptroller by August 20.

Spearman was sent a check for \$3,949.40 compared to last year's \$9,090.25. Total payments to date are \$88,339.15 compared to last year's \$144,386.66 this is down 38.82%.

Gruver was sent a check for \$2,678.30 compared to last year's \$1,509.36. Total payments to date are \$27,509.18 compared to last year's \$28,494.48 this down 3.46%.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS
OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION

NOVEMBER 6, 1984

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 29 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides to state-chartered banks the same rights and privileges that are or may be granted to national banks of the United States domiciled in this state. For example, if national banks become authorized to maintain branch offices, this amendment would extend the same privilege to state banks.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide state banks the same rights and privileges as national banks."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that restructures the Permanent University Fund to provide: (1) for the expansion of the institutions eligible to participate in the bonding capacity of the fund to include the components of The University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems that have been added to those two systems of higher education since the Permanent University Fund was last restructured by constitutional amendment; (2) for the expansion of the purposes for which bond proceeds can be expended from new construction to include major repair and rehabilitation projects and the acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials; (3) for an increase in the bonding capacity from 20% (2% for The University of Texas System and 1% for the Texas A&M University System) to 30% (20% for The University of Texas System and 10% for Texas A&M University System) of the value of the assets (exclusive of real estate) in the Permanent University Fund in order to provide sufficient bond proceeds to care for the addition of 10 new institutions to those authorized to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program and to care for the expanded purposes for which the bond proceeds can be spent; and (4) for the dedication of the dividends, interest, and other income from the Permanent University Fund remaining after payment of principal and interest due on bonds and notes issued, to the provision of support and maintenance (over and above normal legislative appropriations) for Texas A&M University in Brazos County, Prairie View A&M University, and The University of Texas at Austin.

House Joint Resolution 19 also annually appropriates \$100 million in each fiscal year, beginning September 1, 1985 (from the first money coming into the state treasury that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution) for the use of those

education which are not included in The University of Texas or Texas A&M University Systems and, therefore, not eligible to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program. The amount of this appropriation could be adjusted every five years by a 2/3 vote of the Legislature, but could not be adjusted in such a way as to affect outstanding bonding indebtedness. Each institution of higher education that is eligible to participate (i.e., those institutions of higher education outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M University Systems) would be authorized to expend directly its share (such share to be determined pursuant to an equitable formula) of the \$100 million appropriation for the purposes of acquiring land, constructing and equipping buildings or other permanent improvements, major repair and rehabilitation of other permanent buildings or improvements, and acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials. Additionally, each institution would be authorized to issue bonds backed by a pledge of up to 50% of its share of the \$100 million annual appropriation for the purpose of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

Except in the case of fire or natural disaster and in other extraordinary cases, verified by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature, all institutions of higher education would be precluded from receiving appropriations of general revenue funds for the purposes of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to create from general revenue a special higher education assistance fund for construction and related activities, to restructure the Permanent University Fund, and to increase the number of institutions eligible to benefit from the Permanent University Fund."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 65 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the legislature to provide for the payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of officers, employees and agents of the state or its political subdivisions, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units authorized to make arrests, who die in the course of performing hazardous official duties. Payments to surviving spouses and dependent children of agencies and institutions of higher

such officers, employees, and agents are already authorized by the Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of certain public servants killed while on duty."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 20 proposes a constitutional amendment which abolishes the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties if a majority of the voters in each of those counties vote in favor of abolishing the office of county treasurer in a local election to be held on the issue. All the powers, duties, and functions of the office of county treasurer in each of these counties would be transferred to the county clerk.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which provides a new method of filling a vacancy in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The amendment requires the President pro tempore of the Senate to call together the committee of the whole Senate within 30 days after a vacancy occurs in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The committee would be required to elect one of its members to perform the duties of the Lieutenant Governor until the next general election. This individual would continue his duties as Senator at the same time that he performs the Lieutenant Governor's duties. If the Senator who is elected ceases to be a Senator before the next general election, another Senator must be elected according to the above procedure to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties. The President pro tempore would be required to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties pending the election of one of its members by the committee of the whole Senate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the state senate to fill a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that permits the use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on non-assessable life, health, or accident insurance policies and annuity contracts issued by a mutual insurance company authorized to do business in this state. The constitutional prohibition against a grant of public money to an individual, association, or corporation or against becoming a stockholder in a corporation, association, or company has limited life and health group policies of political subdivisions to non-mutual insurance companies. The amendment would permit mutual insurance companies to bid for those policies.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment to permit use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on certain insurance contracts of mutual insurance companies authorized to do business in Texas."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to change the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct to include one Judge of a Municipal Court and one Judge of a County Court at Law, who shall be selected at large and appointed by the Supreme Court with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The amendment also provides additional grounds for removal from office of judges or justices of Texas courts, and provides additional disciplinary actions that could be taken in lieu of removal or censure. The amendment would extend the Commission's disciplinary authority to masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges who hear cases by designation. The amendment creates a tribunal to review recommendations of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct for removal or retirement of a judge or justice. The review tribunal would be composed of seven (7) Justices or Judges of the Courts of Appeals selected by lot by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The amendment also provides for appeal of the review tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court of Texas and grants an accused judge the right to discovery of evidence.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which increases the per diem of members of the Legislature. The amount of per diem allowed during a calendar year would be equal to the maximum amount set in federal income tax statutes as of January 1 of that same year as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator. Current per diem is \$30; the maximum deduction is now \$75.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide a per diem for members of the legislature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed by federal law as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator."

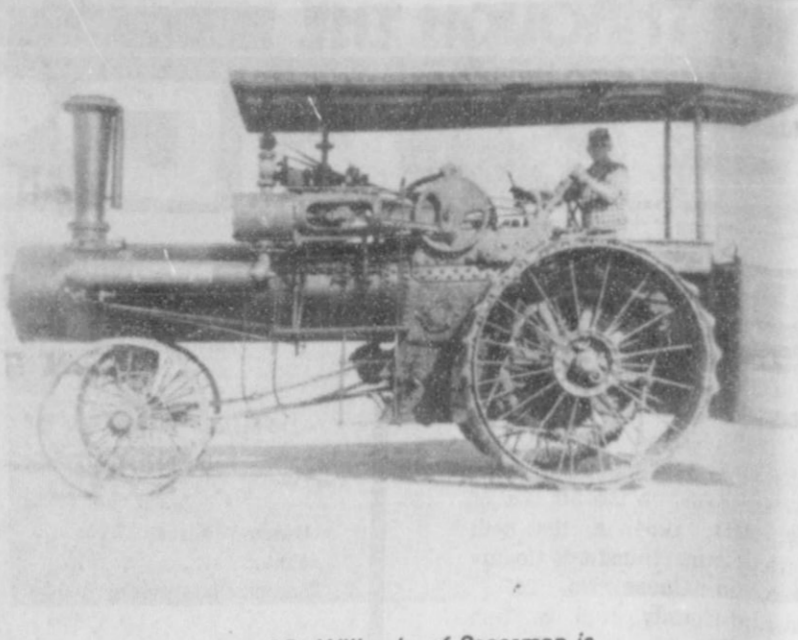
White Deer nips Spearman, 7-6

Q. My heart isn't functioning too well and as a result I have to take diuretic pills to keep from retaining fluid. Since I began them I've been bothered by muscle cramps which often wake me up at night. Does this mean that something else is going wrong?

The steam engine returns to the Texas Panhandle! At least it does on the weekend of September 15-16 during the seventh annual Golden Spread Antique Engine, Machinery, and Tractor Show near Perryton, Texas.

The event features a considerable number of antique tractors with names such as Mogul, Rumley, Advance Rumley, Waterloo Boy, Titan, Rock Island, Hart Parr, and many others. An antique car show is also featured.

One of the more unique features of the Antique Show is the exhibition of a number of mule drawn implements such as the header and barge which were once used during wheat harvest, mule drawn plows, and other equipment. These are actually driven during the afternoon parade which begins each day at 1:30 p.m.

The star of the antique machinery is the steam engine. The Show draws the full sized steam engines as well as a number of working scale models. A favorite of the Show seems to be the steam engine demonstration of climbing, descending, and stationary on an incline. The steam engine had no brakes and was controlled by the amount of steam pressure. J. D. Wilbanks of Spearman engineers this demonstration.

A large exhibition of stationary gasoline engines is expected. They range in size from the large to small. The pop-pop of the gasoline engine which brought power to the old Maytag washing machine was a familiar sound in years gone by.

A parade of the vehicles actually driven by the grandstands begins at 1:30 p.m. each day. A working cow dog demonstration is included during the parade time. The parade of activities concludes with the old time thrashing of wheat with a thrasher powered by a steam engine.

The grounds are open from nine to five Saturday and Sunday, September 15-16. Along with a close up look at the machinery, visitors may visit a museum on the grounds, a flea market is expected, and food is available. An open air church service is planned for 9:00 a.m. Sunday. Space is available for overnight campers. Guest exhibitors are welcome.

The Antique Show is sponsored by the Golden Spread Antique Machinery Association made up of members throughout the Texas and Oklahoma area. Dan Sell, Booker, is the president of the Association. The Association was formed to preserve and exhibit a part of our historical heritage.

The site of the Antique Show is on the Donald Sell farm located 10 miles east of Perryton on FM 377 then 5 miles south on FM 2711, or from Booker, 5 miles south on SH 23, 6 miles west on FM 377 and 5 miles south on FM 2711. Rattlesnakes are here to stay

Star Wars, Star Trek, and Indiana Jones are here to stay. These movies have become part of our world. And here in the Panhandle, so are rattlesnakes. Rattlers are like these movies, rattlers are here to stay. Tough, isn't it? One day you may be walking in your backyard near the wood pile and then you hear that common dreaded noise. What do you do? There are several things: you could scream, move to Alaska, call Rattler Bill, run away from the rattler, or you could get a shovel and whack it on the head. That sounds alright.

Alright you have a dead rattler. What can you do with it? Well you could lay the rattler in one of the desk drawers at Alton's Gulf Service. Everyone knows how much Alton loves and desires rattlesnakes. You could throw the snake into a pile of junk, or you could make a belt buckle, a tie, a belt, or you could stuff it and give it to your wife on your anniversary. Seriously, you could tan the snake hide. How? The following steps have worked for me.

1. Make sure that the snake is dead. (The only dead snake is when the head is cut off).

2. Take a pair of sharp, barber scissors and cut in the middle of the underside of the snake, that is, cut the crawler; from one end to the other. Cut the rattle off.

3. When that is completed, pull the skin from the body. It is like peeling a banana.

A pound of flesh: The IRS assessed a penalty of \$205.25 on Jimmy Culver and his wife, Billie, of Mesquite, Texas, for "underpaying" their federal income tax of \$8,956.52. The Culvers had paid, \$8,956.51 — one penny short. Jean Delk, who prepared the Culvers' tax return, said, "I won't let them get away with this." She intends to fight. Mrs. Delk received a letter, saying the IRS was authorized to file notice of federal tax lien and seize property, wages and other assets unless the Culvers fork over the penny — and the penalty. "I took a penny and taped it to the statement," she said and mailed it back. Penny wise.

4. Take a spoon and scrape the meat off the skin. Do this gently so that you will not damage the skin/hide. At this time decide if the scales are to be left on or removed. To remove them use a spoon or your fingers. I would leave the scales on. There is more color.

5. Place the hide in the following solution: one cup borax into one gallon of water for every hide. Keep the hide in this solution for about three/four days.

6. Take the hide out and peel off the meat. Place the hide meat side down on a piece of plywood and gently stretch the hide. But just enough to keep it firmly on the plywood/wood etc...

7. Peel off the hide when it starts to curl up in about two days. Cut along the crawler/ribs on each side leaving the hide. Then apply glycerin to both sides. Roll the hide up and in about a week you can use it to make a tie or belt.

To make a tie or belt, the hide is not strong enough by itself. To make a belt use a piece of leather, and for a tie use some material in order to make it strong. Do not use a sewing machine for that will rip the hide. Sew by hand.

I have seen ties, belts, stuffed snakes, hat bands, rattlesnake hats, vests, and coin purses. It's up to your imagination. Next time around: More about Rattlers.

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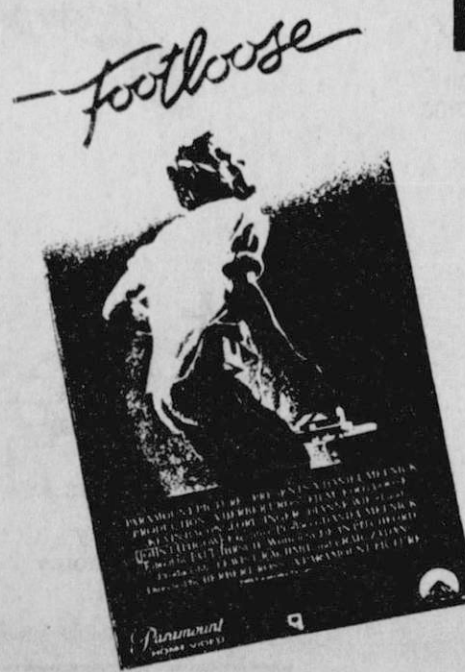
