

At Spearman high school auditorium . . . Dam bids to be opened Wednesday

The long-awaited opening of bids for the Palo Duro River Authority dam project will take place Wednesday morning when PDRA board members meet in open session at the Spearman high school auditorium.

The PDRA board will meet first in their board room at the Pittman-Shieldknight building beginning at 9 a.m., then will recess and reconvene at the SHS auditorium beginning at 10:30 that morning.

While they will take care of a couple of agenda items during their initial gathering at the Pittman-Shieldknight building, the sole purpose of the public meeting at the SHS campus is for the opening

of bids on construction of the dam project.

No award will be made during the Wednesday's meeting. Engineers for the PDRA will be given the bids for inspection. Once they have been certified by engineers as meeting specifications, they will be returned to the Spearman-based water authority.

PDRA general manager Johnnie Lee expects to have the certified bids back within a week of the bid opening.

Once the bids have been certified, the PDRA board will meet in special session to award the bid.

After the bid is awarded, the successful contractor could have

construction started on the dam site in as little as 30 days, notes Lee.

That would put construction on the PDRA dam starting in late April or early May.

"There were 154 sets of plans sold to contractors," reports the PDRA manager. "Of course, many of the contractors were buying 10 sets at a time, but that's still a lot of plans."

Engineers for the Palo Duro River Authority expect between eight and 10 bids to be on hand for the bid opening Wednesday, according to Lee.

The successful bidder will be in

charge of building a 3,700-foot earthen dam across the Palo Duro draw -- a dam which will eventually hold back 60,900 acre feet of water which will serve as both a reservoir and recreation facility for member communities.

The Palo Duro Dam project -- the lake has yet to be given an official name -- has six member communities including Spearman, Gruver, Stinnett, Dumas, Sunray and Cactus.

Residents of those communities will eventually be utilizing water from the lake for tap water. That portion of the project is still several years off, however.

After 5 months into fiscal year . . .

Hospital financial picture strong

Now five months deep into the 1987-88 fiscal year, the Hansford Hospital District's decision to 'bite the bullet' and seek a 56 percent tax increase appears to be doing

the job it was designed to do, hospital administrator Al La Rochelle told board members Thursday evening.

A combination of increased taxes

along with higher than anticipated patient census for the period shows both the hospital and the nursing home in better fiscal shape than projected through those first five months.

The board received the reports at their monthly meeting Thursday evening, reports which show the hospital slightly over \$100,000 to the better than budgeted while the Manor is almost \$17,000 better than projected for that period.

The hospital board also approved a contract with Dr. Lawrence Behney of Missouri. While Behney's family will go ahead and make their move to Spearman in early April, the physician is obligated to a 2-week tenure in Oklahoma, and must pass Texas licensing requirements before he

can open his practice in Spearman.

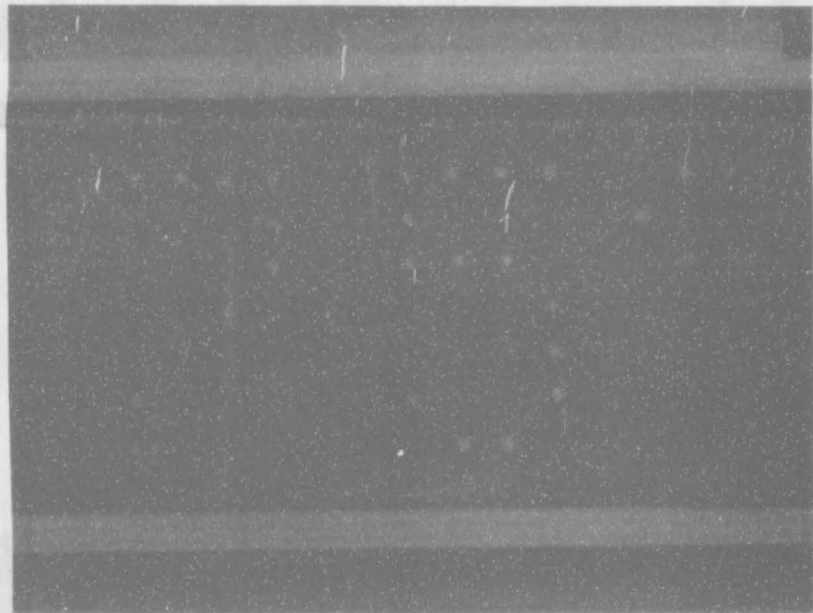
Behney is expected to assume his Spearman practice between April 1 and July 1, La Rochelle notes.

The hospital board also approved a new 3-year contract with La Rochelle which mainly outlines duties and responsibilities of and to the hospital administrator and the board.

The financial report continues to bring bright news to hospital district taxpayers, and the problems which beleaguered the medical institution last year seem to have been resolved.

Through the first five months of operation, the loss for the district is running 40 percent less than projected and a \$250,000-plus cash

Interest remains light for city, school posts

Even though the Super Tuesday primary elections have been safely tucked away by voters, interest in upcoming city and school elections are apparently drawing little interest with two seats still without contenders as of presstime Friday.

In Spearman, three city council seats are open to election May 7 as are two seats on the Spearman Independent School District board of trustees.

City councilmembers serve 2-year terms while school board members serve 3-year terms.

Both SISD trustee incumbents, Mike Garnett and Joe Clement,

have filed for re-election to those offices.

Incumbent city mayor Ralph Blodgett, along with incumbents Ed Garner and Jim Nicholson have indicated they will not seek re-election in 1988.

Only the mayor's office has received any attention, that coming in a lone filing by former city councilmember Bob Pearson for the office of Mayor.

Both city councilmen seats remained open without any filings as late as noon Friday.

Filing deadline for both the city and school elections is Wednesday, March 23.

Personnel contracts to be main item for SISD

The Spearman ISD board of trustees will meet in regular session Monday evening but may have a special session on tap for next week as well. That special session would come toward the latter part of the week in order to approve architect's plans and specifications on the proposed junior high building program.

Monday's meeting will begin at 7 p.m. in the board room at Spearman High School, however, with approval of teacher's contracts the main item on an otherwise routine, if somewhat lengthy, agenda.

Prior to approving contracts, the board will meet in executive session to discuss personnel, then will reconvene in open session to actually make their vote.

Trustees will also hear requests from Spearman Emergency Medical Services to provide either equipment or training help. The H&S EMS provides free standby emergency help at Spearman ball games.

The board will also consider the adoption of next year's school calendar and will consider approval of textbook committee recommendations for school books for the 1988-89 school year.

The board will also hear a report from consultants hired to examine the compliance of the SISD to regulations governing the use of asbestos floor and ceiling tiles in school buildings.

It is expected that compliance with the federally-mandated asbestos laws could cost the Spearman ISD between \$15,000-\$20,000.

Work toward the 1988-89 budget will also begin as trustees appoint budget committees and set work sessions at Monday's meeting.

County, hospital to hold joint meet March 24

A special joint meeting between the Hansford County commissioner's court and the Hansford Hospital District board of directors will be held March 24 in Gruver with the re-appointment of directors to be the main item on the agenda.

Three members of the hospital board -- board president Jack Oakes, Rosa Lee Butts and Jerry Hunt -- have terms which will expire this year.

All three have indicated they will serve again and the commissioner's court -- which has the responsibility of appointing hospital board members -- is expected to appoint the three to another 2-year term.

Sirens to be tested March 21

A test of the emergency warning sirens will be held Monday, March 21, announces Spearman police chief, Joe Raper.

The test of the city's four emergency sirens will take place at 4:30 that afternoon with all four sirens blowing for a full cycle, or about 10 seconds.

The test is made annually to ensure the working condition of the emergency alert system.

The sirens are located at 11th and Evans, E. Kenneth and North Brandt, in the 400 block of Barkley and at 7th and Oklahoma streets.

A test of the storm sentry indoor warning system will also be held at 6:05 p.m. in conjunction with KRDF-FM radio in Spearman.

deficit has been erased as well. Between the hospital, the nursing home and physician clinics, the 1987-88 budget had called for a loss of \$295,183 through that 5-month time period. The actual loss is \$177,744, a total of \$117,439 lower than anticipated.

Losses at the medical facility are mainly due to medicare, medicaid and bad debt service.

The hospital is actually showing a profit from operations of \$87,670. 63 for the year -- well up from a \$53,000-plus loss from operations for the same period a year ago.

But that profit is eroded quickly by medicare and medicaid adjustments which total over \$80,000 and bad losses of \$69,868.85 through the first five months.

The total loss for the hospital is \$128,220.57 compared to a loss from operations of \$258,816.96 for the same period a year ago.

The Hansford Manor Nursing Home is showing a much improved situation over the same period last year where they had a loss of slightly over \$66,000 through the first five months.

This year they show a minor profit of \$518.73 for that period prior to depreciation expense and indigent patient welfare.
