City Council raises property taxes

The Spearman City Council held its meeting Tuesday, September 11. The main items on the agenda were the raising of property taxes and the disbursement of general revenue sharing funds.

The \$26,000 in the general revenue sharing fund was divided among five recipients. The Golden Spread Senior Citizen's Center will receive \$3,500 as will the Hansford County Historical Museum. The Health and Sanita-

tion Dept. and the Hansford and Spearman Emergency Medical Service will each receive \$8,000 for the purchase of new equipment. The remaining \$3,000 is earmarked for the acquisition of the old First State Bank building which is being purchased to replace the old city hall building which was burned last year.

Councilmen voted to raise property taxes to .7259 cents per \$100 of valuation. In many cases this

tax is calculated after exemptions, such as the 30 percent homestead exemption. There are other exemptions for senior citizens, certain agricultural land and selected veterans.

Sanitation rates were raised 15 percent which means that a single family dwelling which was paying \$4.05 per month will now pay \$4.65 per month.

Monthly water and sewer rates were also hiked. The minimum

rates for up to 3000 gallons has been raised from \$4.40 per month to \$5.05 per month. The rate for each additional thousand gallons will be raised from \$1 to \$1.15 per month.

Other rates which have been increased are animal control fees and fees for food handling establishments. The animal pick-up fee is up from \$5 to \$25 and board us

up from \$3 to \$5 for the first day of impoundment. The fees for sanitation inspections at food handling establishments are up from \$10 to \$30 for the initial application and from \$3 to \$25 for annual renewals.

All the actions approved by the city council will go into effect on October 1.

A special called meeting of the Board of Directors of Hansford County Hospital was held on August 30, 1984 at 7:00 P.M. in the Hospital Board Room.

Present were Jack Oakes, President; Alton Ellsworth, Vice-President; Leslie Barkley, Sec.-Tres.; Dwight Hutchinson; Jerry Hunt; and John Trindle.

The meeting was called to order by Jack Oakes.

Dr. McClellan presented Dr. and Mrs. Mark Heard to the Board.

The Board as a whole welcomed Dr. and Mrs. Mark Heard to the meeting and Hansford County.

Dr. Heard expressed a desire to start a practice of medicine in Hansford County in 1985, but that he had a Governmental Scholastic Scholarship obligation to meet and would need help with this obligation.

Next, Dr. Takhar addressed the Board with his concern of whether there was any further need of an additional physician in Hansford County; and should the Board help Dr. Heard with his governmental obligation.

The Board thanked Dr. McClellan and Dr. Takhar for expressing their view points, they also thanked Dr. and Mrs. Heard for coming to Spearman to meet with them.

Next, in accordance with Article 8252-17, Section 2 (f) and (g) the Board met in Executive Session.

In the prescribed manner, the Board reconvened the meeting open to the public.

Next, John Trindle made a motion that the Board authorize the Administrator to negotiate a contract for the Hansford County Hospital District to redeem the Governmental Scholastic Scholarship obligation of Dr. Mark Heard; in exchange for his agreeing to practice medicine in Hansford County for a period of four years. Motion was seconded by Dwight Hutchinson. There were 3 votes in favor of the motion, 2 against the motion. Motion carried by majority rule.

There being no further business before the Board the meeting was adjourned.

Hightower announces grazing period extension

Congressman Jack Hightower announced today that due to recent congressional action, the normal period during which producers may graze cattle on their 1985 wheat crop has been extended by an additional 30 days. It will now be up to individual county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) committees in Texas to decide whether to add this extension to the beginning or the end of the normal grazing period.

"This provision, which was added to the 1984 Supplemental Appropriations bill, should be helpful to wheat growers and cattlemen in the 13th District,"

Hightower said. "It will allow them to utilize their wheat crop in whatever way will be best for them for an additional time period."

"I felt I should make some kind of announcement so that producers in our district who may not be aware of this action could use this information in making some of their planting and participation decisions on the 1985 Farm Bill and received testimony directly from producers in the field. Hightower is a member of the Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee of the House Appropriations Committee which reviews the funding of agriculture programs nationwide.

PRP solves special problems

Experiencing an uncomfortable feeling akin to indigestion regarding an unresolved tax problem? If you have already tried the normal IRS remedies to solve your problem, the tax agency suggests you try its Problem Resolution Program (PRP) office.

The most common problems brought to the PRP office are complaints about missing refunds, mixed up social security numbers, incorrect billings by IRS, and situations caused by

taxpayer error, the IRS says. They cautioned, however, that the Problem Resolution should not be used as a substitute for normal procedures.

Although most taxpayers will never need the services of PRP, the IRS says that taxpayers with a persistent tax problem will find PRP willing and able to help. Taxpayers can contact PRP through the IRS assistance number listed in the phone book under U.S. Government.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS
OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION

NOVEMBER 6, 1984

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 29 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides to state-chartered banks the same rights and privileges that are or may be granted to national banks of the United States domiciled in this state. For example, if national banks become authorized to maintain branch offices, this amendment would extend the same privilege to state banks.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide state banks the same rights and privileges as national banks."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that restructures the Permanent University Fund to provide: (1) for the expansion of the institutions eligible to participate in the bonding capacity of the fund to include the components of The University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems that have been added to those two systems of higher education since the Permanent University Fund was last restructured by constitutional amendment; (2) for the expansion of the purposes for which bond proceeds can be expended from new construction to include major repair and rehabilitation projects and the acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials; (3) for an increase in the bonding capacity from 20% (¾ for The University of Texas System and ¼ for the Texas A&M University System) to 30% (20% for The University of Texas System and 10% for Texas A&M University System) of the value of the assets (exclusive of real estate) in the Permanent University Fund in order to provide sufficient bond proceeds to care for the addition of 10 new institutions to those authorized to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program and to care for the expanded purposes for which the bond proceeds can be spent; and (4) for the dedication of the dividends, interest, and other income from the Permanent University Fund remaining after payment of principal and interest due on bonds and notes issued, to the provision of support and maintenance (over and above normal legislative appropriations) for Texas A&M University in Brazos County, Prairie View A&M University, and The University of Texas at Austin.

House Joint Resolution 19 also annually appropriates \$100 million in each fiscal year, beginning September 1, 1985 (from the first money coming into the state treasury that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution) for the use of those

agencies and institutions of higher education which are not included in The University of Texas or Texas A&M University Systems and, therefore, not eligible to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program. The amount of this appropriation could be adjusted every five years by a ½ vote of the Legislature, but could not be adjusted in such a way as to affect outstanding bonding indebtedness. Each institution of higher education that is eligible to participate (i.e., those institutions of higher education outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M University Systems) would be authorized to expend directly its share (such share to be determined pursuant to an equitable formula) of the \$100 million appropriation for the purposes of acquiring land, constructing and equipping buildings or other permanent improvements, major repair and rehabilitation of other permanent buildings or improvements, and acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials. Additionally, each institution would be authorized to issue bonds backed by a pledge of up to 50% of its share of the \$100 million annual appropriation for the purpose of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

Except in the case of fire or natural disaster and in other extraordinary cases, verified by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature, all institutions of higher education would be precluded from receiving appropriations of general revenue funds for the purposes of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to create from general revenue a special higher education assistance fund for construction and related activities, to restructure the Permanent University Fund, and to increase the number of institutions eligible to benefit from the Permanent University Fund."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 65 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the legislature to provide for the payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of officers, employees and agents of the state or its political subdivisions, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units authorized to make arrests, who die in the course of performing hazardous official duties. Payments to surviving spouses and dependent children of

such officers, employees, and agents are already authorized by the Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of certain public servants killed while on duty."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 20 proposes a constitutional amendment which abolishes the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties if a majority of the voters in each of those counties vote in favor of abolishing the office of county treasurer in a local election to be held on the issue. All the powers, duties, and functions of the office of county treasurer in each of those counties would be transferred to the county clerk.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which provides a new method of filling a vacancy in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The amendment requires the President pro tempore of the Senate to call together the committee of the whole Senate within 30 days after a vacancy occurs in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The committee would be required to elect one of its members to perform the duties of the Lieutenant Governor until the next general election. This individual would continue his duties as Senator at the same time that he performs the Lieutenant Governor's duties. If the Senator who is elected ceases to be a Senator before the next general election, another Senator must be elected according to the above procedure to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties. The President pro tempore would be required to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties pending the election of one of its members by the committee of the whole Senate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the state senate to fill a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that permits the use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on non-assessable life, health, or accident insurance policies and annuity contracts issued by a mutual insurance company authorized to do business in this state. The constitutional prohibition against a grant of public money to an individual, association, or corporation or against becoming a stockholder in a corporation, association, or company has limited life and health group policies of political subdivisions to non-mutual insurance companies. The amendment would permit mutual insurance companies to bid for those policies.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment to permit use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on certain insurance contracts of mutual insurance companies authorized to do business in Texas."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to change the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct to include one Judge of a Municipal Court and one Judge of a County Court at Law, who shall be selected at large and appointed by the Supreme Court with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The amendment also provides additional grounds for removal from office of judges or justices of Texas courts, and provides additional disciplinary actions that could be taken in lieu of removal or censure. The amendment would extend the Commission's disciplinary authority to masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges who hear cases by designation. The amendment creates a tribunal to review recommendations of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct for removal or retirement of a judge or justice. The review tribunal would be composed of seven (7) Justices or Judges of the Courts of Appeals selected by lot by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The amendment also provides for appeal of the review tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court of Texas and grants an accused judge the right to discovery of evidence.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which increases the per diem of members of the Legislature. The amount of per diem allowed during a calendar year would be equal to the maximum amount set in federal income tax statutes as of January 1 of that same year as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator. Current per diem is \$50; the maximum deduction is now \$75.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide a per diem for members of the legislature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed by federal law as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator."

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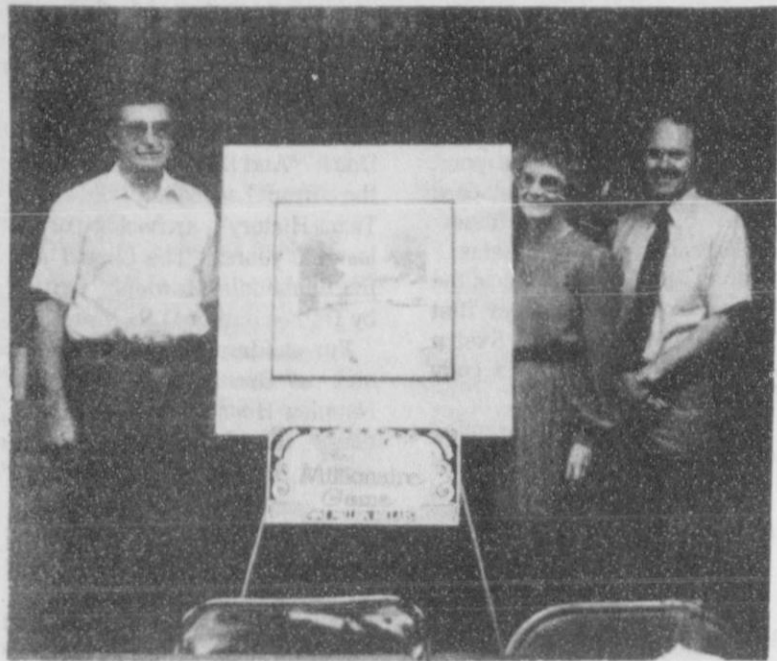

Chemical People to have seminars here



Marilyn Golightly will be a featured speaker at the Substance Abuse Rally to be held Monday, September 17.

Abuse Rally to be held Monday, September 17.

The Chemical People of Hansford County will take an innovative step in the growing battle against substance abuse among the young people of our community. On Monday, Sept. 17 representatives from the Panhandle Substance Abuse Consortium will present seminars in the Spearman Schools. The goals of this "Rally Day" are to raise community awareness of substance abuse in every age group of our society and to give specific help to youth and adults in ways to combat and prevent substance abuse. Wayne Hughes, Regional Alcoholism Services Director for the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, believes this is the first time a project of this nature has been held in Texas schools.

The substance abuse consortium was formed in 1982 so that professionals in the substance abuse field could share information about intake evaluation and referral programs, treatment operations and rehabilitation techniques and practice in the Texas Panhandle area.

The consortium is made up of professionals from all aspects of the field. The members are bound by letter of agreement to promote the development of services and facilities that provide the maximum attention to the needs of the substance abuser, his or her family and significant others. A primary aim of the consortium is to eliminate duplication of services while insuring that there is sufficient redundancy of service to serve the needs of all.

The Education Resources Team will present classroom seminars to Spearman students.

The team was formed by the consortium to provide information about substance abuse to the school children of the Texas Panhandle. Members of the team are professionals in the substance abuse field whose expertise enables them to provide a variety of views on the complex subject of substance abuse.

The resources team is made available to school systems in the Panhandle free of charge. Depending on the distance from Amarillo and other circumstances, sponsoring communities or school systems, reimbursement for actual mileage driven by consortium members may be requested.

The Education Resources Team has five objectives:

1. To provide up-to-date information on substance abuse to school students in the classroom. Every effort is made to tailor presentations to the classes where the team members appear. The consortium has made the decision to not interrupt the school day in any way.
2. To assist school administrators and counselors where requested in developing techniques to deal with the school's substance abuse challenges. Specific

attention is given to the development of a student assistance program for each host school as an outgrowth of the team's involvement.

3. To orient student leaders of the school to a drug-free environment. The team will meet with student leaders at the discretion of the school administration for a brief "pep talk" that will help them become aware of the resources of the community and the region.

4. To orient teachers of the school to the challenges of a drug-oriented society. This includes intervention and counseling techniques that can be used on an emergency basis. Particular emphasis is given to the value of a student assistance program.

5. To inform the general public. Team members believe it is important for the general public that supports the school to know what kind of information their students are getting and how they can get involved. This will be done in an evening session following the school presentation.

Speakers and topics throughout the day are as follows:

Larry Barber, Amarillo Council on Alcoholism will present *Getting it Together*--What it takes to identify the drug problem in the community and how to turn the situation around. Who do we go to? What do we do? How do we form student activist groups to help combat peer pressure. When do we use positive peer pressure?

Mr. Barber is a 1974 graduate of Baylor University with a bachelor's degree in communications. He has been executive director of the Amarillo Council on Alcoholism for over a year. Before that, he served as the council's director of education services.

Prior to working for the council, Mr. Barber was news director of KFDD TV in Amarillo. He held several similar posts around the state before coming to Amarillo in 1977.

He is a graduate of the Johnson Institute short course on Chemical Dependency and the Family and served in 1983 on the steering committee of the Texas Panhandle Chemical People. He was director of the young people's conference for the 11th Annual Tri-State Institute On Substance Abuse.

Bill Thompson, Texas Tech Family Practice--Aspects of Substance Abuse--The disease nature of substance abuse. How mood-altering and consciousness-altering substances affect behavior patterns. Presentation to science classes will deal with the chemical nature of substance abuse and how the long-range health, mental and physical abilities of the user are affected.

Mr. Thompson is an instructor in the Texas Tech School of Medicine and staff psychologist of the Texas Tech Family Practice Center. He joined the Tech faculty in 1982.

Mr. Thompson is a native of Alabama with a Master of Arts Degree in Psychology from Alabama A&M University and a Bachelor's degree in Education from Athens State University. He graduated from Alabama A&M in 1974.

Before joining the Texas Tech faculty, Mr. Thompson was coordinator of the Substance Abuse Program for the Huntsville-Madison County Mental Health Center and was resident psychologist for the Huntsville Hospital.

Mari Panagiotou, Catholic Family Service, will speak on *Little Brother, Little Sister*--How the substance abuse of a teenaged family member may be affecting other members of the family, particularly younger brothers and sisters. A similar presentation will be made to students of the second and third grade during the team visit.

Ms. Panagiotou is Counseling Supervisor with Catholic Family Service of Amarillo, a post she has held for the past four years. Previous to coming to the Panhandle, she was a teacher with the American Community Schools in Athens, Greece from 1970 to 1978.

Ms. Panagiotou received her Master of Arts degree in counseling from Ball State University in Indiana in 1975 after having spent several years as a teacher and missionary in Africa, New York and Greece.

She received her bachelor's degree in Religion and Education in 1958 and is a certified alcoholism and drug abuse counselor and a certified social work associate.

David Tatum, Texas Commission on Alcoholism, *When You Know A User*--How a friend's substance abuse affects you and your other peers. What danger signs to look for and how to intervene for a positive outcome. This presentation involves role-playing and is drawn from personal experience.

Mr. Tatum is currently District I Alcoholism Services Coordinator for the Texas Commission on Alcoholism, an area encompassing the Panhandle, North Texas, South Plains and San Angelo area.

Before joining the TCA staff he was the director of the Waco Council On Alcoholism; at 21, the youngest person to ever serve as a

PLANT CARE -- Keep your pretty houseplants happy and moist even when you're not around. Plastic bags from the dry cleaners can make mini greenhouses for large plants -- tie bag around base of pot and bring ends up. Force air into bag, fasten at the top with a twist tie. The days events will conclude with an evening program for youth and adults at 7:30 at the Spearman High School. Bill Tatum will speak to the young

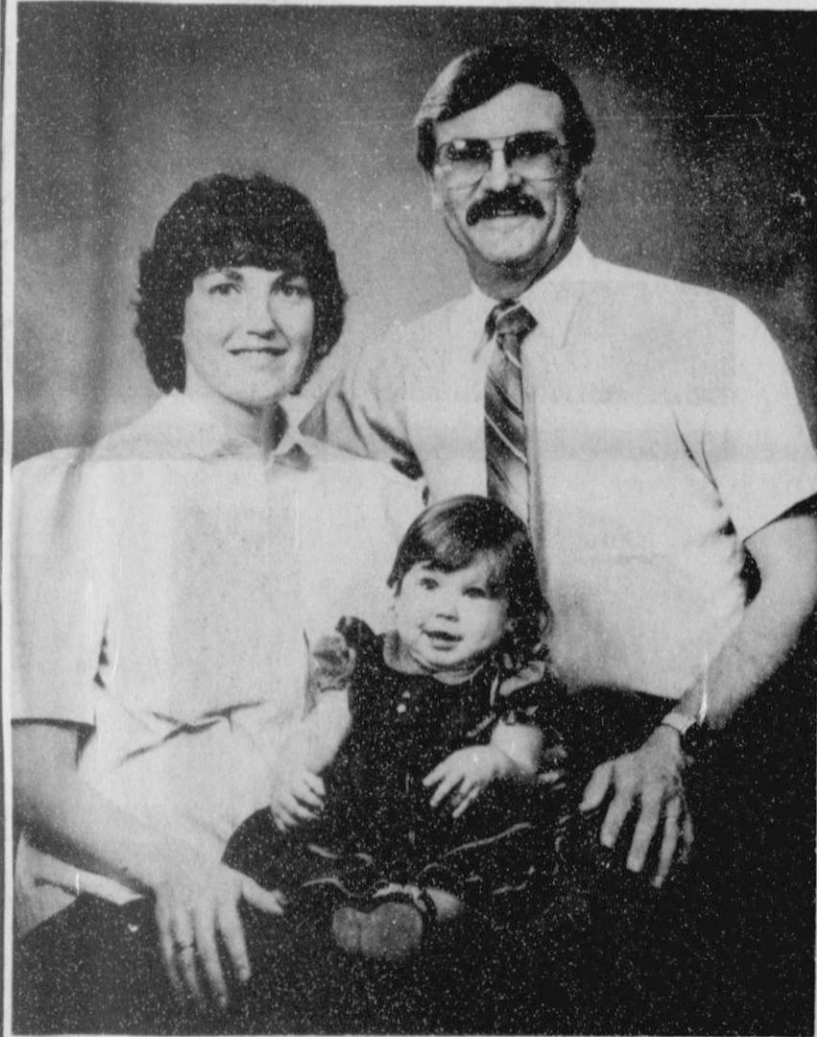
people in the cafeteria, and Marilyn Golightly will speak to parents and concerned adults in the auditorium.

"I think this letter makes it clear, President Reagan supports my candidacy," Boulter said. "I believe the major reason which prompted the President to state his preference in this race is Jack Hightower's unwillingness to go along with President Reagan on controlling the federal budget."

"Because Jack Hightower voted against President Reagan's budget last year in favor of the one drafted by Tip O'Neill and the Democratic Leadership, he is a direct threat to President Reagan's economic policies," Boulter added.

"I fell the people of the 13th Congressional District want a congressman who will work to reduce federal spending, and who will take the initiative in solving the problems that are facing the country and the district," Boulter added. "As this letter makes clear, that's what President Reagan needs as well."

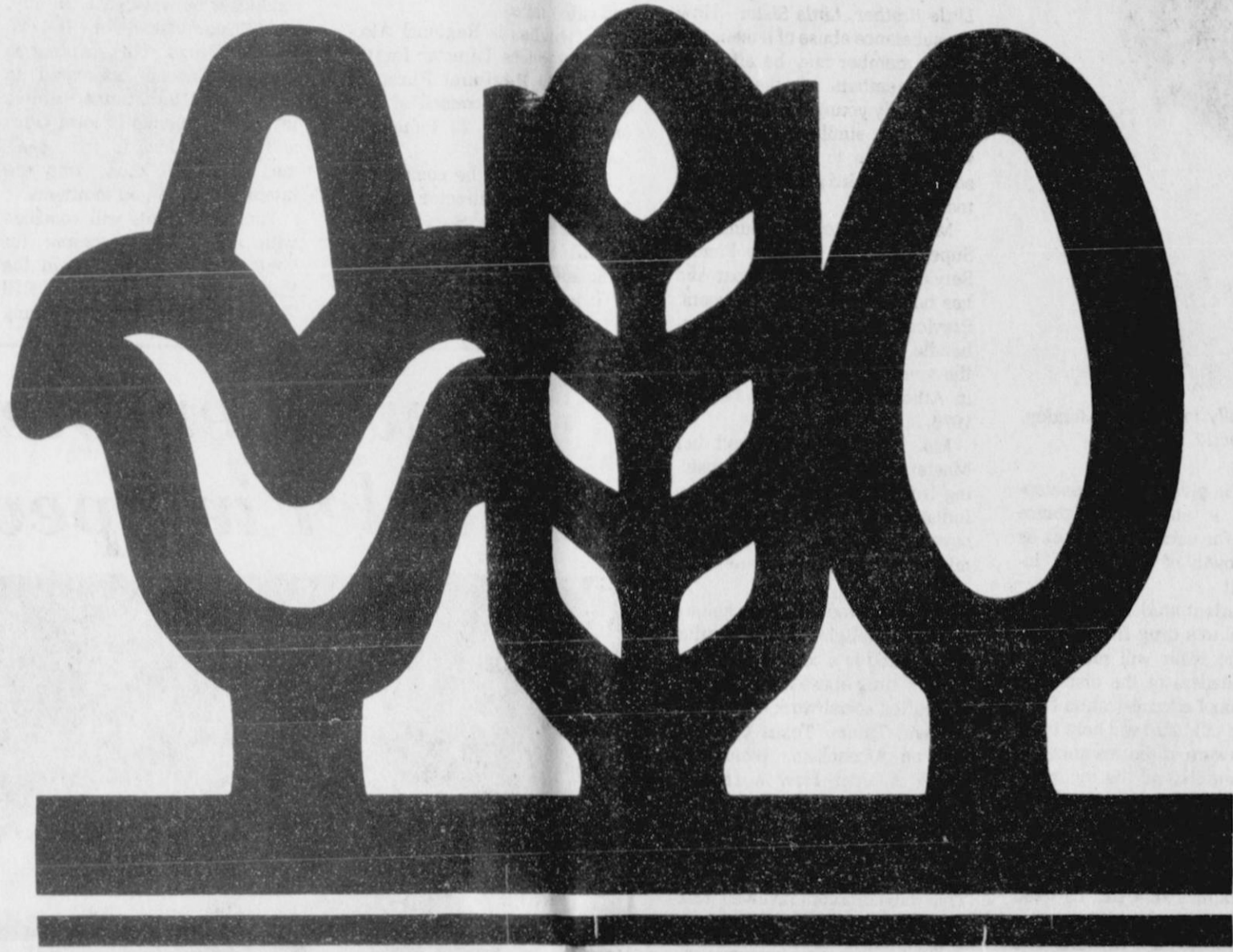
