

City Council raises property taxes

The Spearman City Council held its meeting Tuesday, September 11. The main items on the agenda were the raising of property taxes and the disbursement of general revenue sharing funds.

The \$26,000 in the general revenue sharing fund was divided among five recipients. The Golden Spread Senior Citizen's Center will receive \$3,500 as will the Hansford County Historical Museum. The Health and Sanita-

tion Dept. and the Hansford and Spearman Emergency Medical Service will each receive \$8,000 for the purchase of new equipment. The remaining \$3,000 is earmarked for the acquisition of the old First State Bank building which is being purchased to replace the old city hall building which was burned last year.

Councilmen voted to raise property taxes to .7259 cents per \$100 of valuation. In many cases this

tax is calculated after exemptions, such as the 30 percent homestead exemption. There are other exemexemptions for senior citizens, certain agricultural land and selected veterans.

Sanitation rates were raised 15 percent which means that a single family dwelling which was paying \$4.05 per month will now pay \$4.65 per month.

Monthly water and sewer rates were also hiked. The minimum rates for up to 3000 gallons has been raised from \$4.40 per month to \$5.05 per month. The rate for each additional thousand gallons will be raised from \$1 to \$1.15 per month.

Other rates which have been increased are animal control fees and fees for food handling establishments. The animal pick-up fee is up from \$5 to \$25 and board us

Hightower announces grazing period extension

Congressman Jack Hightower announced today that due to recent congressional action, the normal period during which producers may graze cattle on their 1985 wheat crop has been extended by an additional 30 days. It will now be up to individual county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) committees in Texas to decide whether to add this extension to the beginning or the end of the normal grazing period. "This provision, which was added to the 1984 Supplemental Appropriations bill, should be helpful to wheat growers and cattlemen in the 13th District,"

Hightower said. "It will allow them to utilize their wheat crop in whatever way will be best for them for an additional time period."

"I felt I should make some kind of announcement so that producers in our district who may not be aware of this action could use this information in making some of their planting and participation decisions on the 1985 Farm Bill and received testimony directly from producers in the field. Hightower is a member of the Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee of the House Appropriations Committee which reviews the funding of agriculture programs nationwide.

Experiencing an uncomfortable feeling akin to indigestion regarding an unresolved tax problem? If you have already tried the normal IRS remedies to solve your problem, the tax agency suggests you try its Problem Resolution Program (PRP) office.

The most common problems brought to the PRP office are complaints about missing refunds, mixed up social security numbers, incorrect billings by IRS, and situations caused by

taxpayer error, the IRS says. They cautioned, however, that the Problem Resolution should not be used as a substitute for normal procedures.

Although most taxpayers will never need the services of PRP, the IRS says that taxpayers with a persistent tax problem will find PRP willing and able to help. Taxpayers can contact PRP through the IRS assistance number listed in the phone book under U.S. Government.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that restructures the Permanent University Fund to provide: (1) for the expansion of the institutions eligible to participate in the bond-ing capacity of the fund to include the components of The University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems that have been added to those two systems of higher education since the Permanent University Fund was last restructured by constitutional amendment; (2) for the expansion of the purposes for which bond proceeds can be expended from new construction to include major repair and rehabilitation projects and the acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials; (3) for an increase in the bonding capacity from 20% ('% for The University of Texas System and ½ for the Texas A&M University System) to 30% (20% for The University of Texas System and 10% for Texas A&M University System) of the value of the assets (exclusive of real estate) in the Permanent University Fund in order to provide sufficient bond proceeds to care for the addition of 10 new institutions to those authorized participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program and to care for the expanded pur-poses for which the bond proceeds can be spent; and (4) for the dedication of the dividends, interest, and other income from the Permanent University Fund remaining after payment of principal and interest due on bonds and notes issued, to the provision of support and maintenance (over and above normal legislative appropriations) for Texas A&M University in Brazos County, Prairie View A&M University, and The University of Texas at Austin.

House Joint Resolution 19 also annually appropriates \$100 million in each fiscal year, beginning Septem-ber 1, 1985 (from the first money coming into the state treasury that is , not otherwise appropriated by the duties. Payments to surviving constitution) for the use of those spouses and dependent children of

Except in the case of fire or natural disaster and in other extraordinary cases, verified by a twothirds vote of each house of the legislature, all institutions of higher education would be precluded from receiving appropriations of general revenue funds for the purposes of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

The proposed amendment, will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment to create from general revenue a special higher education assistance fund for construction and related activities, to restructure the Permanent University Fund, and to increase the number of institutions eligible to benefit from the Permanent University Fund."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 65 proses a constitutional amendment which authorizes the legislature to provide for the payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of officers, employees and agents of the state or its political subdivisions, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units authorized to make arrests, who die in the course of performing hazardous official

The amendment requires the President pro tempore of the Senate to call together the committee of the whole Senate within 30 days after a vacancy occurs in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The committee would be required to elect one of its members to perform the duties of the Lieutenant Governor until the next general election. This individual would continue his duties as Senator at the same time that he performs the Lieutenant Governor's duties. If the Senator who is elected ceases to be a Senator before the next general election, another Senator must be elected according to the above procedure to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties. The President pro tempore would be required to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties pending the election of one of its members by the committee of the whole Senate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the state senate to fill a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 prooses a constitutional amendment that permits the use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on non-assessable life, health, or accident insurance policies and annuity contracts issued by a mutual insurance company authorized to do business in this state. The constitutional prohibition against a grant of public money to an individual, association, or corporation or against becoming a stockholder in a corporation, association, or company has limited life and health group policies of political subdivisions to non-mutual insurance companies. The amendment would permit mutual insurance companies to bid for those policies.

courts, and provides additional disciplinary actions that could be taken in lieu of removal or censure. The amendment would extend the Commission's disciplinary authority to masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges who hear cases by designation. The amendment creates a tribunal to review recommendations of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct for removal or retirement of a judge or justice. The review tribunal would be composed of seven (7) Justices or Judges of the Courts of Appeals selected by lot by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The amendment also provides for appeal of the review tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court of Texas and grants an accused judge the right to discovery of evidence.


The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 proses a constitutional amendment which increases the per diem of members of the Legislature. The amount of per diem allowed during a calendar year would be equal to the maximum amount set in federal income tax statutes as of January of that same year as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator. Current per diem is \$30; the maximum deduction is now \$75.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide a per diem for members of the legislature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed by federal law as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator."



Chemical People to have seminars here



Marilyn Golightly will be a featured speaker at the Substance

The Chemical People of Hansford County will take an inovative step in the growing battle against substance abuse among the young people of our community. On Monday, Sept. 17 representatives from the Panhandle Substance Abuse Consortium will present seminars in the Spearman Schools. The goals of this "Rally Day'' are to raise community awareness of substance abuse in every age group of our society and to give specific help to youth and adults in ways to combat and prevent substance abuse. Wayne Hughes, Regional Alcoholism Services Director for the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, belives this is the first time a project of this nature has been held in Texas schools.

The substance abuse consortium was formed in 1982 so that professionals in the substance abuse field could share information about intake evaluation and referral programs, treatment operations and rehabilitation techniques and practise in the Texas Panhandle area.

attention is given to the development of a student assistance program for each host school as an outgrowth of the team's involvement.

3. To orient student leaders of the school to a drug-free environment. The team will meet with student leaders at the discretion of the school administration for a brief 'pep talk' that will help them become aware of the resources of the community and the region.

4. To orient teachers of the school to the challenges of a drug-oriented society. This includes intervention and counseling techniques that can be used on an emergency basis. Particular emphasis is given to the value of a student assistance program.

5. To inform the general public. Team members belive it is important for the general public that supports the shool to know what kind of information their students are getting and how they can get involved. This will be done in an evening session following the school presentation.

people in the cafeteria, and Marilyn Golightly will speak to parents and concerned adults in the auditorium.



2. To assist school administrators and counselors where requested in developing techniques to deal with the school's substance abuse challenges. Specific the day are as follows:

Larry Barber, Amarillo Council on Alcoholism will present Getting it Together--What it takes to identify the drug problem in the community and how to turn the situation around. Who do we go to? What do we do? How do we form student activist groups to help combat peer pressure. When do we use positive peer pressure? Mr. Barber is a 1974 graduate

of Baylor University with a bachelor's degree in communications. he has been executive director of the Amarillo Council on Alcoholism for over a year. Before that, he served as the council's director of education services.

Prior to working for the council, Mr. Barber was news director of KFDA TV in Amarillo. He held several similar posts around the state before coming to Amarillo in 1977.

He is a graduate of the J ohnson Institute short course on Chemical Dependency and the Family and served in 1983 on the steering committee of the Texas Panhandle Chemical People. He was director of the young people's conference for the 11th Annual Tri-State Institute On Substance abuse.

Bill Thompson, Texas Tech Family Practice--Aspects of Substance Abuse--The disease nature of substance abuse. How moodaltering and consciousness-alternating substances affect behavior patterns. Presentation to science classes will deal with the chemical nature of substance abuse and how the long-range health, mental and physical abilities of the user are affected.

Mr. Thompson is an instructor in the Texas Tech School of Medicine and staff psychologist of the Texas Tech Family Practise Center. He joined the Tech faculty in 1982.

PLANT CARE - Keep your pretty houseplants happy and moist even when you're not around. Plastic bags from the dry cleaners can make mini greenhouses for large plants - tie bag around base of pot and bring ends up. Force air into bag, fasten at the top with a twist tie. President Reagan endorses Beau Boulter

Texas Republican Congressional Nominee Beau Boulter announced today that he has been endorsed by President Ronald Reagan in his bid to unseat Democrat incumbent Jack Hightower

Boulter's race has already been targeted as an "opportunity race'' by the National Republican

Congressional Committee. He was one of seven congressional candidates, and the only one from Texas, to be asked to speak at the Republican National Convention in Dallas last month.

"The President's endorsement is yet another indication of his confidence in my ability to win this seat, and to get things

moving in Congress once elected," said Boulter. "he feels that with a Congress that supports his policies, our goal of sustained economic recovery throughout America will be reached."

Boulter once again resterated his campaign theme that Hightower is part of the problem

rather than a help in reducing the federal deficit. "If he is not helping to row the boat, then he is, by definition, impending its progress," he said.

"I think this letter makes it clear, President Reagan supports my candidacy," Boulter said. "I believe the major reason which prompted the President to state his preference in this race is Jack Hightower's unwillingness to go along with President Reagan on controlling the federal budget."


"Because Jack Hightower voted against President Reagan's budget last year in favor of the one drafted by Tip O'Neill and the Deomocratic Leadership, he is a direct threat to President Reagan's economic policies," Boulter added.

"I fell the people of the 13th Congressional District want a congressman who will work to reduce federal spending, and who will take the initiative in solving the problems that are facing the country and the district," Boulter added. "As this letter makes clear, that's what President Reagan needs as well."
