White's To Celebrate Golden Anniversary



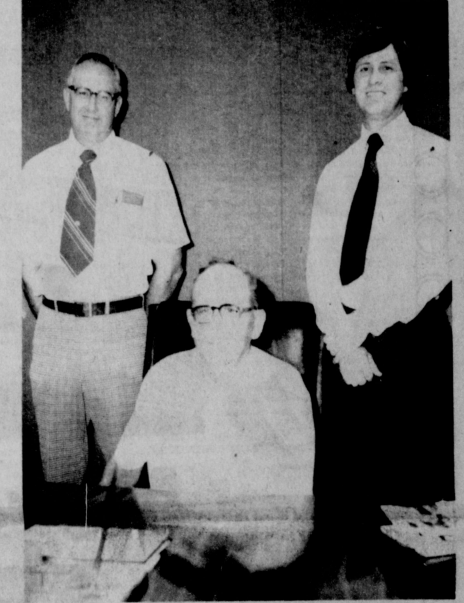

Krueger Campaigns In Panhandle

Krueger will visit Amarillo, Claude, Panhandle, Borger, Pampa, and Wellington as part of a person to campaign promise on July 4, the day Krueger announced his candidacy. "I am an independent Democrat," Krueger said of his personal campaign style, "and I want to meet as many Texans as possible so I can be an effective and independent voice for them in the U.S. Senate." Krueger plans to take his campaign into every area of the state and has visited over 110 communities in 84 Texas counties since announcing earlier this summer. On Thursday, Oct. 29th, the Phillips '66 Station was burglarized. The owner was called and found about \$5.00 worth of change missing. Nothing else was discovered taken. Also, James Michael Pierce, age 22, and Mary Ruth Bailey, age 18, were arrested and charged with a violation of the Texas Liquor Control Act and also with possession of a controlled substance. The arrest was made after the driver of the vehicle they were in was stopped for a minor traffic violation, at which time it was discovered that the two had in their possession a substantial amount of alcoholic beverages, and less than 2 ounces of marijuana. Voter Registration Deadline

October 8 is the registration deadline to vote in the special election to fill Max Sherman's vacated 31st Senatorial District seat and to consider a number of constitutional amendments on November 8. To be eligible to vote in the special election, a person must be registered 30 days prior to the election. Persons wishing to sign up may do so at the County Tax Assessor-Collector's Office on the first floor of the Hansford County Court House. Those persons needing to stop by the office are those that have married and experienced a name change or those that have moved and changed addresses. New residents to Hansford County or Texas also need to register. New voter registration cards will be mailed November 1 and 15, so an incorrect address would probably result in the card not getting to the owner and it would be difficult for that person to vote in future elections.

Sheriff's Dept. announces new policy

Sheriff R.L. McFarlin announced that beginning Oct. 15th the names of persons arrested on worthless check warrants will be released to the newspaper. This has not been done in the past, but Sheriff McFarlin stated that he felt this may be one more step toward deterring worthless check offenses. There has been a 70% decrease in worthless check offenses over the last year. Reasons for this include the seminar that business people have attended concerning bad checks, the posting of prosecuting procedures in the businesses, and the prosecution itself. Sheriff McFarlin stated that he felt the County Prosecutor, J.E. Blackburn, "has done a vigorous job in prosecuting these offenses". Other business concerning the Sheriff's Department included the arrest of James Michael Pierce, age 22, for the possession marijuana. Pierce was released on bond.

Tax Bills Mailed

The last of the school tax bills was mailed Friday, bringing the total to be collected this year to \$1,236,101.41. This was figured on a total district evaluation of \$103,008,451.00 at a rate of \$1.20 per \$100 of evaluation. This rate is down 14% from last year's school tax rate which was \$1.39 per \$100 of evaluation. This year's school tax collections will be down from last year's total of \$1,254,237.41, an \$18,136 decrease. Real Estate Tax Roll B had a total assessed value of \$6,718,980 which includes automobiles, farm machinery, livestock, equipment, and business inventories. Royalties Tax Roll C total assessed values were \$15,299,350. Oil and Gas Producers Roll A total assessed \$38,127,955 in assessed value. Roll H which includes the telephone company, electric company, railroads, pipelines, plants and etc. totaled \$12,618,140 in assessed value. The top five taxpayers in this school district this year are Exxon who will pay \$60,699.72 in taxes followed by Northern Natural, paying \$58,624.68. Ansox paying \$47,723.88, Phillips paying \$50,475.36, and Diamond Shamrock, \$42,921.00.

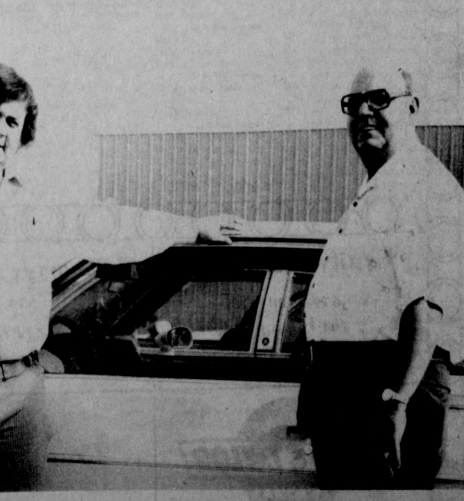

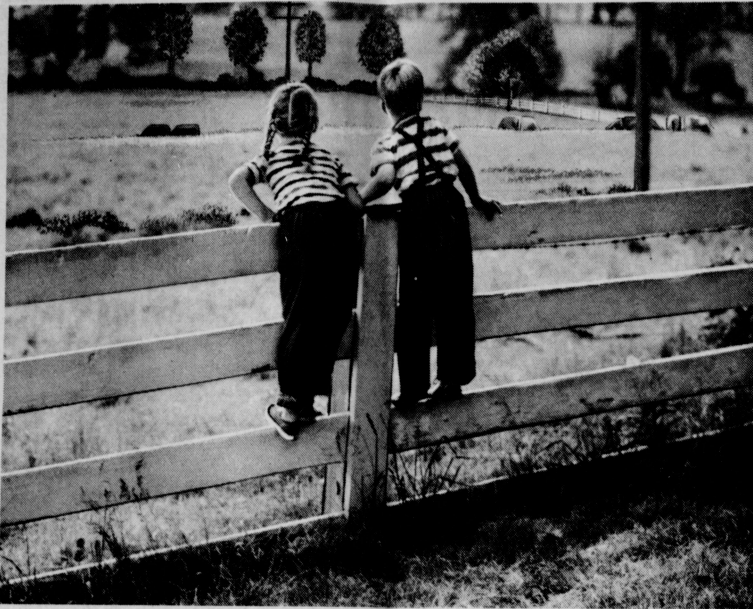
Lynx make Irish stew at Shamrock

Gruver Woman Serving on PHSA

Mrs. Archie Nelson (Marguerite) of Gruver is currently serving on the governing body of the Panhandle Health Systems Agency (PHSA). According to Mrs. Nelson, "The PHSA is actively studying the health maintenance and health care needs and resources of the Panhandle area to determine the availability, accessibility and affordability of local health care, to evaluate existing programs and facilities, and to collect and review data regarding local health care delivery."

The governing body meets monthly on the second Thursday to help plan and encourage the implementation of a system that will deliver quality health care to every individual in our 25 county area. By volunteering time and effort, Mrs. Nelson is helping to assure that PHSA remains an organization of Panhandle people serving Panhandle needs.

In an effort to improve public accessibility to quality health care at reasonable prices, the United States Department of Health, Education, and Welfare has designed a nationwide system of 204 regional health planning agencies. The PHSA is one of these agencies," Mrs. Nelson stated, "and as much as constantly seeking ideas and information concerning health care from Panhandle residents.

The PHSA Governing Body believes that by working together as health care providers and consumers, we will be able to improve the quality of health care and maintenance throughout the area."

The Health Systems Agency has been in operation since its conditional designation on August 9, 1976. The Governing Body has organized itself into committees with specific functions relative to the development of the Health Systems Plan. Mrs. Nelson is serving on the Environmental Health Committee. The Agency has performed the "review" function on fifteen projects totaling \$22,981,460. It has begun an inventory of facilities, manpower, and health services and has a strong start on documenting the health concerns of the people in the region.

TEXAS FIRST Job Fair Set

Amarillo will host the ninth TEXAS FIRST Job Matching Fair—the city's second—9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Saturday, October 8, in the Women's Gym at Amarillo College.

To date, more than 600 jobs, ranging from registered nurse to production worker have been listed by Amarillo employers in the one-day event.

"We expect more than 1,000 positions to be open at the Job Fair," according to Gene Hill, Amarillo Chamber of Commerce industrial development chairman.

The Job Fair is sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, the Amarillo Board of City Development, the Texas Employment Commission and the Texas Industrial Commission.

Designed to bring numerous employers and potential employees together in one place and time, the Job Fair will offer permanent, seasonal and part-time positions. As of the last week in September, 17 Amarillo employers had listed jobs with the Chamber of Commerce.

"There are by no means the final figures," Hill said.

"The number of jobs available has risen continuously, and we expect it to keep on climbing right up to the day of the fair," Brooks Carroll, TEC employee supervisor, said. "We are encouraging people from Southern Colorado, Oklahoma, Kansas and New Mexico, as well as Texas to attend the Amarillo Job Fair, because of the variety of jobs available. We feel anyone who needs a job will have an excellent opportunity of finding one in Amarillo."

Examples of jobs listed are production workers for a local

beef packer, sewing machine operators, key punch operators, electronic and drafting technicians, registered nurses, and licensed vocational or practical nurses, sales people, cashiers, mechanics, cabinet makers and truck drivers.

Many of the employers will offer on the job training, according to Hill.

"Amarillo held the first and most successful Job Fair in Texas last winter," according to Jerry Hare, community development director of the Texas Industrial Commission.

That fair brought 1,325 applicants for 1300 jobs, with more than 800 placements resulting.

"We are still placing people who came to the last fair," Carroll commented.

Job Matching Fairs are part of Phase Two of Gov. Dolph Briscoe's TEXAS FIRST campaign initiated in 1975 to overcome recessionary trends in

Perryton Family Services Center Serves 4 Counties

The Perryton Family Services Center, located at 417 S. Amherst, is a division of the Amarillo Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center. This center is one of 6 Regional Centers serving a 19 county area. The Perryton Family Services Center was established in March of 1976. The center is funded through Ochiltree County United Fund, Mental Health Mental Retardation, local donations, and fees. The Perryton center provides services to Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hemphill and Hansford Counties.

For purposes of citizen input to each regional center, each district is represented by a committee appointed by county judges and mayors according to population distribution. The committee for the Perryton center is made up of Mrs. Dean Paul, Mrs. Irving Born, Mr. Bruce Roberson, and Mrs. Joyce Reimund.

The goals and objectives of the Family Services Center are to provide community based Mental Health Mental Retardation services. In this effort, the center is involved in the promotion of Mental Health through educational programs, early detection and treatment of problems before they become emotionally overwhelming and support for those who, without help, would become institutionalized. In terms of educational services, the center provides programs for local civic organizations and radio presentations on the local coffee break show. A variety of psychological services are provided by the center to meet the other goals. These include psychological testing, individual, group, marital and family counseling.

The center recently acquired a new director, Jim Morris, who replaces Tom Harper as Tom takes the director position at the Pampa Family Services Center. Mr. Morris began his duties August 22. He graduated from West Texas State University with a B.S. in Psychology and completed his Masters coursework at Stephen F. Austin State University.

Ann Upchurch is the case

worker for the center. She also provides counseling services and assists in testing. She is a former resident of Amarillo and completed her B.S. in Psychology from Utah State University. Miss Upchurch has been employed at the center since April of this year.

Beth Murphy recently joined the staff of the center. She comes to the center from Roswell, New Mexico. Mrs. Murphy will be providing alcoholism counseling and educational programs on alcoholism.

The center's secretary and receptionist is Mrs. Madeline Moore, a six year resident of Perryton. Mrs. Moore is the center's newest employee, having started work in Mid-September.
