Dr. Stanton W. Cobb, formerly of Fort Worth, Texas will open his new dental offices in Spearman, in the near future. The new building is almost completed in the medical complex near the hospital in Spearman. Dr. Cobb, his wife Pamela, and their daughter 16 month old Catie moved to Spearman this summer.

Dr. Cobb is originally from the Fort Worth area. The 31 year old dentist graduated from Richland High School in Fort Worth, Texas, in the spring of 1974. His education includes TWC, at Fort Worth, Texas, where he received a Bachelor of Science in Chemistry in 1978. He graduated from

Engineer speaks to Rotary in Spearman Monday

John Sloan, Chemical engineer in charge at the local Air Products plant, located on highway 136 near the Oklahoma State line, spoke at the Spearman Rotary Club Monday.

Sloan stated that the plants main purpose is to produce helium. Helium is found in natural gas in this area. Natural gas is about 1/2% up to 1 3/4% percent helium.

Nitrogen turns to liquid at 320 degrees below zero, and turns to helium at 450 degrees below zero. Helium is the lightest and smallest liquifier. And, 459 degrees below zero is absolute zero, a temperature at which all molecular activity stops.

However, the very simple process of operating machinery at an extremely cold temperature presents many problems. 3,600 horsepower is used to liquify the helium.

The helium is shipped all over the world. The method at insulating the helium is by a vacuum. Each of the containers cost near \$500,000.00.

One large user is the off shore rigs. The divers use the helium. Also, heliarch welding, and the medical profession use it for catscans and it is used as a blanketing material in nuclear work to shield radioactivity.

The U.S. Government has about 30 billion cubic feet stored underground near Amarillo, or more than this plant could produce in 100 years!

The Confessions are important to the Lutheran Church. But the purpose of the Confessions is not to replace the Bible. The Lutheran Church does not see the Confessions as legal documents or historical artifacts. It is more helpful to see the Confessions as pointers, treasures and anchors.

The Confessions are pointers. In a refreshingly unselfconscious manner they point beyond themselves to the Scriptures. They insist that the prophetic and apostolic writing of the Old and New Testaments are the only rule and norm according to which all doctrines and teachers alike must be appraised and judged. According to the Confessions the Scriptures themselves have a pointing function; they point beyond themselves to their center, to Christ.

The Confessions are treasures. They are a part of the living tradition of the church and of the community to celebrate the presence of the true living God, then, now, and forever. As treasures the confessions had a combination of faith and doxology.

The Confessions are anchors. Confessional statements are necessary. They are needed in connection with the unity of the church, to preserve the Scriptures, to guard the proclamation, to regulate life and teaching.

While the Confessions may quote the church fathers they note pointedly that the final test is always the Scriptures. As an anchor the Confessions are also needed as a constant test of how we proclaim and live the message of our Lord. And finally, the Confessions as anchors holds us from drifting into heresy.

By centering our thoughts on Jesus Christ by calling us back again and again to this center, the Confessions provide a footing against the currents, winds, and tides that swirl around and within every believer.

IN THE OPINION OF THE COURT
