current and futures. The "Economic Perspectives" consist of a broad review of the country and world economic situations. The "Portfolio Strategy & Earning Summary" tell the reader the overall summary of net earnings of many of the major companies.

Rape Prevention Program Planned

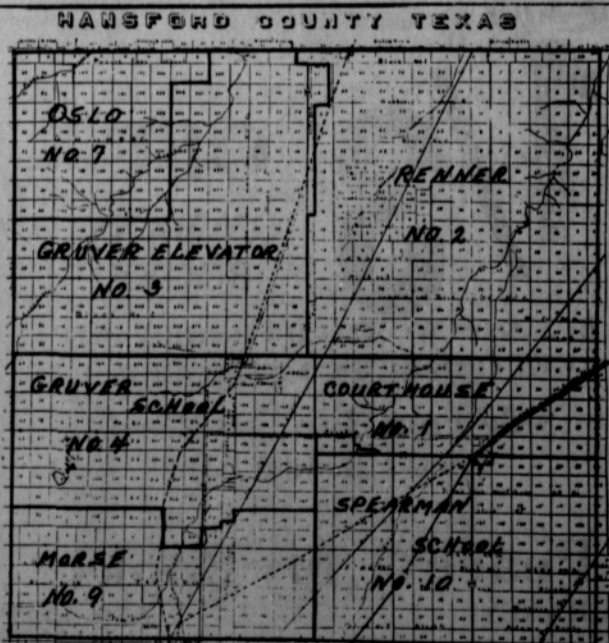

Bedroom Doors Vs. Fire

A closed door between you and a raging fire could provide enough protection to save your life. It takes fire 10 to 15 minutes to burn through a wooden door. Many of the 10,000 people who die each year in home fires are not actually burned to death, but are overcome by superheated air, smoke and toxic gases. So don't automatically fling open your bedroom door. This may be a fatal impulse. If you are awakened by fire and the bedroom door is closed, test it before opening. If the panels are hot or smoke is leaking in around the edges - keep it closed and use the window exit. If the door is open and more than a little smoke is present in the room, close it immediately. Get down low - there's usually a layer of relatively smoke-free air about 18 inches off the floor. Always sleep with the bedroom or hall door closed. It can keep fire out long enough to allow escape or rescue through the window.

Lynx whip Dalhart in District opener!

The Spearman Lynx opened their defense of the District 1-AA crown by beating the visiting Dalhart Wolves. This win by the Lynx raises their season record to 7-8 and drops the Dalhart record to 12-9.

The Lynx started out slow as the Dalhart Wolves blessed with good height hurt the Lynx in the early part of the first quarter as their height was used to get many easy shots close into the basket and the Lynx could not handle it. Also hurting the Lynx was the fact that we were getting only one shot at the basket and missing most of these.

The Wolves outscored the Lynx in the first period behind the shooting of Butch Stewart a 5'10" Junior with 6 points and Malcom Green, a 6'5" Sr. who scored 6 points mostly inside 5 feet of the basket.

Also scoring for the Wolves was Jim Bob Matthews with 4 points and Bart Cadenhead with 2 points.

The Lynx were led by Jeff Beedy with 4 points, Roger Jones with 4 points and Randy Reid with 3 points. Also scoring was Zane Newton with 2 points. The first quarter ended with the Lynx trailing by 7 points, 20-13.

Trailing by 7 points, entering the second quarter, the Lynx outscored the Dalhart Wolves, 21-15 to close the gap that Dalhart had to only one point at the end of the second quarter, 35-34.

Much credit should be given to the Lynx defense as they did not allow Butch Stewart who scored 6 points in the first quarter, no points and allowed Malcom Green only 2 points. The two main players responsible for this was Roger Jones and David Steele as they controlled the inside and allowed Dalhart only one shot at the basket.

Roger Jones who had only scored 2 points in the third quarter came on with 13 points in the final quarter to lead the Lynx. Also scoring was Jim Jones with 2 points and Randy Reid with one point.

For the Dalhart Wolves the fourth quarter was a disaster for them as they were called for a technical foul and one of their ball players, Butch Stewart was thrown out of the game in the final quarter for fighting as he tried to slug Zane Newton while they were wrestling for the ball. Leading the scoring for the Dalhart Wolves was Jim Bob Matthews with 4 points, followed by Butch Stewart, Greg Lloyd, and Bart Cadenhead with 2 points apiece. 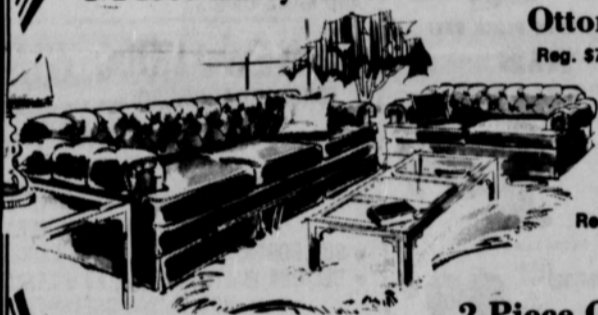

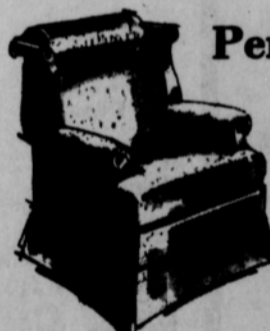
