## Lynx Blast Wildcats 21-0 Friday

The Lavender Lynx, playing a chess game, clinched the 1-AA crown at Canadian Friday night with an impressive 21-0 win. Supt. of Schools Joe Cullender and his Wildcat team were perfect hosts as they fought the Lynx to a standstill in the first and third quarters, but were just unable to cope with the power and finesse of the classy Purple Pride team.

Kent Hargis, the "Baker Taylor Bullet" opened the scoring in the second quarter, on a 3-yard run after a fumble recovery on the 9-yard line. Zane "the train" Newton kicked the extra point to put the Lynx ahead 7-0.

The alert Lynx scored again with only 10 seconds left in the first half as Sherwood sneaked over from the 1. Mr. automatic Newton kicked the extra point and the Lynx lead 14-0 at halftime.

Billy "White Shoes" Sellers added another TD in the final stanza and Mr. automatic Newton kicked the extra point to put the Lynx ahead 21-0.

The game was played in freezing weather but no snow fell at all during the game. The Lynx and Wildcat band performed at halftime and considering the cold, were sensational.

# Earns Outstanding Farmer Award

Before a crowd of about two hundred area residents attending the Hansford Bankers' Award Banquet Thursday night, a Gruver man was introduced as Outstanding Conservation Farmer 1976.

Kenneth Irwin, well known area banker and community leader, was presented with the coveted award by Peyton Gibner during the annual Award Banquet held this year at the Gruver School Cafeteria. Mr. Irwin, who has gained widespread recognition in the financial world, is the president of the Gruver State Bank which was one of the sponsoring groups for the annual affair which also included the First State Bank of Spearman in cooperation with the Hansford Soil and Water Conservation District among the hosts.

Appearing on the evening's program which followed the delectable Suthphens-catered banquet were the melodious trio of Gruver High School girls who will be representing the Regional Farm Bureau at the State Convention in December. Enthusiastically received were the selections by the girls, Lisa Nelson, Nanette Cluck, and Tanya Hart. They were accompanied by Mrs. Del Cluck at the piano.

Master of Ceremonies for the evening was Freeman Barkley of the host First State

Bank in Spearman. Horace Curlee, a member of the Gruver State Bank family, offered the welcome with J. C. Harris giving the response. Warren Proctor, representing the Hansford County Soil and Water Conservation District, presented directors and supervisors, both past and presently serving, who were present for the occasion.

Outstanding speaker for the evening, Kenneth Wyatt of Tulia, was introduced by Charles Brillhart, Chairman of the Board. Highly entertaining, Mr. Wyatt brought a message of hope for the future during his witty and sage talk by noting that we influence everybody and everything with whom or which we come in contact and that the results of this contact can be clearly recognized by what we can produce wisely and with care. Concluding his sparkling soliloquy, Mr. Wyatt, a talented artist who shared some of his oil paintings with the group, offered a note of thanksgiving for all of that for which we are stewards. He was given a standing ovation at the conclusion of the evening's program.

In presenting the coveted award to Mr. Irwin, who shared the honor with his wife, Janet, Mr. Gibner pointed out that Kenneth, who is serving his twelfth year as Gruver's mayor along with enjoying an

enviable reputation as a banker not only in this area but recognized in far-flung financial circles, has indeed practiced good conservation farming on his section of land, located five miles west and two miles south of Gruver.

It was noted that Mr. Irwin, seeing a need for improving this land, entered into a Great Plains Conservation Program contract with the Soil Conservation Service in 1974. Improvements, including a grassed waterway designed to carry water from the west side of the farm to the east without causing erosion; a tailwater

recovery system which resulted in minimum loss of water; an irrigation well which delivered water to all of the surface irrigation system; land leveling where needed plus good farming methods, have indeed resulted in a good productive farm, returning a good operating income with a minimum of maintenance.

Appreciation was expressed at the conclusion of the enjoyable evening's program to the Gruver Schools, the Field Office Staff and to Dallasene Reynolds, Soil Conservation District Clerk for work which went toward making the annual banquet a great success.

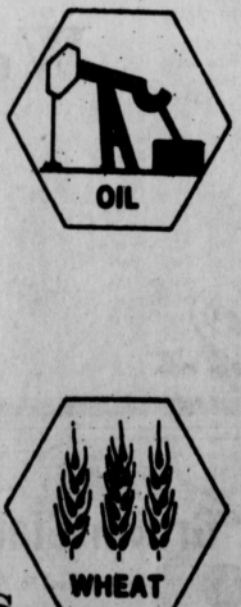
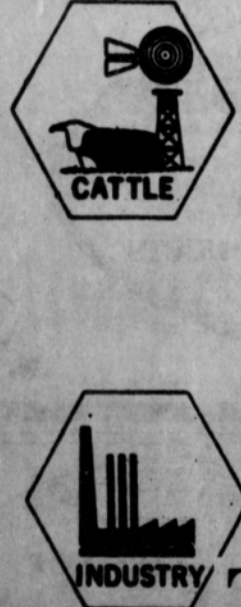
