Neal Jones visits Spearman

When Brad Beedy told me Neal Jones, one of the "Dirty Dancing" stars was in town, he didn't expect me to know what he was talking about. Being a music fan and having just passed through the teenage years with my three children, I was very familiar with the movie, having watched it five or six times. Brad asked me if I would be interested in doing an interview with Neal. "Yes, I definitely would!"

I called Neal to see if he would agree to the interview. He was a very pleasant person on the telephone. He told me he would call me the next day, and promised not to disappear without talking to me.

Neal was traveling to Los Angeles, from New York, on his motorcycle, when it broke down south of Liberal. He had planned to visit with Brad and Dody Beedy, friends of his family, on his way to California, so the breakdown gave him a little added visitation.

To keep Neal's presence a little out of the public eye, I went to the Beedy home for the interview, taking along my daughter, Cayla, to do the interview with me.

We were greeted at the door by an auburn haired, auburn bearded, blue-eyed charmer, who was as interested in us as we were in him. He immediately put us at ease with his friendliness.

Neal attended school in Georgia and St. Louis, Missouri. When asked why he decided to follow an acting career, Neal replied, "I had already decided to go to North Texas State University, in Denton,

to become a professional trumpet player. A friend talked me into acting in an amateur production, before I was even out of high school. I really liked it and I've been at it ever since."

Neal has been an actor for about 12 years, professionally for 10 years. Besides "Dirty Dancing," where he plays the character called Billy Kostocki, he has several Broadway plays to his credit. In 1982, he was in "MacBeth," in 1983 "The Corn is Green," and then 2 years in "Big River." He has also been an assistant director. For a young man of 29, this is quite a list of acting accomplishments.

I asked Neal why he was riding a motorcycle to Los Angeles. With a smile he said, "The parking in New York is exhorbitant. I got tired of moving my car from one side of the street to the other, where I live, so I bought the motorcycle. I can park it on the sidewalk and chain it to the fence. I may be in Los Angeles for awhile so I'm taking my transportation with me." He has some prospective projects in the works in Los Angeles.

"Are you married?" I finally asked. (This is a question all females eventually get around to.)

With a gleam in his eye, Neal laughed and answered, "A good woman may be the making of me. That remains to be seen! I am taking applications though." I asked if I could quote him on that.

Neal's father, Marvin Jones, of Jefferson City, Missouri, and Brad Beedy were fraternity brothers and good friends at Texas

Tech University during their college days. The two families have kept in contact ever since. In fact, Brad first referred to Neal as his nephew.

Neal's parents have been very supportive of his acting and his younger brother enjoys it. His brother did not follow him into acting; instead, he became an engineer.

Of course, Cayla and I were both interested in what type of guy Patrick Swayze, the star of "Dirty Dancing" was. Neal said he was a decent chap, very likeable.

One thing Neal told us that does bother him is when fans try to get souvenirs. "I would rather just give them my shirt instead of having it torn off of me," he stated. The price of success!

After much picture taking (I only took 3 cameras), we bid our new friend goodbye.

Neal had matched us question for question. Sometimes I wasn't sure who was interviewing who. He did not show the aloofness I had expected from an actor. He was very patient through all our questions and picture taking. If his personality is any sign of his success, this young man will be heard of a lot in the future.

Palo Duro Updated

"This will be under 35 feet of water when the lake fills up," said Johnnie Lee, as we drove across the Palo Duro Creek bridge. As I looked around at the dry walls of the canyon and the small trickle of water in the Palo Duro Creek, it was hard to imagine this land being at the bottom of a lake. But, as we approached the dam site and I saw the immensity of the being done there, anything becomes possible.

According to Mr. Lee, water is one of our most important resources. The construction of this dam will ensure a supply of water for Hansford County communities of Spearman and Gruver. The other out of county communities to receive water from the lake will be Stinnett, Dumas, Sunray, and Cactus.

A bond to pay for the building of the dam was voted by each of these communities, but water from the lake will be purchased by each community as they use it. The water from the anticipated supply of water from this lake is already completely allotted to the communities building the dam.

Construction of the dam involves three basic areas. The dam itself and two spillways.

The spillways are on either side

of the dam. They allow water to run by the dam when the lake reaches a certain level. One spillway is at the normal level the lake is supposed to stay at. The other is at a higher elevation and will function as an emergency exit for the water if the lake level rises suddenly.

The normal spillway is set at an elevation of 2,992 feet. It consists of a concrete culvert 11 feet in diameter, with 40 inch thick walls. This spillway will run by the north side of the dam and empty into the Palo Duro Creek.

The emergency spillway will be a trench running along the south edge of the dam. It will empty into a holding pond 100 feet long, 600 feet wide, and 60 feet deep. The dirt being taken out to create this spillway is being used to construct the dam proper.

The heart of the dam is its core. The core is a strip of very hard packed dirt. The dirt has got to be packed to give it a higher density. Water is constantly sprayed on the dirt to help in the compacting. Measurements by an independent consulting firm are taken to constantly check that the compactness of the dirt is exactly what the engineers specify. If the core is not compact enough, then water can seep in and destroy the dam in

a short time.

Even when the core is compacted just right water still seeps in. To carry this seepage away and prevent it from doing damage, there is a slow trench dug along the bottom of the dam. This slow trench is dug 35 feet into the bed rock under the dam. It is filled with cement sand, which is pourous and traps any water seeping under the dam.

To trap any water seeping through the dam the engineers are digging wells through the dam to connect with the slow trench at the bottom. These wells are also filled with cement sand. This system of wells and a slow trench are designed to trap and to carry off any water seeping into the dam

American Vintage Car Race

Rally Gives Satisfaction

James Cunningham gave two reasons why he participates each year in the Great American Vintage Car Race. "We get a great satisfaction in being able to compete," Cunningham said as his first reason. The second is that it is a great way to see the country. Car travel is a way to learn the geography and the people of our country. What Cunningham learned can be summed up in his own words, "We are still a great country, despite what TV says."

In this race Cunningham had the opportunity to learn about a great deal of the American country side. The race started in North Fork, Virginia, traveled along the southern states, and ended at Disneyland in California. The race started on June 26th and ran until July the 8th. This is a total of thirteen days of racing.

Actually the word race here is a misnomer. The drivers did not race against each other but against a computer. This was a road rally.

In a road rally each car has a driver and a navigator. Each day of the rally the driver and navigator are given a course to follow to the days destination. The car must follow the course exactly. The course is chartered in a computer as to the speed limits, possible traffic control stops, and turns. The computer then comes up with an optimum time a car should take to drive the course. The driver and navigator who come close to that optimum time win the rally for the day.

The problem with matching the computer's time is that the computer stops and changes speeds instantly. This is something a normal car cannot do. Therefore, the navigator and driver have to figure out an average speed to fit the computer's instantaneous speeds.

The driver and navigator must practice with their car at all kinds of speeds and road conditions. They must know how long it takes the car to change speeds or how a turn will effect the speed of the car. By practicing, a good driver and navigator can come within a few seconds of the ideal time set

by the computer.

In this rally Cunningham was the navigator for Zeke Neeley, of Amarillo. Neeley saw the race go through Amarillo five years ago and decided he wanted to be a part of it. He bought an old Oldsmobile and restored it that year. The next year he asked Cunningham to be his driver in the race. "Didn't either one know what a rally was!" said Cunningham.

They learned quickly. Now after racing only four years they were able to finish ninth over all. They were only 70 seconds off the perfect time during the Grand Rally, the last two days.

Each day of the race is a separate rally, with medals being given out for the closest finisher each day. The last two days of the race are called the Grand Rally. This is the big event of the race.

The Grand Rally ends in a

parade up Main Street of Disneyland with all the cars with their drivers and navigators being put on display.

This was not the first celebration the people in the race had seen. In each of the communities the race stopped in for the night, there would be a pageant or ceremony celebrating a distinctive feature of the area. These celebrations usually did not last too long as the drivers and navigators were usually very tired or had to make repairs on their cars.

The Neeley - Cunningham team were lucky in that they did not have to make any repairs. "Never even had a flat tire!" said Cunningham. If they did they had a crew of Jay Neeley and Melvin Sasser to help them out with repairs and driving the support truck.

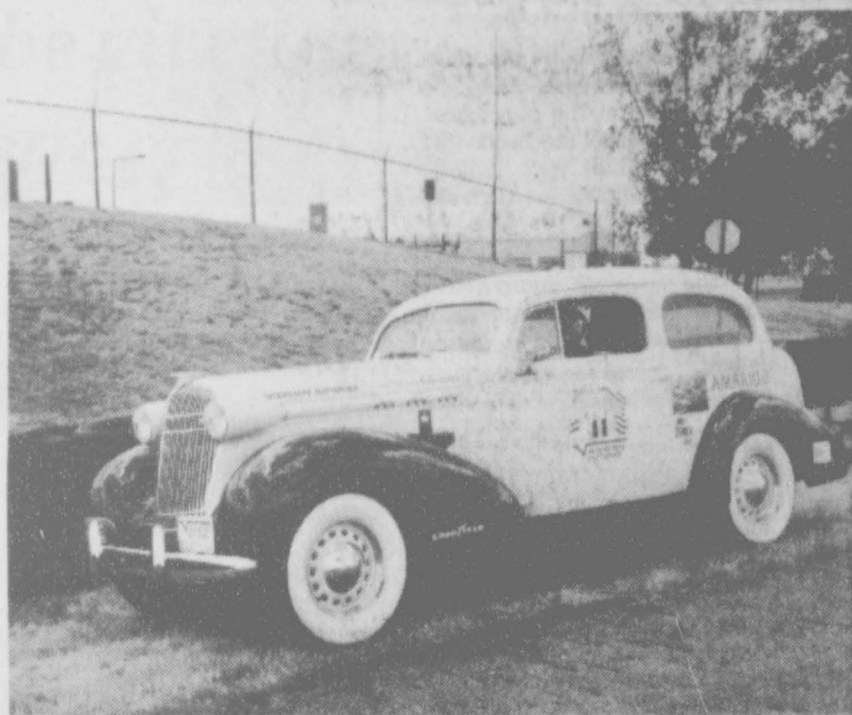

Working out of the Perryton office, Kelln will be responsible for making and servicing loans in Lipscomb, Ochiltree, and Hansford Counties.

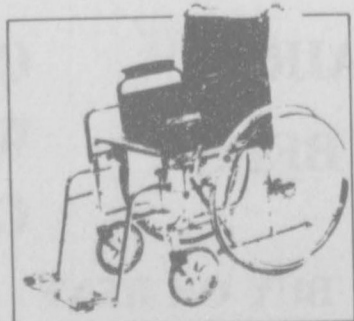

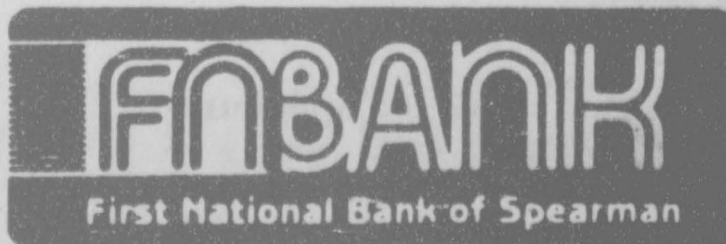

before the water can do any damage to the dam core.

On either side of the dam core are the pads. These are made of caliche rock. This rock when compressed interlocks and gives support to the core of the dam.

When the dam is completed these center parts of the dam will be covered with concrete and surface soil.

When the dam is completed in January of 1991, a park, behind the dam is planned. The park will have spaces for 37 recreational vehicles. There will be a picnic area along the Palo Duro Creek and a childrens play area next to that.

The Soil Conservation Service has donated 200 trees to the River Authority to be planted in the park and along the lake shore. All but the cottonwoods are doing well. The sand cherry seems to be doing the best.

The addition of the trees and the stocking of the lake by the Texas Fish and Wildlife Department will make the lake a prime recreational development. But the important thing about the dam, and the lake it will form, is that, it will serve as a water supply for Hansford County way into the future.
