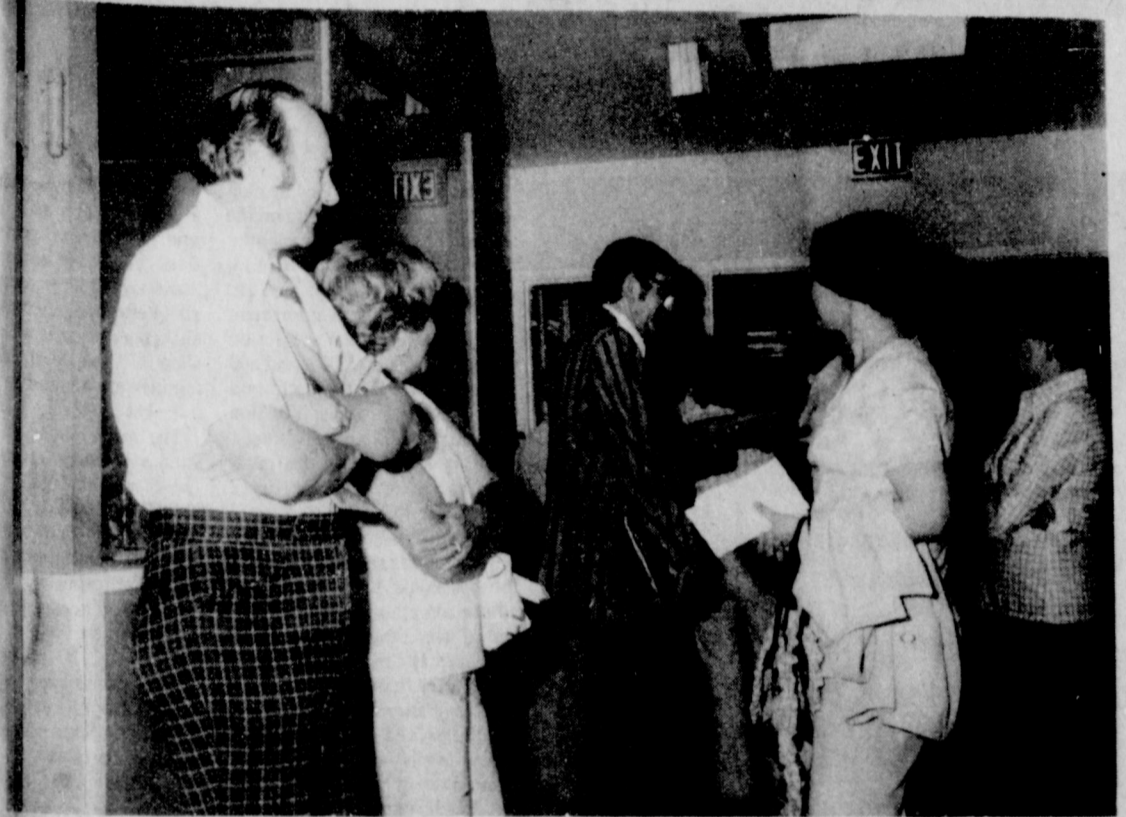


Record crowd attends hospital meeting here Thurs!

In the past, only six or eight people came out to the meetings; many new, young persons, as well as the old are now interested in keeping doctors in our community.



Orvil Brummett and others are pictured above in the halls of Hansford Hospital, Thursday evening. The group was waiting for an executive session to end. After the executive session, the meeting was adjourned. Members of the local Chamber of Commerce attended the meeting, supporting the local hospital board.

Some 70 people crowded into the dining room of Hansford Hospital Thursday evening to attend the regular meeting of the Hospital Board. All members were present and as soon as the meeting opened, the reading of the minutes was challenged by Mr. Cook; but Board president Max Baggerly stated to Mr. Cook, "you are out of order!" Only the Board can approve the minutes of the last meeting.

In other action Thursday night, the bills were paid. The opening of Dr. Yang's office was discussed then a new calculating machine was purchased or leased.

After opening the meeting to the public, Mr. George Cook informed the Hospital Board that the door was closed at the last meeting and President of the Board, Max Baggerly, did apologize to Mr. Cook for this closed door situation. He stated that it will not happen again. The door that the Board enters their meeting room through is located near the stock room and Mr. Cook did not know this, apparently. Also, Mr. Cook stated that he wanted copies of motel expense, telephone bills, etc., and that he had been refused these copies in the past and, in fact, still has not secured the copies; but he has been assured that he can get these copies at the going rate of 55 cents per copy for the first sheet and 15 cents per sheet thereafter.

In other business, the new Director of Nurses, Patty Saver, was introduced to the Board. She has just arrived in Spearman from Houston, Texas.

President Max Baggerly opened the meeting to public questions, but instead of answering the questions, he stated that each question would be taken down or recorded and answered at the regular hospital meeting, the second Thursday of July—a meeting which everyone expects to be held at the Courthouse (or hoped that it will be held there).

Some of the questions asked the board were: Why did the hospital purchase a new incinerator? Was the old one not sufficient?

Why did a doctor from downstate inform some local people that the administrator here was leaving and that he would have to talk to a new administrator if he wanted to come to Spearman? After this question was asked, the name of the doctor was requested, but not given to the board.

The question of "How many patients does the hospital have to have to reach the break-even point?" was asked.

One of the real "biggies" of the evening was "Has any member of the Board asked Dr. Phillips why he is leaving and what could be done to keep him?"

Another question, "Ask prospective doctors why they don't come to Spearman and why are other communities getting them regularly?"

The Texas hospital associate will visit in Spearman next Tuesday and the question was asked, "What will they look for when they come to Spearman for evaluation?"

"Why do the doctors and R.N.'s quit at the hospital? Is it a personality conflict?"

During the open discussion, Joe T. Venneman, Commissioner, informed the people present that if they have any discussion about the hospital-go to the Hospital Board! "We appointed these men on the Board and we think they are doing a good job," Venneman stated. Several persons were at the Commissioner's Court Meeting last month, discussing the hospital situation with the Commissioners who flat stated that people need to go to the Hospital Board and not the Commissioners Court concerning the hospital.

Several of the people present Thursday night wanted answers to their questions and asked the Board President why they "can't answer our questions tonight?" Mr. Baggerly called on the hospital lawyers, Mr. Musick and Mr. Ryan, and they stated that under Article 3 A H, the Board can operate in such a manner!

At this point the local citizens wanted to know who Musick and Ryan were and many thought that they were CPA's or prospective doctors and it turned out that they were lawyers for the Board, summoned to the meeting to discuss the suit against Dr. Abrams. One person asked the Board why they had hired "out-of-town" lawyers, when we have so many lawyers here. It was stated that none of the local lawyers wanted to handle the Hospital Board's legal needs.

One person, who wanted to get a copy of the phone bills, was informed by the hospital employees that the phone bills were involved in litigation and the copy could not be obtained. This, however, has been amended and the copy of the phone bills apparently will be furnished.

Other questions: "Can we find out if M.D.'s, R.N.'s, and LVN's have licenses to practice at Hansford Hospital? And, can we see these licenses displayed? Are they licensed by the state?"

L. E. Thomas, Chairman of the local Chamber of Commerce Committee, informed the Hospital Board that the Chamber thought the Board was doing a good job. Several Chamber members, including the president, were on hand for the meeting Thursday night.

Orville Brummett, member of the Senior Citizens' Committee, informed the Board that the Director of the Nurses Homes in Texas, would be available to discuss a nursing home for Hansford County in the near future. A special meeting night will be set aside for this meeting, according to Max Baggerly, Board President.

Another question: "The hospital is big business, when will we start running the hospital like big business, for profit?" And, "What can the citizens do to help the Board make the hospital run more efficiently?"

Other questions were asked: "Are we still in search for doctors for our community?" "Does the hospital have an anesthetist?"

Baggerly stated that the hos-

hospital has purchased a surplus generator from the Lubbock area and it will be moved to Spearman this week end. The generator weighs 9,000 lbs. and will be used for emergencies. The old generator is "shot" and must be replaced. Baker and Taylor and local electricians have re-built the generator many times and Baggerly wanted to thank Baker and Taylor and their men who have helped in so many ways at the hospital!

In summing up the meeting, the newspaper would like to thank everyone who attended the meeting. The 75 to 100 persons present gave the Board some indication of how interested the people are in keeping doctors and keeping the hospital open. The Board acted in a civil manner and will answer all of the questions at their next meeting in July. It is sensational when civilized people settle their problems in a civilized manner! Hospital Board Meets

The regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Hansford County Hospital District was held on May 11, 1978 at 7:30 P.M. in the Hansford Hospital Conference Room.

Present: Max Baggerly, President; Richard Fletcher, Vice President; Jimmie Vernon, Secretary-Treasurer; William Etling; Dick Kilgore; Wayman Edwards; Robert Phillips, D.O.; Jerry Taylor, Administrator; 6 guests. None Absent.

The meeting was called to order by Max Baggerly. The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and approved upon motion made by Dick Kilgore, seconded by Jimmie Vernon and approved by the Board.

The financial report for the month of April was presented

by Jerry Taylor, Administrator and the bills were approved for payment by a motion made by Jimmie Vernon, seconded by William Etling and approved by the Board.

Old Business: 1. Pending Litigation--Dr. Abrams--Proceedings have been scheduled for June 12, 1978 at Hansford County Court House. No further information was available at this time.
2. Insurance--Employee's Medical--Due to the increased premium requested by Blue Cross and an evaluation of the coverage provided, the Board asked for bids on Employee's Medical Insurance. One bid only was presented by L. E. Thomas representing Brock Insurance Company, Spearman, Texas. The insuring company is Group Department-The Travelers.

Dick Kilgore moved to accept the insurance plan as presented by L. E. Thomas. Richard Fletcher seconded the motion and by unanimous vote, the motion passed.

3. Building Committee Report--The evaporative cooler over the kitchen is repaired and is in use.

The Board suggested that the Building Committee study the feasibility of moving a refrigerated unit which is not serviceable, from the kitchen to another area of the Hospital.

ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT: 1. Physician Recruitment--Chum Yih Yang, M.D. has received a Texas License, the license has been put on record at Hansford County Court House and is expected to arrive in Spearman as soon after May 19, 1978 to begin practice in Hansford Clinic and Hansford Hospital.

2. Purchases--The lease on a Hematology Counter from Clay Adams, a piece of equipment used in the Hospital Lab is up for renewal. This piece of equipment may be purchased for \$500.00 and reportedly does perform well.

Dick Kilgore moved to purchase the above piece of equipment for \$500.00. Jimmie Vernon seconded the motion and the Board approved unanimously.

Mr. Taylor recommended that the Hematology Counter be moved to the Gruver Clinic and that the Board consider leasing or purchasing a replacement piece of equipment for use in the lab.

3. Clinic Operation--Max Baggerly, President called the meeting into executive session for the purpose of discussing clinic operation and internal affairs of Hansford Hospital District.

The meeting returned to regular session.

Dr. Thu wishes to purchase an automobile for business purposes and that the regular payments on that automobile be made through the Gruver Clinic operation.

Bill Etling moved to allow the Gruver Clinic to make the payments on Dr. Thu's automobile and that the amount of those payments shall be deducted from Dr. Thu's portion of income after expenses on a monthly basis. In the event profits after expenses are not sufficient to cover the amount of the loan payment on the automobile in any given month, the amount of that payment shall be carried forward and deducted from Dr. Thu's portion of income after expenses of the Gruver Clinic.

The automobile shall be owned, insured, and operated by Dr. Thu and not the Gruver Clinic or Hansford Hospital District.

The motion further states that Dr. Thu's income from operation of the Gruver Clinic be changed in his contract from 90% of the income after expenses to 95%, an increase of 5%.

Wayman Edwards seconded the motion and the Board accepted the motion unanimously.

Richard Fletcher moved to allow apartment rent for Dr. Yang to be paid by Hansford Clinic and that the amount of those payment shall be deducted from Dr. Yang's income after expenses on a monthly basis. In the event profits after expenses are not sufficient to cover the amount of the rent payment in any month, the amount of that payment shall be carried forward and deducted from Dr. Yang's portion of income after expenses of the Hansford Clinic.

NEW BUSINESS: 1. Hansford County Medical Committee--Orville Brummett and J. C. Harris, members of the Hansford County Medical Committee informed the Board of Directors of their procedures and reported that meetings had been held and information is being gathered for a proposed Convalescent Medical Care Center for Hansford County. The Board of Directors complimented the medical committee on their work and offered assistance at anytime in coordinating the efforts of the Medical Committee and the Board of Directors of Hansford County Hospital District.

No further business was conducted and the meeting was adjourned.

Artist of the Month will be Mrs. Deta Blodgett. A sampling of her talent is on display at the Hansford County Library during the month of June.

Deta is well known in our area for her beautiful china and oil painting. She began her painting with the help of Mrs. Roach in 1952 and later studied under the direction of Ruth Hutton and Dord Fitz. Deta's talent reflects the delicate beauty of the flowers and reveals the wonders of the "Master Artist."

She came to the Panhandle as a young school teacher and at 18 years old took over the responsibilities of the Old Ochiltree School District during 1915-1918. Now that we know that beef is a good source of iron, you may be wondering what the fuss is all about, or why we worry about getting iron everyday. Iron is an integral part of the hemoglobin of blood which carries oxygen to body cells. The red blood cells can neither form nor function without iron. Further, hemoglobin is responsible for the redness of blood. People with a serious iron deficiency develop anemia which is characterized by paleness, listlessness, shortness of breath, dry skin, gastric disturbances and dizziness.

Silhouette Shoot Is Lake Fryer Attraction

Lake Fryer has a new attraction that creates attention on the second Sunday of every month. Between the hours of 10 a.m. and 1 p.m., a group of men are busy trying to hit an assortment of metal targets that are set on pedestals 200, 300, 385, and 500 meters (not yards) away from a set firing line. This is called Metallic Silhouette Shooting and the area across the main road, north of the Lake Fryer Dam is the location.

The idea is to help hunters become better shots, and satisfy those who like to shoot without killing something. The designers of the range were safety conscious and everything is run with 'safety first' as a rule. The only regulations are the magazine rifles and armor piercing bullets not be allowed because of the damage to the targets.

A .243 Winchester is the lightest rifle able to knock over a ram at 500 meters. The .308 Winchester and the 30-06 are rated as the first and second choice, and in that order. The 270 Winchester, 6mm Remington, 25-06, 30-40 Krag, and others are able to bring home a trophy. The 30-30 won't do such damage at 300 meters if the rifle was accurate enough to hit the large pig. The chicken at 200 meters will fall easy enough to the 30-30 while the scrawny turkey silhouette at 385 meters appears to be more luck than skill for any shooter or rifle.

The large ram at 500 meters is a test of knock down power for anything less than the 30-06. A scope appears necessary, but there is a class for open sights if the eye is good enough. This metallic silhouette shooting is made for amateurs

and professionals alike. Everyone starts as a beginner and as his score goes up, so does his classification. Ten shots are fired at each animal silhouette and after each five shots the rifle cools while others shoot. Two and one half minutes are allowed to fire the five shot groups.

The range opens at 8 a.m. Sunday morning to practice. The cost to shoot is \$6.00 plus \$1.00 for a class card. The class card is a one time cost unless the shooter advances to a higher class. Approximately 60 rounds of ammo are needed to practice and shoot the required forty shots.

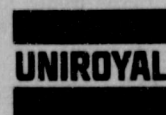

Beef Tip Roast On Rotisserie Assures Memorable Cookout

A beef tip roast is an excellent choice for rotisserie roasting. It's easy to balance this compact cut on the rod so that it turns evenly and steadily. Since this roast is lean, boneless and practically waste-free, it provides more flavor-packed slices of meat per pound than most cuts. Brushing it with barbecue sauce, as in this recipe, supplies a popular supplementary flavor, says Reba Staggs, National Live Stock and Meat Board home economist.

Barbecued Tip Roast

4 to 6-pound beef tip roast, tied
Barbecue Sauce

Insert rotisserie rod lengthwise through center of roast. Balance roast and tighten spiro forks to fasten meat securely so that it turns only with the rod. Insert roast meat thermometer at a slight angle, so the tip is in the center of the roast but not resting in fat or on rotisserie rod. Place on rotisserie and roast at moderate temperature until meat thermometer registers 130°F. Continue roasting, brushing frequently with barbecue sauce to desired degree of doneness - 140°F. to 160°F. When thermometer registers about 5°F. below desired doneness, remove meat from rotisserie and allow to stand 10 to 15 minutes before carving into thin slices.

Note: A boneless rump roast or chuck eye or cross rib of high quality can be used.

Cookout Safety

A few simple rules will insure that your cookouts are always safe: never add liquid starter after coals are ignited; never use gasoline as a starter fluid; keep young children and pets away from the grill area; wear heavy cooking mittens and avoid wearing loose clothing; suggests the National Live Stock and Meat Board.

Father's Day Tradition

Father's Day has a long tradition, but only recently became an official holiday. The first Father's Day is traced to 1910 in Spokane, Washington. In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson issued a "Father's Day" button while in 1924, President Calvin Coolidge recommended establishing "Father's Day." It was not until 1972, however, that Father's Day became an official national holiday in this country. Beef for Father's Day has now become an established tradition in the United States, says the National Live Stock and Meat Board.

Meat Cut Quiz



Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?

A. BEEF TOP LOIN STEAK. BONELESS. This is the correct name in accordance with the Uniform Retail Meat Identity Standards. It also may be properly referred to as BEEF LOIN STRIP STEAK.

Q. Where does it come from? How is it identified?

A. The top loin steak comes from the wholesale (primally cut) of beef called the loin, specifically from the short loin section (the area closest to the rib). The steak is identified by the one major muscle it contains, referred to as the loin eye muscle, and a thin outside layer of fat. This muscle is the larger of the two muscles in a Porterhouse steak.

Q. How is it prepared?

A. By broiling indoors or on an outdoor grill. Steaks cut 1 inch thick should be placed 2 to 3 inches from heat; steaks cut 2 inches thick, 3 to 5 inches from heat. Broil at moderate temperature.

Broiled Porterhouse Steaks

Steaks cut 1 to 2 inches thick are best for broiling. Place steaks on grill over ash-covered coals. Steaks cut 1 inch thick should be placed 2 to 3 inches from the heat; steaks cut 2 inches thick, 3 to 5 inches from

the heat. Cook at low to moderate temperature. When one side is browned, turn, season with salt and pepper and finish cooking on the second side. Season as desired.

Steaks cut 1 inch thick require approximately 15 to 20 minutes for rare, 20 to 25 minutes for medium; steaks cut 2 inches thick, 30 to 35 minutes for rare, 40 to 45 minutes for medium.

An important difference is in how these forms of iron are absorbed by the body. Heme iron, the kind from animal foods, is more readily absorbed by the body, and therefore in a more useful state than nonheme iron from plant sources. In fact, absorption of heme iron, found in animal tissues, is five or tenfold higher than nonheme iron.
