## Three Contracts Let For School Project

One Spearman contractor was among the three successful bidders on more than \$200,000 of school construction let here Thursday night.

Contracts were let for electrical work, paving, and general construction for the remodeling of the junior high school building and completing the paving at the new high school.

Anthony Electric of Spearman got the electrical contract with a low bid of \$24,895. Five other contractors were bidding on the job.

Shorty's Electric of Guymon bid \$27,989, Duke Electric of Amarillo bid \$37,690, Ray Electric of Amarillo bid \$30,635, Louis Schnell of Spearman bid \$29,970 and Brooks Electric bid \$29,889.

These were all base bids with alternates either adding or subtracting from the contract.

Two contractors bid on the paving work. Lewis Construction of Dumas got the job on a bid of \$69,950, Lee Milligan Paving Co. bid \$76,590.81.

Carter-Johnson Construction of Guymon got the general contract with a low bid of \$124,149. There were alternates in this contract also, which added or subtracted the final cost.

Others bidding were M.B. Allen Construction of Amarillo, \$132,360, Timmons Construction of Amarillo, \$140,802, and Andrews Construction of Amarillo, \$144,897.

The total of the successful base bids is \$218,994. Spearman voters earlier this year approved \$242,000 in bonds for this work.

Construction is to begin immediately after school closes. Work is to be finished before school opens this fall.

The Junior High School will be completely remodeled inside, parking area around the building will be repaved, the bus loading area behind the building will be repaved and elevated to allow buses and cars to be out of the mud when it rains. More parking areas will be paved at the high school.

John Work of Amarillo is the architect for the project.

## Sutherland In California

Marine Corporal Frank Sutherland has returned to Camp Pendleton, Calif., after spending a 30-day leave with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jim Sutherland of Spearman.

Cpl. Sutherland has just returned from 13 months duty in the Far East. He was stationed on Okinawa and then was part of the Marine battle contingent with the Seventh Fleet off Viet Nam.

The Marines group Sutherland was in spent 77 days at sea on the helicopter carrier USS Princeton. They were at sea 45 days at one stretch, then had a few days liberty in the Philippines, then went back to sea.

After a total of 77 days they were returned to Okinawa for a month before he returned to the states.

Cpl. Sutherland said they were three to eight miles off Viet Nam most of the time.

He volunteered for four years duty with the Marines and will be discharged in July, 1966.

## Jerry Floyd Joins Clock Collectors While Stationed in Verdun, France

VERDUN, France--Clock collecting has snared two more aficionados here--- Capt. James T. Johnston, a dentist with the 767th Medical Det of 56th General Hospital, and Sp5 Jerry O. Floyd, Hq and Hq Co. Operations and Intelligence Training Branch, Maginot Casern here.

Johnston figures he has about \$135 invested in his collection of 17 clocks. He pays an average of \$5 a clock but bought one for only \$4 when the seller put it on the scales and let it go for the price of the brass.

"The only thing wrong with most of the clocks is that they need a good cleaning," Johnston said. "They look terrible when we get them, but by the time we have them cleaned up, we hate to part with them."

Johnston takes the brass parts

over to the hobby shop to clean them up, but does the rest of the work at home.

"We go to auction sales at the small towns around here and find quite a variety--we've bought marble, brass, wooden and grandfather clocks. One even has Westminster chimes."

Floyd now has nine clocks and figures he has invested no more than \$35 in his hobby although since he has repaired and cleaned them they are worth far more than that.

"Westminster chimes add a great deal to the value of the clock," Floyd said. "The problem is, the Westminster chimes take up more space than the other strikes do so your Westminster chime clock is usually a bit thicker and the style is sometimes not as appealing."

Johnston's wife, Carol, col-

lects old cast iron stoves and oil lamps. Recently she found a lamp with three faces in the brass base and then was happily surprised to find that she had acquired a treasure exactly like one illustrated in the January issue of the American magazine, "Woman's Day."

She has 12 lamps in her collection, all from Italy and France. "I never pay more than the equivalent of about \$3 for any of them," Mrs. Johnston said.

Johnston picked up a large sideboard for \$25 at St. Dizier and found a treasure inside--a love letter dated in the late 1700s.

Now that the collecting bug has infected them both, Johnston and Floyd are looking for other items to collect, although they are far from the States. "If a bargain comes along, we'll buy it."

# Soil Stewardship Week Stresses Man's Responsibility To God

With dominion over the earth and the fullness thereof man bears a great responsibility to his Maker, to himself and to all the living world around him--a responsibility for maintaining developing the natural endowments with which he cohabits the earth.

Each year we give recognition to an important part of this responsibility in observance of Soil Stewardship Week.

We do so this year from May 23 through 30 with the theme "The Challenge of Growth." We acknowledge man's dependence on the soil and his duty to care for it. We have come to know that a land of conservation is a land of plenty.

Our conservation responsibility is a product of the growth that characterizes the United States, and growth presents a challenge that becomes more demanding with time.

Midway the decade of the Sixties, as we venture into the total and awesome universe, we are fast becoming aware of an extension of man's responsibility. There dawns upon us the realization that, bit by bit, man is slipping his veil of ignorance and misun-

derstanding, sweeping aside the aged shrouds of timidity and fear, the approach new horizons of human achievement.

In the laboratory, on the soil, beneath the sea and into space, our forays unto the unknown in search of the "whys" and "hows" bring us always closer to truths we have only vaguely suspected. Our imagination leaps to engage more profound mysteries.

It is imperative, in the face of this remarkable boldness, that we pause with each unfoldment to understand our role and its meaning.

We are stewards of what we survey. Whatever we may chance to discover about our world, or worlds beyond, we are privileged by a Higher Authority than ourselves. The rewards of this privilege are accompanied by serious obligations. Nowhere will we be more constrained to meet our responsibility, to honor our trust, to discharge our obligation as stewards, than on earth with its soil and water resources, the stuff on which after all, our lives depend.

We have learned from bitter experience the price of disregard for those obligations. Where we misused and

abused the land we reaped subsequently the floods and dust and utter desolation.

We in America have survived those mistakes. We are earnestly endeavoring to husband and develop our soil and water resources--to heal the scars of our land. In this effort there are yet too many who believe the problems of soil and water to be problems only for the land owner and operator. They must be impressed with the meaning of stewardship. They must come to know that although our resources to meet present and future needs are adequate, they will remain adequate only as we of country and city together use and develop them wisely. The speed with which stewardship becomes a fact of life in our cities can well be marked as a facet of the challenge of growth.

The best use of land and water to meet human demands on a continuing basis becomes more urgent. As each day passes, this fact looms larger in importance in both urban and rural areas.

This is the nature of the challenge of growth that confronts us: To cultivate more widely, among all our people, the conservation attitude. For

## Senior Citizens Should Claim Social Security

Panhandle residents 65 or over who have not yet applied for social security benefits were advised today to file a claim now even if they are not planning to retire right away.

In issuing the above advice, Hal Geldon, Amarillo social security district manager pointed out that several local people who applied last year found that they had lost some benefits by not applying earlier. "We have found," said Geldon, "that the best way for a person to protect his social security benefit rights is to apply at 65 whether or not he intends to go on working. Even if no benefits are payable right away, there's an advantage in having your claim already approved when you actually retire. With entitlement already established, the benefits can be started immediately when we are notified of the retirement date."

Geldon said that according to the latest figures there are nearly 19 million Americans who are 65 or over. Of that total, more than 14 million have already established their entitlement to social security monthly benefits, and 1.1

million are insured for benefits but have not yet filed their claims. The latter figure includes the wives of insured workers.

Noting that President Johnson has designated May as National Senior Citizens Month, Geldon extended a special invitation for all Panhandle over-65 residents who have not applied, to visit the social security office or meet with the social security representative who comes to their area and file application for benefits.

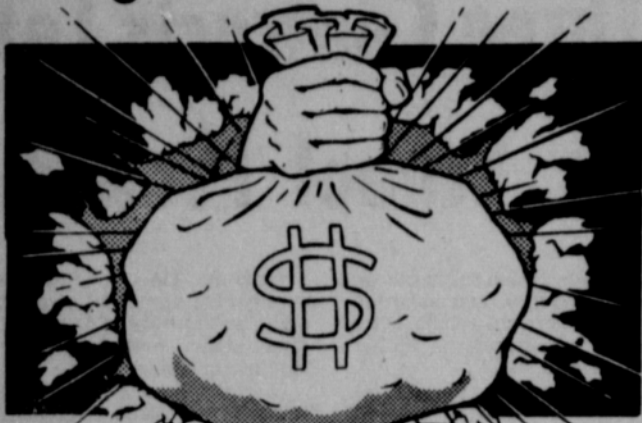

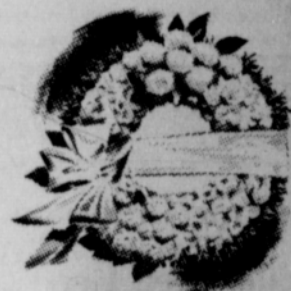
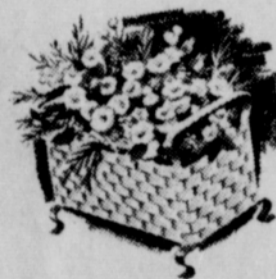

BLANTYRE, Malawi Women who wear tight skirts are having them torn off by "thugs and hooligans" in marketplaces, the Malawi News reported. The newspaper said the eager males claim they are acting within the official ban forbidding women to wear lip stick, short dresses, hair straighteners and finger nail polish. The Malawi Government considers such objects objectionable European influences.

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It is a violation of the law to either carelessly or deliberately set on fire the lands of another. In 1951 the Legislature made it a felony for a person to deliberately set fire to grass or forest land owned by another. They also enacted a law making it a misdemeanor to negligently set, or cause to be set on fire, the lands of another. The Texas Forest Service is primarily responsible for enforcing these statutes.

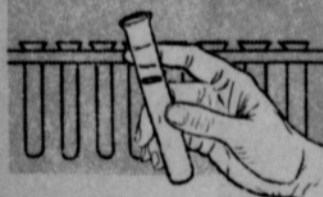

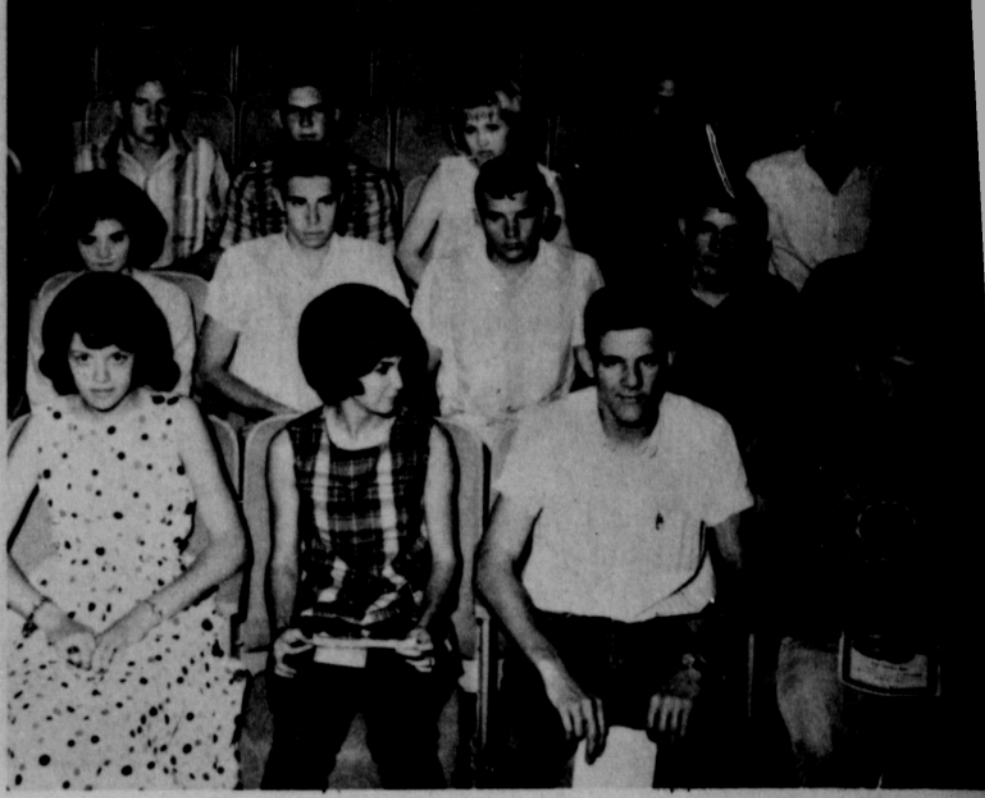
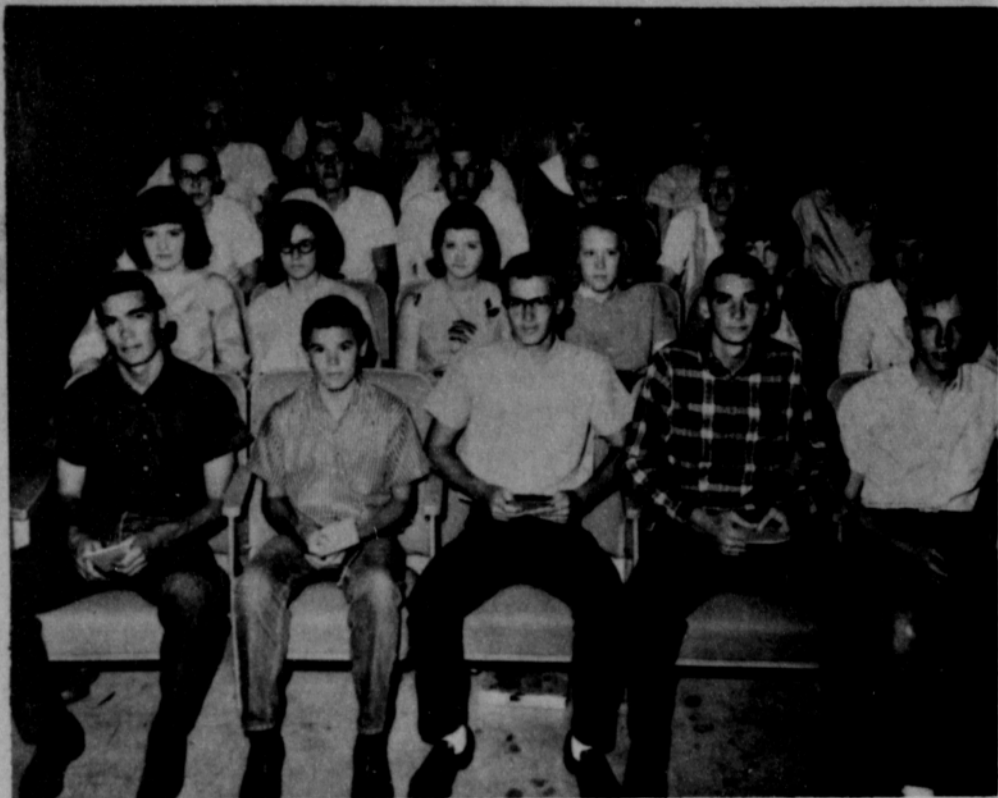
