There is not a superstitious bone in J. Woodrow Gibner's body despite the fact that many of his life decisions were made in March--chief among them his marriage to Lois and his retirement from the active staff of First State Bank, Spearman, March 1, 1983.

The place of his birth in 1918--the town of Old Hansford--is presently just open country with a few native sons who started life there to recall it. "Woody" Gibner is in their foremost ranks.

Life at Old Hansford and the Gibners shifted to Spearman where Woody started school in 1924...

"...The same year my next brother was a senior in Spearman High School." Gibner notes.

As this budding community leader advanced through the grades, play was in the form of basketball and tennis.

Work was farm labor, mostly plowing. It was here Woodrow Gibner learned the deep importance of a straight furrow whether it was in the soil of the old home place or the dealings of business life.

During high school years, Woody moved into the city laboring life where jobs included a stint at the bank of that era, little realizing then this was the first apprenticeship to a career that would begin in earnest in his early twenties.

At the time Woodrow Gibner finished high school studies, college came to the lives of very few, rich or poor. Knowing only that he wanted to direct his life into the business world, this young banker-to-be turned to the more popular--and practical--advanced education of his day...business school.

His choice was a highly rated school at Oklahoma City. During his tenure there he received a valuable business education, an administrative

job with an Oklahoma City milk firm and a wife.

He married Lois March 17, 1939...St. Patrick's Day.

The young couple missed Woody's magic March by one day, returning to Spearman, April 1, 1940.

He set about immediately to build a small house--almost single-handedly--that was to be the couple's home for some time.

It seemed only a short time from that point that J. Woodrow Gibner was a member of the Armed Forces--U.S. Navy, aviation branch--fighting the "War-to-end-all-wars."

Here destiny stepped in and even in uniform, Woody Gibner was to advance his business experience. It seemed the Navy was made up of fighting men but few of them with administrative experience.

So it was, Woodrow Gibner fought the war "aiming" men in the conflict instead of the prows of ships or the muzzles of guns.

Missing magic March by a month this time, young Gibner returned from military service to work in the bank at Spearman, May, 1946.

Through the years, both the bank and the area residents that did business with it, benefited from the career that began that May day in 1946.

Then came a time in that career when Woody fixed eyes--and a goal--on a date. This time, reckoning was "dead on."

March 1, 1983, J. Woodrow Gibner retired from the active staff of First State Bank, Spearman.

--Not from life nor the living of it.

So it is that Woody Gibner is pondering options while a greatly enlarged community he helped to grow, is watching to see what horizon his vision and his experience settle upon.

A rank of storms in the Pacific off California and a writhing jet stream "cue-balled" another snowstorm into Hansford County.

In Spearman, snow started falling about 8 p.m., Thursday, but until about midnight it was melting as fast as it reached the ground. Around midnight, cold took over and by Friday morning the ground was white.

On the ground, snow remained only in patches with ordinary ground moisture the only token it had fallen. Then, at mid-morning, Friday, it started snowing again and continued to fall melting as it hit.

### Pesticide training course

Pesticide products containing the active ingredients 2,4-D (2,4-dichlorophenoxyacetic acid), 2,4-DB (4-[2,4-dichlorophenoxy] butyric acid), 2,4-DP (2-[2,4-dichlorophenoxy] propionic acid), 2,4,5-T (2,4,5-trichlorophenoxyacetic acid), MCPA (2-methyl-4-chlorophenoxyacetic acid), silvex (2-[2,4,5-trichlorophenoxy] propionic acid), dicamba (3,6-dichloro-o-anisic acid), propanil (3', 4'-dichloropropanilide) and arsenic acid (orthoarsenic acid), alone or in mixtures, when distributed in containers of a capacity larger than one quart for liquid material or two pounds for dry or solid material (if marketed using metric measures—containers larger than one liter or one kilogram, respectively) have been classified as state-limited-use pesticides by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA).

Specialty fertilizer mixtures containing one or more of these active ingredients packaged in containers of 50 pounds or less that are labeled for ornamental use and registered with the Texas Feed and Fertilizer Control Service for sale and distribution in this state are exempt from the classification as state-limited-use pesticides.

Products for home use containing one or more of these active ingredients requiring no further mixing or dilution before use and packaged in containers with a capacity of one gallon or less for liquid formulations or four pounds or less for dry or solid materials are also exempt from the classification as state-limited-use pesticides.

State-limited-use pesticides and restricted-use pesticides may only be sold to certified applicators, persons acting under the direct supervision of a certified applicator, or a licensed dealer. Hansford County producers who anticipate use of a state-limited-use or restricted-use pesticide and who do not currently hold a private applicator certificate may wish to obtain a certificate from the Texas Department of Agriculture.

A person is a "private applicator" if the person uses or supervises the use of a restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticide for the purpose of producing an agricultural commodity 1) on property owned or rented by the person or the person's employer or under the person's general control; or 2) on the property of another person if applied between producers of agricultural commodities. Persons meeting these qualifications may obtain certification as private applicators from the Texas Department of Agriculture through completion of an approved training program conducted by the County Extension Agent on Monday, April 11, 1983, 2 p.m. at the Extension Homemakers Clubroom in Spearman.

Many persons holding private applicator certificates responded to a 1981 Texas Department of Agriculture request to "re-certify" and in so doing received a current private applicator certificate which may be identified by a two-digit prefix—81, 82 or 83--of the certificate number (example: 81-17952). Initial issue certificates (certificate number not preceded by a two-digit number) are considered valid according to a TDA source, however, TDA encourages holders of such certificates to submit an "application" for renewal. A limited supply of the TDA Application for private Applicator Renewal is available at the County Extension office.

Connie Woolley did a fine job in the **TRIPLE JUMP** by placing 5th and Julie Godfrey was right behind her in 6th Place.

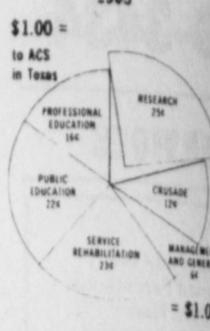
Mary Lou Baker improved by placing 3rd in the **DISCUS**. Sherri Sexton placed 5th in the same event.

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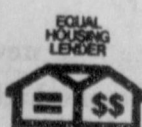

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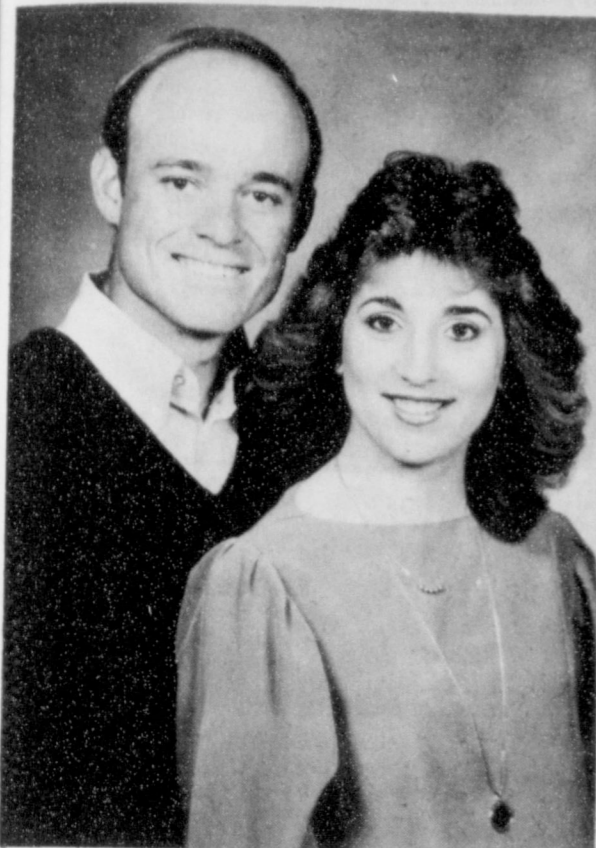
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## July Wedding Planned

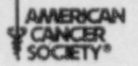

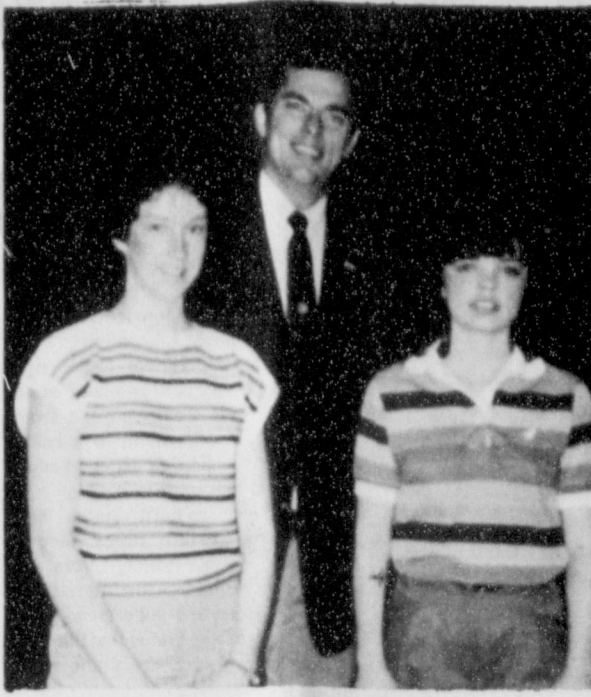

## Free wildlife tree

Home appliance repairs by consumers are becoming more common because of the high cost of repair service. Know your limitations before attempting any repairs, and start out with simple tasks to develop your skills. You may find that repairing your own appliances is easier than you think.

Determine whether repair is really needed. Be sure that the appliance is plugged in, and that a fuse is not blown or a breaker tripped. This will eliminate wasted time or service calls.

Before you begin your repairs, find the manual or instruction sheet that came with the appliance, and re-read it. Make a habit of keeping manuals in a central place so they can be found quickly and easily.

Many "do-it-yourself" repair books are available commercially or through appliance companies. You may also find pamphlets and workshops offered in your community.

Each job will require different tools, but it is good to start out with a few basic, good quality items. Add extra tools as additional skills are developed.

Beginners usually need a claw-type hammer and several screwdrivers, both blade and Phillips head types, in various sizes. Adjustable wrenches are useful, as are both slip joint and needle nose pliers.

Other handy items include a spray can of silicone and a can of all-purpose oil to free rusty, clogged or stuck areas. Scrap fabric or "rags" are needed to clean appliances and hands.

For your own safety, be sure the appliance is unplugged or turned off before you tackle a repair job.

Remember that some repair jobs can be avoided by follow-

ing the use and care manuals that come with the appliance. Keep all appliances cleaned and oiled, and change filters as needed. Preventive maintenance may prolong the life of your appliances. ## TRUSTEES CALL BOND ELECTION

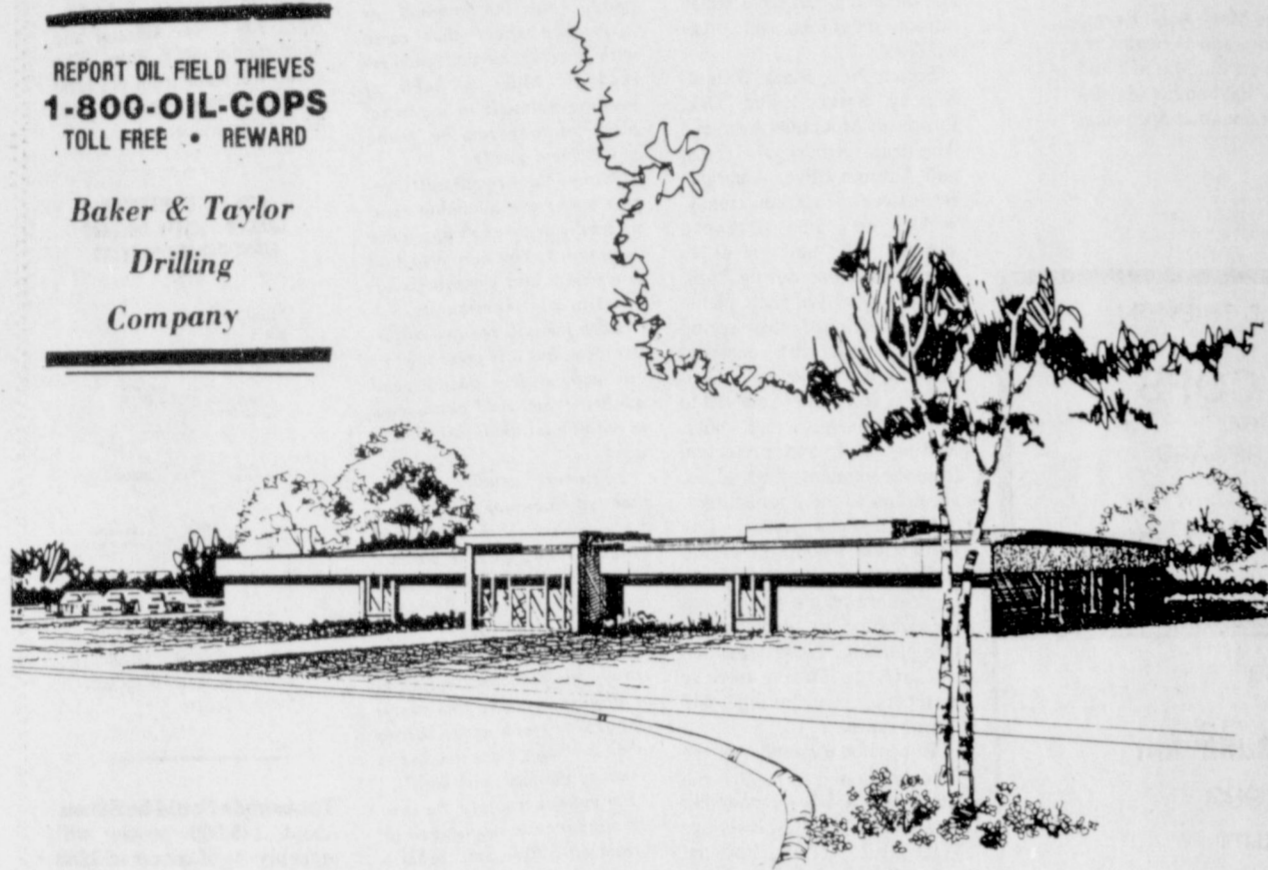

## In Texas . . .

### '26-wheeler wait-and-see

While at least seven states in the nation are vehemently fighting the new federal highway move that allows "26-wheeler" tandem trailer rigs to operate on two-lane state roads, in Texas no one from Austin officialdom to a back-roads pickup-pusher knows what will happen here.

Most eastern states and many western states banned the double-trailer trucks on everything but the Interstates. Texas had gone along with the western states that allowed them on Interstates and four-lane arterials.

There is a major problem. In the federal bill that added five-cents-a-gallon gasoline tax, truck widths were ad-

vanced from 96 to 102-inches. If Texas goes along with the federal rule, it will require legislative action to raise the width law to 102-inches.

This means other vehicles on Texas roads would be meeting an awesome length of extra-wide truck! A truck-to-truck encounter could be disastrous.

That is why all states with bans for the tandem trailers on the books are going to leave them in force and enforce them.

At least 13 states have said their highway patrolmen would ticket any of the double-bottoms caught off the Interstate.

A federal highway official said the new rule would be enforced but a substantial transition period would be allowed.

In Texas, in addition to two and four lane roads, there are some "load zone" arteries -- mostly farm-to-market thoroughfares -- with an under-80,000-pound limit.

Meanwhile, the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation at Austin is awaiting lists of Texas two-lane roads the federal government feels are adequate for the tandem trailer trucks.
