## Gruver-Texhoma ISDs 'swap' land

A swap of two pieces of taxable property with Texhoma, Texas school district requested by two farmers was approved by Gruver ISD school board during its regular session Wednesday.

The swap of the property for tax purposes was requested in a petition submitted to the Gruver trustees by Jack Freeman, who owns the property in question lying within Gruver ISD in Hansford County adjacent to Texhoma, Texas ISD in Sherman County.

A similar petition by Dan Carthel, has already been approved by Texhoma school board. Carthel's

property in question lies just across the line in Texhoma ISD.

Carthel informed the school boards that although his property lies within the bounds of Texhoma ISD, his interest and involvement in community has always been in Gruver. He said his family preferred Gruver and he wants his children to attend school in Gruver without paying transfer fees, and these are the reasons he wanted his property within Gruver ISD rather than in Texhoma, Texas ISD.

Carthel so petitioned Texhoma ISD. Freeman, who owns property in Gruver ISD but resides elsewhere,

agreed to the switch to accommodate Carthel. No property will change hands, but the Carthel property in Sherman County would be listed on Gruver ISD tax rolls, and the Freeman property in Hansford County would be listed on Texhoma, Texas ISD tax rolls. Although there is some difference in the total acres of Carthel's and Freeman's places, the tax values of the two are almost identical according to Gruver school board president Randy Brown.

Before this transfer becomes final, it first must be approved by both the Hansford and Sherman County commissioners and the

Gruver trustees plan to have the school district's attorney take the petitions before the two commissioners courts.

The trustees discussed at length a proposal by two head coaches that if an athlete quits a team twice he would be banned from playing any competitive team sports for a year, subject to unanimous vote of a three person board composed of the quitting athlete's principal, a teacher and a coach.

Superintendent Jack Weldon told the board the original language of

## Seventh, eighth graders 'split'

Spearman and Boys Ranch split a pair of close, hard fought football games Thursday in Lynx Stadium.

The Spearman seventh graders struck swiftly, then held on for an 8-6 victory in the first of the two games. In the eighth grade game the visitors scored in equally quick fashion and added a fourth quarter touchdown to decide what was otherwise a fiercely contested defensive duel, 14-0.

Spearman's winning points came like a bolt of lightning as J Garnett, the teams quarterback took the opening kickoff and ran it back 60 yards for a touchdown.

Then Matt Tucker, the team's big

bruising fulback, slammed into the line and bulled his way across for the two point conversion that ultimately proved to be Spearman's margin of victory.

Boys Ranch made it close, scoring a touchdown on a 20-yard end run after a drive from the Spearman 30 following a short punt. But the all-important try for extra points was stopped, and the bristling Spearman seventh grade defense did the rest, shutting out Boys Ranch the rest of the way for the victory.

The win could prove costly to the Spearman team, however. Tucker,

will consider a GTE proposal to install a new phone system.

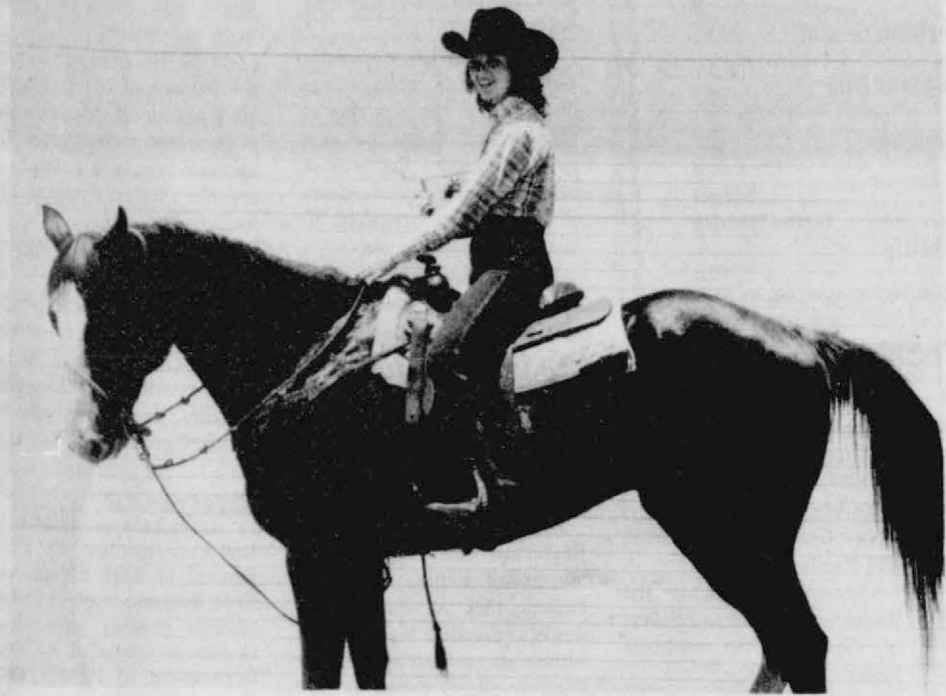
Under old business, the board will take up nomination of candidates for directors positions for Hansford County Appraisal District. The board may nominate five candidates. Three candidates are members who have been serving on the board and have who have indicated they will serve again. Two members of the present board have indicated they will not serve again and will be replaced.

Under new business, the trustees will take up possible action on recommendations and/or resignations, first board consideration for

proposed board policy additions, first board consideration for proposed board policy additions and amendments, workers compensation Self-Insurance Fund contract with T.S.S.F. (T.A.S.B.), and the seasonal change in meeting time.

Superintendent's reports on tap include the high school calendar for October, new books and audio-visual materials for the high school library, the W.S.L. program for grades kindergarten through fourth, the enrollment chart, cafeteria report for September, board breakfast on Oct. 25 at 6:30 a.m., and Hansford County Appraisal Board's September report.

RED TYLER DEE, a five-year-old sorrel gelding, and its owner Andrea Archer were recently awarded the title AQHA Youth Champion by the American Quarter Horse Association located in Amarillo, Texas.

A minimum of 15 points in halter class competition is required, with another minimum of 15 points earned in youth performance events. Five points must be won in at least two events, with the final five points won in either halter or performance classes.

The AQHA is the world's largest equine registry, hosting more than 142,000 members. There are state and local associations in all 50 states and recognized foreign associations in 10 different countries.

More than 2,300 AQHA-sanctioned shows were held during 1982, attracting 720,812 entries.

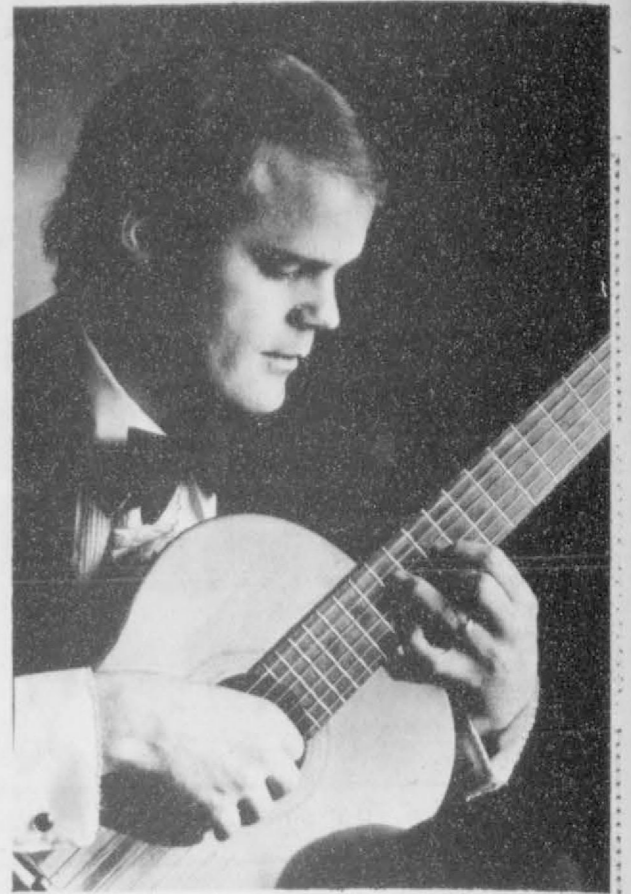

Spearman 4-H meets second Monday of each month. Gruver 4-H meets second Tuesday of each month.

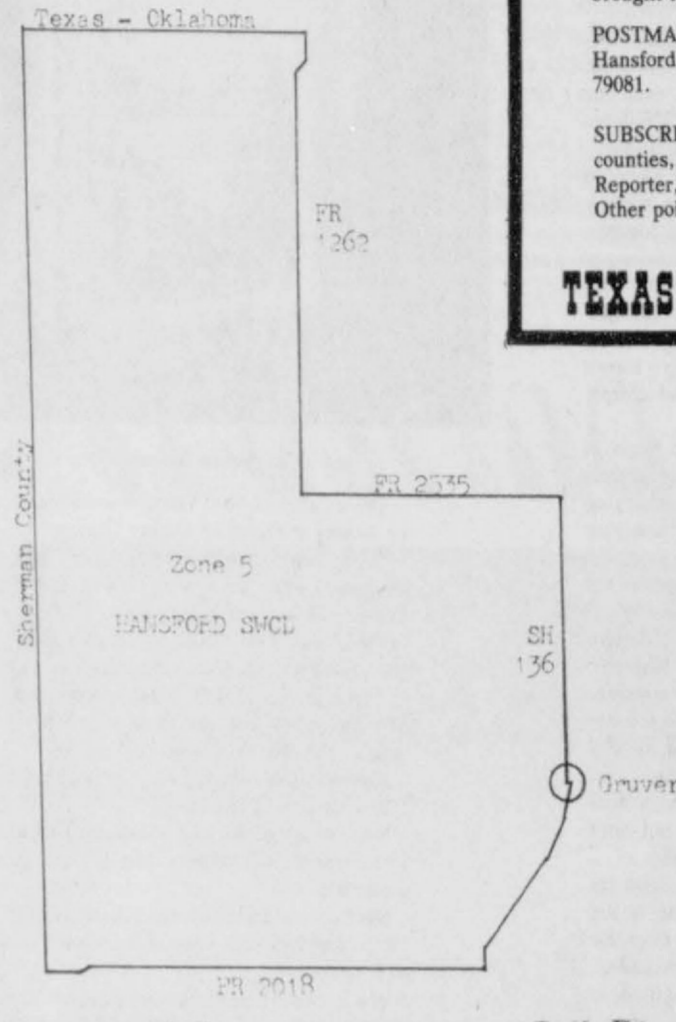

### Hansford SWCD Zone 5 election set

The election for the Zone 5 director of the Hansford Soil & Water Conservation District (SWCD) will be held Tuesday, October 11th, at 7:00 p.m. in the Oslo Lutheran Church.  
The boundaries of the directors zones were revised in July to make it easier for landusers to determine in which zone they had land located.  
Zone 5 is now bordered on the north by the Texas - Oklahoma line, on the west by the Sherman - Hansford County line, on the south by Farm Road 2018, and on the east by Highway 136 and Farm Roads 2535 and 1262.  
Persons owning agricultural land within this zone and residing in Hansford County who have attained the age of 18 years are eligible to vote. The landowner's spouse is also eligible to vote.

In the second half Spearman got its final TD. Coach Gordon Lockett

tried to keep from running up the score, and was using his limited number of substitutes available on offense. The rub was, he had Cook playing as a defensive back. Cook intercepted a long Boys Ranch aerial and returned it for a Spearman TD. A bad snap killed the chances of a conversion kick, and it was 36-0, Lynx.

Boys Ranch finally tallied a touchdown after covering a Spearman fumble at the Lynx 35 and marching in from there. The Rough Rider JV got its score on a five-yard run with four minutes to go.

the proposal limited it primarily to boys football and basketball but that he told the coaches "Title 9 wouldn't let us do it that way," and said that they would have to eliminate all reference to the sex of the athlete if they wanted to adopt the proposal. Brown said the proposed probation of an athlete for quitting a team twice was modeled after one adopted "two or three years ago at McCamey."

As proposed, an athlete quitting a team would be placed on probation the first time, and allowed to participate in other sports, but the second time he quit he or she could be prohibited from participation in any team sport for one year provided the principal-teacher-coach board voted unanimously to ban him or her playing.

"The teacher, principal and coach all have to agree--if the teacher says, "No I think you should not have to give up all sports," then that's it--the athlete can play in other sports," it was explained.

"If a player fouls up in football and quits twice, then he could be put on probation in all sports for a year."

Board member and secretary Dennis Stedje said, "I don't like it. If he quits the football team, maybe he should be punished in football, but not in tennis or some other sport."

Weldon said the discussion was putting too much emphasis on football, that it could apply to quitting twice in any sport.

Stedje said, "I can already see we better not get on that." (at the meeting).

Brown said, "We're dealing with parents too, and that he was sure some parents of Gruver school athletes would be against such a policy."

He said that he was leary of the proposal at first but that the more he studied it, the closer he came to liking it.

"The only way to build a football program is to build character--and not just football--I don't care if it's football, basketball, ping pong or tennis."

He said the proposal gave some leeway, an athlete had so many days to drop off the team if he wanted to when he first came out for the sport, without being subject to the year's probation. But once the team has played two or three games and is depending on that player, and he just quits because he decides he doesn't like the coach, or to really play the sport, then he should understand this will hurt the whole team.

Stedje said before the board approved such a policy, "I need the ole boy who authored this deal to show me how it's going to work."

Without coming to a vote, the board decided to postpone action on the proposed policy until the trustees could get more input from the coaches.

Gruver High School Principal Kenneth Baker and Junior High School Principal Bill Duncan gave progress reports on the school year to date.

Baker said, "As far as the academic program is concerned, we've had as good a start as we've had in the eight years I've been here."

"More teachers have shown cooperation and support as far as pushing students (to excell) is concerned."

"And I'm really pleased with three new teachers we have--Mr. (Barry) Haensch, Mrs. (Susan) Kidder, Mr. (Tim) Garland and Mr. (Doug) Frick, (new in high school, formerly taught in Gruver Junior High."

"Mrs. Kidder is very concerned with her youngsters. She spends a lot of time with them--a lot of extra time."

"You go to her room, and see her walking around helping them with their problems."

When asked about the drafting program, Baker said, Mr. (Royce) Blackshear also spends a lot of his time helping his drafting students. "Everytime I'm out there, I see him back there bent over a table, helping a student with his drafting."

Baker said, "And the youngsters

seem to have a more receptive attitude towards the teachers--our new ones and our old ones. They seem to want to learn."

Baker said attendance in high school so far this year has averaged "97 point something percent--we're not having many absences."

Duncan said that enrollment in the junior high and elementary schools was 372, and that "the only hotspot" as far as overcrowding is concerned "is the third grade where there are 37 students."

He said participation by student in extra curricular activities is excellent.

"We've got just about all out for football that can possibly come out just about--I think two boys are not participating. All the girls except 12 are out for athletics."

"And participaiton has been excellent as usual in band..." We

have 57 out for the seventh and eighth grade band. They sound pretty good."

He also said the new elementary-junior high teachers were doing a good job, mentioning Linda Haensch and David Steele by name.

Duncan said if the proposed policy on banning players who quit twice from playing sports for a year, if adopted, would also be for junior high. The he added, "Of course these littler fellows seldom quit, and when they do quit, they stay quit."

Gruver ISD Business Manager Margaret Fry was asked if a new computer system under consideration would help in her office and she said if it did the things the manufacturer claimed, then it would cut "my work at least in half."

It was suggested Mrs. Fry and Superintendent's Secretary Betty

McWilliams might make a trip to White Deer and see how well this particular computer system is working there before any decision is made.

It was also mention Gruver High School would host the district UIL literary competition, the school's "swan song" in 1-2A because the school expects to be dropped to 1A next season. The board members then speculated on possible district alignments.

Lloyd Looer, president of the newly formed Gruver Classroom Teachers' Association also visited with the board. The board selected Gene Fletcher as its choice for a nominee to one of the two vacant

seats on the Hanford County Appraisal District Board, went along with another government entity's nomi-

nation of Roy Bulls for the other vacant seat, and also nominated the remaining members of the board--

Lynn Hart, Thane McCloy and Jimmy Shieldknight--all up for another term.

School guidance counselors recommend that students participate in the ACT Assessment Program during the junior year or early in the senior

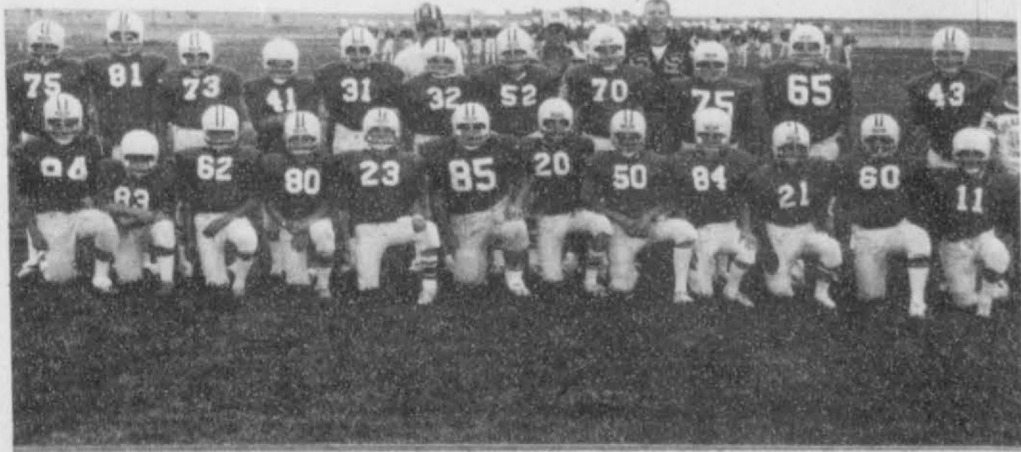
year, so their results will be available in time for use in planning for postsecondary education and careers.
