

# Amendment Election Tuesday

Hansford County voters will go to the polls Tuesday, Nov. 2, to help decide the fate of 10 constitutional amendments. All nine voting boxes in the county will be open for the election.

Voting precincts two, five and six, Kimbell, Hitchland and New Hope were combined into one precinct by the Commissioners Court Oct. 11. It is now precinct two and the voting box will be at the N.F. Renner farm residence with Mrs. H.J. Dondlinger as judge and Mrs. Oma Lee Brillhart and

Mrs. Bill Logsdon as clerks. All other voting precincts will be in their regular locations.

The 10 amendments cover a wide range of subjects, ranging from an increase in the state ad valorem tax to increasing the terms of state office holders to four years.

Amendment one will permit the state to increase the state ad valorem tax from five cents to 10 cents per \$100 valuation. This money will go to 17 state supported colleges and universities for building and equip-

ping more buildings.

Amendment two would allow the state to issue \$200,000 in bonds to continue the Veterans Land program. It would also allow the bonds to draw a higher rate of interest and extend the program an indefinite time.

Amendment three allows the state of Texas to give wider welfare coverage under the Kerr-Mills medical care program. It will also protect the \$27 million now being distributed under the program.

Amendment four provides

the Governor, Lt. Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller, Treasurer, Land Commissioner and Secretary of State four year terms of office.

Amendment five allows a broader investment authority for the Teacher Retirement Board. It would allow the board to invest the retirement fund in higher earning equity securities and mean more income for the fund.

Amendment six is to provide a Texas Opportunity Plan for needy and deserving

students attending public and private colleges in Texas. This is the program copied after the Opportunity Plan that has worked so successfully at West Texas University.

Amendment seven affects only Harris County and allows the exemption of property of certain charitable organizations from local ad valorem taxes. These organizations have to expend \$1,500,000 annually for free medical and hospital care for the needy.

Amendment eight provides for the automatic retirement of district and appellate judges at the age of 75 and provides a means of removal for misconduct or disability.

Amendment nine allows the legislature to set the salary of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker and increase per diem for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$20.

Amendment ten provides a four year term of office for state representatives.

**Track Great To Speak Here Nov. 6**

A former world record holder in the indoor and outdoor mile run, will be the guest speaker for the Christ For All Youth Hootenanny in the Community Building, Nov. 6, at 7:30 p.m.

The speaker will be Glenn Cunningham, the great University of Kansas runner of the 1930's who now operates a home for boys in Augusta, Kans.

Cunningham was the first miler to begin flirting with the four minute mile and was far ahead of the other runners of his day. It has been said he might have broken the four minute barrier if his competition has been strong enough.

In 1934 he set the world record of 4:6.7 in the outdoor mile and in 1938 he set the indoor mile record of 4:4.4.

Cunningham overcame a great handicap to become a great runner. When he was eight years old he was building a fire in the stove of a country school. Kerosene was used to start the fire. It exploded and he was so seriously burned, doctors said he would not walk again.

He did walk again and to strengthen his legs he used to run from his home to school, a distance of more than two miles.

For the Hootenanny there will be four talent groups. The Minstrels and Girls Sextet from Spearman High School, the Climbers from Pampa and a group from Peryton High School.

Tony Cregler of TCU will lead the group singing during the Hootenanny.

There will be a Coke, chip and dip session for refreshments.

Burl McClellan will be master of ceremonies for the program.

Youth from all over the area are invited to attend the Hootenanny. There is no admission and everyone is urged to attend.

This will be the first youth night program during the Christ For All Crusade.

Another outstanding Christian athlete will be on one other program and the third program will feature evangelist Roy Gustafson and music director Wesley Boyd and his wife.

# Lynx Blast Blackhawks

## Kenneth Shufeldt Rushes For 182 Yards in 20 Tries

Senior Kenneth Shufeldt made Phillips coach Joe Means look like a great judge of football talent as Shufeldt led the Spearman Lynx to a 22-13 victory over Phillips here Friday night.

In a pre-game interview this week, Coach Means said Shufeldt was a good runner. Shufeldt was so good that he gained 182 yards in 20 carries, scored two touchdowns and set up the third in probably his greatest game of three years.

Although Phillips contained the Lynx after the locals' first play from scrimmage until early in the third quarter, the Lynx rolled up 233 yards on the ground to Phillips' 185. Phillips had 76 yards passing to Spearman's 12.

The big, quick Blackhawk forward wall stopped the Lynx cold in the first half. Spearman got only two first downs in the half.

Phillips, led by Allen Brain, moved the ball up and down the field, but miscues and a Lynx defense that rose to the occasions managed to contain the Blackhawks outside the Spearman goal.

Spearman jarred Phillips loose from the ball six times and recovered three of the fumbles. Clayton Cochran and Mart Brillhart each recovered one to snuff out Hawk drives and Shufeldt got the third one on a fumbled punt to set up the last Spearman score.

Although the big Phillips line-men were able to clear Brain and Jack McClellan for gains of five to 10 yards, the Lynx secondary managed to contain the speedsters.

Brain and Wilson opened the game with a rush and marched the ball out from the Phillips 16 to the 38 before the Lynx could contain them.

First, linebacker Lynn Buzzard caught Brain from behind at the line of scrimmage. Then he was met by a wall of defenders, bounced off and was caught for no gain on the other side of the line by Clement.

McClellan's fourth down punt from the Hawk 40 went almost straight up, took a backward bounce and linebacker Clement caught it on the Phillips 40 and got to the 33 before being caught.

On the first play, Shufeldt swept to the left, got one block

from Cochran and raced 33 yards to score. On a fake place kick, Clement's pass to Cochran was too high. Clement was rushed hard and the receivers were covered.

That was the end of Spearman's offense for the first half, but the defense held up. Good work by Cochran and Jerry Holton forced Phillips to punt.

Spearman put the ball in play on the 20 and an offside penalty and two running plays put them back to the Lynx 13. There Clement got off a 76 yard quick kick.

Phillips started to move the ball. Brain could not be stopped. He carried on seven of nine plays and put the ball out to the Lynx 43. Here, quarterback Gary Wendel faked to Brain, rolled out and passed to fullback Larry Reed on the Spearman 20. He was all alone and scampered in for the score.

Brain tried to run for two points but was first slowed by Ken Shufeldt, then mobbed by Buzzard, Cochran, Clement and Berry.

Phillips had tied the score on the second play of the second quarter.

Spearman was hog-tied on offense. Cochran got one Phillips fumble on the Spearman 39, then a second Phillips drive was killed after Brain ran 38 yards for a tally. Phillips was caught holding at the 34 and penalized back to the Hawk 47.

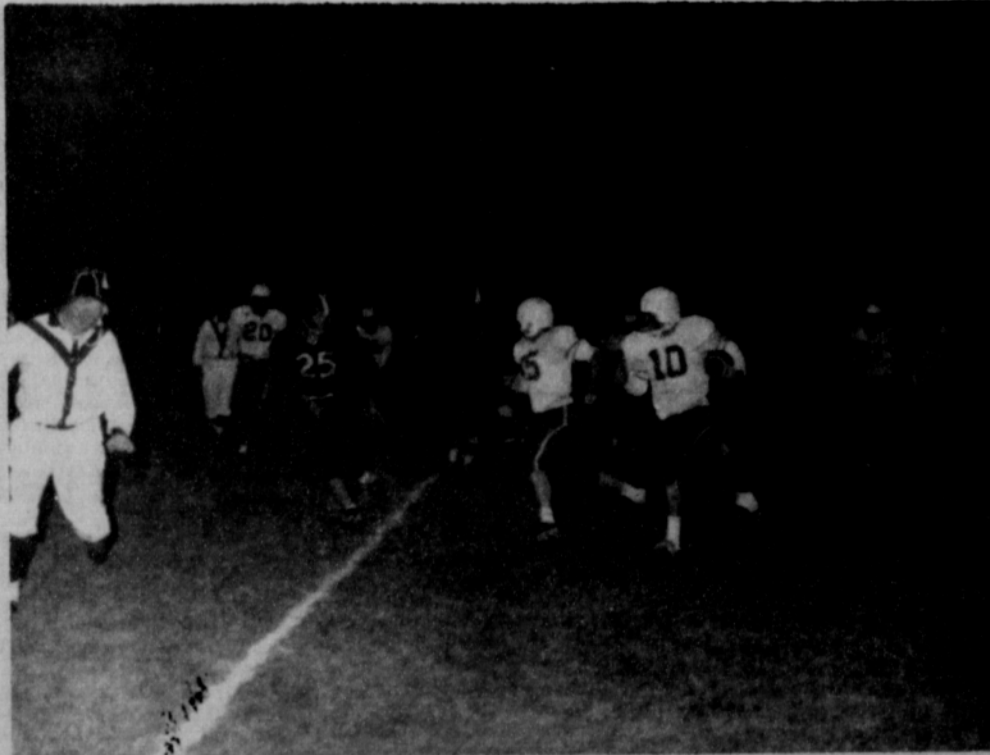

running but time ran out with the Lynx at midfield.

Spearman took the second half kickoff and three plays later tied the game.

Shufeldt was stopped twice, then on third down at the 21 the right side of the line opened a little hole. He scooted through, eluded the linebackers and broke free. At the Hawk 30, a defensive back closed in but Shufeldt twisted sideways, gave the Hawk a hand in the face and shoved free to go the rest of the way to score.

Hal Shufeldt got the call for the extra points. He was hit at the one, but a great second effort sent him sprawling in for the go-ahead points and the Lynx led 14-13.

There were still about 22 minutes left in the game, but the Spearman defense came on strong. They gave the offense good field position when they forced a Hawk punt on the Phillips 45. Jack McClellan bobbled a low snap from center and tried to run but was dropped on the 44.

Spearman could not move, then punted deep but Phillips roared back on a 33 yard pass from Wendel to Danny Kinky.

Then Brain picked up nine for a second and one on the Spearman 36. There was a fumble and Brillhart recovered at the Lynx 35.

Fullback Cochran began finding some running room in the line and he and Clement, who directed the game in the second half, picked up one first down. It bogged down and Clement got off a short kick.

On the second play of the series Wendel threw a touchdown pass to Brain, but he ran around so much in the backfield that he was over the line of scrimmage when he threw and the play was called back and Phillips penalized five yards.

Hal Shufeldt forced a punt when he stopped Brain for no gain on the next play.

With the wuarter running out, Spearman started the insurance touchdown drive, Ken and Hal Shufeldt and Cochran punched at the line. Ken Shufeldt got 20 yards on one gallop.

# Former Blind Woman Tells Of Thrill of Regaining Sight

As I lay in the hospital in the darkness not knowing how I would be able to manage now if this corneal transplant was not a success, I began to pray for understanding and guidance.

It had been a long road to where I lay now, I wondered if I had enough strength to continue.

I guess I do not remember being able to see clearly before the Miracle. I know I must have when I was a small child. My eyes never gave me much trouble, except when I had hay fever in the summer.

After my marriage in 1948 my eyes began to bother me, but I never saw a doctor until I began having trouble reading. He fitted me with glasses. He in spite of this my vision grew steadily worse.

On one visit to the optometrist, we had a long talk and he told me that he would refer me to an ophthalmologist for further treatment. I was beginning to worry. It was so hard for me to take care of my home and family.

I had married a wonderful man and we had a beautiful baby girl, so Dick said, for I couldn't see her too well. Now there was going to be another baby soon, and I wanted so much to be able to see it when it came.

The ophthalmologist said I had a condition of the eyes called Keratoconus and there was little that could be done. He fitted me with contact lenses and said it would be a matter of time, but eventually I would be blind.

I was only 19 years old. My vision was 20/200 and 20/400. My world was a dark gray, blurry mess. I could only wear the contact lenses for a few hours at a time and the pain was so great that I could hardly stand it.

God blessed our home with a little boy and for a while after this with the aid of contact lenses I could still manage my home and family.

The next eleven years were hard ones, but our home was made happier with two more children, a girl and a boy. Our financial situation wasn't too good. Contact lenses were expensive and I had to have four pair, while trying to find a pair that would fit.

My health was bad and after our little girl was born, my right lung collapsed. I was in the hospital and at my mother's home for some three months. It seemed that things could not get much worse, but they did. Before our boy came, I had another bad spell with my lungs, and I spent sixteen more days in the hospital. By this time we were in real need. God provides for his own and by His grace, we made it.

I came to the point where I had to lay aside my contacts. I had had so much pain and disappointment that I felt I could no longer stand it. With each pair of contacts my hopes would rise and I would think, "Maybe it will be different this time, and I can wear them", but always to my bitter disappointment they would fail.

I began to prepare for my dark world. I received my talking book from which came so many pleasant hours of music and books that I had longed to read. I received my Sunday

was too tall. On fourth down Brain hit the middle trying for the needed one yard. He was met at the line of scrimmage and when the chain was brought in and stretched, he lacked two inches making the first.

School lessons so that I could help with my class. I then began to take Braille. This was very difficult for me because I wanted to look at the dots instead of feeling them.

I had a wonderful Braille teacher who was blind. She tried to prepare me for the "world" that lay ahead. She would say, "Joyce, quit fighting it, it will get easier some day." It never got easier. I wanted to see more than anything. I wanted to see my children for I feared that we would go somewhere and they would be dirty.

Our baby was seven months old when I awoke one morning to find no vision at all in my right eye. I knew this was the end. A visit to the doctor confirmed my suspicions. My eye had ruptured.

The doctor told me I would have to have a cornea transplant. I do not believe I can ever put into words the fear that was in my heart. I told the doctor that I did not want this. He said I would have to have the operation or lose my eye to cancer. He sent me 340 miles to another doctor who had done transplants and had been successful. He confirmed the condition of my eye, adding that it was my only chance to see again. The chances were not good that the operation would be successful.

We waited a month for an eye from a donor. (Eyes are removed only from deceased who have previously donated them.) With each ring of the phone I would want to run and hide. February 28, 1961, at 2 p.m. the phone rang, I answered to find the nurse in the doctor's office asking me if I could be at the hospital at 10 p.m. that night. I almost said no.

The next morning after a sleepless night, at 7:30 a.m. the nurse gave me a shot and two pills that were to put me on cloud 9. The operation was to be a local, the doctor said there was less chance of being sick this way.

They wheeled me into the operating room at 8:30 a.m. and for the next hour and forty-five minutes the doctor performed a miracle as he removed the old cornea. I looked up to see the beautiful lights overhead and saw them as clearly as possible. As the doctor fitted the new cornea of my eye and he began to stitch it in place, I could see everything he did, it was so wonderful to see.

For three days I lay in a black nothingness. I was fed, bathed, and cared for by Dick and our friend.

The fourth day I could sit up and the doctor removed the bandage from the left eye so I could see a little, but the light hurt my eye and I was still almost helpless.

The twenty-first day finally came and we went to the office to have the stitches removed. This was very painful although the eye was deadened. He removed four of the eighteen stitches. The doctor said to return in two weeks. We went home and I sat straight up the whole way. We had to have as little jolting as possible.

One morning, six weeks later, as I took the little metal shield off my eye to bathe it, I made out the faucets clearly with my right eye. I called for Dick, and he came running, for fear that I had fallen. I told him that I could see out of my right eye.

Everyday my eye got better, soon I was seeing entirely with my right eye and with each day my vision improved. Before long I was fitted with glasses and my vision was 20/20.

I walked out of the ophthalmologist's office into the most beautiful world anyone could ever hope to see. I had forgotten how green the grass was, or how blue the sky. I could see people walking along the street. I smiled at each of them. I know they must have

thought that I was crazy. When I got home I went through the house touching things because everything was new to me. My children and Dick were so beautiful.

The doctor said I would be anxious to have the second operation and I thought, "He doesn't know me very well," but as it turned out, he was right. On our 14th wedding anniversary, January 16, 1962, we received my call.

The next 21 days weren't as bad as the first ones had been so Dick was able to leave me and go back to work. Now I had enough vision to care pretty well for myself in the hospital after the first week.

You can never know how much being able to see means until you've lost it. To me seeing is more wonderful because I was without sight so long!

I saw David take his first steps, something I had missed with the other three. Everything he did was so cute to me because I saw it for myself.

I received my driver's license in November of 1963. Now I am able to go and do things all wives do. I love each and every chore. I love to watch Nancy sing in the choir and I go to all of Ricky's baseball games to watch him pitch. This is a thrill that is indescribable.

Only God can make an eye, but through miracles of eye surgery, the blind are able to see again and I know if it had not been God's will, I would not be able to see now, and to His name I give the glory.

Eye banks can only function if they have donated eyes which they can use for transplants. All eye banks need more donors. The most precious gift you can leave someone is the gift of sight. Only those who are less fortunate than ourselves can realize how much a donation of eyes can mean. The slogan of our Hi-Plains Eye Bank is "He Who Gives His Eyes, Never Really Dies."

Any widow who was receiving social security benefits based on her deceased husband's social security record, and saw them ended due to her remarriage, should get in touch with the social security office at once.

The 1965 provisions will let her receive either one-half of her former husband's basic amount, or one-half of her present husband's retirement amount (slightly reduced if she is between 62 and 65), whichever is the higher. Geldon went on.

For example, Mrs. A. began to receive \$82.50 per month at age 62, based on Mr. A's social security record. At age 64 she married a man who was not entitled to social security benefits at that time, so her checks were stopped.

Geldon says that she may now begin to receive \$50 per month on her former husband's record. Later, if her present husband becomes entitled to retirement benefits of more than \$100 per month, her checks can be raised to one-half of his.

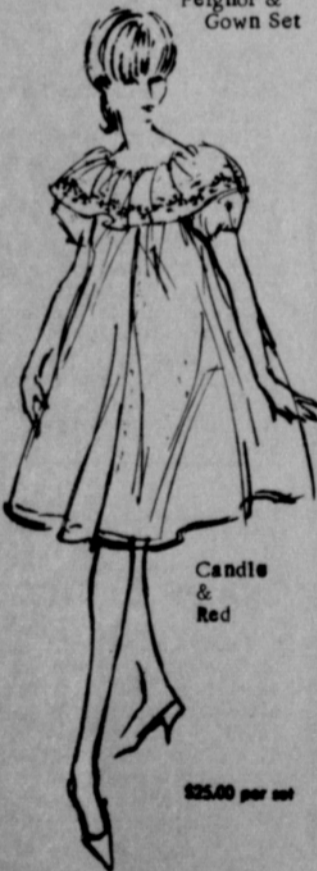

More than a million people in rural America may benefit from an expansion in financial support for rural community facilities and family farm authorized by recent legislation, L.J. Cappelman, Farmers Home Administration State Director for Texas said today. Private investors will provide the bulk of the funds on

an insured basis through USDA's Farmers Home Administration. The legislation signed into law by President Johnson on October 7: authorizes an increase from \$200 to \$450 million in the Farmers Home Administration's ability to insure loans in any one year for rural community facilities including water supply and waste

The \$450 million in insured loans plus the \$55 million in grants authorized yearly by the Act can help an estimated 800 rural areas containing approximately one million people obtain water and waste disposal systems and other facilities; and provide 18,000 farm

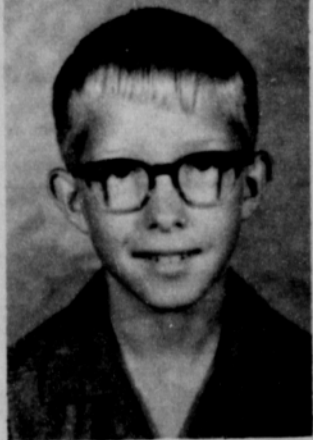
