## School bells will ring Thursday as first 83-84 classes open here

Bells will begin ringing throughout halls of Spearman schools Friday morning as the community's youngsters return to classes for the first day of the new school year. The first bell will ring at 8:15 and the tardy bell at 8:25.

Last week, new students transferring into Spearman High School and Elementary School registered. Kenneth Friemel, Spearman Junior High School principal, has asked all junior high students new to the district to register at the school Monday through Thursday, with Thursday the main day.

Registration for all other high school and elementary students will be held Thursday. At the elementary school, regular registration will be held Thursday for kindergarten through fourth grades from 8:30 a.m. until

10:30. Thursday high school registration will be seniors at 8:30 a.m., juniors at 9:30 a.m., sophomores at 10:30 and freshman at 11:30.

At the junior high, a general assembly will be held in the auditorium beginning at 8:20 Friday morning, then students will be sent for pre-enrollment to their homes. A short schedule of classes will be held at the junior high that first day.

Teachers meanwhile will be reporting for inservice on Monday at 8:30 a.m. and spend the entire school day in inservice here. On Tuesday, the teachers will attend a joint inservice in Perryton for the entire school day. On Wednesday they will be back in their respective schools for individual building inservice and will have

a work day on Thursday in their respective classrooms.

The office of Superintendent James Cunningham reminds new employees to check with his office concerning required personnel records. And new employees who will be driving school buses were required to attend driver certification sessions, while those requiring refresher driving courses attended sessions on Aug. 17 and 18.

There will be 10 new teachers in Spearman ISD waiting to greet students on their first day of classes Thursday. These include:

## June sales tax rebate up for Spearman

Friday, August 12, State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$103 million in local sales tax payments to 974 cities that levy the one-percent sales tax.

"So far this year, we are just a little ahead of 1982 payments," Bullock said. "This is about where we expected to be by this time when we put out our revenue for the state."

Seven of the 20 cities that collect the most local sales tax—Houston, El Paso, Beaumont, Odessa, Abilene, Midland and Tyler—continue to lag behind last year's receipts. But the August payment to all seven showed they had gained ground since last.

These checks of were for taxes

collected on sales made in June and reported to the Comptroller by the end of July.

The City of Spearman received a check for \$27,968.38 for this period which is up \$2,857.30 from the check for \$25,111.08 for the same period in 1982. While this monthly total is up, 1983 payments to date are \$135,296.41, which is off 2.66 from the 1982 payments of \$138,993.02 for the same period.

Graver continues to have a rise in their rebate, receiving \$7,101.87 for the June sales as compared to \$5,926.68 in 1982. Their total payments to date this year are \$26,985.12 up 22.34% over last years payments for the same period of \$22,057.06.

In our neighboring county of Hutchinson Berger sales tax is off 20.80% for payments to date, while Fritch, Sanford, Stinnett all report increases. Fritch is up 10.20%, Sanford up 22.37% and Stinnett up 20.48%.

In Ochiltree County, Perryton's city tax rebate is off 29.06 percent for the year. In 1982 their payments to date were \$562,609.32 and in 1983, they received \$399,109.43.

Canadian, which has been a boom town as far as oil industry is concerned the past several years and experienced new growth, is also hard hit. Their receipts to date for this year are \$120,261.66, off 38.04% from the \$194,095.97 received for the same period last year.

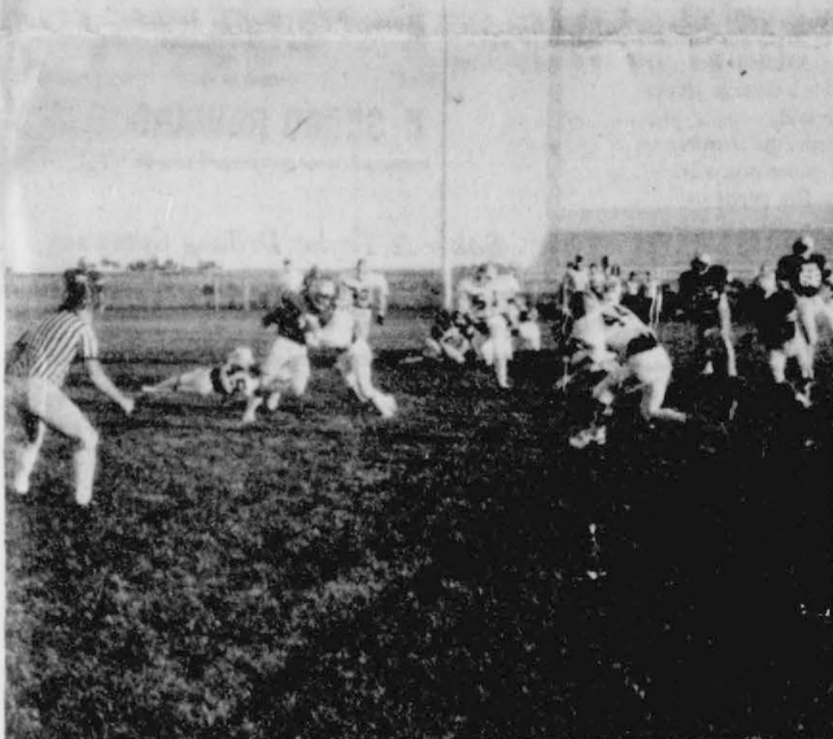

# Spearman band selling pizza

Mama Mia!-Spearman High School Band is going into the pizza business.

Lynx band members, including the rifle corp and flag girls, Spearman Band Boosters, and other interested persons met with Band Director Pat Daniels and his wife in the band hall Tuesday evening to consider a fund raising project for the band.

Dan Keating, vice-president of marketing for Perry County Cheese Co. of Reynoldsburg, Ohio, treated the gathering to fresh, cooked-on-the-spot samples of pizza. Keating described his company's fund raising program which he said was designed specifically for school bands and choirs, by people who understand band and choir fund raising problems.

He explained his company's name is somewhat misleading as it really sells pizzas and not cheese, marketing the pizzas through fund raising programs of high school band and choirs.

Keating said his company's product is unique in the fund raising field because "it is the only product on the market that can be sold to the same people on a regular basis."

He explained by saying that when a person is approached by a young band member who rings his doorbell and tries to sell him something as a fund raiser for the band, usually something of token value, the customer feels bad, no matter what he does.

He said that if the customer bought the product, he reaction tended to be, "You did it again. You're just a sucker for a soft touch."

And if the student fund raiser is refused, the customer accuses himself--"Poor little kid, it wasn't him, he's just a kid, trying to help out her band."

Keating then added that the pizza sales plan is different because it is not sold door-to-door and it offers a quality product at a bargain price, a price that makes it a bargain even to people on limited income and a tight food budget.

The program calls for the Lynx band students to sell the pizzas in do-it-yourself at home packages so customers make the pizzas themselves to their own tastes, using ingredients supplied by the company.

sausage an equal amount of sausage. The cheese kit offers no meat but 2 1/2 pounds of cheese rather than the usual 1 1/2 pounds of cheese that comes in all kits. Customers can order extras, or may add their own ingredients, Keating said.

The band buys the kits for \$10.95 and sells them to customers for \$14.95, which means the six pizzas in a kit each cost the customer about \$2.49, depending on whether they add extra ingredients or not. Keating stressed the customers will be making fresh pizzas, not frozen ones, although they can make them up all at once and then freeze them, if they want to.

Although band students are responsible for selling the pizzas, "we insist kids do not go door-to-door," Keating said. He gave each of the band students a present a card, and asked them to list names and addresses and phone numbers of 12 people they know.

They turned in these cards Thursday, and from these a master list is to be drawn up, Keating said, and sent to Perry County Cheese. The company will then send each prospective customer on the list illustrated information on the pizzas and the program, with the name Spearman High School Lynx Band prominently printed on it.

After the prospective customers have had time to read up on the pizza program, the band students then call by phone and take orders from those that want to buy, Keating said. The orders are sent to the company, which in turn sends the pizza kits in refrigerated trucks to the school. The students then distribute the kits to the customers.

Keating said Spearman High School band is the first in the Panhandle--and all West Texas to sign up for the pizza fund raising program, although the program has been a success in other states and in East Texas, and is beginning to expand into West Texas.

The pizza sales will be sponsored by Spearman Music Boosters and Keating urged the parents to get involved and set up an organization that would make the sales a big success.

Daniels said they wanted to start the fund raising sales early so that they could take advantage of the company's truck passing through enroute to El Paso.

## Area airports to be discussed

A Texas Aeronautical Facilities Plan regional planning meeting will be held at 10:00 a.m. on Wednesday, Aug. 31, 1983 in the District Courtroom (3rd Floor), Ochiltree County Courthouse located at 511 South Main, Peryton.

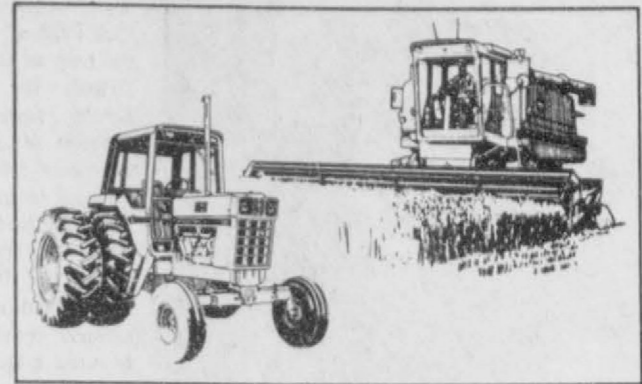
