Lynx and Lynxettes drop double-header at Stratford

Don't tell the Spearman Lynx there are no mountains in the panhandle—they won't believe you.

Tuesday night they ran into their second mountain in a row—this time Brent Spurlock of the Stratford Elks—and as a result suffered their second loss of the season.

Spurlock at 6-5 was not nearly so impressive an obstacle for the lynx as 6-8 Ed Cunningham who poured in 36 points last Saturday to hand the promising Lynx their first loss of the season, in the finals of the Spearman tourney.

But coupled with a fine overall team performance by the Elks, the

loss of a couple of Lynx due to injuries and a second straight game when the officials calls mostly went against the Lynx. Spurlock's presence was enough to lift the Elks past the Lynx 63-49.

Meanwhile, the Spearman Lynxettes discovered the same height problem the Lynx have been experiencing. They ran into a mountain, too—6-2 Sheila Cummings—and suffered their worst loss of the year to the Elkettes, 74-48.

Spurlock sat out part of the middle of the game, maybe for the rest, but

also because he was in foul trouble and Elk Coach Phil Warren wanted him around at the finish. He wound up with 19 points.

Even without Spurlock, the Elks had plenty of scoring punch most of it supplied by 6-2 Brett Cummings, who hit game high 20 points.

The Lynx fell behind early and at the end of the first quarter trailed 17-9. Fighting back, they cut the Elk lead to 28-22 with a second quarter rally, but could not maintain the pace and fell behind 41-33 by third quarter's end.

Usually high scoring Ross Donahue had a sub-par game offensively,

partly because of Stratford's tight zone, a particularly small but fast guard Kent Holman. Several of Donahue's long range jumpers rimmed away, close but off just enough. Late in the game, in the clutch, Donahue came through with points, and wound up with 10.

Mark Pearson took up some slack, tallying 16 points, but Steve Burke was also a little below scoring norm with just 7 points. Buddy Pool also hit 7, Billy Ray 4, Damon Goodheart added 3 and Johnny Rogers 2 for the Lynx.

Spurlock was well behind Cummings in Stratford scoring until late

in the game, when several good feeds to the big center as he moved right up the middle of the key let him lay in the shots and helped in the final quarter Stratford surge.

Danny Barrett, one of the Elk's most proficient scorers last year, also had an off night as his shots did not drop either, and he ended with 6 points. Holman collected 6 points, mostly on free throws in the final seconds, Chris Baker added 5, Doug Mires and Kevin Long 3, and David Nagule and Collin McKinney 1.

Sheila Cummings was simply too much for the Lynxettes to cope with. The tall center popped in 38 points,

most of them under the basket. Rhonda Gibson with 18 points, led the more balanced Lynxett scoring. Nita Baker scored 6, Tiki Jackson and Carri Ann Guthrie 5, Kelly Crawford and Shelly Cook 4 each and Jill McLain and Andrea Mires 2 apiece.

Behind Cummings, it was Diann Riffe with 14, Donita Gibson with 8, Kerry Boren with 6, Marcie Metzger with 4, Lisa Wiley with 2, and Nannette Boardman and Monica Dettle with 1 each.

The Lynxettes were led by Stratford by quarters, 13-7, 36-20, 56-35, and 74-48.

City and school meet Monday

Two local governmental bodies, Spearman City Council and Spearman ISD school board, will meet early next week.

The school board meets Monday at 7 p.m. at Spearman High School, and the City Council meets at 8 p.m. Tuesday at the temporary City Hall.

Among the new business items on the school trustees' agenda are board action on recommendations of the textbook committee, on the school district report for property values for 1983, and the proposed school calendar for the 1984-85 school year.

Several letters will be studied, and John Muthersbough from Texas Advisory Commission on Energy and Environmental Education will meet with the board. The board will hear several reports from Superintendent James Cunningham and will cover several routine matters. (See agenda inside this issue.)

The city council will consider reappointing Ed Williamson as director of H&S EMS Medical Service for another two-year term, consider appointing Martha Boyd for a three-year term to the board of city development, and Charlotte Sheets as City Secretary.

Operation Christmas Greeting underway

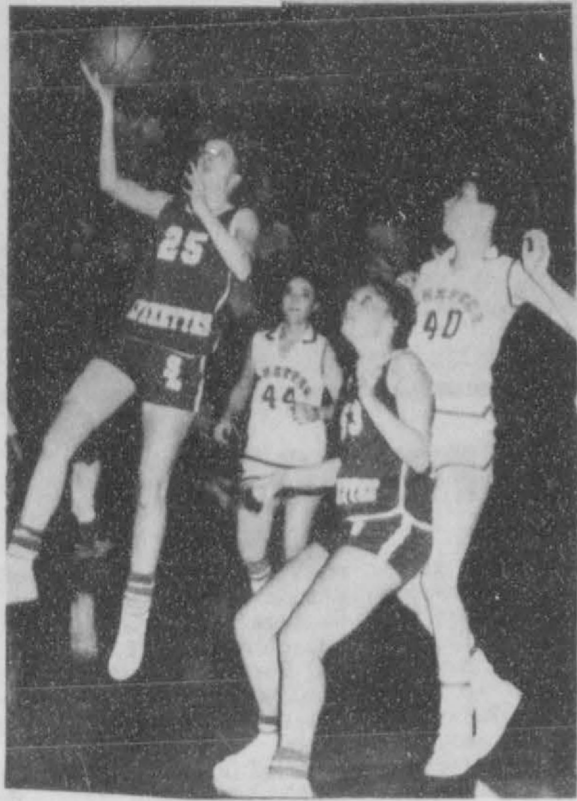

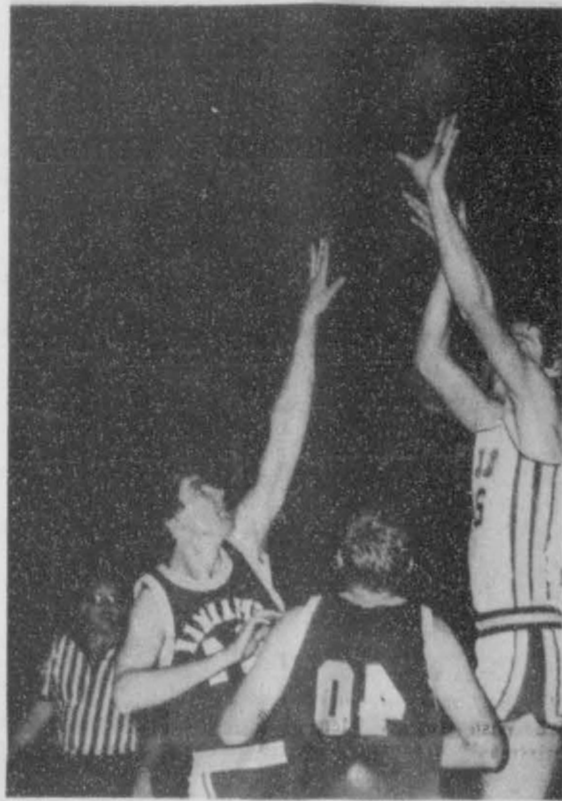

Even though diapers are the most important part of your baby's wardrobe, diapering him can get to you. Changing your baby will probably be your first big job as a mother.

Babies have excellent plumbing systems. You will find a large portion of your day is spent keeping baby dry, only for him to wet again.

He many need as many changes as one hundred per week. After the initial production of changing the baby's first diaper on the way home from the hospital, you will p.d.q. learn to change your baby efficiently and completely.

The mechanics of diaper changing depend a great deal on the type of diapers you use.

Cloth diapers are made of cotton in either flannel, bird's eye, or gauze, and they come in various styles from prefold to extra thick.

When your baby no longer needs diapers, the cloth ones make excellent burp cloths, rags, or dust cloths.

Disposable diapers are more expensive but require less work for mother.

More than 60 financial institutions in a five-state area participate in the Endowment Fund program. Therefore, any Panhandle citizen who wishes to help fight cancer by contributing to the Center may donate to the Endowment Fund through his or her own local bank.

"We are so grateful to the people of Spearman for their past support," said Marilyn Van Petten, director of development at the Center. "In this Panhandle neighborhood, they stand as friends to the Center and the patients we serve."

"Many donations are made in memory of friends and family," Ms. Van Petten said. "When the bank notifies us of a memorial gift, we send a letter to the family of the individual the donation will honor, and of course, send an acknowledgement to the donor."

"There are several reasons why the Endowment Fund is beneficial to both the community and the Cancer Center," Ms. Van Petten explained. "The money contributed to endowment stays in the community to provide funds for local loans, and individuals have the convenience of making a contribution to a worthwhile regional institution organization simply by going to their local bank," she said.

"Also, many people would rather do business at home with their own banker," she said, "and the Endowment Fund reminds people that the Harrington Cancer Center is daily serving the needs of their friends and neighbors."

More than 2,000 patients have received treatment at the outpatient treatment facility since it opened. Before that, cancer patients often traveled to Houston, Dallas or Oklahoma City for treatment. Often this meant a drastic change in their lifestyles, Ms. Van Petten said. "Besides the medical and psychological trauma, they experienced additional economic burdens as well."

"Citizens of this area have spent millions of dollars traveling elsewhere to receive treatment, and the emotional cost of this kind of disruption to patients and families is impossible to calculate," she said.

The \$10 million facility, located in the Medical Center complex in West Amarillo, was built entirely from private donations. No money was borrowed and no government funds were used.

"Now that the doors are open, we need continued financial support to pay for expanded patient care, re-

search, and educational programs," Ms. Van Petten said. In addition to basic treatment, the Center provides a wide variety of supportive care, including the services of social workers, pastoral counselors, pharmacists, and nutritionists.

"The Center is dedicated to the concept that the whole person must be treated, and that includes emotional, spiritual and financial needs as well as physical," Ms. Van Petten stressed.

"We do not deny services to anyone," she added. "And it should be noted that the destitute are not the only ones who are unable to afford medical bills for cancer treatment."

"When you consider that one chemotherapy treatment may cost several hundred dollars, cancer treatment is priced out of reach for many people. It's not unusual for cancer therapy to cost about \$20,000."

Homemade Mixes Save Time, Money

A good way to save time as well as money is to prepare your own dry mixes in large batches. You can make the mixes in a jiffy whenever you have time and store them for later use in a variety of recipes. Homemade mixes cost about half as much as many commercial products and offer the bonus of that homemade flavor and quality.

BISCUIT MIX
10 cups flour (about 2-3/4 pounds)

1-2/3 cups instant nonfat dry milk
1/3 cup baking powder
2-1/2 teaspoons salt
1-2/3 cups shortening

Mix dry ingredients thoroughly in a large container (about six to eight quart capacity). Cut in shortening with pastry blender or mixer until fine crumbs are obtained and shortening is evenly dispersed. Store, tightly covered, in refrigerator. Use within three months. Makes 15 cups mix.

HOMEMADE BISCUITS

3 cups biscuit mix
2/3 cup water
Preheat oven to 425°. Stir most of water together with mix. Add more water, as needed, to make dough that is soft but not sticky. Knead dough 15 times on lightly floured board. Pat or roll dough into a square about 7

by 7 inches. Cut into 16 pieces and place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake until lightly browned, about 12 minutes. Makes 16 biscuits.

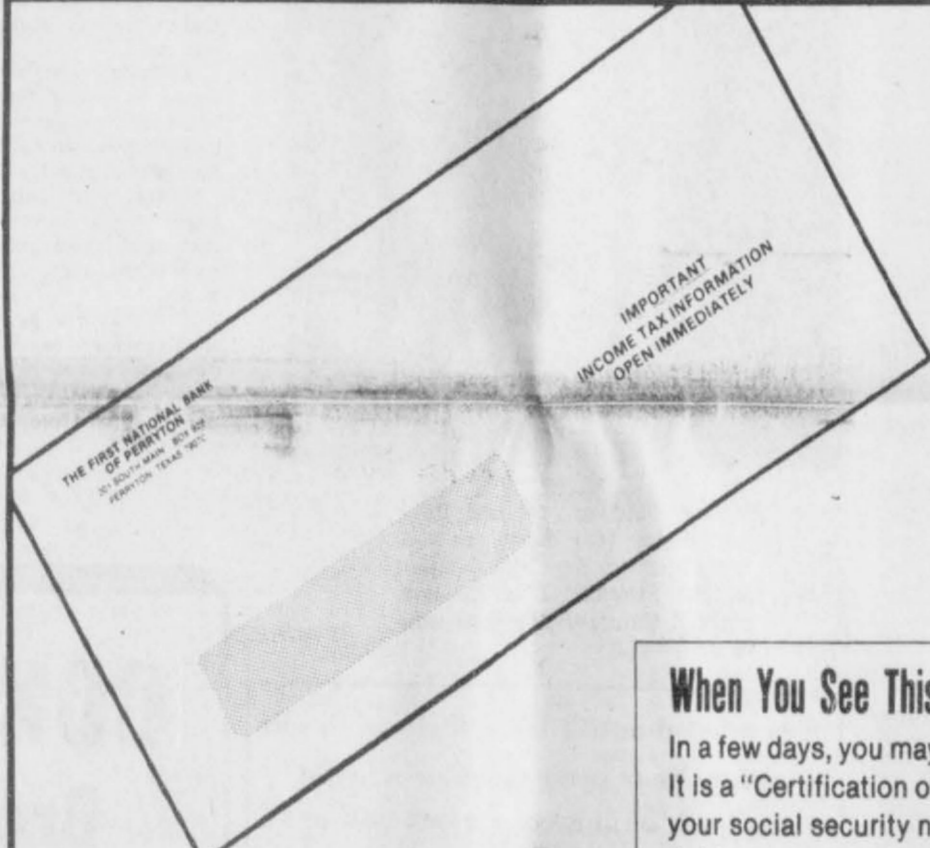
PARTY PINK PINEAPPLE PUNCH

IMPORTANT TAX NOTICE ABOUT YOUR BANK ACCOUNTS

When You See This Envelope ...

In a few days, you may be receiving this envelope in the mail. Open it immediately. It is a "Certification of Taxpayer Identification Number". In other words, it verifies your social security number. Please fill in the spaces, sign it, and return the form right away to the bank in the postage-paid envelope.

It's A Federal Requirement

Recent federal laws require that you provide the bank with your correct Taxpayer Identification Number. There are two types of taxpayer numbers: the social security number for individuals and the employer identification number for businesses.

Even if the bank already has your number, it has to be verified in writing this month.

By law, failure to provide the information could result in a \$50 penalty by the Internal Revenue Service, plus your interest could be subject to 20% withholding, starting January 1, 1984. Those are tough penalties.

So Let's Help Each Other

If you send back the Certification form with the correct social security number, we keep our records straight and keep you out of trouble with the IRS.

In the case of a joint account, we need the name and social security number of only one person — usually the first person named on the account.

If you don't have a social security number, contact the local Social Security office.

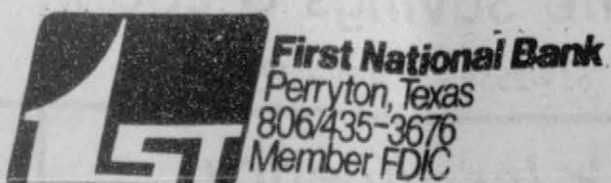
