

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



It's estimated that consumers spent some \$3 billion on natural foods in 1982, but did they know what they were buying? Exactly what does the word "natural" mean? Take the following true-false quiz to find out what you know about natural foods:

-- Natural foods are more nutritious and better for you than processed foods.

-- The federal government sets standards that determine which foods can be sold as

-- A food may not be labled "natural" if it has been processed in any way or contains any ingredients that don't occur naturally in that food.

The answer to each question is "False.

The subject of natural foods is one that has puzzled consumers for years. Unfortunately, the confusion is likely to continue since there is no standard definition of the term "natural"

An early definition of a "natural" food was something that occurs in nature such as oranges, lettuce, or fresh

By 1974, however, the definition was stretched to include "those foods which are in their original state or have minimal refinement and minimal processing.'

For a long time, the major distinction of natural foods was that they contained only natural ingredients, nothing was artificial, and nothing was added to the product.

Orange juice made from fresh-squeezed oranges was natural, for instance, as was all-peanut peanut butter. If the manufacturer put in food colorings or preservatives or anything else artificial, they could no longer be considered natural products.

The assumption was, of course, that nature couldn't be

improved upon, and therefore natural meant better.

As Americans have become more and more health conscious, advertisers have taken notice. They tried to appeal to consumers' desire for fresh, wholesome foods by promoting the natural qualities of their products. So now products are sold as "natural" that contain any naturally occurring or minimally processed ingredients. This is true even when the products also contain artificial ingredients.







Gibner announces Endowment Fund

AMARILLO--Clay Gibner, Chairman of the Board, The First State Bank announced today that \$1,000 has been pledged to the Endowment Fund for The Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center. Funds contributed to the Endowment Fund remain in the bank; only the interest earned is forwarded to the Cancer

More than 60 financial institutions in a five-state area participate in the Endowment Fund program. Therefore, any Panhandle citizen who wishes to help fight cancer by contributing to the Center may donate to the Endowment Fund through his or her own local bank.

"We are so grateful to the people of Spearman for their past support," said Marilyn Van Petten, director of development at the Center. "In this Panhandle neighborhood, they stand as friends to the Center and the patients we serve."

"Many donations are made in memory of friends and family," Ms. Van Petten said. "When the bank notifies us of a memorial gift, we send a letter to the family of the individual the donation will honor, and of course, send an acknowledgement to the donor.'

"There are several reasons why the Endowment Fund is beneficial to both the community and the Cancer Center," Ms. Van Petten explained. "The money contributed to endowment stays in the community to provide funds for local loans, and individuals have the convenience of making a contribution to a worthwhile regional institution organization simply by going to their local bank," she said.

"Also, many people would rather do business at home with their own banker," she said, "and the Endowment Fund reminds people that the Harrington Cancer Center is daily serving the needs of their friends and neighbors."

More than 2,000 patients have received treatment at the outpatient treatment facility since it opened. Before that, cancer patients often traveled to Houston, Dallas or Oklahoma City for treatment. Often this meant a drastic change in their lifestyles, Ms. Van Petten said. "Besides the medical and psychological trauma, they experienced additional economical burdens as well."

"Citizens of this area have spent millions of dollars traveling elsewhere to receive treatment, and the emotional cost of this kind of disruption to patients and families is impossible to calculate," she said.

The \$10 million facility, located in the Medical Center complex in West Amarillo, was built entirely from private donations. No money was borrowed and no government funds were used.

"Now that the doors are open, we need continued financial support to pay for expanded patient care, re-

search, and educational programs," Ms. Van Petten said. In addition to basic treatment, the Center provides a wide variety of supportive care, including the services of

social workers, pastoral counselors, pharmacists, and nutritionists. "The Center is dedicated to the concept that the whole person must be treated, and that includes emotional, spir-

itual and financial needs as well as physical," Ms. Van Petten stressed. "We do not deny services to anyone," she added. "And it should be noted that the destitute are not the only ones who are unable to afford medical bills for cancer treat-

"Whe you consider that one chemotherapy treatment may cost several hundred dollars, cancer treatment is priced out of reach for many people. It's not unusual for cancer therapy to cost about \$20,000."

You can make the mixes in a jiffy whenever you have time and store them for later use in a variety of recipes. Home-made mixes cost about half as much as many commercial products and offer the onus of that homemade flavor and quality.

> **BISCUIT MIX** 10 cups flour (about 2-3/4 pounds)


1-2/3 cups instant nonfat dry milk 1/3 cup baking powder

1-2/3 cups shortening Mix dry ingredients thoroughly in a large container (about six to eight quart capacity). Cut in shortening with pastry blender or mixer until fine crumbs are obtained and shortening is evenly dispersed. Store, tightly covered, in refrigera tor. Use within three months. Makes 15 cups mix.

HOMEMADE BISCUITS 3 cups biscuit mix 2/3 cup water


Preheat oven to 425°. Stir 2-1/2 teaspoons salt most of water together with mix. Add more water, as needed, to make dough that is soft but not sticky. Knead dough 15 times on lightly floured board. Pat or roll dough into a square about 7

by 7 inches. Cut into 16 pieces and place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake until lightly browned, about 12 minutes. Makes 16

IMPORTANT TAX NOTICE **ABOUT YOUR** BANK ACCOUNTS

When You See This Envelope ...

In a few days, you may be receiving this envelope in the mail. Open it immediately. It is a "Certification of Taxpayer Identification Number". In other words, it verifies your social security number. Please fill in the spaces, sign it, and return the form right away to the bank in the postage-paid envelope.

It's A Federal Requirement

Recent federal laws require that you provide the bank with your correct Taxpayer Identification Number. There are two types of taxpayer numbers: the social security number for individuals and the employer identification number for businesses.

Even if the bank already has your number, it has to be verified in writing this

By law, failure to provide the information could result in a \$50 penalty by the Internal Revenue Service, plus your interest could be subject to 20% withholding, starting January 1, 1984. Those are tough penalties.

So Let's Help Each Other

If you send back the Certification form with the correct social security number, we keep our records straight and keep you out of trouble with the IRS.

In the case of a joint account, we need the name and social security number of only one person — usually the first person named on the account.

If you don't have a social security number, contact the local Social Security office.


