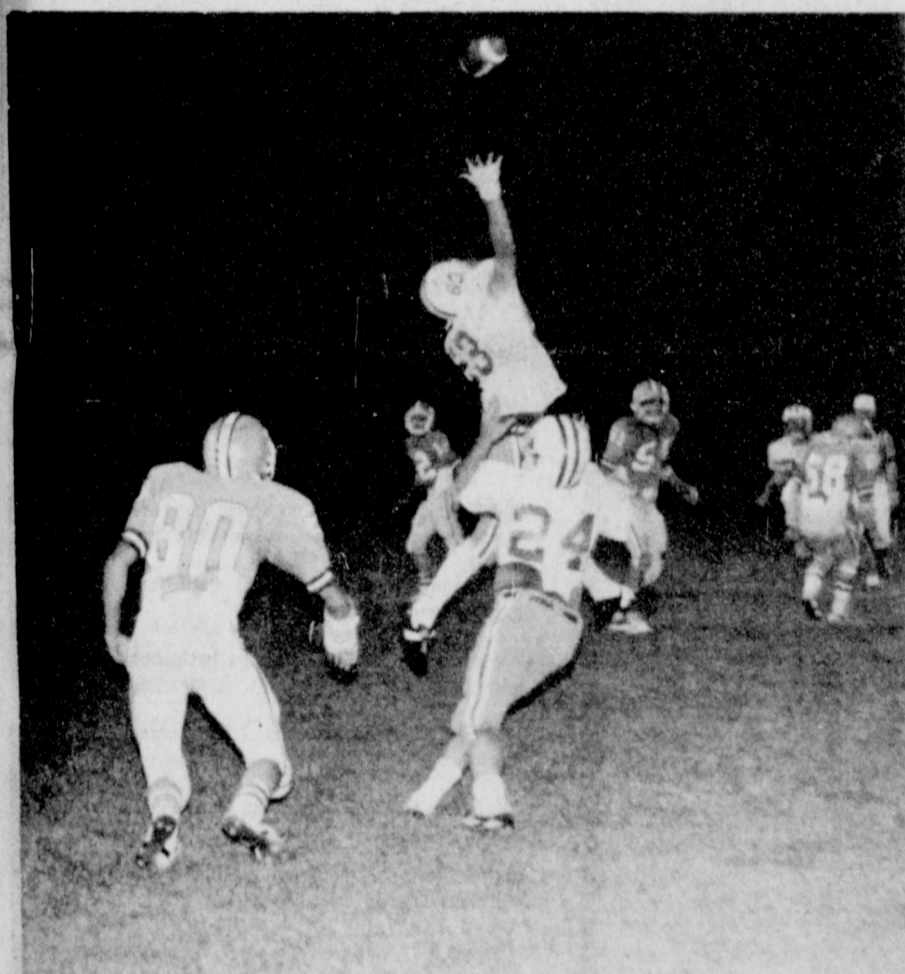

Lynx win Friday nite 18-15



The regular Friday night Cat-fight at Lynx stadium ended in an 18-15 win for the league leading Lynx last night. Pictured above, Whitaker, No. 80 gets set for a big defensive play. The Lynx win last night put the Lynx in sole possession of the district I-AA lead!

It was a team effort that propelled the Spearman Lynx into sole possession of first place in District I-AA Friday night at Lynx stadium, when they defeated a classy Canadian team, 18-15. The game was played in a light rain, before a big sell-out crowd at Lynx stadium in 68 degree weather.

Carey Boley scored a touchdown for the Lynx to put them ahead 6-0 in the first quarter, but the Wildcats came back to take the lead 7-0 before halftime.

The Lynx came back in the third quarter and scored two TD's, as Zane the train Newton scampered 47 yards for a touchdown. Once again the PAT failed, Boley added another TD for the Lynx in the 3rd, and then all "heck" broke loose for the Lynx. The Wildcats returned a punt 47 yards for a TD. On the first play from the 50, after returning the kick-off, the Lynx fumbled and the Wildcats took over with some 2 minutes in the game. The Wildcats drove to the Lynx 6 yard line, before a game-saving tackle set the visiting cats back on their 20 yard line! The Lynx took over with 17 seconds left and ran the clock out to take the win!

In the meantime, the impossible happened at Boys Ranch when the Ranchers upset the Rangers 14-13. The Rangers had 11 fumbles and Boys Ranch 7, and the game was played in a steady down-pour. Spearman is now in sole possession of first place in the district as Canadian has already defeated Boys Ranch, and Spearman defeated Canadian Friday night.

Bill Osborne extends an invitation to everyone to come and hear this servant of the Lord, November 6 - 12, 7:30 each evening.

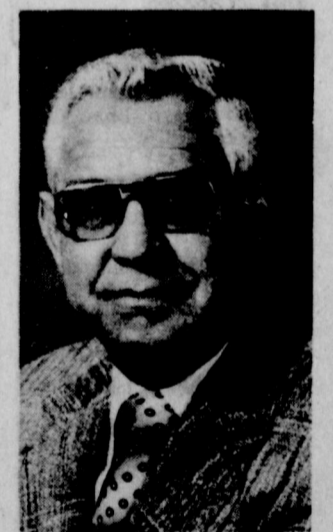
Gruver Businessman Assumes New Role

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:
This is a copy of an advisory letter I have sent to your president and mine.

Dear Mr. President,
There is much in the news these days about the dollar's

troubles in competition with foreign currencies. It keeps falling relative to the yen. It keeps falling relative to the mark, and franc. It even falls, God save the Queen, relative to the pound, as well as most of the other world currencies--and gold, of course.

I'd like to know why, in view of this sorry state of affairs, we continue to make gifts to Japan and the nations of the European Economic Community of literally billions of dollars--by allowing them to buy our grain at a price that permits delivery--of wheat, for example--on their docks for about \$4/bushel, whereupon they deal it to their processors for \$8-\$9.50/bushel, thus farming our economy for a cool, effortless \$4 to \$5.50 clear profit on each and every one of the nearly one billion bushels we so obligingly supply--(got your calculator handy, to see how much this one single item swells our deficit balance of payments?). Even if I were making what your Secretary of Agriculture says I am--about 2 bits a bushel--that's 20 times as much, and with almost no effort, courtesy of Uncle Sucker. Takes me a year to make that mythical quarter--I say "mythical" because I'm actually losing well over a dollar a bushel at present prices, even with all the help the Administration is giving me. Forgive me that touch of sarcasm--I should say BE-CAUSE of "all the help you're giving me.

In light of our crippling, ruinous balance of payments deficit, this is madness, Mr. President. Please, let us set our price at the level that reflects true value--that is, what they charge their own people (with never a complaint from those citizens)--and see if the rest of the exporting nations continue to sell at the present price or raise theirs, too--to a nickel under Chicago, just like they do now.

Well, you've no doubt surmised that I'm a farmer, and there're gobs of us out here who'd appreciate a helping hand, Mr. President.--instead

of the back of one. Sincerely,

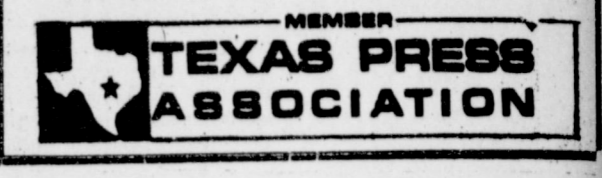

Insurance Corner

PROOF OF LOSS

The proof of loss statement must be furnished within 60 days, unless this requirement is waived by the insurance company. The insured is obligated to go through these procedures involving notice of loss and proof of loss. There is no liability on the part of the insurance company until he does this. It's important to bear in mind that the filing of the proof of loss statement doesn't mean there has been any agreement regarding the actual amount of the loss.

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There is a proverb that says "Time is of the essence" and this holds true in the insurance business just as in other areas. It is especially true with regard to the reporting and proving of losses after a fire.

If a person sustains a loss by fire, he should notify his agent (in effect, the insurance company) within a day or two, although there might be extenuating circumstances to prevent this. After that, he must give his agent proof of loss. This is a statement telling about the fire and when and how it started. It should also tell about the cash value of everything that was destroyed or damaged. Forms are available for reporting a proof of loss.

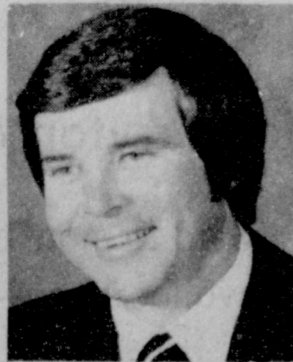

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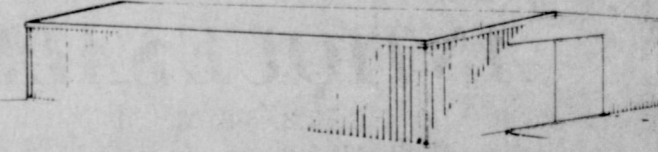

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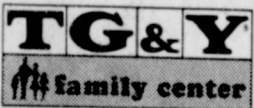
