AUSTIN -Gov. John Connally said Monday he is encouraged by the fact that 17 fewer persons died on 'rexas highways during the Christmasbeen year holidays than had been predicted.
The Department of Public Safety reported that 93 person fewer than predicted. said Connally, "Yet it is signit cant that the holiday death toll was 17 below the predicted 100 traffic fatalities."
"There is room for optimism in studying the accident pic-
ture," Connally said. "The relatively low number of fatalities reflects driving courtesy, more caution and more attention to traffic laws. This is a hopeful
