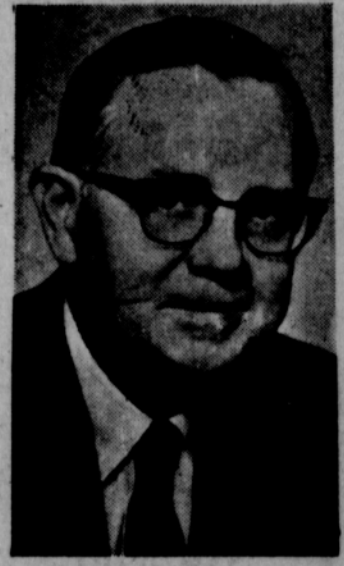
The Stinnett girls are expected to be the strongest challenge to the Lynxettes' chances for their sixth consecutive district title.

Team Loses Guard And Championship

Spearman's Lynxettes lost a guard to a knee injury and the championship of the Southwestern AAU Girls Basketball Tournament in Duncanville to Tulia 53-51 Saturday night.

Leading 13-9 at the end of first quarter, Spearman lost guard Kathi Pattison with a twisted knee early in the second period and were trailing at the half 27-29.

Pattison twisted the knee as she went up court with the ball and before the Lynxettes could get their defense adjusted, Tulia had the lead.

Playmaker Susan Hutchison moved from forward to guard to replace Pattison and freshman Marcia Shieldknight replaced Hutchison.

Tulia was leading 37-39 at the end of three quarters, then just before the game ended extended the lead to four points, but the Lynxettes cut it back to two at the end of the game.

Barbara Wilde led the scoring with 28 points, Karen Gibson had 19 on 13 free shots and three field goals. Shieldknight had four points.

Spearman reversed the script from last year's tournament by beating Jordanton in the semi-finals 55-43. Last year Jordanton beat Spearman in the semi-finals.

The six regulars carried the load for the Lynxettes and had a commanding lead at all the quarter stops. The scores were 15-9, 30-17, and 40-23.

Wilde again led the scoring with 29 points, Gibson had 17 and Hutchison had nine.

Lynx Lose in Overtime; Girls Beat Dalhart Easily

Spearman basketball teams got back into district competition Tuesday night by dividing games with Dalhart in Lynx gym.

The Lynx dropped a 34-36 overtime contest to the Wolves and the Lynxettes toyed with the Dalhart girls in beating them 63-28.

A three point foul in the overtime gave the Wolves the

win over Spearman. The score was tied 32-32 at the end of the regular game. Spearman had come from behind to take the lead in the closing minute.

Dalhart got the tip in the overtime and went into a stall. Dave Clement stole the ball from Dalhart to break the stall. Spearman scored to take 34-32 lead.

It was no contest for the Lynxettes as the reserves got in plenty of playing time. Barbara Wilde and Marcia Shieldknight led the Lynxette scoring parade. Wilde had 27 and Shieldknight 16.

Susan Hutchison and Karen Gibson both saw some playing time as guards. Gibson had 10 points, Hutchison 4, Robinson had 4, McCullough 2. Spearman hit 19 of 27 free shots.

The sixth starter, Susan Hutchison, placed in the top 10 of the annual player's beauty contest at the tournament.

Coach Dean Weese said he was well pleased with the play of the team in the tournament.

"Naturally, we wanted to win the big one, but when Kathi (Pattison) was hurt, we lost about five or six points to Tulia while making the necessary adjustments in our defense. That was too much to give up to a team like Tulia."

"Susan (Hutchison) did a good job for us being the playmaker in the first quarter, then switched to the guard end of the court to replace Kathi and was a real tough defender," Weese said.

Weese pointed with pride to the work of his guards in the tournament. Duncanville, Midlothian and Grandbury all score 40 to 50 points in all other games. Spearman held them to 18, 20 and 34 points in the first three games.

Coach Weese said no one considered the Lynxettes to be much of a threat in the early contests. "After we knocked off Jordonton by a good margin, people suddenly realized we were there."

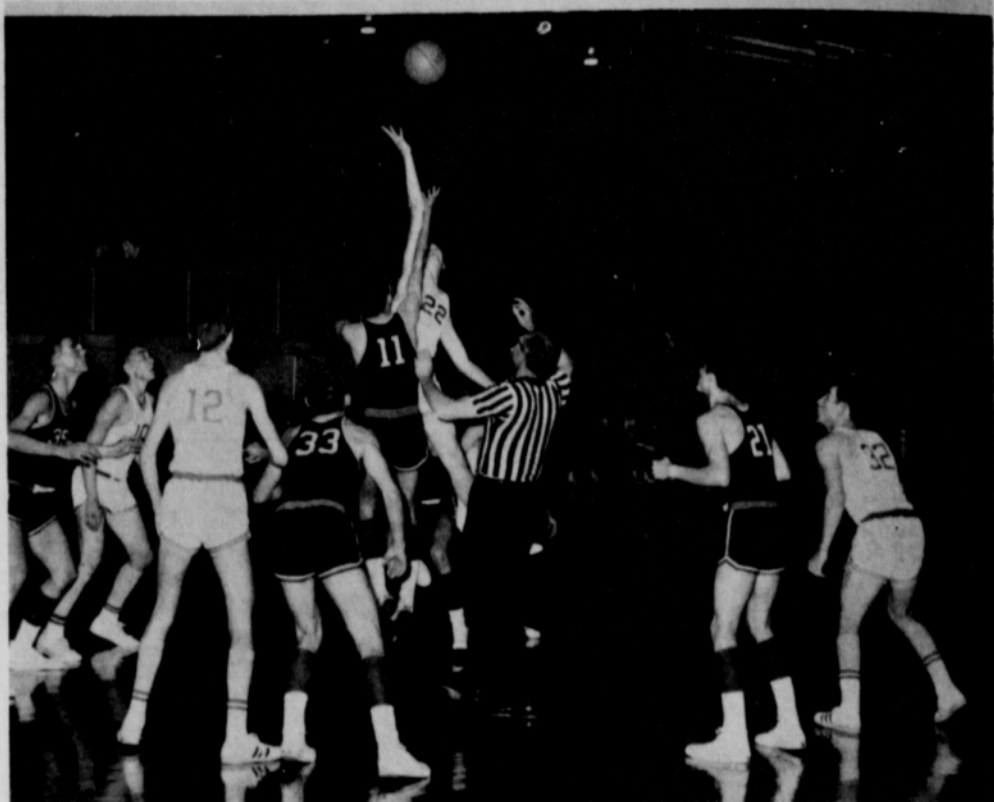

The 1966 edition of the "Farmer's Tax Guide" contains tax information for farmers and is now available, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for northern Texas, announced today.

This booklet can be obtained free of charge from county agricultural agents or at the nearest Internal Revenue Service office.

It is written in non-technical language and contains numerous examples showing how the tax rules apply in actual situations. A completed sam-

ple of a return form is included.

The "Important Dates to Remember" section tells Texas farmers when to pay income and social security taxes, file returns, and meet other Federal tax requirements. A section on record-keeping tells farmers what records they need to keep and describes an easy method of keeping track of income and expenses.

The "Farmer's Tax Guide" was written primarily to help farmers prepare their 1965 tax returns. It is useful as a tax reference guide throughout the year.

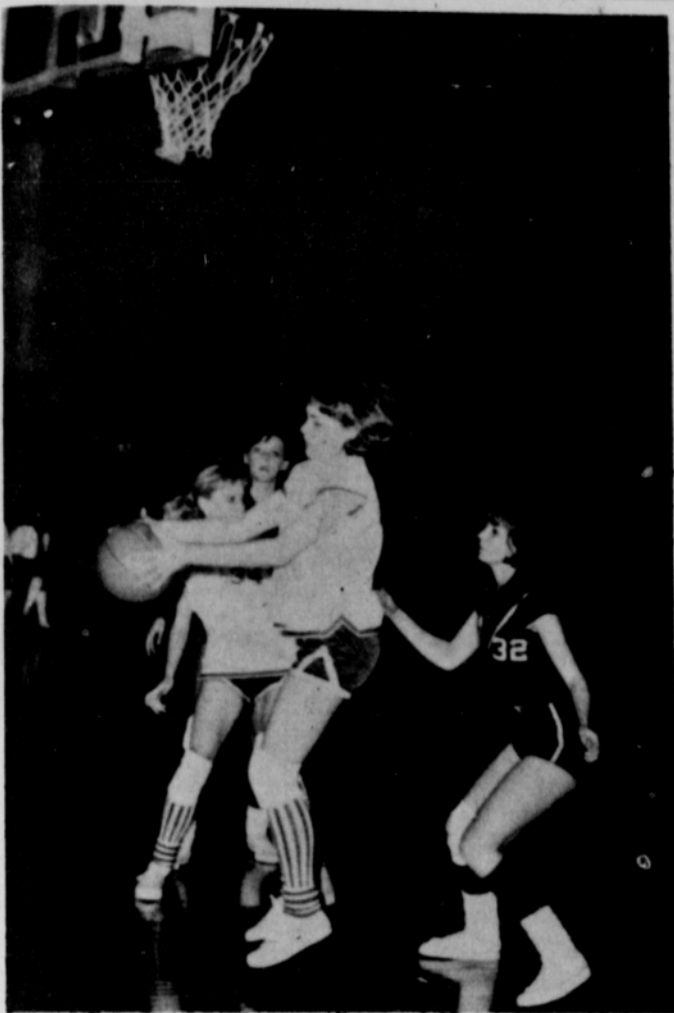

Lower Toll Heartens Governor

AUSTIN --Gov. John Connally said Monday he is encouraged by the fact that 17 fewer persons died on Texas highways during the Christmas-New Year holidays than had been predicted.

The Department of Public Safety reported that 93 persons died in automobile accidents, 17 fewer than predicted.

"This is a tragic number," said Connally. "Yet it is significant that the holiday death toll was 17 below the predicted 100 traffic fatalities."

"There is room for optimism in studying the accident picture," Connally said. "The relatively low number of fatalities reflects driving courtesy, more caution and more attention to traffic laws. This is a hopeful sign which I pray will continue through the new year."

U.S. experts, examining the film, also found that it was a double exposure, with Leonov superimposed on a background of the earth below. Black and white stills, under careful scrutiny, revealed that Leonov was floating in a tank of water, to give the effect of weightlessness, and that he was suspended by fine wires.

And Dean C. B. Neblette of the Rochester Institute of Technology put his finger on the cause for this Soviet clumsiness. "They had to make this film before they had seen any other pictures of a man walking out in space," he said. "They had to do a lot of guessing."

Soviet Scientists Hoax 'Walk In Space' Film

Lloyd Mallan, one of the nation's top science writers, has reports that the Soviet 'walk in space' was another big hoax. To prove his point, Mallan consulted some of the foremost space and photography experts, running for them the official Kremlin films of the Communist "achievement." This story, which should have made page one of the big city press, was generally suppressed.

Writing in Science and Mechanics, Mallan reported out that the photos of Cosmonaut Leonov crawling out of the space capsule were taken from out in space, with the camera pointed head on. No one else was out in space, and the Soviets themselves reported that the only pictures of this 'feat' had been

TURIN, Italy --Nino Toriani was fined \$15 because his girl friend hugged and kissed him while he was driving his car through heavy traffic. Troiani appealed to a higher court, and the decision was reversed.

Judges ruled that the driver had no way of preventing his feminine passenger from expressing her sudden affection without taking his hands off the wheel and endangering his driving in heavy traffic even more.

Fish Pond More Profitable Than Hen House

The farmer's wife who used to raise chickens for "egg money" to help out with the household expenses is now turning to the farm pond instead of the hen house, says the United States Department of Agriculture.

Once the pond is stocked, it is up to the fisherman to get

them out, and many fishermen will pay for the privilege.

The possibilities for money-making include renting rooms and providing meals for city-dwellers in search of a place to wet a line, says the USDA.
