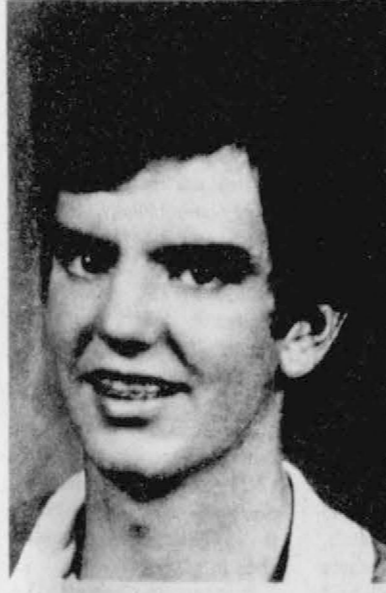
Ross Donahue and Mark Pearson are juniors and will return for next year's varsity club. Buddy Pool and Billy Haden are seniors.

This may be the first time in the district's history for a junior to be named the most valuable player.



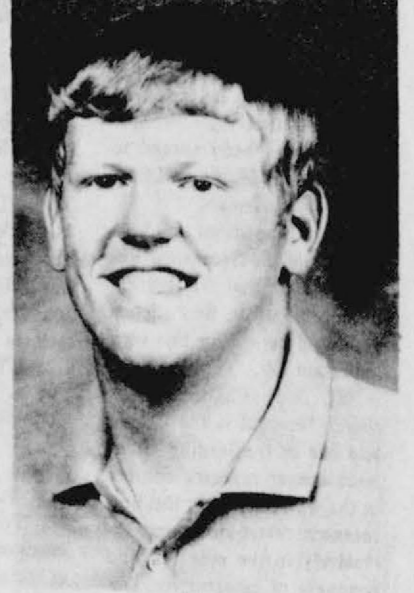

Police report busy week

On Feb. 23, 1984, at 3:36 p.m. a Spearman Police Officer was sent to an alley behind 1008 S. Barkley. Upon arrival, the officer was met by a City employee who advised the officer that the gas meter had been struck by a vehicle. Upon looking at the gas meter, it was found that the vehicle that had struck the meter was blue in color. The officer left and went to 1008 S. Barkley to talk with the people who lived there but none was at home at that time. At 5:25 p.m. the officer returned to 1008 S. Barkley and talked with the owner. They advised him that on Wednesday they were having concrete poured by a contractor. The owner gave the name of the contractor to the officer. At this time the officer went to the contractors home and talked with his wife and advised her to have her husband call the Police Department. At 6:50 p.m. an employee of the contractor entered the Police Department and he was asked if he was pouring concrete at 1008 S. Barkley and he advised that they were. The officer then asked him if there was a light blue vehicle parked there while they were pouring the concrete. He advised that the vehicle used to belong to him but that he had sold it to the contractor and that the contractors hired hand was driving it. At 7:28 p.m., the contractor contacted the Police Department and the investigating officer went to his residence to speak with him. The officer advised him of the situation. He advised that he had driven down the alley the day before but that he had not hit the gas meter. He also advised that his hired hand had driven the vehicle. He advised that the vehicle was parked at his place of business on the airport road. The officer asked if he could go and look at the vehicle. The owner advised that he could. The vehicle was located at the old airport. It was discovered on the right bumper and the right rear bumper there was fresh gray paint that is used on the gas meters. Pictures were taken at this time. At 8:47 p.m., the officer returned to the contractor's home and advised him to bring his hired hand to the Police Department the next day. The officer returned to the Police Department. The contractor called the Police Department later and advised that he had contacted his hired hand but that he denied hitting the meter. The contractor

advised that he had went and looked at the vehicle and did see the damage and that he would take care of it.

On Feb. 23, 1984, at 2:00 p.m., an officer was dispatched to a church in reference to vandalism. Upon arrival the officer was met by the Pastor of the church who advised him that within the past 7 to 10 days, someone had been shooting at the glass door located on the South side of the church with a BB gun. He also handed the officer a BB pellet that he had found by the South door as he was coming into the church. The complainant did wish to file charges and asked that the Police Department keep an eye on the church. No more to report at this time.

On Feb. 24, 1984, while a Spearman Police Officer was on patrol, he observed a vehicle parked in the lot at a Spearman business just North of the shop with the spare tire rack hanging down. Upon investigation of the vehicle, it was found that a tire had been taken from the vehicle. Also observed was that the lock nut had been taken. Further observation showed a footprint on the tire rack and fingerprints on the tailgate. Investigation still continuing.

On Feb. 24, 1984, at 8:00 p.m. a complainant contacted the Spearman Police Department and related that someone had stolen her vehicle from the Hospital parking lot. An officer proceeded to the Hansford Hospital, upon arrival the officer was met by a Sheriff's Deputy. They both interviewed the complainant who related that her daughter had brought the keys to her for the vehicle and related that the vehicle had been left in the parking lot. The officer and deputy found the complainants vehicle parked under her carport at her residence. Apparently the complainant misunderstood what her daughter had told her about the location of her vehicle. Nothing further at this time.

On Feb. 26, 1984 while an officer was on patrol he observed a vehicle traveling East on Main with the lights off. The officer was traveling West on Main and flashed his lights at the vehicle twice, however the vehicle did not turn on its headlights. The officer stopped the vehicle at Main and Davis. All three subjects in the vehicle were known

Membership Drive

Hohertz appointed chairman

Hansford County YMCA Executive Director, Winn Crenshaw, announced this week that Marva Hohertz has been appointed the General Chairman of the Y's first annual "Partner With Youth" membership drive. This drive will be the Y's largest, most highly organized effort to date to develop financial support within the Hansford County community.

Crenshaw explained that the Y's Board of Directors decided that rather than seeking sponsors for activities several times each year, the Y is going to have only two fund raisers per year. The two fund raisers will be the Partner With Youth drive in the spring and the Annual Harvest Ball in the fall.

Mrs. Hohertz, who is a Y Board member, explained that the Y has an annual expense budget of approximately \$100,000, but an income of

only about \$50,000 from membership and program fees. She explained that it is the goal of the Y to offer affordable programs for children and adults. She said that without these two fund raisers the fees at the Y would be out of reach for many people. It is the Y's policy to not deny a membership or a program to any child who can not afford it. Therefore the funds raised through the Partner With Youth will be used to offset the cost of running these programs.

Specifically, Mrs. Hohertz explained that the Partner With Youth drive will be very similar with the United Way Drive in many other cities. Interested volunteers will be contacting individuals and businesses to buy a Partner With Youth membership at the Y and are tax deductible. Each Partner to Youth will receive a Y membership card

and other recognition depending upon the size of the donation.

Mrs. Hohertz stated that this year's drive will be from May 14-May 29 with a goal of \$21,000. She also said that workers are being recruited right now and if anyone is interested in working in the drive or making a contribution to contact the Y at 9-2591.

In closing Mrs. Hohertz said, "Spearman's greatest resource is people. And one of Spearman's greatest resources for working with people is the YMCA. Now is a great time to get involved in joining and supporting the Y. A Partner With Youth membership will help a kid go to Day Camp this summer, learn to swim, or be on a team. I really think the Y is a great idea, and hope many, many people choose to be a Partner With Youth!"

Pringle-Morse to have new addition

Construction has started on a 7,300 square foot addition to the Pringle Junior High. The addition will be of traditional brick construction and will be attached to the North side of the auditorium.

High Plains Builders of Amarillo will be doing the construction work. William P. Underwood of Amarillo designed the addition.

The addition will add 6 new classrooms and an office area to the existing building. There will be new

music, art and kindergarten rooms and a new Superintendent's office.

In addition to building the new classrooms, they will also be renovating 2600 feet of the older building. The school will now have a media library, a computer lab and a teacher's workroom.

"The estimated cost of the project is \$350,075.00. A completion date of August 17 has been set," stated Roy Harris, superintendent of Pringle-Morse Consolidated Schools.

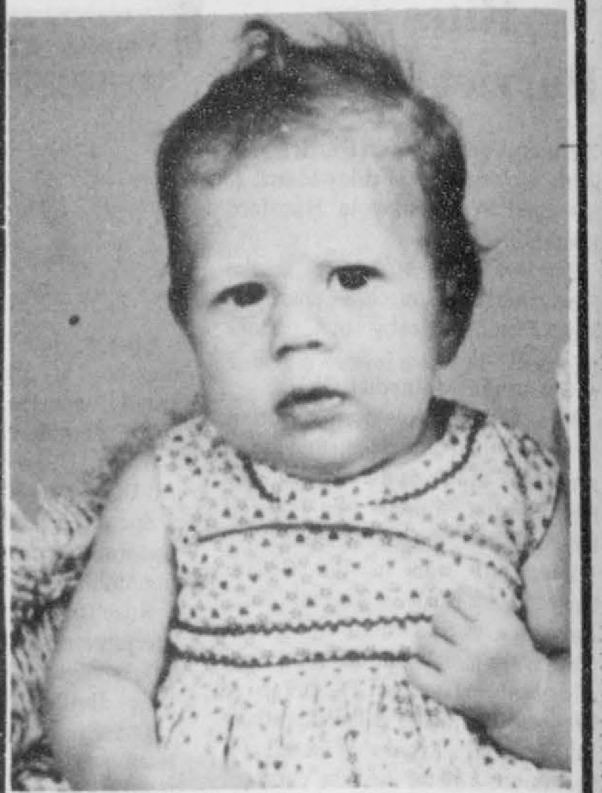

Election Recommendations

JANUARY 1-16, 1984 - Not statutory, but recommended as latest dates for city to review election procedures to ascertain whether any changes have been made or need to be made by city authorities for the April election that have not been submitted to the U.S. Department of Justice for pre-clearance under the Federal Voting Rights Act. Included, among others, are changes in election precincts or location of polling places (Arts. 2.02 (b), 2.03, 2.03a, and 2.05, Election Code.) Any needed changes or submissions should be made as soon as possible.

JANUARY 31, 1984 - Recommended last day to begin preliminary work on appointment of election judges and clerks. Mayor (or city council, if mayor fails to act) appoints for each election precinct a presiding judge and an alternate presiding judge and fixes the maximum number of clerks to be appointed by the presiding judge (Arts. 3.01 (b) and 4.06, Election Code.)

JANUARY 31, 1984 - Recommended last day to ORDER ELECTION SUPPLIES.

FEBRUARY 6, 1984 - First day for candidates to file application for a place on the ballot; applications are filed with the mayor (Arts. 1.08 c and d 13.53, Election Code.)

FEBRUARY 7, 1984 - First day for accepting applications for absentee mail ballot (Art. 5.05, Subd. 1(c) (i) and (ii), Election Code.)

FEBRUARY 22, 1984 - Last date recommended for:

a. election order (Art. 4.06, Election Code.)

b. order designating election precincts and polling places, unless Justice Department submissions are pending (Arts. 2.02 (b), 2.03, 2.03a, and 2.05, Election Code.);

c. order appointing presiding and alternate judges (Arts. 3.01 (b) and 3.09, Election Code.)

MARCH 1, 1984 - Recommended date for posting notice of time and place of drawing for order of names on ballot. Notice must be posted in office of city secretary at least three whole days before date of drawing (Art. 6.05c, Subd. 3, Election Code.)

MARCH 7, 1984 - Midnight of this date is deadline for candidates to file application for a place on the ballot (Art. 13.53, Election Code.)

MARCH 8, 1984 - Recommended date for conducting drawing for order of names on ballot (Art. 6.05c, Sbd. 3, Election Code.)

MARCH 8-27 1984 - Art. 29e, V.T.C.S., requires one publication of notice of the election in a newspaper of general circulation in the county between these dates, inclusive, if notice is given under Art. 4.05, Election Code, is not by publication. Date for publication of notice under Art. 4.05 are March 13-27, inclusive.

MARCH 17, 1984 - Last day for mayor to order election in time to comply with notice requirements of Art. 4.05, Election Code; but see entries under February 22, 1984.

Last day for posting notices of the election as required by Art. 4.05, Election Code.

MARCH 19, 1984 - Period for absentee voting by personal appearance begins (Art. 5.05, Subd. 3, Election Code.) Secretary mails ballots to voters who have applied for an absentee mail ballot (Art. 5.05, Subd. 4, Election Code.)

APRIL 3, 1984 - Last day for absentee voting by personal appearance (Art. 5.05, Subd. 3, Election Code.) Last day for accepting applications for absentee mail ballot (Art. 5.05, Subd. 4, Election Code.)

APRIL 4, 1984 - Period for emergency absentee voting begins; applies only where absentee ballots are handled by a special canvassing board (Art. 5.05, Subds. 3e and 3f, Election Code.)

APRIL 6, 1984 - Last day to post notice of council meeting to canvass returns of election on April 9; must be posted at least 72 hours before scheduled time of meeting (Open Meeting Law, Art. 6252-17, V.T.C.S.)

APRIL 7, 1984 - ELECTION DAY [Art. 978, V.T.C.S., and Art. 2.01b, Election Code.]

APRIL 7-8, 1984 - Counting of votes proceeds continuously after closing of polls until all ballots are counted (Art. 8.19, Election Code.) Copies of returns and accompanying papers and ballot boxes containing voted ballots are delivered to mayor and secretary immediately after counting is

completed and not later than 24 hours after closing of polls (Arts. 8.29a, 8.29b, 8.30, and 8.32, Election Code.)

APRIL 9, 1984 - City Council makes official canvass of election returns and mayor issues certificates of election to the persons shown to be elected (Arts. 8.29a, 8.34, and 8.36,

Election Code.)

APRIL 17, 1984 - Last day for secretary to forward to the voter registrar and affidavits of residence of voters on the list of returned registration certificates and to report errors on the list of registered voters to the registrar (Art. 5.16a, Subd. 5, Election

Code.)

JUNE 7, 1984 - Secretary destroys contents of ballot boxes containing voted ballots if no contest or criminal investigation of the election has arisen (Art. 8.32, Election Code.)

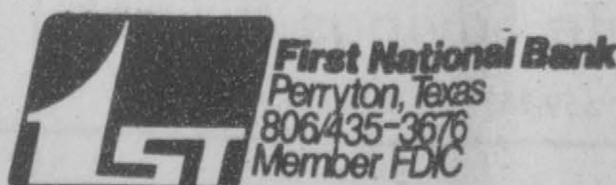

to the officer. The officer ordered all subjects to exit the vehicle. Two of the subjects were intoxicated. The officer placed the subjects under arrest and followed them to the Police Department. Upon questioning the subjects it was learned that they had been drinking beer for several hours. The officer advised the driver of the vehicle who was not drinking to take the other two subjects home and further advised them that if any of them were seen out again that night they would go to jail. The probation officer was notified of the situation.

On Feb. 26, 1984, two Spearman Police Officers observed a vehicle North bound on Barkley. The vehicle approached the intersection of Barkley and West Kenneth and slid thru the intersection nearly colliding with another vehicle that was East bound on Kenneth. The driver of the vehicle then accelerated excessively and turned East on Kenneth. The officers then attempted to stop the vehicle, following it to B Avenue. At this time the driver exited the vehicle. As the driver exited the

vehicle, the officer observed that he was very unsteady. The officer then approached the driver and smelled an odor of an alcoholic beverage about him. Upon speaking with him, the officers also noted that his speech was slurred. During the initial interview, the driver stated that he had been drinking but didn't say how much he had actually consumed. At this time, the driver was offered a blood or breath test, which he refused. The driver was then advised that he was under arrest for DWI. The driver was then transported to the Spearman Police Department where the interview was concluded. He was then transported to the Hansford County Jail. Further investigation revealed that the subjects drivers license is under suspension.

On Feb. 26, 1984, at 12:45 a.m., a white male advised a Spearman Police Officer that his girlfriend had stolen his car. He advised that when he came home from work, his girlfriend had taken all her clothes and the car. He gave the officer a description of the subject. At this time the officer proceeded to look for the vehicle but failed to spot it. The

complainant advised that he had bought the car before moving to Texas with his girlfriend and the title had not been changed over to him. He advised that his girlfriend had written her name on the title but it hadn't been notarized. He also advised he really didn't want to press charges unless she was with another male subject. At 7:45 a.m., an officer received a phone call from a person unknown that the female subject had just walked into her place of employment. Two officers arrived at the scene and placed the female subject under arrest and transported her to the Spearman Police Department. The complainant was picked up and brought down to the Police Department. After some discussion between the two subjects, the complainant refused to file charges and the female subject was released. The female subject advised where the car was located. Case closed.

On Feb. 27, 1984, a Spearman resident called the Spearman Police Department and asked to speak with an officer. The officer went to the complainants residence and related that she had gone home with

another female subject and when they arrived, there were two male subjects at the apartment and that both had been drinking. She then gave the other female subject her car keys and told her not to let one of the male subjects have the keys. At this time the male subject asked for the keys but they were not given to him. The male subject then grabbed her arm and took the keys from her by force. The complainant then kicked the male subject in the chest. He then hit her once in the mouth and three times in the stomach. At this time, the other male subject subdued the subject. The complainant signed a complaint against the male subject and at this time the male subject was advised to be in court at 10:00 a.m. on March 5, 1984.

On Feb. 27, 1984, a male subject was arrested for violating his work release. The subject was transported to the Hansford County Sheriff's Office where he was booked and placed in jail.
