PIK value nearly \$6 million

Some 615 Hansford County grain producers and landowners (89%) began receiving a 1,890,119 bushel "payment" in wheat for not harvesting a crop from land in the federal payment-in-kind (PIK) program on July 1.

The wheat, earmarked for grain producers and landowners, is worth \$5,991,677.23, based on the \$3.17 per bushel price at Hansford elevators Wednesday afternoon.

The in-kind wheat program is for idling 59,596 acres of land in addition to acres in

other federal farm programs. Warehouse receipts issue was begun Friday, July 1. These receipts will be in bushels of wheat which the grain producer and the landowner can convert to cash.

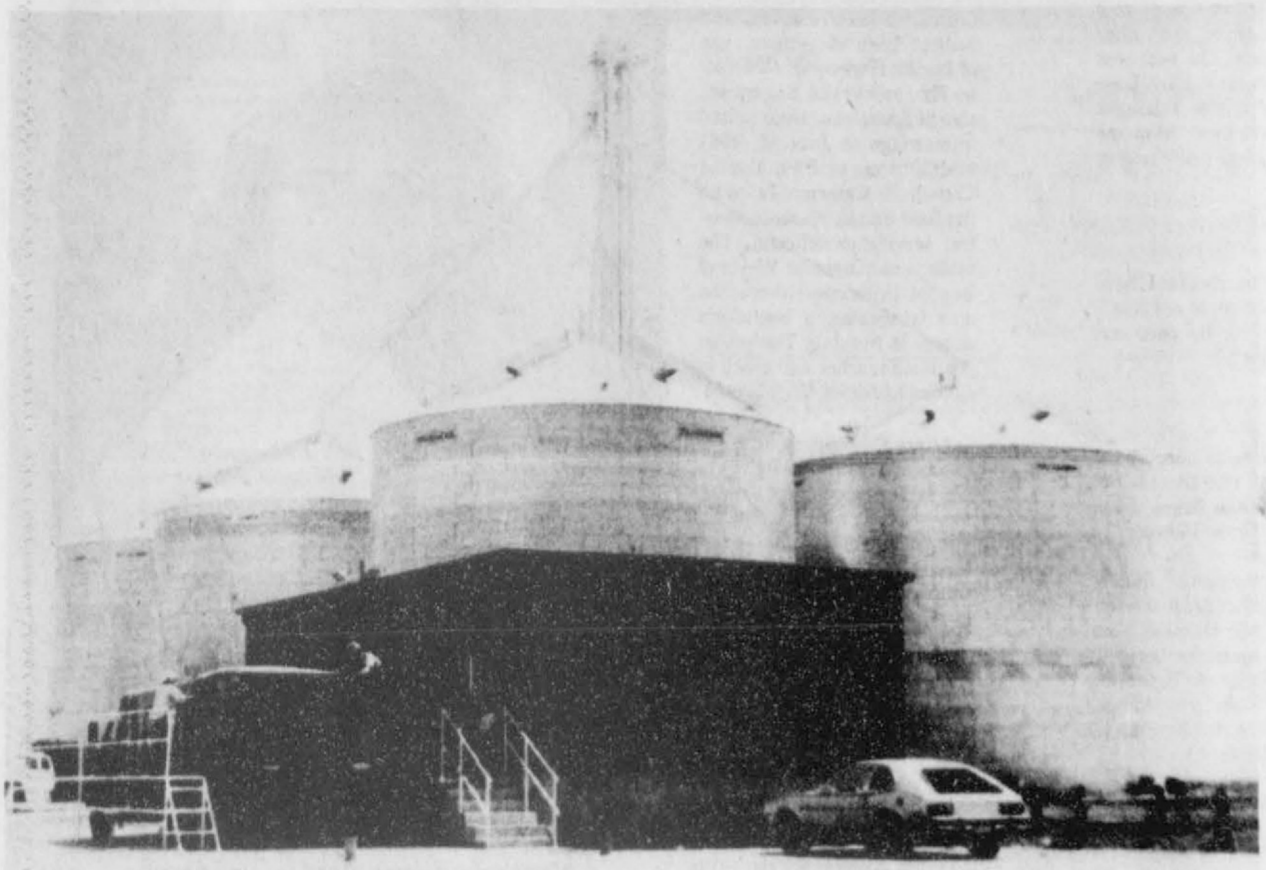
Most of the PIK wheat will come from grain Hansford county wheat producers and landowners have under Commodity Credit Corporation loan and in the reserve programs for the years 1979 through 1982.

Keith Martin, executive director of the Hansford County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office, emphasized that although the farmer-landowner

does not have to pay storage for five months, paid storage will end the day that warehouse receipts are picked up.

Acres in the PIK program are in addition to croplands farmers have retired from grain production this year under another federal farm program.

Grain producers had to sign up for the acres reduction program, agreeing to take 20 percent of their wheat land out of production. They then had the option of enrolling an additional 10 percent to 30 percent of their land in the PIK wheat program.



PIK has given a big dollar boost to the wheat harvest. Despite the acrossage cutback, the yield per acre according to farmers who have been the wheat harvest. Despite the wheat has been the best in years sending wheat trucks into elevators.

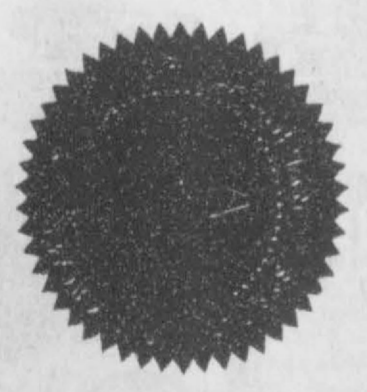
"OLD FASHIONED FOURTH OF JULY CELEBRATION"

City Council buys fire truck

Spearman City Councilmen voted Tuesday night to buy a new, fully equipped fire truck for \$69,500, but decided to hold up again on awarding a contract for repair and renovation of City Hall.

The council also adopted a resolution suspending the operation of a proposed rate hike filed by North Plains Electric Cooperative Inc. for a period of 120 days beyond the date the new schedules would go into effect. And they tabled until next session the possible extending of water service to the new municipal airport.

On a motion by Bob Pearson and second by Burl Buchanan, the council decided to follow the recommendation of Fire Chief Steven Slater and accept the second lowest bid on the new fire truck.

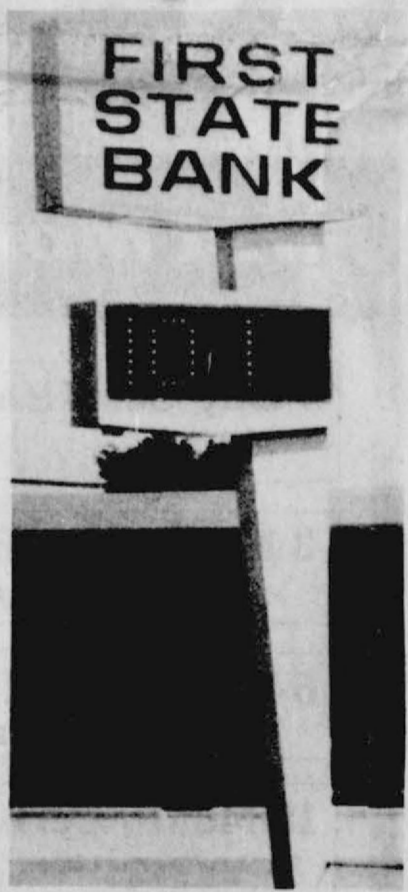
After conferring with City Secretary Jim Murray and studying the offers in the eight bids with the city's specifications, the fire department men decided to recommend the bid of \$69,500 by Boardman Company of Oklahoma City over the \$68,169 low bid by DACO Fire Equipment Company of Lubbock. Murray said this was because

DACO offered a pump on its truck that has been in manufacture for only 16-18 months, while Boardman offered a pump that has been manufactured for 12 to 16 years.

Although the city had tentatively voted to, at their previous meeting accept the apparent low bid of \$178,516 by Canadian Corp. of Amarillo for the renovation and repair or fire damage on the City Hall, the councilmen again voted to table awarding the contract for the work until the July 12 meeting.

The Council passed the resolution suspending the new rate hike proposed by North Plains Electric Cooperative—a hike that would affect only two businesses in town—until the Public Utilities Commission in Austin sets the rate.

After a report that a spraying service plane had been using the airport because there was water there and none at the new airport, the councilmen discussed at some length the possibilities of running a water line out to the airport or drilling a small domestic well there, but also tabled the item for further study.

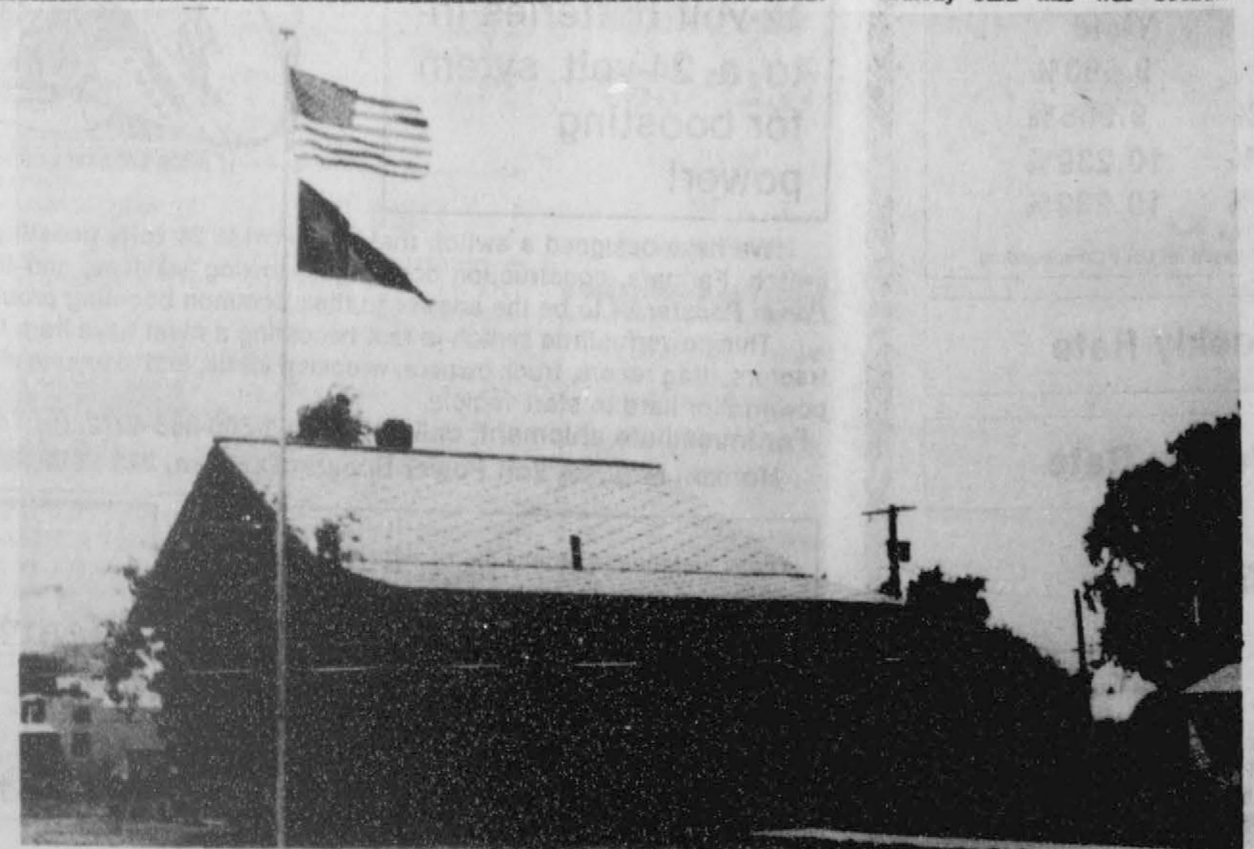

"Pink carnations, chrysanthemums, dandelions, geraniums, pansies and roses are just a few of your favorite flowers that will tantalize your palate," says Dr. Bill Welch, landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. They can be used in butters, soups, sauces and salads as well as in beverages, sandwiches, casseroles and desserts.

"Either the buds, petals or leaves of these flowers may be eaten. Wash them thoroughly, bathe in salt water and then dip in ice water to perk them up."

One of the possibilities the horticulturist calls delicious is to line the bottom of a cake pan with marigolds. This doesn't appeal to me because I can't stand the smell of marigolds. Anyway you can blend softened cream cheese with chopped petals for a spread on crackers and nut breads.

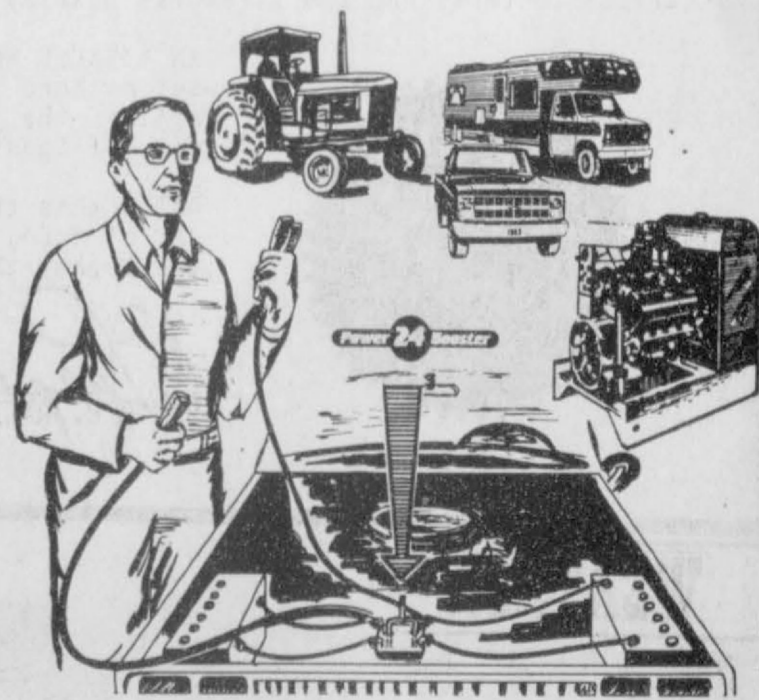

Warts are a common condition of the skin. They occur as contagious benign tumors and vary from one sixteenth to one half inch in diameter.

They are found most frequently in children and young adults—and are generally uncommon in elderly people.

In general, warts take on varied shapes and fall into several categories. There are common warts (verrucae vulgaris), rough surfaced, round or oval or irregular, firm, of varied colors—gray, yellow or brown.

They can occur anywhere, but they're more frequently found on the fingers, hand, elbows, knees, face, and scalp...or places mostly subject to trauma.

Interestingly, one type of common wart is located anywhere on the bottom of the foot—or plantar surface. Naturally, we call this type a plantar wart.

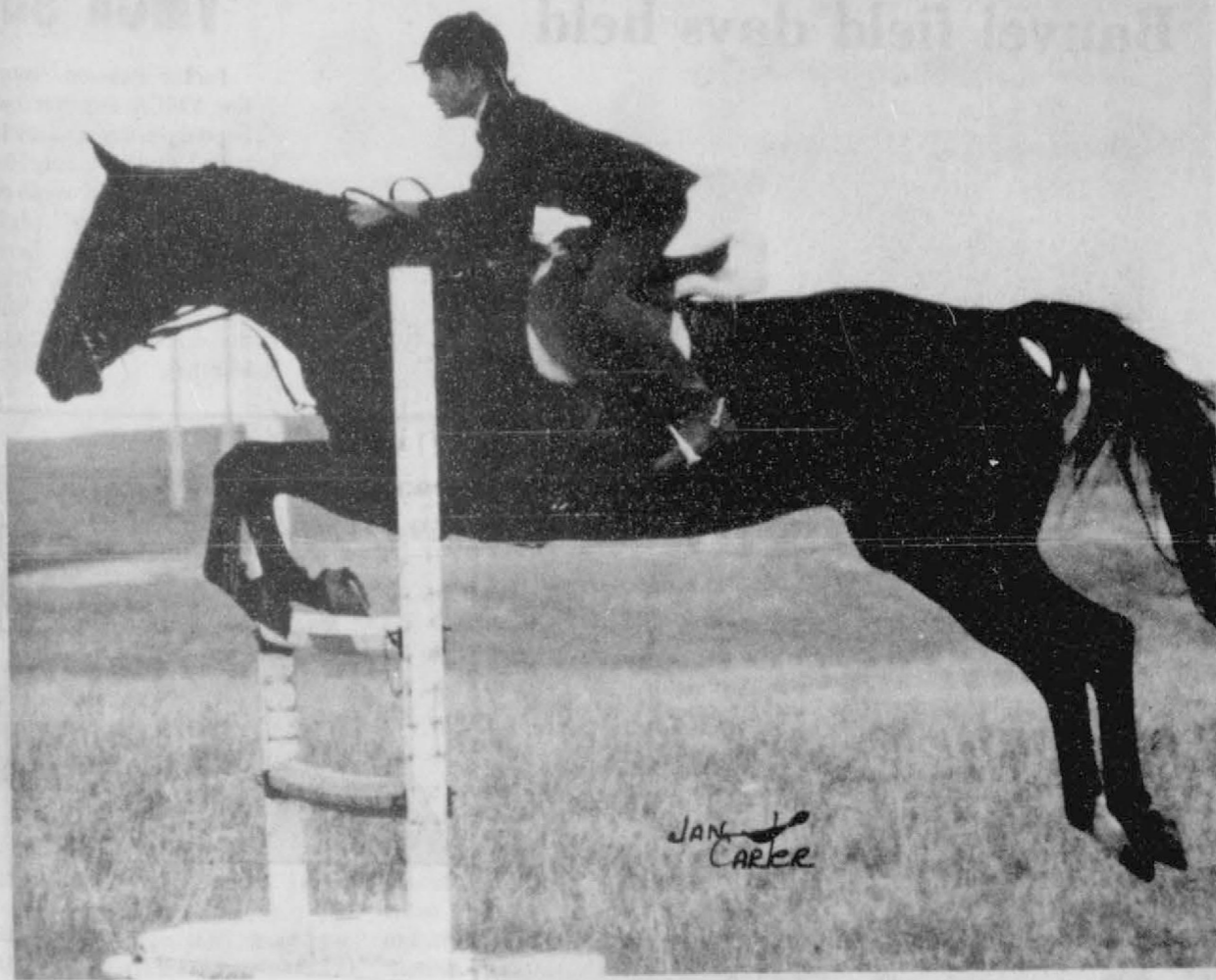
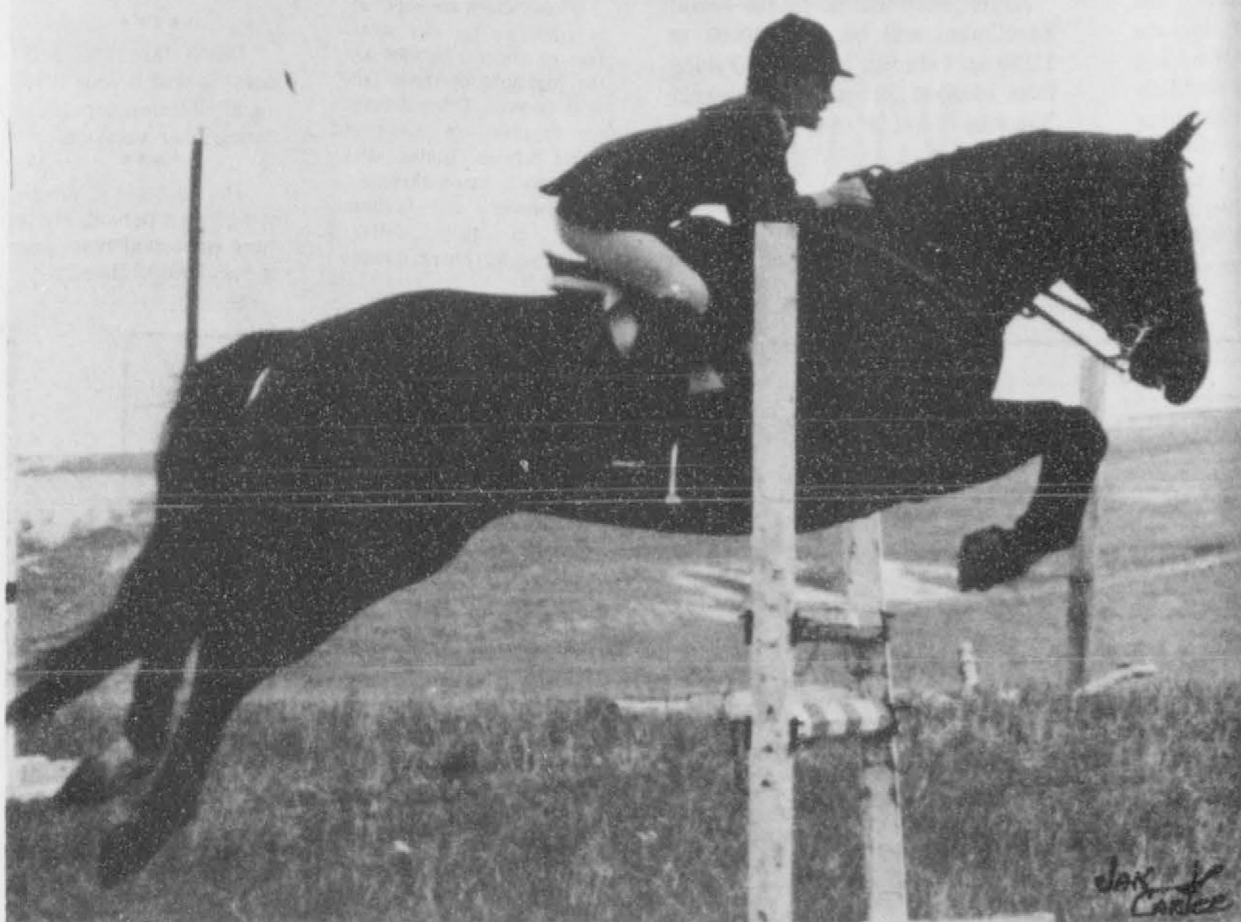

Banvel field days held



PANHANDLE, TX.—More dependable and consistent control of field bindweed and other problem perennial weeds was the attraction that drew west Texas farmers to a recent series of field days held in Panhandle (pictured), Spearman, Dalhart and Childress. Bindweed infests thousands of acres of west Texas farmland, rendering it unprofitable for crop production. Those attending the field day heard discussions on the latest control methods and viewed herbicide test plots demonstrating the Between Cropping Application (BCA) method of controlling bindweed and other problem perennial weeds, such as lakewood and

weeds, such as lakewood and Texas blueweed. The BCA treatment, which uses high rates of Banvel herbicide applied after the harvest of one crop and before seeding the next, costs as much as \$50 per acre less than alternative herbicide treatments. Farmers attending the field day saw field tests with 85 to 95 percent kill of perennial weed root systems without soil sterility. The BCA treatments allow growers to rotate to wheat, grain sorghum or corn. Those present for controlling high interest in using the Banvel BCA system for controlling problem perennial weeds on PIK/set-aside acres so they can be returned to profitable production this fall or next spring.

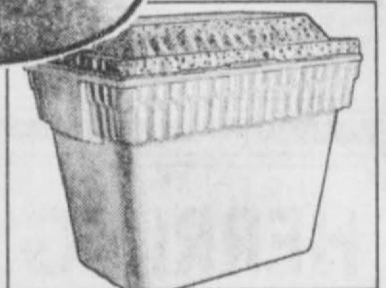

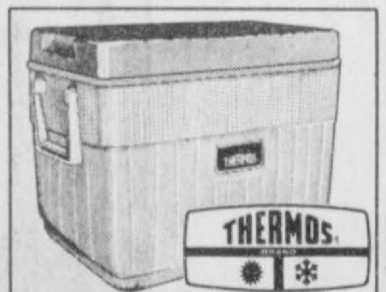

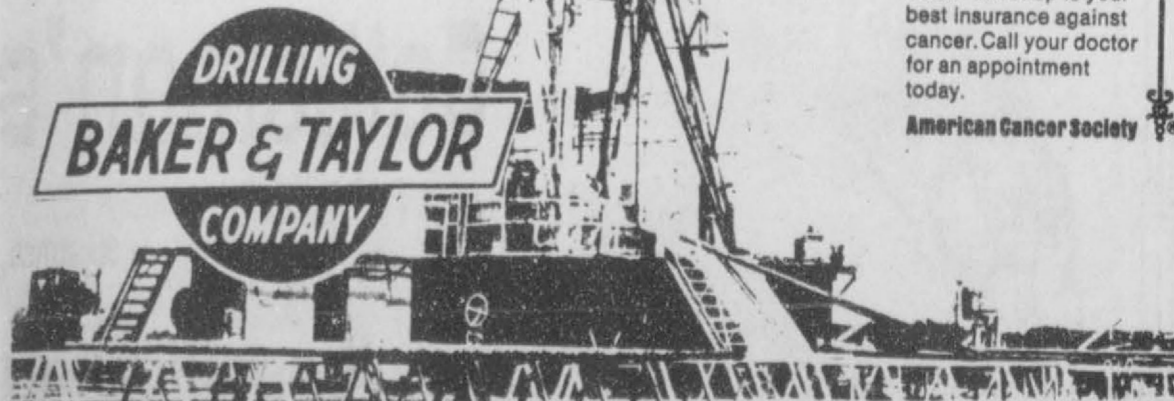
