Million dollar snow falls here Friday

Snow began falling in the Spearman, Gruver, Morse area before midnight Thursday. The snow continued throughout the night with approximately 1 1/2 inches on the group by 7 a.m. Friday morning. By 7:30 a.m. Friday, heavy snow began falling with accumulations from 6 to 8 inches by noon. Sheriff McFarlin and his deputies were busy checking on school buses, hospital and other areas in the county. The snow quit falling at noon Friday, but resumed at 3:12 p.m. Weather forecasters in the area predict more snow for Friday night. Approximately 1/2 an inch of moisture has fallen in the county since the snow started Thursday evening.

The track meet for Spearman had been cancelled this week of course. The snow is extremely wet. This snow was a \$180,000,000 peso snow, or a \$230,000,000 yen snow, or for our British readers it is a 1,480,000 L.B. snow!

In other words any way you want to say it, in any language, this was a million dollar snow for wheat farmers and businessmen of Hansford County.

We repeat, just as we are writing this story at 3:20 p.m. Friday, it has begun to snow again!

This will be followed by the all clear sounding approximately 3 minutes after the initial sounding. Remember, do not become alarmed. This is a test.

Funnels usually appear as an extension of the dark heavy cumulonimbus clouds of thunderstorms and stretch downward toward the ground. Some never reach the surface, others touch and rise again.

On the average, tornado paths are only a quarter of a mile wide and seldom more than 16 miles long. But there have been spectacular instances in which tornados have caused heavy destruction along paths more than a mile wide and miles long. A example, a tornado traveled 293 miles across Illinois and Indiana in May 1917 and lasted 7 hours and 20 minutes. Its forward speed was 40 miles per hour, an average figure for tornados.

Their time on earth is short and their destruction paths are rather small. But the march of these short lived local storms though populated areas, leaves a path of terrible destruction. In seconds a tornado can transform a thriving street into a ruin, and hope into despair.

Everyone in the Panhandle should be aware of tornados and take precautions during severe storms. A tornado watch, issued when the atmosphere is favorable for development of tornados. Listen and be prepared to act quickly to tornado warnings. A tornado has been sighted in the area or indicated on radar. Take cover, listen to your radio or television for more weather information.

- Emergency Actions:
1. stay away from windows.
 2. avoid areas with large poorly supported roofs.
 3. take shelter in the basement or inner hallway or a level or other predetermined safety area.
- At home: 1. stay away from windows.

YMCA partner with youth campaign building steam

Workers are being recruited and enthusiasm is building in the Hansford County YMCA's sustaining drive called "Partner With Youth." Campaign Chairman, Marva Hohertz says that everything is going according to deadline for the Y's largest undertaking to date in the area fund raising. "After setting the goal, the next big step is recruiting workers," Mrs. Hohertz explained. Marva told the Reporter that the workforce will consist of 49 volunteers which will be placed on teams in three districts which will engage in some friendly "competition" in reaching the Y' goal of \$21,000.

Marva went on to explain the reason for the campaign is to insure that the Y can keep its membership and program fees low enough that they can be afforded by most people. She also said, "It's the Y's policy is that no child will be denied membership or program participation on the grounds of financial condition."

YMCA Director, Winn Crenshaw explained that youth programming cost approximately \$21,700 a year to operate here in Hansford County. That figure includes salaries, insurance, utilities, mortgage, and equipment. However, he also stated that because the Y tries to keep fees low that the total income from youth programs are approximately \$4750. The difference between the \$16,950 deficit and the \$21,000 goal is for campaign costs such as printing, mailings, recognition for both workers and contributors, and catering for workers.

Mrs. Hohertz said that the 49 volunteer workers that will be canvassing the community will be divided into three districts consisting on three teams each. Each of the three teams will have four workers. At this point in the planning all three district leaders have been recruited Marva said that the three district leaders are Todd Brock, Mary Dixon, and Jackie Pearson. "Todd, Mary, and Jackie are responsible for

recruiting three team captains," Marva said. Todd Brock's team captains are Cindy Schneider, Wanda Archer, and Richey Thompson. Mary Dixon's team captains are Brice McRee, Rich Melton, and Mona Beth Windom. Jackie Pearson has recruited Betty Elbert, Charles Shieldknight and Steve Holton.

"The exciting thing about this campaign is that the whole community is taking part," Winn Crenshaw said. He explained that one doesn't have to be a Y Board member to be part of the campaign. "Many, many people see the YMCA as a real community asset to Hansford County and are taking part because they are interested in the community and especially the kids," Crenshaw said.

Both Hohertz and Crenshaw said that if anyone is interested to participating in the campaign and have not been contacted yet, to please call the Y at 9-2591. The drive will begin with a Kickoff dinner on May 14 and conclude with a Victory celebration on May 29.

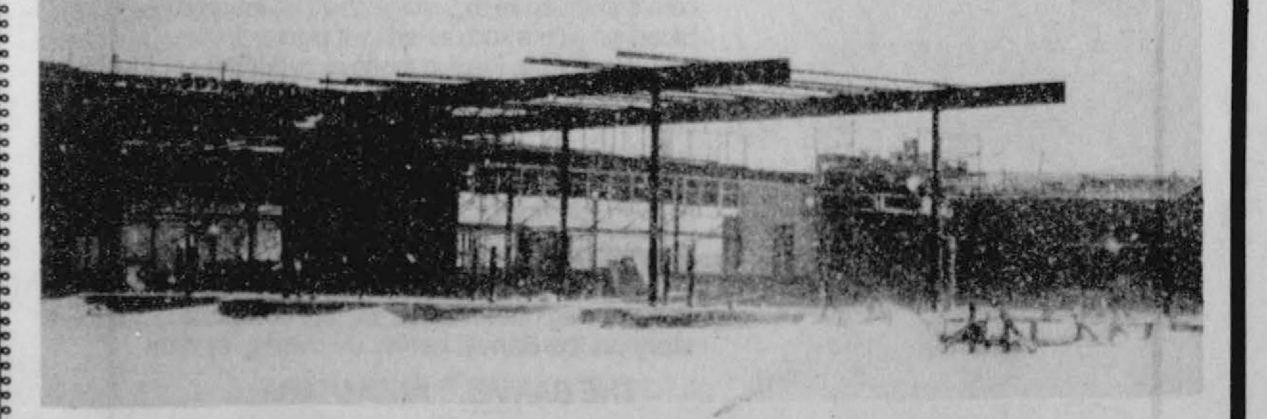

2. take shelter in the basement, preferably under heavy furniture.

3. if you have no basement, preferably under heavy furniture or the ground floor in the center part of the house or small on the ground floor away from outside walls and windows.

4. if time permits, shut electricity and fuel lines off, open doors and windows on opposite side of approaching storm. Do not remain in a trailer mobile home or vehicle.

At school: 1. stay away from windows.

2. if school is reinforced construction, stay inside near inside wall on the lower floor.

In Open Country:

1. Move at right angles to tornados path.

2. if there is no time to escape, lie flat in nearest ditch ravine, culvert or under bridges. Do not stay in your car.

To Report a Tornado Call the Nearest:

1. Local Law Enforcement Agency.

2. The National Weather Service.

In the event of a storm warning there will be a 5 minute sounding of the sirens.

All clear: sounding will be made by four separate sounding of the sirens.

Homestead exemptions available

The burden of property taxes for 1984 can be reduced for taxpayers in Hansford County Appraisal District who take advantage of various residence homestead exemptions available in Texas.

According to Mrs. Alice Peddy, chief appraiser for the district, provisions of the Texas Property Tax Code permit a one-time initial application for residence homestead exemptions rather than requiring annual application as in previous years.

However, taxpayers who have never received a residence homestead exemption on the homes in which they were residing on January 1, and those who became 65 years old or disabled during 1983, must take the one-time application this year in order to receive exemptions for 1984.

A residence homestead is a structure, together with improvements and land up to 20 acres, used by the owner for residential purposes. Mrs. Peddy said that in order for a property to qualify as a homestead, it must meet four tests.

It must be owned by the person or persons claiming the exemption; it must be designed or adapted for human residence; it must actually be used as a residence; and it must be occupied as the principal residence of an owner who qualifies for the exemption.

A mobile home, if it meets the requirements, can be claimed as a homestead, even if it is on leased land. Mrs. Peddy, said. (She) added, "A taxpayer can still qualify for the homestead exemptions if a portion of his residence is used for other purposes, such as a business in the home. And the home will not lose the exemption if the owner moves away temporarily, provided he intends to return and does not claim a homestead elsewhere."

Among the various types of homestead exemptions provided by Texas tax law are two which must be granted by a school district to taxpayers who qualify. School districts offer a \$5,000 general homestead exemption to all homeowners and an additional \$10,000 exemption to those who are 65 years of age or older or who are disabled.

An advantage associated with the over-65 school exemption is that elderly homeowners receive a "tax ceiling" on their school taxes. Although the appraised value of these homesteads may fluctuate with the market, taxes due the school district will not increase. The ceiling would be raised, however, in the instance of adding an improvement, other than repairs and general maintenance. In this case, the value of the new improvement will be taxed at current market value and tax rate, and the taxes due will be added to the previous tax ceiling to create a new ceiling.

Mrs. Peddy stressed, though, that the elderly homeowner has to apply

for the over-65 school tax exemption in order to get the ceiling. The homeowner must be 65 years old or more on January 1, 1984, to qualify for the elderly exemption and tax ceiling.

Counties must offer a \$3,000 general homestead exemption to all taxpayers, granted only on the portion of the county tax levied for farm-to-market roads and/or flood control.

Any taxing unit's governing body may vote to offer an exemption for a minimum of \$3,000 on the homesteads of disabled and/or elderly taxpayers. Only in school districts, however, is a tax ceiling established for taxes on over-65 homesteads.

In addition, taxing units may offer a local-option homestead exemption based on a percentage of the home's appraised value. Because of a constitutional amendment passed in 1981, any taxing unit in 1984 may exempt up to 40 percent of the value of all homesteads in the unit. No matter what the percentage, the dollar amount of exemption on any homestead must be at least \$5,000. This exemption is granted at the option of each taxing unit's governing body.

Tax renditions due by May 1

Mrs. Alice Peddy, chief appraiser for Hansford County Appraisal District, reminds district residents that those property owners required to render their taxable property for taxation must file these statements with the appraisal office before May 1.

Rendering property is a method through which a property owner reports or lists the taxable property he owned or managed on January 1, 1984. It is also the means by which a taxpayer is allowed to record his opinion of his property's value.

The Texas Property Tax Code is specific in listing property which must be rendered to the chief appraiser for taxation.

A taxpayer must render all taxable personal property used for the production of income if, on January 1 of the tax year, he owns the property or manages and controls it. Examples include business vehicles, office furniture and fixtures, and inventories.

Tax law also requires banks located in Texas to file a statement listing assets and liabilities.

The chief appraiser may also require a person to render any other taxable property that he owns or manages and controls on January 1. The chief appraiser will deliver written notice that a rendition statement is required and attach the appropriate form.

Even when not required, any property owner may voluntarily file a rendition with the appraisal

district.

According to Mrs. Peddy, rendition statements are filed with the chief appraiser of the appraisal district in which the property is located.

Any taxpayer who believes that his property's value has decreased during the preceding tax year, for any reason other than normal depreciation, may submit a "report of decreased value" to the chief appraiser. This report describes the property involved and states the nature and cause of the decrease.

Forms of rendition and the report of decreased value may be obtained from the Hansford County Appraisal District office. Anyone filing a rendition or report must include all the information requested on the form, and it must be signed by the property owner or an authorized individual.

When rendering property, it is not necessary to state a market value for it, Mrs. Peddy said. However, a taxpayer may include his opinion of its market value and thus be assured of official notification in case the appraisal office places a greater value on the property.

Mrs. Peddy also said that renditions and property reports are confidential and not open to public inspection.

The forms should be filed with Mrs. Peddy before May 1 at the appraisal district office at 13 West Kenneth Ave. for more information, call 659-5575 or 733-5139.

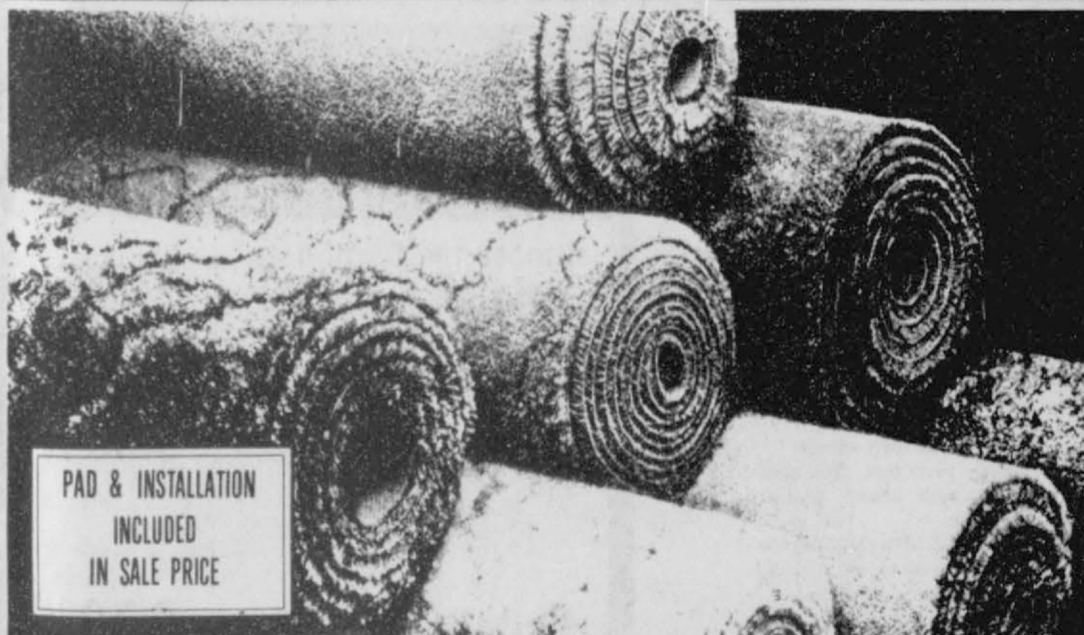

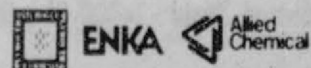

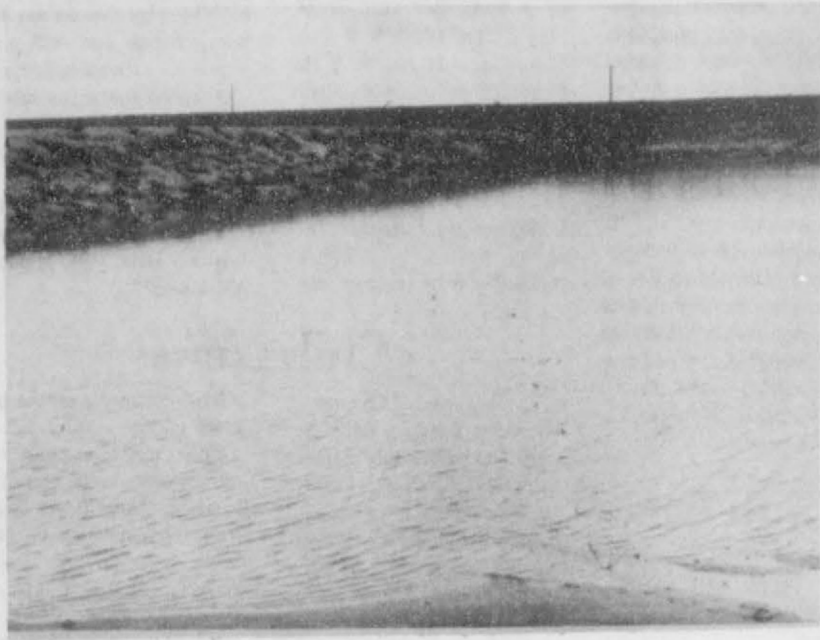

Farm ponds reduce erosion



POND- Livestock Pond on R.E. Lee.

Ponds and reservoirs are bodies of water created by constructing of an embankment across a water course.

Water is as important as the forage in the production of livestock. Adequate water will give a better distribution of grazing in a pasture.

A pond should be of a size that will meet the needs of all

livestock that will use the surrounding grazing area. Ponds are also utilized by fish and wildlife.

Ponds that are constructed and managed properly may yield from 100 to 300 lbs. of fish annually for each surface acre. Ponds can provide recreation such as swimming and

boating for the family and friends.

Farm ponds also help to prevent silting and pollution of streams and rivers by reducing erosion.

For further information on farm ponds, contact the Soil Conservation Service office in Spearman.

with two or three towels, or in an area that enables you to handle him carefully without straining.

Use a plastic pan, bowl, or bathnet, and sponge bathe him, beginning with the head and face. While you are working on his top, keep his bottom diapered to avoid any accidents. You may want to wrap him in a towel if the room is drafty or cool. Gently wipe the baby's eyelids with a cotton ball dampened in soapless water.

Stroke the eye area from the nose to the outside, using a clean cotton swab for each eye. Clean the outer ear and nostrils with a dampened cotton ball. Never poke or probe inside the baby's eyes, ears, nose, or mouth. Wash the rest of the baby's face with a dampened cotton ball or with a soft washcloth dampened with warm water. Gently pat dry.

Next, shampoo your baby's head with a mild soap or shampoo, depending on the infant's age. Support the baby's head and body with your right arm, and handle as if cradling a football. Rest his hips and legs against your side for good support so he will feel secure. Then, with your left hand, lather his scalp, whether bald or bushy.

State shows decline in fatal accidents

AUSTIN--Statistics compiled by the Department of Public Safety show 448 fewer persons lost their lives in Texas traffic accidents last year compared to 1982. The 10.5 per cent decline in 1983 follows a reduction of 430 fatalities in 1982.

"This is the first time in 25 years that Texas has experienced a reduction in fatalities for two years in a row," said Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director. "This represents a saving of 878 lives over the past two years and would not have been possible without the cooperation of many Texas drivers and increased law enforcement activities."

A total of 3,823 persons died as a result of motor vehicle

crashes in Texas last year compared to 4,271 in 1982 and 4,701 in 1981.

The mileage death rate for 1983, three deaths per hundred million miles traveled, was the lowest in Texas history. The 1982 mileage death rate was 3.4.

The DPS director said public sentiment has continued to build against drunk and unsafe drivers.

"I'm hopeful that this concern will lead to a long term change in attitudes which will encourage safe driving habits by motorists," Adams said. "Since law enforcement resources are limited, we must continue to seek voluntary compliance with the traffic laws."

Adams noted that at least 26 per cent (1,006) of the 1983 fatalities involved DWI.

"Since state law did not require blood alcohol measurements from drivers involved in fatal accidents last year, we believe this statistic substantially understates the drunk driver's role in fatal accidents," Adams said.

Statewide DWI arrests in 1983 totaled 149,621, an increase of 33 per cent compared to the 1982 figure.

Motorcycle operator and passenger deaths totaled 349 last year, a decline of 13.4 per cent compared to the previous year. About three out of four motorcyclists killed were not wearing helmets when the accidents occurred.

Almost 98 per cent of the persons killed in passenger vehicles were not wearing seat belts at the time of the crash. The number of persons injured in 1983 traffic accidents increased by 1.7 per cent, totaling 208,157.

"We'd like to see the use of seat belts and child safety seats become a standard driving practice in Texas," Adams said. "Wide-spread use of these lifesaving devices would substantially reduce the number of deaths and serious injuries in vehicle crashes."

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation estimated that motorists traveled 129,309 billion miles in 1983, an increase of 3.5 per cent above 1982.
