

The world has among its people a group known as Fundamentalists. Yet few understand who or what they are. Since I count myself as one, I would like to try to clear the air concerning this subject. There are many counted among our number which are not. For instance many times The Ayatollah of Iran, even Jim Jones (No Relation) of South American fame was labled with us. I would like to share with you what we are and stand for.

In Luke 1:1-4 we find this statement, "A declaration of those things which are most surely believed among us." These things of which Luke writes there are which serve as a sign or the signature of a Fundamentalist. These are as follows:

Fifth, a literal return of Christ in the Second Advent. In 1 Thess. 4:16 and Acts 1:11 state that Jesus will return as He left. Jesus left in a Glorifed Body and will return in the same manner. There are many other things that Fundamentalists claim but, these are a must.



Protect Fruit Trees From Insects

Homeowners hoping to harvest good fruit from their trees this year need to start work now to assure healthy trees and quality yield. The first step in producing quality fruit is to insure that the tree is in a healthy, vigorous state.

Various insects attack fruit trees and often the use of insecticides is the only means of control. Cultural practices such as proper pruning, fertilizing and watering also play important roles in preventing insect damage.

Insect losses can be reduced with a. spray program and by diligently following good cultural practices. This program should begin right away for peach and apricot trees and in the next few days for apple trees.

The most important insects which damage fruit in this area are the codling moth in apples and pears and the peach twig borer in peaches and apricots. Other damaging insects include the peach tree borer, which attacks the base of the trunk and tions for the pesticide you are using.

thrips, which attack foliage.

The first cover spray to prevent insects from damaging fruit should be applied to peach and apricot trees when 75 percent of the blossom petals have fallen, and to apple trees when 90 percent of the petals have dropped. Subsequent applications should be made every 10 days to assure undam-

Five or six applications will be needed for apricot and peach trees, and up to 14 applications for apples and pears. Thorough coverage of the tree is

Several insecticides, including diazinon, malathion and zolone provide good control of damaging insect pests. Sevin will thin apples and shouldn't be used until 30 days after full bloom. A fungicide can also be applied with the insecticide to help prevent diseases in peaches and apricots.
