More Asking for Water

Recently the city of Crowell asked the member towns of the Greenbelt Water Association working to build a dam on the Salt Fork of Red River for membership in the organization.

The dam site is north of Hedley. Crowell is more than 100 road miles from the dam, but is willing to pay the cost of pipelines to have an adequate supply of water.

Crowell is not a growing place. It is noted for one thing, football, and that does not require much water. However, even though it is just a little place, the people realize they must have water. Since the town is old and has depended on wells all these years, the supply is becoming scarce and the people are hunting water.

Crowell is just one of the vast horde of towns and cities looking for a sure source of water. Today water is our most importand natural resource. Almost everywhere you travel today there are multitudes of new dams being built as large and small towns and cities try to keep the fresh water that falls in their areas.

Many of these towns and small cities are not experiencing a big growth rate, some, like Crowell, are just holding their own, or losing a little population. However, the people in these towns realize that it does not matter how many people that are in a town, these people are going to have to have water to support life.

In Hansford County we have an almost God given lake, all it needs is a plug in one end and the water supply for Spearman, Gruver and Perryton would be assured for many years.

Many oppose this project because of taxes. With the oil and gas properties paying over 60 percent of the taxes in the county more than half of the dam cost would be a gift, also. Should the oil and gas industry begin to fade in 10 to 35 years, the industry still would have paid a large portion of the cost.

Let us not wait until we have pumped our underground sources dry before we start making preparations for the future. We may find that rain falling on Hansford County belongs to people farther down the creek who looked ahead.



Vandalism in Diboll

Constable Fred Simpson is to be commended for his action last week which resulted in the fining of four boys whom he caught breaking out windows.

We do not even know the identity of the boys, nor do we wish to. What is important is the contable's readiness to see to the punishment of those among our youth who have no regard for the property of others.

Diboll has been plauged in recent years by all sorts of vandalism - some of it petty, and some of it quite serious. It is high time the law took steps to put an end to these juvenile acts of violence against our local society.

None among us wants to see young boys mistreated. We don't what to see the law ride herd on them so close that they can't have a friendly argument without feat of their little fracas making newspaper headlines. But there is a difference in horseplay and vandalism.

Defining and limiting actions which result in damage to the property of others is the job of law enforcement officials. Citizenry should demand prompt justice in matters of vandalism. If they demand it, they will get it. And when they get it, they should commend the law for doing its duty.

bining liquid ammonia and liquid carbon dioxide at very high temperatures and pressures; contains 45 percent nitrogen.

Ammonium sulfate - comes primarily from a by-product of the coke ovens; also manufactured from synthetic ammonia by treating it with sulfuric acid; contains 20, 5 percent nitrogen.

Anhydrous ammonia - formed by uniting nitrogen gas from the air and hydrogen gas from natural gas. It is dry ammonia gas.

Nitrogen solutions - made from various combinations of ammonia sulfate, ammonium nitrate, urea, aqua ammonia, and water. The actual nitrogen content will vary from 20 to 41 percent nitrogen.

What source of nitrogen should be used? Any of those listed are good. Approximately equal results should be obtained from the application of equivalent amounts of nitrogen from any of the sources lited. Other considerations in selecting a source of nitrogen are:

Availability of materials in the area.

Method by which it must be applied. Cost per pound of nitrogen in

the fertilizer material.
