Hit-and-run case needs FBI report

A second hit-and-run within the city resulting in serious injury to a Spearman youth following by just weeks the December, 1981 fatal hit-and-run, has stirred up the coffee-cup crowd.

Fruit of gossip is the question: "Will anything be done?"

For a progress report, Spearman Police Chief Ron Robinson was questioned.

"We completed an exhaustive investigation into the December fatality," Robinson explained. "That investigation was completed Dec. 25, 1981 and the results, including all evidence, was in the hands of District Attorney Steve Cross, Dec. 28.

"Evidence needing laboratory evaluation was on the way to the Federal Bureau of Investigation lab in Washington D.C., Dec. 30.

"Presently, the DA is awaiting return of that evidence with the FBI analysis. Assuming it substantiates all other findings, the case will be presented immediately to the grand jury."

Chief Robinson noted that he had visited the Washington FBE facility in times past and observed that not one individual employed in the lab there wasted one minute.

"Just imagine if you will," Chief Robinson suggested, "how many law enforcement departments in the United States rely on the FBI lab for just such evidence work. Their load there is tremendous."

There is a two-fold importance to the FBI lab report, according to Robinson: the district attorney must have every thing at his command when he goes to court with a case for there is only "one shot" at convicting a suspected felon and -- there is no case on record where findings of the FBI lab have been impeached.

"It is only natural for the layman to question delays," Chief Robinson said. "For there are delays. The criminal justice system moves slowly due to investigation, grand jury deliberation, awaiting a trial on the court docket and actual trial of the case.

"However, all this is a part of true American freedom."

Robinson observed that there might be a time when citizens would have a right to be upset: "If we go to trial with these hit-and-run cases and jurors respond with a "slap-on-the-wrist" type of punishment, we will know how our community feels about hit-and-run crimes."

Preservation Week Proclaimed

AUSTIN--Gov. William P. Clements has proclaimed PRESERVATION WEEK in Texas, May 9-15, and called upon the people of the Lone Star State to recognize and participate in local observances dedicated to the conservation and appreciation of historical resources.

The Texas commemoration of Preservation Week is part of a national program sponsored by the National Trust for Historic Preservation, with local leadership from the Texas Historical Commission and many community heritage organizations across the state.

Governor Clements noted that the homes and buildings constructed by our forefathers represent the investment of their skills, energy, and financial resources, and that many of these structures merit preservation and continued appreciation. The conservation of such landmarks bestows cultural, social, and economic benefits to present and future generations of our society, according to the governor.

Governor Clements also observed that the Economic Recovery Tax Act 1981 has established tax credits for the certified rehabilitation of historic buildings. The governor's proclamation further suggested that the reuse of older buildings can help solve such contemporary problems as poor housing, depressed inner cities, declining small towns, and energy shortage.

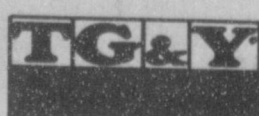

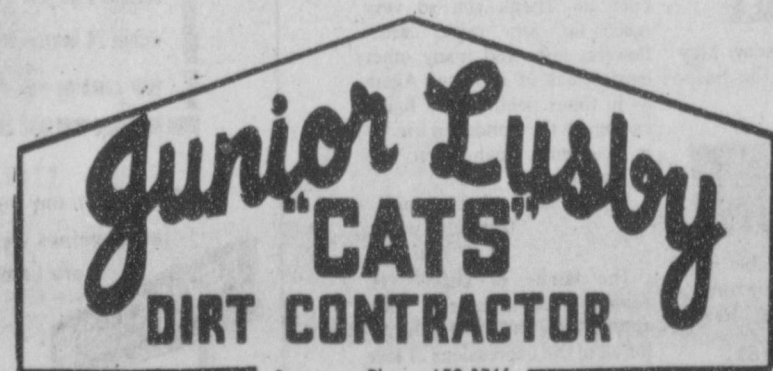

Other honors include being named to "Who's Who", and is treasurer and vice president of the Speech Club.

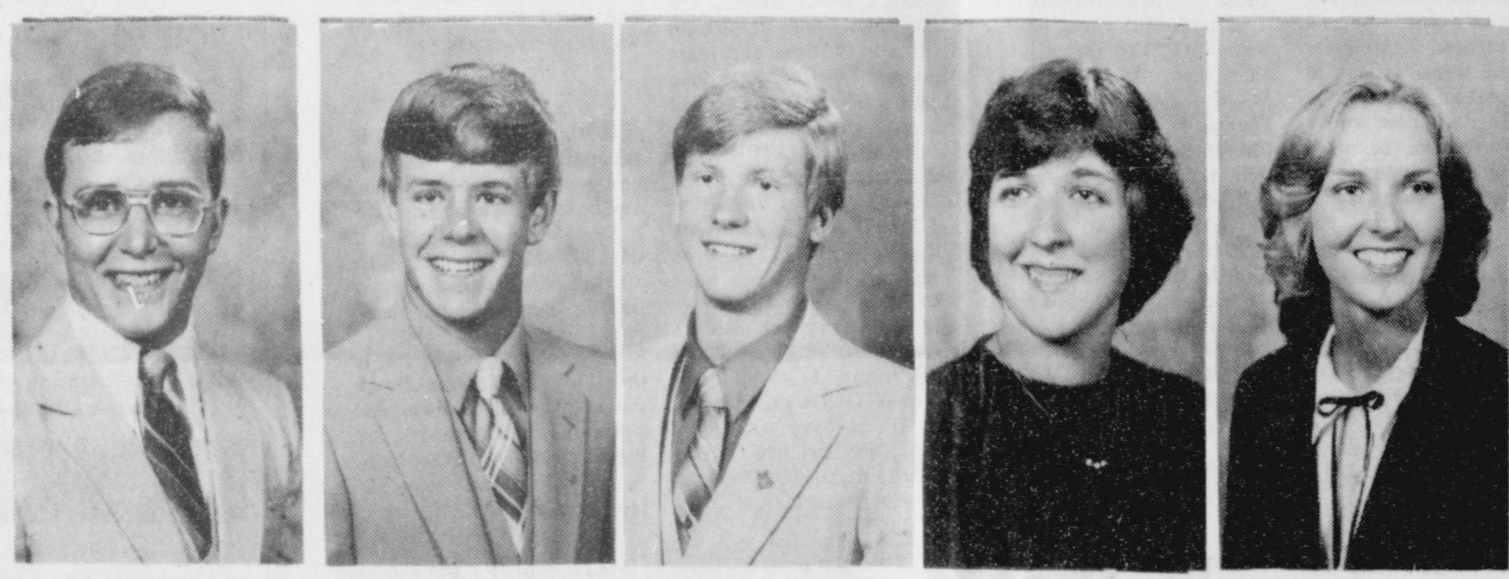
