PDWA voting by absentee opens Monday

Absentee voting began last Monday and will continue through January 16 on Moore County annexation to the Palo Duro Water Authority. The election is set for Jan.

19 in Moore voting precincts. Absentee voting will be handled in the office of Rhonnie Mayer, county clerk, in the courthouse.

Voters will mark a 2-part ballot in the election and both parts must be approved if the county is to be annexed to PDWA.

First on the ballot is annexation and the second item is authorization of a tax levy for maintenance purposes. Voting at the same time will be the City of Stinnett on the same proposals. PDWA proposes to con-struct a dam across Palo Duro Creek in Hansford county, at a cost of \$22 million, and later to build a water treatment plant and transmission facilities.

"To be eligible, the land must have been devoted to row crops or 1 to November 1. small grains in two of the past three years, except for a summer fallow farm in which case the cropping requirement is for only

one of the previous two years, Keith said. Farmers need to be sure that the land has actually been planted within the specified

time frame, he said. When farmers sign up for the acreage reduction programs, they agree to protect their idled cropland from soil and water erosion

legumes, small grains or other cover on the land. They are required to maintain these acres through normal control measures for insects, weeds and rodents. The program contract also prohibits harvesting ACR land. Grazing is prohibited during the 5 principal growing months of June Keith said farmers need to use proper stubble management not

to prevent problems with stubble mulch cover on acres designated for ACR in 1985. "The 1984 stubble should not be disced, plowed, or burned; otherwise, a cover crop will be required.

As an alternative to planting a cover crop, conservaton tillage can be used on ACR land when adequate 1984 crop residue is emergency tillage or plant the land to a cover crop." The ASCS official said land that is being leveled, put into sod waterways or filter strips, or planted to trees, shrubs, or shelter belts during the current year, may be designated as ACR in 1985. Wet, low-lying areas of land are not eligible for the ACR.

Federal Farm Program Payments Available

When farmers sign up for the 1985 acreage reduction programs, they are eligible to receive 50 percent of the land diversion payments in those programs where land diversion payments are provided, and 50 percent of projected deficiency payments, according to Keith Martin, CED.

"The advance farm program payments provide producers with additional compensation for taking land out of production, in addition to the acreage reduction requirements," Keith said. Deficiency payments are made to program participants when average market prices fall below the established target price for the crop.

A 10 percent acreage reduction requirement is in effect for 1985 feed grains and extra long staple cotton. The wheat and upland cotton programs contain a 20 percent acreage reduction and 10 percent paid land diversion requirement. The rice program calls for a 20 percent acreage reduction and a 15 percent paid land diversion.

Keith said acreage reduction and land diversion programs are necessary to maintain reasonable levels of carryover stocks and strengthen farm prices. "All farmers with an established acreage base are eligible to participate in the voluntary programs."

Land diversion payments have been established at \$2.70 per bushel for wheat, 30 cents per pound for upland cotton, and \$3.50 per hundredweight for rice. Projected deficiency payments are 47 cents per bushel for corn, 46 cents for sorghum, 44 cents for barley, \$1.08 for wheat, \$19.80 cents per pound for upland cotton, and \$3.80 per hundredweight for rice.

Keith said farmers who accept advance federal farm program payments and later fail to comply with program provisions will be required to refund the amount of the advance with interest, plus liquidated damages.



Antiques BY RANDY ORMSBY

Collectable Clock Tips

Almost any clock could conceivably be of interest to a collector, but not all clocks have general collector appeal. It is not possible to define, for every situation, what makes a particular clock "collectable," but we can at least discuss some general tips that will help you understand what collectors look for in clocks. Generally, we can say that a good

collectable clock should be in good working order with all original parts in good condition, be at least 100 years old (to be considered a true antique) or be so unusual in some way (or so rare) that age is not really a factor. Of course, we could get much more

specific for each different kind or style of clock, but this general rule is sufficient for such a discussion. That said, let's take a look at our rule point by point. Point one: the clock must be in good

working order. Unless you're already an expert in clockworks, NEVER buy a clock that isn't working. Pay no attention to the dealer's claim of how cheaply it can be put in working order. If such were the case, the dealer would have already seen to it. While it is true that most antique clocks can be restored to working order, it is almost never true that is can be done cheaply.

Point two: the clock should have all original parts in good condition. There's practically no way the non-expert can know through a buying room examination, but you'd be surprised how many buyers forget to even ask the dealer Reputable dealers will be obliged to tell you if restoration has occurred and how the price has been affected (a restored clock should be 5 to 10 percent less expensive than an all-original example in comparable condition).

Point three: age, novelty or rarity. This is the point where the buyer is most vulnerable. Countless reproductions of old clocks are now on the marketplace, some even difficult for dealers to spot. Your best protection against fraud is a reputable dealer and your own knowledge of the field. WHY NOT TRY IT?

a chance

A trip through any supermarket's produce department will pretty well convince you there are winter vegetables. And, at the checkout, you learn they cost money. Since nutritionists say we need them, proper care and saving freshness is in order. Here's a few tips:

Refrigerate all the veggies you lug home fast. Vitamins in some green and yellow kinds are lost by exposure to light, heat, air and in water. Don't soak or wash vegetables; do this before use. Cut them then, too, and pare if necessary. Everyone has a favorite cooking method, and today, steaming is right up there as it retains freshness and vitamins. If you're a bit conservative, save the water you cook vegetables in and freeze it. Makes good soup, and it adds flavor to stews and casseroles.

Winter greens - like kale, lettuce, spinach, etc. - are exceptions. They should be washed thoroughly before storing. Rinse greens and place in a dish drainer to dry. Wrap leaves in two thicknesses of paper towels. There's a rumor that wrapping a head of lettuce in paper towels: then plunging it in a brown paper sack and refrigerating will keep it from rusting, but this is passed on more as a research project than a tip.

Broccoli is always a good buy and usable in many dishes. Cut stems close to flowerets before storing. Use stems to make a broccoli soup - a great meal starter hot or cold. Simmer broccoli stems in seasoned chicken broth; cool, then puree mixture in a blender. Return it to the pan and add cream, a dash of nutmeg and a bit of grated onion. Serve with croutons

Storing potatoes can be tricky. You know that if they have greenish spots or areas, they've been picked before they're ripe. If you're in doubt, rub skin with a rough polishing cloth. If skin comes off easily, potatoes will be bitter. Cook them and freeze them cooked, or eat right away. Don't store fruits near potatoes, cabbage or turnips. They exchange gases and this could affect taste. Onions should also be stored in a cool, dry spot. They can be hung in strings from a kitchen rafter, but not too long or they absorb cooking odors and also dry out.

Rose growers have been known to disagree about what's the best kind, size, color and style of their favorite flower Such disagreements pale compared to their hot and heavy discussions of how to protect roses for winter. Wow!

The new rosarian can become bewildered and confused. One way to avoid the crossfire is to talk to your county extension agent, or governmental horticultural source, or university expert. One of them is bound to know, or will offer to find out, as these folks are generally agreeable.

To save your precious roses, do what they recommend. They may tell you to mulch with hay, straw or leaves and let'em go if winters are mild. Or, they could recommend "burying" the plant. This is age-old, in-the-ground protection for roses in severely cold climates. Dig a shallow trench the length of the plant; dig up roots gently on one side only; Lay plant on its side and hold it in place in the trench with a wooden cross brace (2 boards nailed together to form an X). Mound earth over. Victorians protected all plants this way. Roses are also burlap

wrapped and covered with earth. Canes have to be pruned first, then straw mounded around the plant. Climbers and bush roses are often wrapped against the elements. Naturally, roses planted in sheltered areas - close to walls around buildings, trees and in protected beds need less winterizing than those out in the open. And you can buy "rose caps," cone-shaped styrofoam protectors that look like rocket nose cones planted in your soil. They're inexpensive and said to be effective.

Whatever, do ask around of experts about protecting your beloved roses and don't get caught in the neighborhood "rose wars



sideration for the collector. A collectable car in "Excellent" condition will bring twice the price of one judged to be in "Good" condition (as determined by experts using strict guidelines).

Unlike some other collectables, cars are not marked down for restoration. A complete restoration to near original condition, using genuine parts and accessories, can transform a worthless rusted hulk into a \$20,000 collector's item. (Never mind that it cost nearly that much in time and materials to restore it!)

Trends in car collecting are hard to predict, tied as they are to passing fads and fancies. There's no accounting for taste, of course, and even the old horsecollar-grille Edsel has its fan club.

Prices are also hard to pin down, since so much depends on condition and market demand of the day. Suffice it to say that one should never buy a collectable car at any price without the opportunity to have it checked out by a trusted mechanic. To get some rough idea of current market prices, see The Official Price Guide to Collector Cars, compiled by Kruse Classic Auction Co. for The House of Collectables, Orlando, Fla.

The three major types of collectable cars, already mentioned, are antique. classic and milestone. Antique cars are those produced prior to 1925. Classics are certain models produced from 1925-1948, so designated by the Classic Car Club of America. Milestones are models built after 1945 and so designated by the members of the Milestone Car Society.
