Girls Publishing 'Everyday Paper'

You have to live on the right street and in the right block if you are going to get your name in Spearman's third and newest newspaper.

The exclusive and newsy five-day a week paper began publishing on July 11, with editors, printers and circulation managers Debbie and Dixie Sheppard and Marcia Larson pecking out their first copy of the "Everyday Paper" on a typewriter.

This first issue contained a crossword puzzle, two news items, a joke and Rory's news.

Hunt and peck typing was rather slow and limited the

rather slow and limited the circulation. It would take the three girls all day to peck out three or four copies.

Mothers, Mrs. Bert Sheppard and Mrs. Marcus Larson did not think the project would last long. Especially when the girls stayed up until 1 a.m. typing one edition

because of increased sales.

Instead increased sales demanded more and faster equipment, so the girls now have a box of ditto jelly for making ditto copies. They hand-letter a ditto carbon, transfer the copy to the jelly and print copies.

Circulation is now l4 to 15 copies per day, Just about everyone on the block takes the paper and some buy more than one. The price is three cents per copy.

A problem is facing the circulation department. The J. L. Brocks have moved across fown to the Blodgett and Linn Addition. They were the best customen, sometimes buying three copies, so the girls are working on a delivery plan to keep the Brocks on the circulation list.

There is no credit and no subscriptions. The girls take their papers and "bank", a large tin can, from door to door on the block. Prospective customers drop three cents in the bank, then get

a paper.
Gathering news is no big problem for the three "crusading editors". They gather the news as they deliver the papers. The best news source is the neighborhood children.
When they started the new feature "Meet Your Neighbors", a short history on each family, the girls did not

bors", a short history on each family, the girls did not bother to interview the first family Mr. and Mrs. Earl Archer, they interviewed the son, Robert.

The regular feature is Rory's News. The girls collect this simply by writing up Dixie and Debbie's baby brother's baby talk which goes something like this:

"Ahh alawone ache abu."

One day the paper carried the item that Rory was asleep so there is no news.

Debbie is the printer for the paper. Dixie and Marcia, fourth graders, have been writing so long in school they have forgotten how to print, but Debbie, being a third grader remembers well how it is done.

Like all newspapers, the "Everyday Paper" has had its troubles. The girls had to suspend publication for a few days when the typewriter broke down and the ditto



Texas' Tourist Attractions Show Big Increase Over Last Year

Despite unusually prolonged rains, attendance at tourist attractions across the state rose 14 per cent during the first half of 1965 over the

same period last year.
The Texas Tourist Develop ment Agency, which took the mid-year survey, said 14,069,333 visitors were counted in the first six months by the 18 attractions and the state parks. The count was 12,347,101 during the first half of 1964.

Attractions that keep a record of the out-of-state portion of their attendance told TTDA that segment of their business was up nearly 25 per cent in the first half.

Although attendance -cut-ting rain was mentioned freting rain was mentioned frequently by reporting attractions, particularly those oriented to the outdoors, a dry July was said to be producing visitors by the drove. In fact, most operators mentioned brisk early July business as heralding a second half even brighter than the

Largest single increase the first half was reported by the Fort Davis National Historic Site in far West Texas. Although still undergoing re-storation, the historic frontier fort attracted 48,612 visitors, nearly 16,000 more than in the first half of 1964 for a 48.8 per cent gain.

Supt. Michael Becker told TTDA his June business alone

was 59 per cent greater than the same month last year. Significantly, another storied military post at the opposite end of the state accounted for the second largest increase during the period.
The Old Stone Fort at Nacogdoches, deep in East Texas, recorded a 46.3 per cent gain with 12,553 visitors.

Old Stone Fort too reported the heaviest increase in out-of-state attendance, 53.1 per cent. Its visitors came from 33 states and seven foreign countries.

Big Bend National Park ran-ked third in attendance gains, up 41.9 per cent for the first

half with 78,758 guests. Supt Perry E. Brown told TTDA accommodations within the park overflowed during the Easter weekend and April attendance generally was 62 per cent above the same

month last year.

"Already this year we are less than 40,000 visitors shy of last year's total attendance of 120,000," Brown said.

Rounding out the top four attractions in terms of in-

attractions in terms of increased patronage was still another fort, this time in El Paso. The replica of original Fort Bliss attracted 23,464 visitors, nearly half of them from outside Texas, for a 26.4 per cent increase.

Largest volume of guests was reported by Texas' 56 state parks. The host Texas Parks and Wildlife Department counted 4,706,710 visitors, up 25.8 per cent over the first six months of last year last year.

Second largest volume was handled by sprawling Lake Texoma on the Texas-Okla. border. Its 3,972,700 visitors represented a 16.9 per cent increase over last year's first

The Southwestern Historical Wax Museum in Dallas' Fair Park was up 20.7 per cent with 74,365 guests.

Crossing the two causeways onto Padre Island were 1,382,904 visitors, an increase of 19.4 per cent. The John F. Kennedy Causeway onto the northern end of the island at Corous Christi reported more Corpus Christi reported more persons, 771,340, for an 18.7 per cent gain. Queen Isabella Causeway at the island's southern tip (Port Isabel) counted 611,564 visitors. Its percentage gain boxes. percentage gain, however, was 20.1 per cent.






