## Swimmers end successful season on winning note

Young swimmers of Spearman were out to end a highly successful season on a winning note Saturday when they competed in their league meet. (Results were not available at press time).

Spearman Swim Club participates in the West Kansas Swim League. Which is an A.A.U. sponsored league. The league is made up of 11 teams and approximately 350 young people under 18 years old.

The Spearman Club is made up of 38 youth, and "one very energetic and dedicated coach Jed, Miesner," according to parents of the young swim club members.

"The club has a lot of very young swimmers, which we feel is the basis for a very successful club in the future," a spokesman for the parents added.

This year they have earned 69 first

place medals, 68 second place, 46 third place, 35 4th place, 41 5th place, 27 6th place and has consistently placed in the top four in team total points.

Swimming is an individual sport as well as a team sport. The Spearman Club stresses the team attitude to their swimmers, as can be seen in the success in their relay teams.

They have won many gold medals and have established new pool records in several towns.

"The means of financially supporting our club is our annual Swim-A-Thon, and donations from various organizations, and individuals," the spokesman said.

Expenses include A.A.U. memberships as individuals and team entry fees into meets, WKSL dues and insurance fee, business supplies, traveling expenses and socials.

The 1983 schedule included seven meets, which started June 7, and ended July 23. Which was their league meet.

Long distant races and individual medleys were swam on Friday and all other events were swam on Saturday. Results of the league meet were not available at presstime.

Requirements to join the swim team are simply the cost of a team suit, a Y.M.C.A. membership or participation fee and the ability to swim one length of the pool.

## 84th District Court

Two men were brought before the bench on criminal charges in 84th District Court this past week.

Richard Allen Beaudette, 23, entered a guilty plea to charges of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. District Judge J.E. Blackburn meted out a five year's probation sentence to Beaudette, with a stipulation that Beaudette make \$3,000 restitution, according to Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin.

William Clifton Allen, 21, of Amarillo was ruled guilty of probation violation on an original charge of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, but Judge Blackburn released Allen because he had already served a full year in county jail, McFarlin said.

Sheriff McFarlin said there are 11 cases on the docket for defendants facing criminal charges to appear and enter pleas when the court convenes on Aug. 15.

Max Banks, owner of Baker & Taylor gave the sum as a reward for the arrest of a suspect and quick recovery of an antique dining room suite belonging to Ruby Banks, reported taken in an alleged theft of Baker & Taylor property.

# POLICE REPORT:

### ARMY NATIONAL GUARD NEWS & NOTES

One of the clothing stores on the north side of main sold some risque T-shirts to students. We teachers got together for a little fun. Garland Head called the owner Guy???. I can't recall his name, and said the kids were sent home to change shirts. A female teacher called the owner, pretending to be the mother of a student sent home, complaining that she would never buy another thing in his store. He apologized and offered to return the money for the shirts. The store owner, a nice guy, was quite upset. He was most happy when he was told it was only a gag.

Once I was sitting next to Dr. Kleeberger in Sparkie's Cafe. Someone was on his opposite side. Some jerk goosed the doctor. Wham! He swung both arms back and cleared the seats on either side of him. Both of us ended up lying on the deck. Luckily, neither of us required a doctor's attention. A word to the wise, "goosy people can be very dangerous." Many cannot control their emotions.
