This crew, in addition to Manager Bill Shipman, includes James D. Jones, Carrie Jean Bowen and Darren Lynn





Re-elected to the North Plains board of directors were Robert C. Ferguson of District 2, Lyndon Imke, representing District 4 and Charles E. Brown, of District 5. "Our revenues must be adequate to maintain financial ratios along with a reasonable equity position that will keep our cooperative financially healthy and ac-

ceptable. Finally," the board president

said, "our rates must also provide revenue

Nearly 425 persons attended Monday of cooperative ownership and operation." In his manager's report, Pat McAlister told the audience that during the 12 months Cooperative. The crowd enjoyed a barbeque of 1982, the cooperative lost over 300 poles to tornadoes and equipment was damaged by

"The latest financial forecast shows the need for an increase in base rates for 1963 in order to meet the ratios required by our lenders. We are currently doing a rate study to determine the revenue requirements. When this is completed, it will be filed with the Public Utility Commission.'

The cooperative manager also noted that the wholesale power contract with Southwestern Public Service Co. expired in October. The expiration resulted in a 30.9 per cent increase in wholesale power rates, which is passed on to members in the form of a power cost adjustment.

There was some good news in the way of a treasurer's report from Harold Kershaw. Assets of the cooperative now stand at \$23.95 million. In 1982, the cooperative sold electric energy amounting to \$6.73 million and showed a net profit of \$370,200. Electric power cost was the main expense item for the year. amounting to \$4.2 million.





The principal objective will be to increase the number of young stamp collectors by concentrating on improving public awareness of the hobby and its benefits, such as learning about the people, places and events that have shaped the history of the United States, the Postal Service noted.

EXEMPTIONS

There are two important points to remember when applying for any exemption on your

(1) All property owners apply through the Hansford County Appraisal District Office.

(2) The amount of each exemption (how much it's worth to you in value) is determined by your locally elected officials (school boards, city councils, commissioners' courts, state

The appraisal district provides applications for exemptions at 13 W. Kenneth Spearman, You may call 659-5575 and ask that an application be sent you by mail.

New application is required when you change residence or become eligible for the first time.

Time to apply for exemptions is after January 1 and before May 1. *Schools must exempt at least \$5,000 of value from your homestead and an additional \$10,000

or more for people 65 years of age or older and for disabled persons. *Every individual is entitled to a general homestead exemption on that property he owns and occupies as his principal residence. Different taxing units (cities, schools and counties) may grant various amounts on the homestead exemption. Your homestead exemptions is valuable tax relief. Make certain you have on file at Hansford County Appraleal District: your application for the homestead exemption which entitles you to receive whatever amount your city, school

*if you are 65 years of age or older you are eligible for the 65 and Over homestead exemption that also entitles you to receive the "school tax freeze". Begun in 1979, the school tax freeze, as it has come to be called, means your school taxes won't increase after you have been granted the exemption unless you change residence or you make improvements to your home. Remember! The tax "freeze" only applies to school taxes, and you automatically receive the

"freeze" when you are granted the 65 and Over exemption.
*Some taxing units grant exemptions to disabled persons. Amounts vary from jurisdiction to

*All taxing units must grant exemption to disabled veterans. The amount of the exemption is established by the State Legislature. Disabled veterans must apply annually

RENDITIONS

Renditions must be filed: (1) for all tangible personal property used for the production of income; or (2) on any other taxable property if required by the chief appraiser. Renditions are annually and may be rendered after January 1st and by May 2.

Rendition statements (available through the Handerd County Appended District) should be filed with the chief appraiser of the appraisal district where the taxable property is located.

AG-USE LAND VALUES

If the land you own is being used for agricultural purposes, you may be eligible for tax relief on your property. Qualified landowners have the option of applying for agricultural or open-space land valuation on their property if they apply after January 1 and before May 2nd.

The legal basis for agricultural use valuation is found in the Texas Constitution Article VIII. Sec. 1-d and 1-d-1.

Ag land tax relief deadline May 2

Is the land you own being used for agricultural purposes? If it is, then you may be eligible for tax relief on that

property.

According to Alice Peddy, chief appraiser of the Hansford County Appraisal District, landowners have the option of applying either for agricultural-use valuation or for openspace land valuation of their property.

Applications must be filed by May 2 this year for any property to receive agricultural-use valuation, or for open-space land valuation on property that did not receive that type of appraisal in 1982. Two constitutional amend-

ments permit taxation of land on its agricultural-use, productivity, value, Mrs. Peddy said. "This means that taxes would be assessed against the productive value of the land instead of what the land would sell for in the open market," she explained.

Mrs. Peddy noted that the legal basis for special land appraisal is found in the Texas Constitution, Art. VIII, Secs. 1-d and 1-d-1. The two types of land and valuation are commonly called "ag-use" or "1-d" and "open-space" or "1-d-1", the chief appraiser

that the land must be owned by "a natural person," not a corporation, partnership, agency or organization; the land must have been devoted exclusively to agricultural use for at least three years before the year application is first made, and the agricultural business conducted on the land must be the owner's primary occupation and source

of income.

Also, the chief appraiser must determine that the landowner qualifies and must approve the application, and the owner has to file a sworn statement each year he applies, attesting to the land's agricultural use.

For the other type of land valuation, 1-d-1 open-space, the land may be owned by a corporation or partnership and so on, and the agricultural business need not be the principle business of the ownlands and ecological laboratories are eligible for 1-d-1 appraisal.

However, the land must be involved in a qualifying agricultural use to the degree of intensity generally accepted in the area; it must have been devoted principally to a qualifying use for at least five of the past seven years, and, again, the chief appraiser must approve the application.

Once an application for 1-d-1 valuation is filed with the chief appraiser and approved, a landowner is not required to submit another application as long as the land qualifies, unless the chief appraiser requests another application to confirm current qualification.

Mrs. Peddy also explained that the possibility for a "rollback tax" exists under either form of special land valuation. This liability for additional tax is created under 1-d valuation by either a change in ownership or a change in use of the land, and it extends back three years before the year of the change.

Under 1-d-1, a rollback is triggered by change in use to a nonagricultural purpose that would not qualify for productivity valuation. Taxes are recaptured for five years before the year of the change.

The additional tax is measured, Mrs. Peddy said, by the difference between taxes paid under productivity valuation provisions and the taxes which would have been paid if the land had been put on the tax roll at market value.

More information and application forms are available from the local appraisal office. Personnel there will be able to assist landowners with the information necessary for determining if their property qualifies for the program.

Are you a veteran with a service-connected disability, or a surviving spouse or a minor child of a deceased disabled veteran or of a person who was killed while on active

Someone who fits any one or more of these descriptions may be eligible for a property tax exemption which can amount to \$1,500 to \$3,000 or more, according to Alice Peddy, chief appraiser of the Hansford County Appraisal District

District.

"But an application has to be filed by May 2 with the appraisal office," Mrs. Peddy said, "for anyone to receive the exemption for this tax

The chief appraiser noted that the Texas Constitution permits the Legislature to provide a property tax exemption on property owned by a disabled veteran or surviving spouse or minor child of a deceased disabled veteran.

Those listed by Mrs. Peddy as eligible to qualify for the exemption are:

---a disabled veteran;
---a surviving spouse of a deceased disabled veteran, as long as the spouse remains unmarried;

---a surviving child of a deceased disabled veteran, if the veteran's spouse does not survive the veteran and if the child is both under 18 and unmarried.

---a surviving spouse of a person who was killed while on active duty, whether the spouse is remarried or not at the time of application;

---a surviving minor child of a person who was killed while on active duty, if there is no surviving spouse and the child is both under 18 and unmarried.

Mrs. Peddy said that qualifications for each applicant are explained further in the Texas Property Tax Code and in pamphlets published by the State Property Tax Board. Appraisal district personnel can also provide information on specific qualifications.

Deadline near for vets, survivors

In order to qualify, a person must be a Texas resident. The amount of the exemption, Mrs. Peddy said, is based on the percentage of the veteran's disability. An individual may be entitled to an exemption ranging from \$1,500 to \$3,000 from the assessed value of any property owned on

January 1 of the tax year.

The exemption may also be applied to any one piece of property which the applicant designates, such as a home, taxable personal property or any other property owned on January 1.

Mrs. Peddy emphasized that applications must be filed or a renewal signed each year with the chief appraiser; this year the application deadline is May 2. On the application,

the individual must designate the single piece of property which will receive the exemp-

tion.

The applicant may be required to present documents which state the percentage of service-connected disability which are provided by the Veteran's Administration or by a branch of the armed services. Depending on the applicant, proof of marriage, death or age may also be required.
