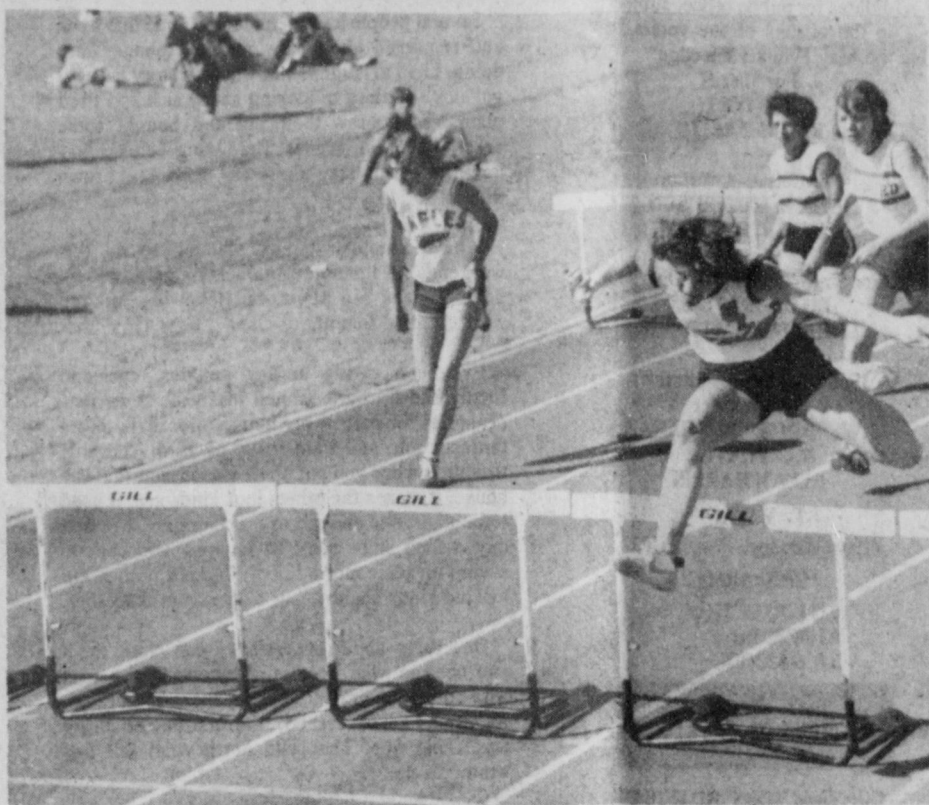



**KEEPING RECORDS**

As time goes by, the insurance file in the office of some firms keeps growing. Policies, premium notices, etc. keep accumulating until drawer after drawer is filled. The company owner might well ask himself "How long do I have to keep this material?"

There is really no definite, pat answer to that question. It's a matter of judgement on the owner's part. If he feels that something MIGHT come up in the future regarding an old policy -- a question about a claim or settlement, for example -- it would probably be a good idea to keep the policy and data for perhaps a year.

If a decision is made to dispose of out-of-date insurance

material, it's a good idea to keep some basic records. This would include name of insurance company, policy number, date of issue, date of expiration, and data on claims (if any) that were filed. This information could be of vital importance if a problem were to come up years later concerning an accident or other peril for which the firm might be accused of being liable.
