I have been on crusades in years gone by but this time is the only time I have felt the need to write about the experience. This was my first trip to India. This was sponsored by International Crusades in Dallas, Texas. The invitation for this crusade came from the Indian Christians.

While the government of India does not grant visas to preach and teach the gospel, through this type of ministry thousands have been won to Christ. God indeed has given an open door in India through Crusade ministry. Let us remember the 730 million souls in that sub-continent of Asia.

Now let us start that long, long journey half way around the world... Virginia and I with our dear friends Larry Miller, Gene and Jo Fletcher, Sharon Seagler from Gruver left Amarillo January 24. Later in the day as our plane approached J.F.K. airport all three airports in New York were closed due to bad weather. Our plane was diverted to Norfolk, Virginia. We spent a couple hours there until the J.F.K. airport reopened. Crusaders from all over the U.S. make and Canada arrived late because of this reason. Some couldn't make it. The flight from New York started 5 hours late. We had a stop in Frankfurt, Germany and continued on the same PanAm 747 to Delhi. Here we had to spend the night because of missed connections. Next morning we continued to Hyderbad, capital of Andgra Pradesh State. This was the main base of our operations.

Vijayawada, Vishakhapatnam, and Warrangel were cities other groups were sent. We had about 70 people working in over 30 churches and congregations. The Spearman-Gruver group with 20 more were sent to Vishakhapatnam. This is a port city on the east coast of India.

Before I write about our activities, let me introduce you to India. India, with over 730 million people, has the largest population of any democracy in the world. Only Communist China exceeds it. One out of every sixth person lives in India. It is ruled by a parliamentary government. Politically it could be considered left of the center. Russian Communists through their many investments in India have a great influence there. Of course, the county which has helped the most is the United States, but you don't hear much about that. When the Russians ruthlessly shot down the South Korean play killing 269 people the whole free world joined in protest, but India stayed silent, not wanting to offend the 'comrades" in the Kremlin.

It is impossible to describe India. If there is any country in the world where extremes are in evidence all the time it is India. When one of the first American tourists, Mark Twian, visited India at the beginning of this century he wrote: "There is only one India, a wonderland of fabulous wealth and fabulous poverty, of splendor and rags". A young African who visited the modern India wrote: "Too many people, too many animals, too many customs, too many gods, too much of everything." It surprised the young African to find out that there are three times more people in India alone than in all the continent of Africa.

The way of India is contradictory, confusing, elusive by any description or analysis. Prime Minister Indira Gandhi said: "No statement about India is wholly true." Neru said: "India is a bundle of centuries in which the cow and the tractor march together." That is the way I feel as I report on India. The extremes there are unbelievable and no human being can describe correctly what India is really like.

A real description of the religions of India would be impossible. I will try to give some general facts. 85% of the people are Hindu and they worship millions of gods. Hindus are divided into an endless variety of groups, sects and divisions. There are Budhists (Buddha was born here), Jaines, Sikhs and many sub divisions. There are the Moslems that represent 10% of the population. The third largest are the Christians, between 10-12 million. No one knows exactly how many. This is a very small percentage, but their influence goes far beyond these numbers. Hundreds and even thousands of schools and hospitals and dispensaries have been built by them. Many in the Government have graduated from them. The largest Christian group is in Kerala in the extreme south. The beginnings of the Christianity here goes back to the Apostie Thomas who, according to tradition came to India. When the Portuguese navigator Vasco de Gama arrived there in around 1500, he found all these Christians who had never heard of the Pope. It is a very interesting story.

Evangelical missions has a glorious history in India. It all started with that dedicated British cobbler William Cary, who had felt God's call to go to India. He is known as the father of the modern missionary movement. He expected and attempted great things for God..." The story of William is one of great sacrifice, sufferings and great accomplishments for God, for humanity and lost souls in India. Sickness, loss of friends, destruction by



New switching equipment placed in service March 15

SUMMARY: Long distance telephone network being expanded to allow Spearman customers to dial all toll calls, including operator handled. Also directory assistance number changes.

New switching equipment that will enable Spearman telephone customers to dial all of their own long distance telephone calls, including operator assisted calls, will be placed in service Thursday, March 15, according to Bob Meyers, Perryton Operators Manager for General Telephone.

Also, in order to reach directory assistance, customers must dial 1 +411 for local numbers and 1+ area code (if different) +555-1212 for other communities.

The new system will expand the current customer dialed station-tostation (1+) capability to include all operator assisted (0+) long distance calls such as collect, third number billing, credit card and person-toperson.

Meyers said there will be no changes in the existing 1+ dialing procedures, adding that 1+ calls are the least expensive way to call long distance.

Equipment is being added to Spearman's local switch which "talks" to a new computerized system at Guymon that makes the new services possible. Customer information including dialing instructions and other helpful details

will be sent to customers in their bills.

Meyers said a customer dialing an operator assisted call will dial the digit 0 plus the area code of the distant city (if different from 806) plus the seven digit number of the customer being called.

After the customer has completed dialing the call, an operator will come on the line to determine and perform the type of service desired-time and charges, collect, credit card, third billing, person-to-person. The equipment will then automatically record the number of one-party customers as well as send the call to its destination. At the same time, the call will be timed and billed, all without further assistance from the operator.

Party line customers can also direct dial all of their long distance calls using the 1 + or 0 + methods, but the operator will come on the line to ask for their number after the customer has completed dialing the call.

Meyers said a customer can still reach an operator for any type of special assistance by dialing "9 Operator" and waiting a brief period until the operator answers.

Meyers said the advantages of dialing your own operator assisted calls are speed and convenience.

Area tarmers place in production contest

Kelm, Plainview, placed third in the 1983 Texas state irrigated corn yield contest sponsored by the National Corn Growers Association

(NCGA). (1 12 Marble harvested 236.29 bushels per acre and Kelm harvested 224.82 bushels per acre. Both farmers planted Paymaster 8990. Producers entering the NCGA contest must enter a

minimum 10-acre field and yields must be verified by outside parties. MARBLE'S CONTEST field was planted April 11 at 32,000 plants per acre.

Applications of 275 pounds of dry fertilizer and 300 pounds of anhydrous ammonia were applied to the furrow-irrigated field. The field was harvested Sept. 29.

Marble's operation includes corn, cotton, wheat and potatoes. Last year Frito-Lay purchased the corn from about 150 acres. "This year we've con-

tracted to raise about 400 acres of corn for Frito-Lay" said Marble. "We get a premium for the grain, but it requires more management. Corn must meet certain quality standards for hardness and it cannot be harvested until it is less than 22 percent moisture in the field. This means that you must select hybrids that have good standability since they are often harvested later in the fall. This year we'll raise 250 acres of Paymaster 8990 and 150 acres of Paymaster 398, a white corn, to meet the requirements of the Frito-

Lay contract." MARBLE HAS always managed for high yields because "that has been the best way to lower my per-unit production costs.' However, he said in-

Max Marble, Hart, creasing irrigation energy placed first, and Jerry costs eventually may force him to reduce the number of total yearly irrigations.

Marble strives to obtain better-than-average market prices by selling corn to food processors and area feedlots and by utilizing on-farm storage. Marble's wife, Evelyn, handles much of the operation's book work. With the high cost of irrigation and other production costs, it's not enough to just produce a good crop," she said. "You've got to explore many options to market the crop at the most profitable level possible."

Kelm also planted Paymaster 8990 in his contest field. The field was planted April 15 and was harvested Sept. 25.

KELM APPLIED 200 pounds of dry fertilizer and 347 pounds of anhydrous ammonia per acre. The fertilizer was applied preplant. Herbicides and insecticides were applied and the field was cultivated

"The crop was furrowirrigated nine times because of the dry summer," said Kelm. "It was a difficult year because it was wetter than usual in the spring and planting was delayed. Then the summer was extremely hot. Hail also damaged much of my corn, but damage was slight on the contest field," he said.

Kelm plants corn, cotton and wheat. "I planted about 40 acres of Bounty hybrid wheat last fall so I'm anxious to see how it yields this summer," he said. "It seems to have a lot of potential."

Back to Carl Archer-possibly summer of 1936-at Stafford Hall. It was so hot, Carl was in his upstairs corner room, asleep in the nude. I sneaked quietly, closed his windows, shut off his fan; turned on the heat, and wired his door shut.

It did not take long for him to break out-soaking wet.

Over 10 years later, after spending almost 5 years in the navy from New Yealand to Hawaii and many islands in between-from New Caledonia to New York City to Columbia U. Mikshipmen school from New York City to Monteuideo. up and the South American Coast from Curacao, to Monterudeo; later from Norfolk, Va., to Wakaynea Japan, by the way of Guam and Okinawa; from Annapolis, Maryland to Denmark, Sweeden, Scotland, England, Cuba and off Pureto Rico and returning to the port of Norfolk aboard the USS New Jersey, I got a job teaching in Spearman. Each of us plays a "role in our families. A role is simply a set of behaviors that others expect of us and we expect of ourselves. Family roles tend to define our family responsibilities.

Roles can vary, depending upon the kind of family, their situation and stage in life. For example, the role of a singleparent father will probably be different from the father whose wife is a full-time homemaker.

Family relations experts tell us that in strong families--no matter what type--members are generally satisfied with their roles. When a member is not satisfied, it produces family stress.

Some employed women, for example, attempt to continue doing everything they did as full-time homemakers. The employed woman who tries to cook, sew and keep up the garden and house without assistance may find this "superwoman" role impossible.

Role dissatisfaction doesn't always result from self-expectations. A man who is laid off from his job, for instance, may find that he dislikes being expected to be a "househusband," even though it is a temporary situation.

Role problems can create tensions and resentment among family members.

But in a strong family, members learn to be flexibleeither to adjust the role expectations that cause them problems, or to adjust to the role and get the most out of it. Family members talk out their expectations about each other's responsibilities and help each person find a role that is suitable and satisfying.

In single-parent families, or families where both parents work, for instance, members have had to change expectatins about who does what. Older children and teenagers have learned to take on re-

cleaning or other chores that were traditionally done for them by their parents.

A role change imposed from the outside also requires adjustment. In strong families, members help each other adjust by finding new and meaningful responsibilities.

A newly retired husband, for example, can learn to do more household tasks with his wife, and she can learn to let him share in those chores. He may also need to find new roles by engaging in volunteer activities, expanding hobby activities, or developing new interests.

Strong families seem to anticipate the role changes that come with different stages of life or circumstances and learn how they can best deal with them EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS

Our Missionary Trip to India

fire of valuable manuscripts-translations: no visible means of support all go together with the name of William Cary. Today 200 years later, his name is revered and respected far and wide. Just to mention the unbelievable accomplished by this man, the translation of the Bible in 36 languages including the Telegu language spoken in the part of India where he worked.

As I check notes I see the three groups left Hyderbad, January 28th. One group headed for Vijayawada. It was a tough ride in an old wreck of a bus on a very rough road. The trip was delayed for three hours because of a van-bus wreck blocking the road. 13 people were killed. I guess no one knows how many are killed in the road accidents. Papers usually only mention when wrecks kill many people. While we were there, in the state of Punjab, 80 people perished from an overcrowded bus which plunged in a canal. It took three days to locate the bus. As the group continued over India, there were farms, villages, animals; people plowing with water buffaloes, people planting rice while wading through deep mud.

When the bus would stop in a village, the Indian mass of people admired the funny looking palefaces.

As you travel the roads it is a lifetime experience. There is a believable commotion on the roads. Looks like that every living creature from humans to animals is there...trucks, ox, carts, auto, rickshaws. bicycles, taxis, water buffaloes, goats, dogs, human beings of all sizes, ages and colors, etc., mixing in an ever moving array. It is indescribable. The vehicles whiz around each other like a dreadful fairy tale or better yet,-like in a nightmare. Crowds of half naked children, women enveloped in their flowing saris carrying shining waterpots on their heads and usually going in groups; young and old men wrapped in their white sheets-dothies. Much color, much noise, much filth, much smell....

The greatest majority of the Indians, about 70%, make their living in agriculture and live in villages. No one can claim that he knows India, if he has not been with the people in the villages. We think of a village as a few hundred people, but in India villages can have as many as 15000 people. Let me give you a description of a village. The individual dwelling places are mud huts with thatched roofs either from grass or palm leaves. They are close together with walks between them. Some of these may be wide enough for a taxi to squeeze through. The hut itself is a one room affair, possibly with an entrance part which is under the roof as well. Sometimes the

cooking is done there, or on the path or inside the hut. There may be a water buffalo chewing his cud by the hut, maybe a goat or two or a dog. Cats are seldom seen, they belong to the lowest "caste" of animals and no one wants to be reincarnated in a cat. (If a cat crosses the street or road, the whole traffic will stop for a short moment.) There are some chickens, or if water is available, some ducks. People own small plots of land around the village and that is where they spend their days. Also in the central location of the village there are water wells around which there is always lots of activity.

Many of the teams traveled from Hyderbad by train. Train travel is very important in India. They have the best railroad system in this part of Asia. Millions travel that way. The railroad station in every city is one of the very busiest spots. As our people traveled into the central railroad station, sights were seen that they had never seen before. Every available space in that huge building, including the stairs was filled with masses of sleeping people. Hundreds and hundreds of persons lying side by side were everywhere. They were not just waiting for trains, this is where they found shelter. It is hard to describe that sight, you have to see it.

I was impressed as I watched the Indian women. You see them everywhere, always busy, always working. Some of them doing hard jobs. They carry heavy loads of brick and morter at the construction jobs. A sight that one sees daily are the women sweeping, bent over hour after hour, pushing litter along the streets with a brush-broom of twigs bound together. Those women are gracefully draped from head to toe with long silk or cotton saris skillfully arranged in folds. Those who work in the fields, by the seashore or at the building projects gather up flowing material above their knees. Some of the saris leave the middle section bare. That type is worn mostly in modern social functions. The stewardesses on Indian airlines wear that type. They may be against miniskirts not to show their legs, but they don't mind showing their tummies, navel and all.

Indians have a great respect not only for animals, but also birds. I saw several buildings marked Bird hospital sponsored by Jaines sect of Hindus." This is the most fanatic sect of Hindus. Their "holy men" wear a little piece of cloth in front of their mouth so they wouldn't by accident inhale some insect and kill it by swallowing it. When their priests walk around the temples, they use a little broom and sweep

the path before them, so they wouldn't step on some tiny insect and thus take it's life. It sounds good until one observes the undernourished, sickly-looking children and hears of the lack of the medical care for the people, especially in the villages. When a wandering cow stops at a vegetable stand to get a mouth full of greens, the owner gently pushes the 'sacred cow' away, but when a hungry child tries to get something for his empty tummy, then there is a real yelling and

Visakhapatnam is a sea port on the Bay of Bengal and a very busy one. It's a natural harbor. We saw big ocean freighters being loaded and unloaded. It is also an industrial center. The air is very thick with pollution. It is hot because of the high humidity and low altitude, just a few feet above sea level. They told us there were 900 thousand people living in Visakhapatnam. I think they were all on the streets. As Virginia and Larry Miller and I traveled 5 miles from the hotel to our church twice each day we realized the prayers that were being answered in our behalf. We traveled in a three-wheeled scouter taxi. It would weave in and out of traffic with no respect for the other party. The 5 mile trip cost \$1.50 for the three of us. The church we were working with was well prepared for us as we worked among them. We made three homes in the mornings and three visits in the afternoons. Church services would last from 6 until 8 each evening. When we arrived at the hotel we were mentally and physically exhausted. This did not really matter because we had seen a day of God working in a great and mighty way.

The homes we were in each day were very simple poor homes of a believer. The lady of the house would invite mostly Hindu neighbors telling them some American Christian people would be there to tell them the most important thing that they would ever hear about in their lives. Many of them had never heard of a man named Jesus Christ. I counted as many as 50 people in a room about 12 by 12 feet. Women and children would be sitting on mats on a dirt floor and some had been waiting for 2 hours. Since so many were women, Virginia would tell first what Christ had done in her life and he would do the same in their life. Brother Larry Miller from Gruver would close telling them through an interpretor the simple plan of salvation. As Larry would ask how many wanted this new life almost 90% of the group would raise their hands. Many would walk miles each evening for the services and make the decision public. We did not count the decisions made in the home but a conservative estimate would be 500 to 700 people. We did record the number that gave us names in the church

and we have over 200 names. My job was to preach some times on the street. Many times I would use by feeble music ability in the home or church. Everything that was presented to them was soaked up like a

As the group of 70 American Crusaders came together for a victory rally there was

over 6000 recorded decisions. How can one assess this particular Crusade? It was quite different from the average Crusade in Latin America. Here we were confronted with the Eastern pagan religions. This is totally different where: Catholicism is predominate. These Hindus worship millions of gods and they know nothing of the Living God. Under the British rule they had seen that traditional, formal religion with no heart in it. They did not want that...Then, think about the tremendous number of them, over 730 million, almost three times more than the United States. What a fantastic challenge! It baffles one's mind.

Then, since the Bible teaching, preaching missionaries are not allowed in India, this type of Crusade ministry is the only way for outsiders to get the message of salvation.

In a closing word about those who went to help there. I worked with them, I watched them, I listened to their joys and sorrows, and I would say they are the choices of God's servants...All the sacrifices they made to go on this trip, the long hours walking the dusy paths and village lanes. Going from door to door sharing their testimony and God's wonderful plan of salvation. The daily exposure to poverty, filth and disease. Broken hearted, but faithfully carying on and sowing the Precious seed. What a blessing it is to have the privilege of working with them. Those people represent the churches that do the mission work, not just by proxy, by praying


WANTED was the big burger without cheese. So the order-taker was asked the price of a large burger without cheese. The answer was that one had to pay for the cheese whether he got it or not!

helped draft the Constitution of Tennessee. Jackson was president for two terms, 1829-1837. James Madison, fourth U.S. president, was born at

Port Conway, Virginia, on the 16th in 1751. Madison steered the nation through the War of 1812 with England successfully (having been Secretary of State before becoming president). He helped found the

University of Virginia. Grover Cleveland, the only president to serve two terms interspaced with four years out of office, was the 22nd and 24th president, being born on the 18th in Caldwell, New Jersey, in 1837.

Cleveland was a man of character, in political life a statesman of principle.

Having opposed the free coinage of silver he left office in 1897 somewhat unpopular but time vindicated

John Tyler, 10th U.S. president, was born at Greenway, Virginia, on the 29th in 1790. Tyler was the first vice president to move into the White House because of the death of a president, William Henry Harrison, in 1841.

He broke with the Whigs, however, and was not renominated by them in 1844. He voted for secession years later when Virginia seceded from the Union. He was elected to the Confederate House, but died

book, Kahn On Codes. Published by MacMillan, it offers readers the answer to a secret which has puzzled the world's historians for forty years. Who was the German traitor who sold a foreign power the secret code book of the famous Enigma cipher machine, used by Germany?

He was Hans-Thilo Schmidt, a Berliner, and an officer in the German Army. His brother was a general and highly successful panzer corps commander. His family was widely respected.

But he was a dissipating, high-living weakling and hedonist. To finance good living in the thirties, he sold the French vital code books, which allowed Polish and other cryptologists to achieve the last step in solving the mystery of the German secret code machine.

The Poles had led the way, and had already built several duplicates, and had worked at the task of breaking the German code for years. Just before Hitler's invasion, they gave one of these machines to the French and one to the British.

The British did much with theirs--and the Allies read secret German military signals all during the war. This was decisive in many critical engagements on land, sea and air.

Kahn says Schmidt's betrayal of Germany was the single most influential spy accomplishment of World War II. The Germans caught up with Schmidt in 1943 and executed him--but never realized how badly he had compromised their so-called unbreakable Enigma coding machine.

For those who like spy stories, coming in from the cold and soldier, sailor, etc., Kahn's research and revelations about the spy who most affected World War II is informative reading with historic significance.




