I would like to ask all the citizens of Hansford County to give careful consideration to the bond proposal of Hansford County Hospital Board which will come up for vote on August 11.

The proposal has two propositions, the first to determine whether the tax levied for the hospital district should be increased from 50 cents to 75 cents, and the second is a bond issue of \$1,400,000 to repair and renovate and improve the present hospital and to add a building for a new 54 bed domiciliary care and convalescent building. This is a facility that is needed in Spearman. We have many of our elderly citizens residing in nursing homes in neighboring towns, and I am sure that they would be happier if they were in Spearman, closer to family and friends.

We are indeed fortunate in Hansford County to have three doctors presently practicing

medicine, and one planning to begin his practice here shortly. There continues to be a perplexing shortage of doctors in rural communities, they like many other young people today do not wish to settle in small communities. Our hospital is top quality and I am sure that the nursing home, if the bond issue should pass, will also be top quality.

I for one am grateful to the hospital board members, the doctors, the nursing staff and everyone connected with the running of the hospital for their continued efforts to give our citizens quality care.

I realize that more taxes is certainly not appealing, since it seems we are overly taxed anyway, but for this tax issue, consider carefully what it could mean to our community, not only in comfort and care for our elderly citizens, but as an asset to our community. This facility will no doubt require more personnel, so more people will be added to our labor force, which is always good to have in any community.

678 Farms In 1979 Program

Some 678 farms in Hansford County were signed up with the 1979 USDA farm program according to the ASCS director, Martin Chandler.

Of these 657 filed intended acreage of wheat at 155,785.0; 114 farms signed up for 17,338.2 acres of corn, 24 with 2,383.4 acres of barley, and 399 with 74,961.0 acres of grain sorghum.

Farmers also filed intentions of haying and grazing 18,376.3 acres, and additional voluntary diversion was 7,792.8 acres.

Chandler said that some of the farmers who had signed up for haying and grazing of wheat

removed themselves from the program when they saw that the wheat was going to be so good this spring and went ahead and harvested it.

This means that there were more acres of wheat actually harvested than the filed intended acreage. There was an area of about 5,000 acres in the Northern portion of the county that was lost to hail.

Chandler also stated that the county had averaged about 40 bushels per acre during this bountiful wheat harvest, which is probably the best harvest on record.

At an estimated wheat yield

for the county of 40 bushels average of 160,000 acres at the present market price, farmers in this county harvested approximately \$25,000,000 of wheat.

Hospital District Election

The Board of Directors of Hansford County Hospital District have called a tax and bond election for August 11, 1979.

The special election is for the purpose of increasing the maximum tax rate for hospital district purposes and authority for the issuance of bond.

There are two propositions

on the ballot. The first is to determine whether the maximum rate of tax levied for hospital district purposes should be increased from 50 cents to 75 cents per \$100 valuation of taxable property situated within the District subject to hospital district taxation

for hospital district purposes, including the payment of all indebtedness assumed, incurred or issued by the District, as provided by law.

Proposition No. 2 is to determine whether the hospital district be authorized and empowered to issue bonds in the

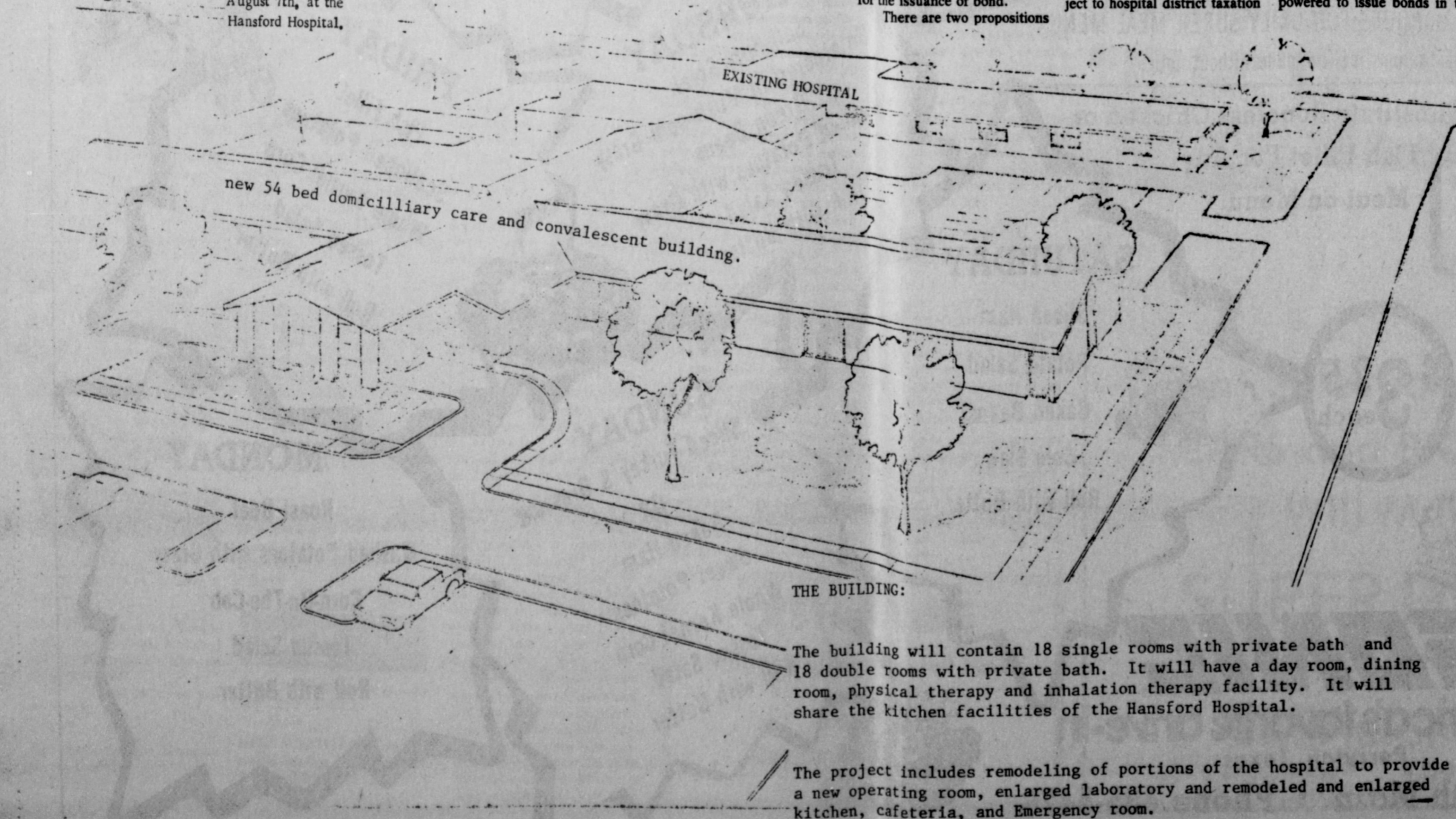
total amount of \$1,400,000 for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping the same for hospital purposes (a domiciliary care facility). The bonds are to be payable from ad valorem taxes levied, assessed and collected on all taxable property in the District subject to hospital district taxation, and issued in one or more installments or series, mature serially or otherwise not more than 40 years.

Description of the proposed project includes remodeling of portions of the hospital to provide a new operating room, enlarged laboratory and remodeled and enlarged kitchen, cafeteria and emergency room, and a new 54 bed domiciliary care and convalescent building.

The proposed new building will contain 18 single rooms with private baths and 18 double rooms with private bath. There will be a day room, dining room, physical therapy and inhalation therapy facility. The proposed new building will share the kitchen facilities of the Hansford Hospital.

Polling places for the election will be Precinct No. 1 (consisting of Hansford County Voting Precincts No. 1, 2, 5 and 6) at the County Agriculture Barn, Spearman; Precinct No. 2 (consisting of Hansford County Voting Precincts No. 3, 4 and 7) County Agricultural Barn, Gruver, Texas and Precinct No. 3 (consisting of Hansford County Voting Precinct No. 9) at the Community Building, Morse.

Absentee voting for the election will be at the Administrator's Office, Hansford Hospital from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays and official State holidays. Lanelle Cummings is the Absentee Voting Clerk and Debra Jones is the Assistant Clerk.

Study Is Now In Full Swing

The U.S.G.S. Ogallala Study is in full swing, with several phases of the study being conducted simultaneously by the Texas Department of Water Resources and the North Plains Water District.

The District is responsible for two aspects of the study within its boundaries:

1. Monitor fourteen recharge observation sites with neutron moisture detection equipment.
2. Construct updated maps of: (a) the base of the Ogallala aquifer, (b) 1980 water levels, and (c) saturated thickness of the Ogallala aquifer.

The recharge monitoring program was started in early March and will continue until March, 1980. The purpose of the program is to determine whether recharge of the Ogallala formation is occurring, and whether the recharge, if any, is due to natural or artificial causes. The monitoring holes, dug to a depth of 30 feet and cased with 2 inch aluminum tubing, are visited weekly by District personnel. A Gearhart-Owen multifunction geophysical logger is used to obtain moisture level logs at each site. The logger, purchased this Spring by the District, is also capable of producing electric and gamma logs to a depth of one thousand feet. The 500 mile round trip of the logging run ranges from the New Mexico line east of Nara Visa to the Oklahoma line east of Follett, and takes one man two and 1/2 days each week.

Topographic mapping of the base of the Ogallala formation is about 50% complete. Maps for Hutchinson, Moore, and Sherman Counties are complete, and mapping of Hansford and Hartley Counties is in progress.

A map of the Ogallala base in the District will be published in the upcoming Progress Report.

Bullock said gasoline tax rates in the nation's nine north-east states are nearly double the Texas rate—averaging 9.5 cents a gallon.

Nine states—Arkansas, Georgia, Iowa, Michigan, Montana, Nebraska, Pennsylvania, South Dakota and Washington—have recently increased gasoline tax rates.

Bullock also said consumers who are seeing their budgets chewed up by inflation benefit from Texas' low sales tax rate. The state's four percent sales tax is lower than the tax rates levied in 18 other states and equal to the rate set by 10 states.

The highest sales tax rate—seven percent—is levied by Connecticut.

Trees help cool hot summer months COLLEGE STATION - One of the best ways to cut air-conditioning costs in the hot summer months is with nature's own cooling system, says a Texas A&M University scientist. In a research project examining low-cost energy-saving techniques, forest science Professor Dr. Robert Dewers points out that the proper positioning of shade trees can substantially reduce power consumption by air-conditioners. Because air-conditioning accounts for more than 19 percent of all residential energy use in Texas—compared with the national average of 4.4 percent—Dewers' advice to homeowners is to plant more trees and protect the ones that are already there.

Prepaid mortgages save for homeowner COLLEGE STATION - Prepaying their mortgage loan is an option homeowners should take into consideration, according to Dr. Jack P. Friedman, research economist and head of the research division of the Texas Real Estate Research Center at Texas A&M University. "It is possible to reduce total payments dramatically by prepaying a mortgage loan," he said. "It is the wise thing to do whenever the interest rate on available savings plans is less than the interest rate on the mortgage loan."

require strenuous physical exertion. Weatherly said that anyone desiring information regarding the services available from Vocational Rehabilitation can contact them by telephone. The telephone number is listed under the heading of their state in the telephone directory, e.g., Texas--Rehabilitation Commission. Weatherly said some workers make complete medical recovery and return to their old jobs without any outside assistance. The law requires that anyone who is able to return to work must have their disability payments terminated. Most beneficiaries who return to work are eligible for a trial work period of up to 9 months. This means their social security payments will not be terminated until they have had an opportunity to determine if they have recovered sufficiently from their disability to continue working. After the successful completion of a trial work period, payments can be made for an additional 3 months and the payments can then be terminated. Weatherly said anyone with questions regarding social security disability payments can visit, write, or call the nearest social security office for additional information.

Use of pesticides widespread in cities

COLLEGE STATION - For years farmers have taken the blame for pushing chemical farming to the extreme, but Dr. Ted Granovsky, a Texas A&M University urban entomologist, says at least 25 percent of the pesticides in the United States are applied in urban areas. Living in an urban environment does not protect you from insects or insecticides. Granovsky says that common urban insect pests in Texas include: termites, cockroaches, fleas, ticks, white grubs, and chinch bugs.

Cattle On Feed Decline

CATTLE ON FEED DECLINE 6 PERCENT Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market on July 1, 1979 totaled 10.3 million head, according to the Crop reporting Board. The total was 6 percent below July 1, 1978, but 6 percent above July 1, 1977. Placements during the April-June quarter totaled 6.11 million, down 7 percent from the same quarter last year but 2 percent above the second quarter of 1977. Marketings of fed cattle for slaughter during April-June totaled 6.11 million, down 8 percent from the same quarter last year and 1 percent from the same quarter in 1977. Other disappearance totaled 768 thousand leaving net placements of 5.35 million. The July 1, 1979 number of cattle on feed included 6.82 million steers and steer calves, 1 percent less than a year ago but 7 percent above 1977. Steers accounted for 66 percent of the total on feed. Heifers and heifer calves on feed totaled 3.45 million, down 14 percent from 1978 but up 3 percent from 1977. EXPECTED MARKETINGS DOWN 5 PERCENT During the July-September quarter, cattle feeders intend to market 6.23 million head. This would be 5 percent below the third quarter marketings in 1978 but 1 percent more than 1977. CATTLE ON FEED IN 7 MONTHLY STATES DOWN 5 PERCENT In the 7 monthly States, the total number on feed at 7.56 million is down 5 percent from a year earlier but 10 percent more than July 1, 1977. The 7-State total accounted for 73 percent of the 23-State number on feed. Placements in feedlots during June at 1.54 million declined 13 percent from last year's level, but was up 5 percent from June 1977. Marketings during June, at 1.52 million, were 8 percent lower than last year and 2 percent lower than June 1977. Marketings for the 7 States during the April-June quarter accounted for 76 percent of the 23-State total, the same as a year ago. Other disappearance climbed to 158 thousand compared with 153 thousand a year ago. Expected 7-State marketings during the July-September quarter are estimated at 4.65 million, 6 percent fewer than 1978 but 2 percent above 1977.


