Santa Fe Presents Bell

The new bell at the Spearman Union Church may ring with a slight Spanish accent since it came from a Santa Fe steam engine that operated into Mexico for many years.

Ed Langley, Santa Fe's Traveling Freight and Passenger Agent presented the bell to the church on behalf of the Santa Fe Railroad and its officials at a brief service Tuesday after-

noon in the church.

The Rev. George Bollinger, pastor of the church, conducted a brief devotional service with about 25 members of the church present.

The pastor said the engine and its bell had traveled many lines and after having served its time the bell had found a safe and secure place of rest in the House of God.

Langley expanded on the same theme by saying the engine had long since been scrapped and melted back to its original metal, while the bell, like the spirit of a Christian man has lived on to serve God.

Many, many miles rolled under the big drivers of the steam engine during its lifetime and the bell rang out at many stops and crossings.

Engine 215 was built in 1910 by the American Locomotive Co. of Pittsburg, Pa., for the KCMO, better known as the Orient Railroad that ran from Wichita, Kan., into Mexico through Presidio.

The engine joined the Santa Fe system when Santa Fe bought the Orient railroad. The engine number was changed to 2549. It retained this number until it was scrapped in 1953.

When the engine was scrapped, Santa Fe kept the bell. The supply of these bells is very short now and the demand is great. Because of this, Santa Fe only lets churches, schools and some civic organizations have the bells now.

Weed Cuts Electricity

The famous tumbling tumble weed and some rain cut the electric supply to Spearman early Friday morning.

Community Public Service manager Charles Gilliam said the electricity to Spearman was shut off from 5:50 until 6:25 a.m. Friday by a wet tumble weed lodged in a 69,000 volt transmission line.

Gilliam said the weed lodged around an insulator on the line when the winds were blowing, then when it rained and got the weed wet, it provided a conductor for the electricity to arc and knock out a circuit breaker.

City To Kill Dump Rats

People and animals were warned this week to keep clear of the city dump ground by the Spearman City Council.

In an effort to get rid of the heavy rat population there, the dump ground will be treated heavily with poison in the next few days.

Councilmen Monday night instructed the city employees to put up signs warning people to stay out of the dump ground where they have been shooting rats. It is against city ordinance and will be enforced.

The poison to be used is very deadly and any animals getting it will die.

This extensive campaign against rats was brought about when two horses died near the dump ground recently and one of them had rabies.

Officials fear that any animal that contaminated the horses could contaminate the rats and other varmints around the dump ground.

HOMEMAKING NOTES

Spring sewing for homemakers is well underway. Many new fabrics are available and some of the more familiar ones are back with new finishes and characteristics.

Bonded fabrics are plentiful in the form of laces, knits, or woven fabrics with a tricot or taffeta type backing. This backing is attached with a heat locking process and makes underlining a garment unnecessary.

Since the backing makes the straightening of the fabric difficult, check the fabric before purchasing it to see that it is not off-grain. It has usually been preshrunk, so shrinking is not necessary.

Choose a pattern with few seams and without intricate details. Lay the pattern on the right side of the fabric, following a lengthwise rib. It is easier to handle if only one layer is cut at a time. To eliminate bulkiness on bodice fronts, bodice backs or jacket fronts, cut facing as part of the main garment, rather than a separate piece.

For ease in sewing, use a thread suitable for the outer fabric, a medium machine needle. Since ripped machine stitching may show, hand baste and fit the garment before permanently stitching the seams. If the fabric is extremely bulky, use a matching lining fabric for facings. Understitch collars, facings and pocket edges where an underseam might show.

Press darts using a pressing ham to give shape to the garment. Press them toward the center of the garment. Bulky darts can be split and trimmed slightly. Press seams open. If they do not lie flat, top stitching can be added close to the seamline. When pressing the garment, either a steam iron

or a dry iron with damp press cloth can be used. Use a temperature suitable for the outer fabric.

To prevent the hemline from showing on the right side of the garment, attach the hem only to the bonded lining.

Have questions about cleaning silk garments in your wardrobe? When in doubt, dry clean silk.

It's wise to check the fabric label and follow the care directions. If no cleaning care instructions are provided, and you are in doubt, have the garment drycleaned.

Problems occur with many silks when they are stained or spotted with water soluble substances. Food and perspiration are common examples of this type of stain.

When water and detergent are applied to the stained area, the dye in silk often bleeds. This is particularly noticeable in silk fabrics made with different colored yarns. The dye from the darker yarn will bleed onto the lighter yarn and create a noticeable and permanent stain.

Often a professional spotter can successfully remove stains from silk, says the Institute of Drycleaning, but he's no magician. Even if the dyes are fast, it's often hard to remove all traces of stain.

The best solution is to take the stained garment to a professional drycleaner as soon as possible, and tell him what the stain is.

Four Fatalities Recorded in March On Highways, Rural Roads in Area

Two people were killed in accidents on highway and rural roads in the four county area of Hansford, Hutchinson, Ochiltree and Sherman counties during March.

One person was killed in Hansford County and one in Sherman County during the month.

There were a total of 20 rural accidents in the four counties according to the monthly report released by the Texas Department of Public Safety. In these accidents there were 13 persons injured and property damage was set at \$15,480.

Hansford County had three accidents in which one was

killed and three injured. Property damage was set at \$2,100.

Hutchinson County had 11 rural accidents with eight injured and damage set at \$7,830.

In Ochiltree County there were five accidents in which two were injured and the damage was set at \$4,050.

Sherman County had only one accident, but one was killed and damage was set at \$1,500.

Urban Demands Increase Farm, Ranch Land Prices

Part of the Texas farm and ranch land market has done a sudden about-face, according to a survey released by Texas A&M University.

The survey was done by F. B. Andrews, Extension resource development specialist, and A. B. Wooten, professor of agricultural economics, both at A&M.

Since 1949, Texas agricultural land prices have risen each year, but the volume of sales has consistently declined. In the A&M study, land prices continued to rise--but for the first time since 1949, the volume of sales also increased, reversing the downward trend.

Economists at Texas A&M say the reason for steadily increasing prices is the urban influence on farm and ranch land. Urban demands of land for hobby farming, rural homesites, speculation and recrea-

tion drive prices higher each year, say the economists.

The abrupt increase in volume of sales comes from a growing population, with more income and better transportation to take them to land in the country.

According to the study, average land price in 1963 was \$93.94 per acre, 19 percent above the 1960 average. Volume of sales increased 22 percent.

Prices ranged from a high of \$700 an acre for land in the upper Rio Grande Valley, near El Paso; \$200 an acre for Blackland areas; to a low of \$41 an acre for land in the Trans-Pecos area.

The greatest increase in price since 1960 was in the Trans-Pecos region. Land prices in the Lower Rio Grande Valley declined 19 percent from 1960 to 1963.

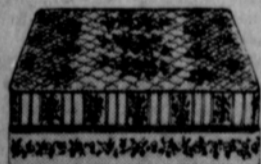

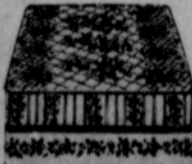

4-H'ERS MACHINERY SALE

Claude, Tex. --The 4-H Club members here in Armstrong County are getting set to conduct their unique fund raising project.

At 10 a.m. April 30, the 4-H'ers will begin a farm machinery sale that has been an annual event here since 1957.

Local auctioneers Wildon Hundley and Doug Britten, and Mead Michael of Canyon, will donate their services for the all-day affair. The small commission charged for items in the sale goes to the county 4-H treasury.

A machinery sale is not really a proper description for the event, according to County Agent Bo Wheeler.

"Last year we had tricycles, chetland ponies, a sand buggy, chicken wire and just about anything else you could imagine," he said.

Wheeler says the sale was one of the first of its kind in the Panhandle when Foster Whaley, who is now the Gray County Agent, and a group of local leaders started it.

The event has continued each year because farmers have found it a good place to market their surplus machinery and equipment.

MANAGEMENT PRACTICES

Double cropping and seed-planting rate are two management practices in grain sorghum puzzling some High Plains producers this spring, according to researchers and county agents in the area.

The agricultural workers say new interest in double cropping has emerged as farmers try to boost production to overcome the fewer acres being planted in compliance with government price support program.

The major planting-rate problem is a common one which ag educators have been working on for years -- some farmers use too much seed for good performance under dryland and limited irrigation conditions.

Double-cropping grain sorghum involves planting early and making a first harvest about July. The stalks are then shredded to a height less than six inches, irrigated and harvested a second time in the fall.

The practice has been used with some success in parts of Texas further South, but little is known about the yield advantages of it on the High Plains.

"Several producers have contacted us about the best hybrid for double cropping," says Darrel Rosenow, grain sorghum researcher at the South Plains Research and Extension Center, near Lubbock.

Producers need one which will mature early enough so that the second crop will mature before the first freeze, Rosenow said.

He says the best hybrid for double cropping on the plains will probably be one that would bloom about five to eight days earlier than RS 610, a hybrid well-known to most farmers.

The very early hybrids are not recommended because they tend to produce disappointing yields, Rosenow said. He believes double cropping them could give poorer total yield than conventional varieties and management.

No research has been conducted on grain sorghum double-cropping on the High Plains, according to Rosenow.

He is urging farmers who want to try the practice to test it on only a small part of their crop.

Overplanting persists on the Plains, even though years of testing indicate lighter planting promotes stronger plants that can tolerate limited water conditions to produce fair yields even in dry years.

Long term studies at the Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland, show that grain sorghum plants 18-inches apart in 40-inch rows have given the best average yields under dryland conditions.

"It's impossible to plant at this rate with conventional equipment," Rosenow said, "but these studies indicate that extremely light plantings can produce surprising yields."

Recommended planting rates for dryland conditions is 2 1/2 to three pounds per acre and for limited irrigation situations about five to six pounds per acre, according to crop scientists.

The lighter planting rates let each plant develop good size and root systems. During long dry spells, Rosenow said the plants can tolerate stress much better than the small, weak plants that result from overplanting.
