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



Texas cattlemen are on the ball. County agents around the state report cattlemen are al-

ready trying the newly deve-loped freeze-branding. The freeze-branding was de-veloped by Washington State

University researcher, Dr. Keith Farrell.

The way it works is simple enough. According to L.A. Maddox, Jr., Texas A&M University Extension animal husbandman copers branding. degrees F. below zero by a mixture of dry ice and alcohol. The dry ice cools the alcohol and the alcohol cools the branding iron.

when the iron is applied, it destroys pigment producing hair follicles and the hair grows out a permanent white, said Maddox. It makes an ex-tremely legible brand that can be read on the longest haired animals from a distance. It should be a big help identi-fying cattle in winter when the hair coat is extra long, he

Another advantage is that freeze-branding doesn't harm

The freeze branding is sup-posedly painless. It's perman-ent and leaves no scars or thickened areas to cause a dock in price for the hide.

commendations for its widespread use have been made. Also, the technique is so new it isn't even mentioned in the branding laws, Branding of-ficials are studying the tech-nique to possibly include it in the law books.

It's important that animals' hair be clipped around the area to get better contact with the skin. In Washington, researchers use cordless clippers. Then they wet the clipped surface with alcohol and apply the brand.

Several animals in the A&M

beef cattle herd at College Station have been freeze-br-anded experimentally. A&M researchers are using dry ice and acetone. They report go-od results from 30 to 40 se-

cond contacts.
The freeze-branding is fairly inexpensive -- usually less than a nickel a brand. According to Washington resear-chers, all-white animals can also be freeze-branded using a nitrogen chilling method.
