## June Is 'Wet' Month

If the month of June can get just one more hundredth of an inch of moisture it will tie for the record of the wettest month of 1966.

The moisture of the past week measure .81 of an inch. The first two showers produced .10 each time, then on Tuesday, May 31, Spearman received .61.

There were some larger amounts reported around the area, but nothing to break the dry weather. A inch was reported south of town along the county line.

Spearman weather observer, Mrs. Pat Cates, has measured a total of 2.25 inches of moisture this year. There were .32 in January, .72 in February, none in March, .35 in April, .15 in May and .71 in June.

## Miss Rebecca Hutchison Wins Second Consecutive Crown

Hansford County's 4-H Bake Queen for 1965 made the crown for the 1966 Queen then went home, baked a pie and some rolls that earned her the right to keep the crown.

Miss Rebecca Hutchison retained the title of Hansford County 4-H Bake Queen in the annual contest judged Thursday at the Home Demonstration Clubroom.

As the winner Miss Hutchison will represent the county in the Bake Queen's contest at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo this fall. She competed in the Tri-State contest last year and placed third.

The winner baked a cherry-peach pie and rolls. She scored the highest number of points on both entries as well as her record book. Judging the rolls were Mrs. Claudine Clark and Mrs. Frances Hudson, Spearman Home Economics teachers. Mrs. Roy Jones and Mrs. Rowena Rowe judged the pies. Mrs. H.B. Parks and Mrs. W.L. Maupin judged the record books.

Others in the competition were Cindy Hutchison, Gloria Lopez, Vicky Rosenbaum, Valorie Uptergrove, LeAnne Shidknight, and Sherille Maupin.

## 218 Boys Indicate Athletic Participation

A total of 218 boys in junior high and high school have indicated they will participate in the athletic program of the Spearman schools in the 1966-67 school year.

The figures were compiled in a survey made by Coach George Wright of all boys who will be in the seventh, eighth and high school grades this fall.

These boys will be competing in football, basketball, track, tennis and golf. There will be 164 in football, 126 in basketball, 101 in track, 43 in tennis and 21 in golf.

As in past years there will be teams for seventh graders, eighth graders, freshmen, and a high school varsity and B-team.

In the seventh grade there will be 31 in football, 28 in basketball, 25 in track, nine in tennis. There will be 34 in athletics.

The eighth grade will have 38 in football, 39 in basketball, 34 in track, seven in tennis and one in golf. A total of 56.

Freshmen have 34 indicating they want to play football, 25 in tennis and 12 in golf. There are 55 freshmen participating.

The top three grades in high school will have 61 in football,

34 in basketball, 26 in track, 18 in tennis and seven in golf. There will be 73 varsity athletics.

The six grades have 15 boys who will be managers.

Coach Wright said the figures will change some when school begins. Some of the boys will have to change their plans and others will decide to join the program.

This year's coaching staff will be head coach Wright, a graduate of the University of Tennessee, assistants Jim Allen of the University of Texas, Allen Simpson of West Texas, Larry Anthony of Rice, Eddy Clemmons of West Texas and Jerry King of West Texas. Dean Weese of Phillips University will be trainer and cameraman.

Also Simpson will be boys basketball coach and Weese will be girls' basketball coach. Anthony will be the seventh grade coach, Clemmons will be freshman coach and King will be the eighth grade coach.

Football season opens for the Lynx on Friday, Sept. 9 when Sunray comes to town. All varsity games will begin at 8 p.m.

A Royal Service Program and business meeting of the WMU was held Wednesday morning at the First Baptist Church.

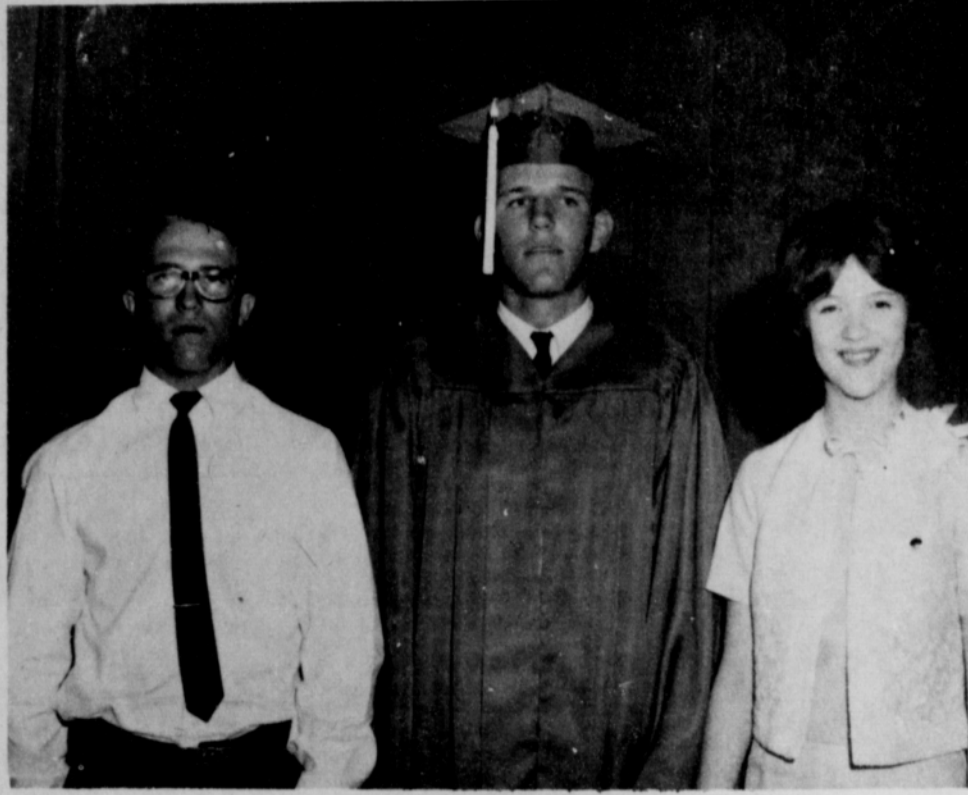
The prayer calendar was read by Edrie Jones followed with prayer by Mrs. Bob Bailey.

### TG&Y Stores Observe 30th Anniversary Celebration

The TG&Y store in Spearman is participating in the 30th anniversary celebration of the company's entrance into the variety store business.

In this time the chain of stores have spread from three stores in central Oklahoma to a coast-to-coast operation of nearly 500 stores.

In 1936 R.A. Young, E.L. Goselin and R.E. Thomlinson each owned a variety store. They formed a partnership and put a warehouse in Oklahoma City so they could buy together.

Later that year they started the expansion with the opening of a store in Norman. The growth was slow but steady with a few new stores each year. In 1957 the chain had 121 stores and it was sold to Butler Bros. of Chicago.

The management remained in Oklahoma City and the growth pace picked up until in 1960 there were 219 TG&Y stores. That year City Products purchased the chain. Again the complete operation remained in Ok-

lahoma City. C.A. (Pat) Henderson who was manager of the first TG&Y store in Norman is now president of the Oklahoma City Based firm.

Since 1960 the firm has expanded rapidly. Now there are almost 500 stores in the chain.

In this rapid growth, TG&Y moved to Spearman. The store here was opened in November 1962. The first manager was Melvin McDougal. In 1964 Nelson Bell moved here to head the store after McDougal left the firm.

During the observance, the store is conducting sales and giving away trips to Hawaii for some shopper.

In an effort to prove their coach right, the team has stepped up practice to once each day and are now scoring above 1,000.

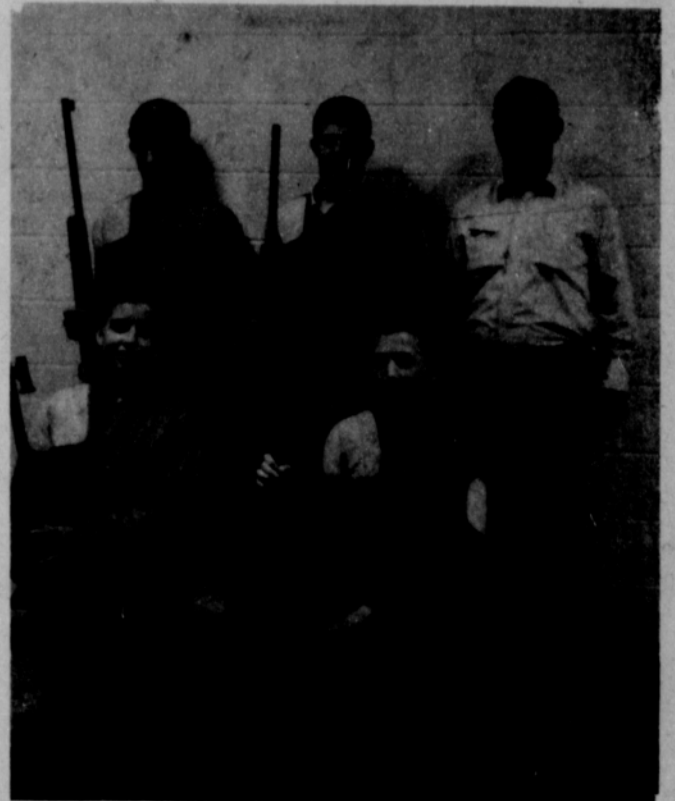
"Boss" Davis was a strong supporter of the many projects carried out by the 4-H boys and girls in the community. He was always ready and willing to help the youth in any project they undertook.

# Freeze-Branding Is Being Tried By Cattlemen Around State

Texas cattlemen are on the ball. County agents around the state report cattlemen are already trying the newly developed freeze-branding.

The freeze-branding was developed by Washington State University researcher, Dr. Keith Farrell.

The way it works is simple enough. According to L.A. Maddox, Jr., Texas A&M University Extension animal husbandman, copper branding irons are colled to about 94 degrees F. below zero by a mixture of dry ice and alcohol. The dry ice cools the alcohol and the alcohol cools the branding iron.

When the iron is applied, it drives the pigment producing hair follicles and the hair grows out a permanent white, said Maddox. It makes an extremely legible brand that can be read on the longest haired animals from a distance. It should be a big help identifying cattle in winter when the hair coat is extra long, he said.

Another advantage is that freeze-branding doesn't harm

the hide like hot-branding. Estimates are the cattle industry loses several million dollars each year from hides ruined by hot brands.

The freeze branding is supposedly painless. It's permanent and leaves no scars or thickened areas to cause a dock in price for the hide.

Maddox cautions that the freeze-branding is still an experimental procedure, so no re-

commendations for its widespread use have been made. Also, the technique is so new it isn't even mentioned in the branding laws. Branding officials are studying the technique to possibly include it in the law books.

It's important that animals' hair be clipped around the area to get better contact with the skin. In Washington, researchers use cordless clippers. Then they wet the clipped surface with alcohol and apply the brand.

Several animals in the A&M beef cattle herd at College Station have been freeze-branded experimentally. A&M researchers are using dry ice and acetone. They report good results from 30 to 40 second contacts.

The freeze-branding is fairly inexpensive--usually less than a nickel a brand. According to Washington researchers, all-white animals can also be freeze-branded using a nitrogen chilling method.

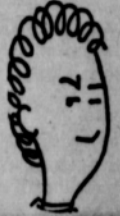
