Holiday At Home

lemonade, undiluted
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 quart lemon-lime carbonated
beverage

Combine all ingredients except carbonated beverage. Chill. Pour into punch bowl;
add carbonated beverage and ice ring.

★Orange-Cranberry Ice Ring

Pour cold water in ring mold almost to the top. Freeze until solid. Barely cover sur-
face with more water and arrange 1 cup mandarin orange sections and 1/3 cup cranber-
ries in pretty pattern. Return to freezer. When fruit is frozen in place, add a little more
water. Keep frozen. Unmold by dipping in warm water. Remove ice carefully and place
in punch when ready to serve.

Facts And Fiction About Strep Throat

Sore throats account for up to 40 million doctor visits each year. In most cases, they are just another bit of discomfort to be endured with the common cold - and just as incurable, because the same virus is to blame.

TO THE RESIDENT QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE HANSFORD COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the Hansford County Hospital District on the 17th day of December, 1985, in accordance with an order adopted by the Board of Directors which is a part of this notice for all purposes and reads as follows:

AN ORDER ordering a bond election to be held in the Hansford County Hospital District, making provision for the conduct of the election and resolving other matters incident and related to such election.

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the Hansford County Hospital District, hereby finds that an election should be held to determine whether said governing body shall be authorized to issue bonds of said District in the amounts and for the purposes hereinafter identified; therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE HANSFORD COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT:

SECTION 1: An election shall be held on the 17th day of December, 1985, in the Hansford County Hospital District, for the purpose of submitting the following proposition:

"SHALL the Board of Directors of the Hansford County Hospital District, be authorized to issue bonds of the District in the principal amount of \$2,500,000 for the construction, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping the same for hospital purposes; such bonds to mature serially or otherwise over a period not to exceed FORTY (40) years from their date, to be issued and sold in one or more series at any price or prices and to bear interest at any rate or rates (fixed, floating, variable or otherwise) as shall be determined within the discretion of the Board of Directors at the time of issuance or sale of the bonds; and whether ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon all taxable property in the District sufficient to pay the annual interest and provide a sinking fund to pay the bonds at maturity?"

SECTION 2: Paper Ballots shall be used for said election, which ballots shall be prepared in accordance with the V.A.T.S. Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid proposition. Said proposition shall appear on the ballot substantially as follows:

"THE ISSUANCE OF \$2,500,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS FOR HOSPITAL PURPOSES"

SECTION 3: The District shall be divided into four (4) election precincts for this election and the polling places designated for each election precinct and the persons hereby appointed to serve as Presiding Judge and Alternate Presiding Judge for each polling place are shown in Exhibit "A", which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as a part hereof for all purposes.

Each Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) nor more than six (6) qualified clerks to serve and assist in holding said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of the clerks.

On election day, the polls shall be open from 7:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

Denhis Robertson is hereby appointed the Clerk and Debra DeArmand the Deputy Clerk for absentee voting for said election, and the Administration Office of the Hansford Hospital District, 707 South Roland, Spearman, Texas 79081, is hereby designated the place for absentee voting. The hours designated for absentee voting by personal appearance shall be from 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. on each day, except Saturdays, Sunday and official State holidays, during the period required by law for conducting absentee voting.

A Special Canvassing Board shall be used for this election in relation to absentee voting and Charlene Bryan is appointed Presiding Judge and Muriel Boyd the Alternate Presiding Judge of the Special Canvassing Board for absentee voting.

SECTION 4: All resident qualified electors of the District shall be permitted to vote at such election, and on the day of the election, such electors shall vote at the polling place designated for the District Election Precinct in which they reside. This election shall be held and conducted in accordance with the Texas Election Code, except as modified by Chapter 872, Acts of the 62nd Legislature, Regular Session, 1971, and as may be required by law, all election materials and proceedings shall be printed in both English and Spanish.

SECTION 5: A substantial copy of this order shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice, including a Spanish translation thereof, shall be posted at three (3) public places within the District and at the administration offices of the District not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date the election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the District, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

PASSED AND APPROVED, this the 20th day of November, 1985.

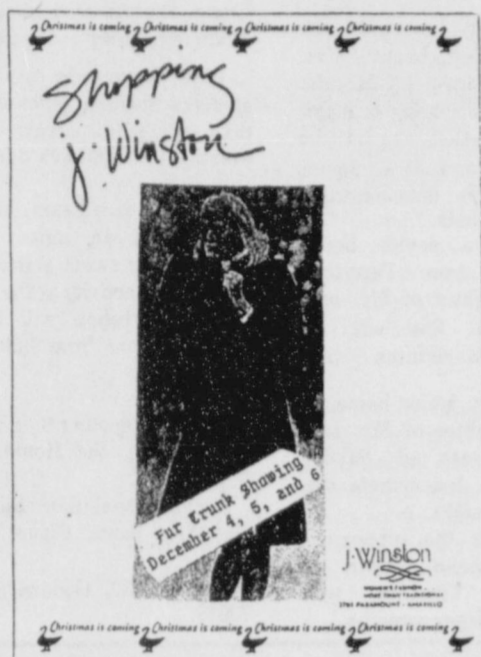
Christmas Card Drive

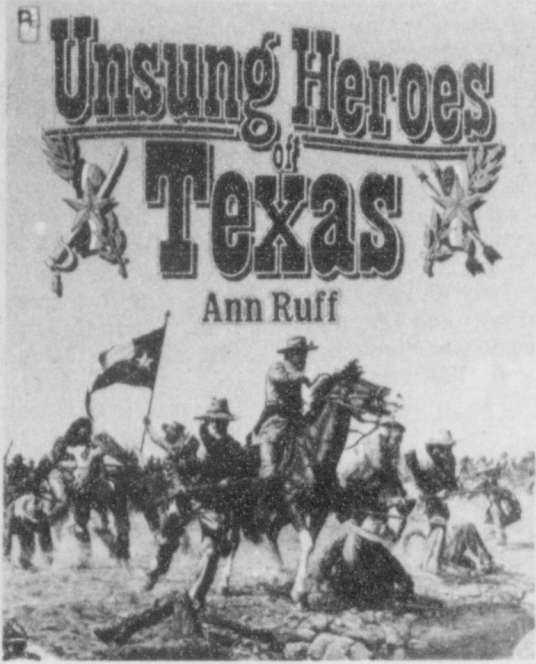

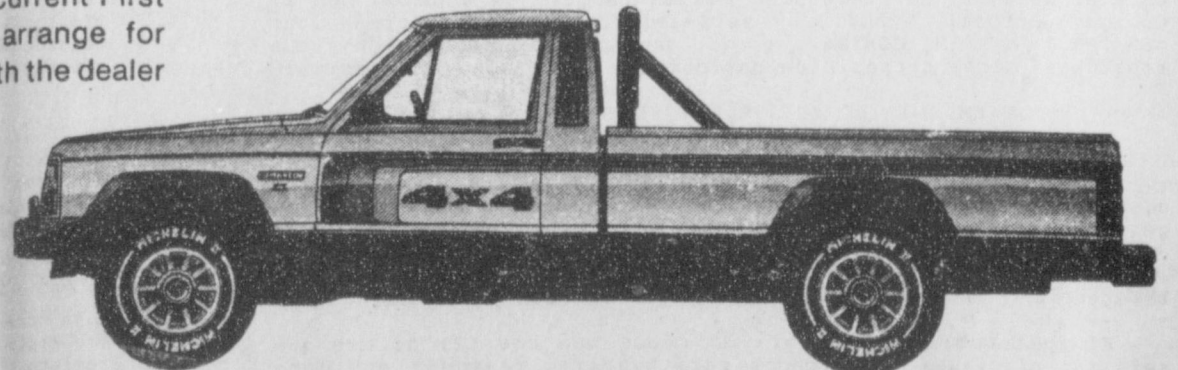

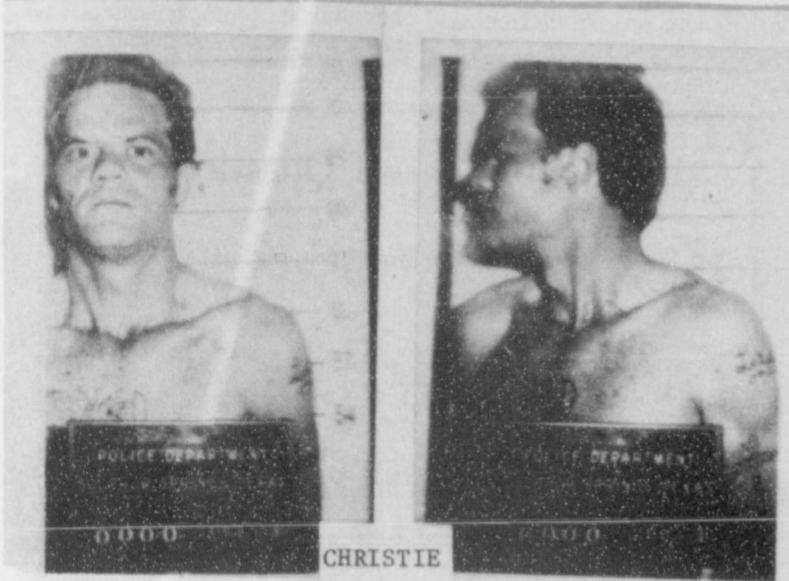

MOST WANTED CRIME STOPPERS



CHRISTIE

SULPHUR SPRINGS, Texas -- John DeWayne Christie has a tattoo of a three-leaf clover on his left arm.

Despite the presence of the tattoo, the 32-year-old Christie is quickly running out of luck.

He is wanted on warrants in Hopkins County charging him with Aggravated Sexual Assault, Assault and Burglary of a Residence.

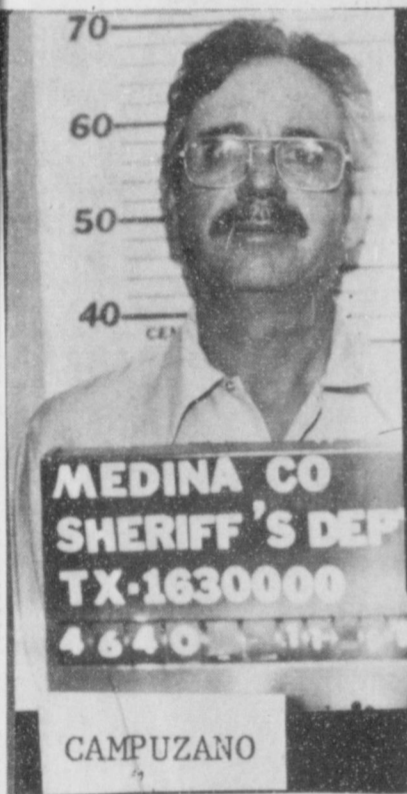
The charges stem from an incident on September 1, 1985, when an intruder raped a 14-year-old girl, then tried to rape the girl's mother.

However, the offender, who was armed with a butcher knife, ran into more than he bargained when he tried to attack the mother. She bit the intruder on the neck and forced him to flee the house.

This is not the first time that Christie has been in trouble with the law in connection with sexual assault charges, investigators say. He has two prior convictions for sexually-related offenses and served time in the Texas Department of Corrections for Indecency with a Child.

Christie is a white male, 6-0, 176 pounds, with brown hair and brown eyes. Detectives say he recently cut his hair short.

In addition to the three-leaf clover tattoo, Christie also has several other tattoos on his body, including one of a butterfly on his chest.



CAMPUZANO

LYTLE, Texas -- If the rest of Texas could match Atascosa County's homicide rate over the past five years, this would be a pretty safe state in which to live.

In the past five years, nine homicides have been reported in the south Texas county.

However, one of those murders and the person accused of it are the subject of this week's Texas Most Wanted spotlight.

Leopoldo Maciel Campuzano, 56, is wanted on warrants charging him with the November 19, 1983, murder of Juan Munzon.

Munzon, a Mexican national in his early 20's, was gunned down on a rural road near Lytle.

Police reports indicate that Munzon and Campuzano were fellow employees at a dairy in Atascosa County.

On the evening of November 19, the pair had been drinking at an establishment called "Poor Richard's". It was the last time Munzon was seen alive.

His body was found by two motorists, who were driving along a dirt road near FM 2790. Munzon had been shot in the face, neck, left arm and rib cage.

Although Christie was living in Greenville at the time of the offense, detectives believe he has fled the state.

This week Christie has been added to the Texas Most Wanted list.

A reward of up to \$1,000 is being offered by the Governor's Office for information leading to Christie's capture. Anyone with information concerning his possible whereabouts is asked to call the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council toll-free at 1-800-252-8477 or their local Crime Stoppers program.

In all cases, callers do not have to reveal their identities.

Texas Most Wanted is a cooperative program between the Department of Public Safety and Texas Crime Stoppers.

In the past seven years, more than 20,000 major crimes have been solved and \$150 million worth of stolen property and narcotics have been recovered through tips to Texas Crime Stoppers programs. The programs have paid out \$2.2 million worth of rewards during this time.

As of November 18, 1985, the Department of Public Safety reported that John DeWayne Christie is wanted on the following warrants: Aggravated Sexual Assault, Assault, Burglary - Hopkins County.



When interviewed by investigators, Campuzano said he had left Munzon outside Poor Richard's and had driven home.

However, an eyewitness to the murder later told investigators that Campuzano and Munzon had a violent argument while they had

been drinking. Munzon left in one vehicle, with Campuzano following behind in a pickup truck. As they reached the dirt road where Munzon's body was found, Campuzano allegedly flashed the truck's lights on and off.

When Munzon got out of the vehicle he had been in, and eyewitness said two shots were heard and the victim fell to the ground.

On November 22, 1983, a warrant was issued for Campuzano's arrest. But since that date, he has not been found.

Campuzano, who also spells his last name Campusano, is 5-3, 130 pounds, with brown graying hair and brown eyes. He usually wears glasses.

This week a reward of up to \$1,000 is being offered by the Governor's Office for information leading to the capture of Leopoldo Maciel Campuzano.

Anyone with information on his possible location is asked to call the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council toll-free at 1-800-252-8477 or their local Crime Stoppers program. In all cases callers do not have to reveal their identities.

If you are interested in information about domestic violence, child abuse, rape, molestation, legal resources, etc., the Panhandle Crisis Center has an excellent library for you. Books must be checked out on your signature. But a number of free pamphlets are well displayed so you can see them easily and make your selection. They are all attractive and readily understood. Even if you don't intend using them yourself, come look them over so you can be better informed.

By now you are aware that the Panhandle Crisis Center helps victims of domestic violence. Another service it offers is to victims of rape.

What everyone should realize is that rape is not a sex act per se. That is, it is not brought on by

"unwise" dress or behavior. Rape is an act of rage or deep-seated anger and resentment. Often it is planned in advance. Sometimes it is well thought out and progresses through several stages, beginning with what looks like normal dating. Most rapes are perpetrated by persons who know the victim.

But there is the "opportunist" who takes advantage of an unexpected victim who happens to cross his path and is alone and/or helpless at the moment.

What to do if you are raped. As soon as possible, report the rape to the police and/or the Panhandle Crisis Center (435-5008). Even if you do not want to prosecute, your information may be helpful in arresting a suspect that some other victim does want to prosecute. REMEMBER: Do NOT bathe or

shower or douche. Do NOT urinate or defecate. Do NOT change clothes. Do NOT straighten up or re-arrange anything at the scene. This way, you can be sure of not destroying valuable evidence.

It is important to get a medical examination as soon as possible. If you call the Panhandle Crisis Center, a volunteer will go with you to the hospital if you so desire, to help you get through the process and reassure your friends and/or family, if you wish to inform them. The examination is not only to tend whatever injuries you may have suffered, but to collect evidence, whether or not you wish to prosecute.

Panhandle Crisis Center Report - 2

The Panhandle Crisis Center will help you cope with the shock you have been through, and will help you to speed your recovery period. THIS IS IMPORTANT, for many persons have come to our attention in our short time of service, who are still suffering from the mental torment of having been victimized perhaps years ago.

If you are one of those whose victimization was in the past, join the support group led by the Director of the PCC. You may not only find yourself helped, but may be of strong help to someone else. Thus you can turn your disaster into a benefit for others.

CRIME STOPPERS WORKS

Ten days before being featured statewide as a Texas Most Wanted fugitive, John DeWayne Christie was apprehended by law enforcement officers in Rockwall, Texas, Governor Mark White announced today.

Christie, who was wanted out of Hopkins County on charges stemming from the September 1, 1985, rape of a 14-year-old and assault on the girl's mother, was arrested Wednesday, November 20.

Noted for the numerous tattoos on his body including one of a butterfly on his chest and a three-leaf clover on his arm, Christie was arrested at a Rockwall truck stop by law officers with the Rockwall Police Department, Sulphur Springs Police Department and Hopkins County Sheriff's Office, according to officials with the Sulphur Springs Police Department.

Aggravated Sexual Assault, Assault, and Burglary charges were brought against Christie after he was identified as the intruder who, armed with a butcher knife, raped a teenage girl and then turned on the girl's mother. The mother, however, forced the intruder to flee when she bit him on the neck.

Christie has had two prior convictions for sexually related offenses and has served time in the Texas Department of Corrections for Indecency with a Child.

Texas Most Wanted is a cooperative program between Crime Stoppers programs in Texas, the Department of Public Safety, and the media. A reward of up to \$1,000 is offered by the Governor's Office on fugitives featured weekly by the state's media.

Rewards also are offered for the apprehension of other felony offenders. Anyone with information on criminal activity may call their local Crime Stoppers program or Texas Crime Stoppers at 1-800-252-8477.

In all cases, callers do not have to reveal their identity.



John Deere has announced new programs to waive finance charges for varying periods for major items of farm equipment purchased through the John Deere finance plan. Waiver of finance charges reduces the interest paid during the term of a retail financing contract. If payments are required during the waiver period, the program permits a faster buildup of the buyer's equity since all such payments apply entirely to principal.

Under the newly announced program, finance charges on all used combines and new John Deere combines will be waived until the beginning of the use season in 1986, and in some cases until the beginning of the use season in 1987.

Finance charges on all new and some used seasonal equipment may be waived until the beginning of the month in which the next use season begins.

For many items, price discounts are available as an alternative to the waiver for finance programs.

Hotline for holiday depression

The Palo Duro Hospital Care Unit in Canyon, Texas will operate on a 24-hour hotline December 12 to January 2 for those suffering from holiday depression.

Kay Kropff, Program Manager at Palo Duro Hospital Care Unit says the Christmas season often causes anxiety, particularly for those already having problems with alcohol, drugs and stress.

"Rather than seeing the holidays as a time for celebration and togetherness, a lot of people see the holidays as a period that accentuates their aloneness," Kropff says.

The results are increased alcohol-related traffic fatalities, severe depression and suicides, she explains.

"Often, all a person needs to make it through the holidays is to talk with someone who understands his or her situation," Kropff says. "We hope we can fill that need."

In addition to being many colored, the new checks show a full-length replica of the Statue of Liberty on the left side. A muted close-up of her head and torch is in the background near the right side.

The new check contains features that discourage alterations, forgeries, and counterfeiting. The new lightweight paper stock is less expensive and takes less space to store. Use of the new check is expected to result in a savings to

taxpayers of about \$6 million a year.
