Beau Boulter visits Spearman

Beau Boulter, Republican nominee for the U. S. Congress brought his campaigning to Spearman Tuesday, and some 20 plus of his "backers" were present at Bull's Inn to enjoy a talk from Beau, and eat "Free Fudge" compliments of Roy Bulls!

Who is Beau?

Raised in Levelland, Texas, Beau Boulter was brought up in a home where everyone carried their own weight. After school, Beau worked part-time in grocery stores and local businesses. During the summers, he labored on a pipeline and a pulling unit.

In high school, Beau met Rosemary Rutherford, and they were later married while both were attending the University of Texas. After graduation, Beau entered Baylor Law School, where he finished in the top 5 percent of his class. He then worked as a briefing attorney for the Texas Supreme Court.

Today, Beau and Rosemary have three children: Becky, age 16; Matt, 11; and Elizabeth, age 4.

Beau moved his family to Amarillo in 1974. Raising their three children in the Texas Panhandle, the Boulters have become very close to the people of this area.



Beau and Rosemary feel fortunate to have had the opportunity to raise their children in an area of the country where the work ethic, faith in God, and discipline in schools are still appreciated and followed.

In 1981, Beau wanted to better serve his community and contribute to the area which had done so much for him. That year he ran for Amarillo's City Commission and won.

On the Commission, Beau fought for better flood control, more aggressive recruitment of new industries, and lower taxes. Soon, however, Beau realized the

lack of new jobs and the need for a growing economy were problems caused by the federal government.

Beau decided to run for Congress when he realized the only way to solve the real problems facing this area of Texas was to tackle them on the federal level.

Today, Beau has closed his law practice to devote his full attention and time to this race. Rosemary and all of the Boulter children are also active members of the campaign. After all, the future of Beau's children will be greatly affected by this year's election, and so will yours.

Contour Farming

For those dryland farmers who have not already prepared fields for sorghum planting consideration might want to be given to using contour farming. Contour farming is a means of reducing soil erosion as compared to up and down hill farming and will conserve moisture.

Sloping fields can be farmed on the contour and reduce the water erosion rate as much as 50 percent in some cases. Also, contour farming will keep the water received from rainfall from running off of the field too quickly. Since the farming operations are performed perpendicular to the slope of the land the water will be trapped in the furrows and be allowed to soak into the soil. This is very important on a dryland field since every drop of rainfall runoff that can be saved will be very beneficial to the crop.

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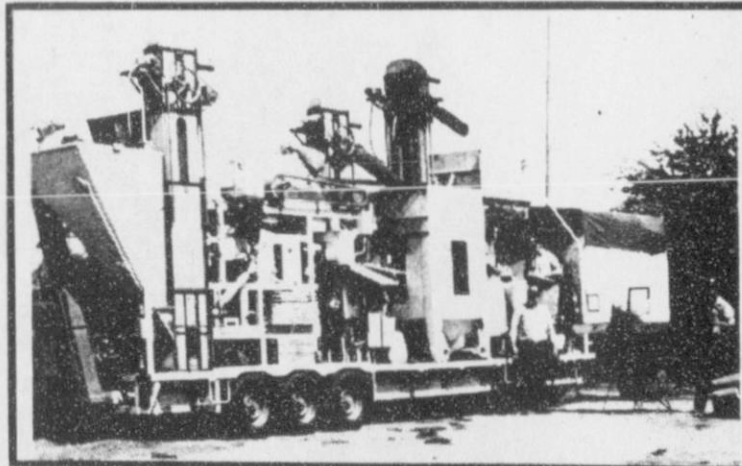



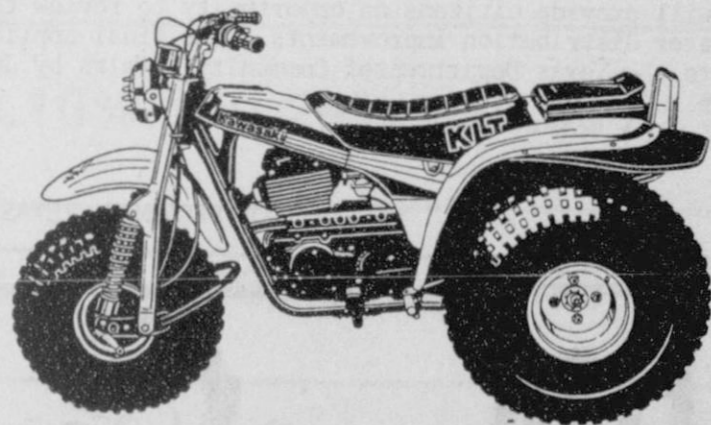

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Marlane Schutter will attend Trauma Seminar

Marlane W. Schutter, C.R.N.A., will attend the "Trauma and Emergency Anesthesia" Seminar to be held May 29 - June 3, 1984 at New Orleans Hilton in New Orleans, Louisiana.

Victims of massive trauma were at one time almost certain to become fatalities. Today, this is no longer the case. Advances in medical and para-medical care have greatly increased the survival rate of patients suffering this type of injury. Anesthesia care providers are an integral vital part of the Trauma Team... often we are involved in the care of these patients from initial assessment, through stabilization, intra-operative and immediate post-operative care.

The seminar, "Trauma and Emergency anesthesia" has been designed to update the knowledge base and sharpen the clinical skills in this area. The trauma patient is one of our greatest challenges, yet may allow us the least amount of preparation time. When seconds count, a systematic priority based approach is mandatory. Ms. Schutter will attend this seminar in New Orleans for an in-depth program on Trauma and Emergency Anesthesia. Learn the latest theories, techniques and procedures in anesthesia management that have contributed to decreasing the morbidity and mortality rate in these patients.

Ms. Schutter graduated from Borger High School. She attended Santa Rosa Division of Nursing and received a Bachelor of Science Degree. She also attended School Anesthesia for Nurses at Charity Hospital, New Orleans, La. She is working on her Masters' Degree at Wayne State University.

Ms. Schutter worked eight years at Methodist Hospital, Houston, Texas with a great deal of experience in cardiovascular and neurosurgical anesthesia. She spent three years at the Mason Clinic, Seattle, working for Dr. Daniel Moore, M.D., then returned to Memorial Hospital for another five years.

She has spent 2 years teaching obstetrical anesthesia to student nurse anesthetist at Baylor Uni-

versity School of Anesthesia for nurses in Houston.

While doing free lance anesthesia for Memorial Hospital System of Waller County, she also worked as Night Supervisor at Belleville General Hospital, and Assistant Director of Nurses at the Colonial Belle Nursing Home, Belleville, Texas. It was during this time that she became aware of a position available here in Spearman. Since she wanted to be near her parents, she accepted a position here.

Ms. Schutter has made three trips abroad, representing the American Association of Nurse Anesthetists. In 1973 she spent fourteen days touring hospitals in Leningrad and Moscow. A year later, she spent eight days in Portugal and Paris both. She has also toured Alaska and Mexico.

Finding things to do is no problem to her here on the high plains because her interest never provide enough hours. She bowls, reads, does ceramics and shell crafts. She is certified in E.C.A. training, has studied real estate and personnel management. She golfs in the summertime, and boating is another pleasure.

Ms. Schutter's family includes four sons, five daughters, and five grandchildren. Her oldest six children are on their own, and the youngest three live in Settle during the school years, but spend summers with their mother.

Ms. Schutter is a member of American, Texas and North Texas Association of Nurses Anesthetists, Chamber of Commerce (Women's Division).

She is a member of Sacred Heart Catholic Church and the daughter of Mr. & Mrs. W.L. Weaver of Borger, Texas.

Ms. Schutter is the Director of Anesthesia Department of Hansford Hospital. She has as consultants, Mr. O.L. Futrell, C.R.N.A., from Canadian on the

HOT DOGS & DEATHS
CHICAGO -- Every five days, an American youngster chokes to death on food, and the biggest single culprit is the hot dog, a study indicated.

Every May we salute older Americans--their achievements, wisdom, courage and strength--but what really makes a person "old" in this era of increasing longevity?

Time magazine quotes comedian George Burns, now 88, as saying, "A lot of people practice getting old. They start practicing when they're 70, and when they are 75, they're a hit. They've made it. They are now old."

Burns then added, "Who wants that?"

More than 1,000 Texans aged 55 and over who work for the Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb program certainly don't want that. One of the myths accompanying the "65 is old" myth is that older persons are simply not productive. Yet these Green Thumbs, who work with non-profit organizations in 111 counties, prove daily that their dependability is very good relative to other age groups, and that their capacity to be productive is high.

"Green Thumb workers have decided not to practice being old," said Green Thumb State Director Diane Parrish. "They've decided to practice staying active instead. Medical and social advances have given us longer lives; why waste those extra years when there are so many contributions to be made?"

According to Robert Butler of the National Institute of Aging, there's been a 26 year gain in life expectancy in just the last 80 years, which has given the nation a population of 26 million people over the age of 65.

In previous centuries, a person in his 30's could look old and be old because of disease. Now, people are living longer and looking younger. Experts feel that we have not really extended the inherent life span, which is probably genetically determined--we have simply improved our chances of survival to enjoy the full extent of that life span.

Today, 83 percent of newborn babies will live into their 60's compared with one-third just 150 year ago. What's more, the over-65 age group is increasingly vigorous and healthy. Older people are working longer and taking better care of themselves than ever before.

Among the many things that Springtime brings to mind is Spring Cleaning and Postmaster Robertson has a reminder to include your mailbox in this annual Spring Rite.

Mailbox Improvement Week, May 21 - 26, provides the perfect opportunity to clean, repair, repaint or replace your mailbox.

"Neat, Attractive mailboxes add to the overall appearance of our community and aid in the delivery of mail," the Postmaster said.

Boxes should be within easy reach for letter carriers. On rural routes, the carrier must have access to the box without leaving his vehicle. Mailboxes on rural and contract routes must be located on the right side of the road in the direction traveled by the carrier, the Postmaster said.

"Rain or snow leaking into the mailbox could ruin the special letter, so box seams should be tight to prevent the loss or damage of mail placed in the box," He said.

Box numbers and house numbers should be clearly visible on the box, but including the owner's name is optional.

All mailboxes, must meet certain requirements for size, strength, safety and location. These guidelines are available from the local post office, Postmaster Robertson said.

"WE CARE -The Chemical People"

How can I tell if my child is abusing drugs or alcohol?

If you find alcohol, drugs, or drug paraphernalia in your child's possession, there's a strong probability that your child is using drugs. Certain behaviors also can warn you that your child may be involved with drugs.

- Abrupt change in mood or attitude
• Sudden decline in attendance or performance at work or school
• Sudden resistance to discipline at home or school
• Impaired relationship with family or friends
• Ignoring curfews
• Unusual flare-ups of temper

- Increased borrowing of money from parents or friends; stealing from home, school, or employer
• Heightened secrecy about actions and possessions
• Associating with a new group of friends, especially with those who use drugs

While these behaviors may indicate drug use, they may also reflect normal teenage growing pains. By observing your child, getting to know his or her friends, and talking to your child about problems, including drugs and alcohol, you should be able to learn whether he or she is involved.

What do I say if I think my child is abusing drugs?

In a straightforward way, tell your child about your concern and the reasons for it: taking drugs is harmful to one's physical, mental, and social well-being. Tell your child that you are opposed to any drug use and you intend to enforce that position.

What you should try to be is:

- Understanding ("I realize you're under a lot of pressure from friends to use drugs.")
Firm ("As your parent I cannot allow you to engage in harmful activities.")
Supportive ("I'll help you find a way to say 'No' to drugs.")
Self-examining ("Are my own alcohol and drug consumption habits exerting a bad influence on my child?")

What you should not be is:

- Sarcastic ("Don't think I don't know what you're doing!")
Accusatory ("You're lying to me!")
Stigmatizing ("You're a terrible person!")
Sympathy-seeking ("Don't you see how much you're hurting me?")
Self-blaming ("It's all my fault!")

Such statements tend to make the child defensive and likely to tune you out. Remember, if your child is using drugs, she or he needs your help. You may want help, also. Seeking the support of other parents in your community will enable you to handle this problem in a more understanding and helpful way. Don't be afraid to be a strong parent!

How can I stop my child from using drugs?

If after you've established a rule against drug use, your child violates it, it's time to back up that rule with discipline. Unless you're prepared to enforce it, the rule will become meaningless.

One of the most effective punishments is grounding. Forcing the child to stay home gives parents and the child a chance to talk. Also, it is important to talk to the parents

of your child's friends about why you have taken this necessary action and to ask their support in making it succeed. If peer pressure is part of the problem, grounding removes the child from the group.

If the problem becomes too much for you to handle alone, professional help should be considered. Counselors trained in working with youth can help re-open communication between parent and child. Outside help can supplement your efforts at home with your child's involvement with drugs.

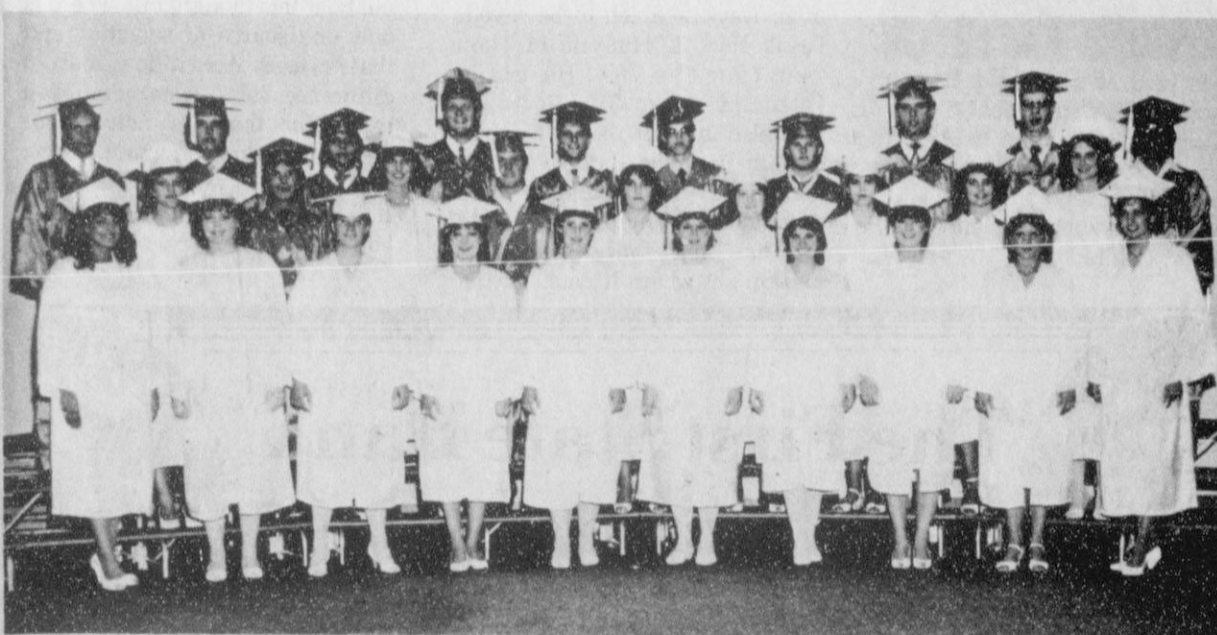

Swimming pool to open Friday

Under the management of the Hansford County YMCA, the Spearman swimming pool will begin operations for the 1984 season on Friday, May 25. Eddie Gage, a fourth grade teacher at Spearman Elementary School will be the pool director for the summer.

For the first time swim lessons will be offered most of the summer. This summer in 1984, the Y will be offering the National YMCA Learn to Swim Program. The program features a progressive style of lessons and the awarding of patches and certificates to children who accomplish determined skill levels.

The swim instruction program will be run in two week sessions starting June 4. Classes will be held on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday afternoons at 5:00, 5:30 or 6:00 p.m. Children will be placed into classes by skill level

which will determine at which time they should come. Parents interested in enrolling their children should contact the Y early, because class sizes are limited. These classes are for children 4 years old and up.

In addition to swim lessons for children, there will be two special times for adults. The pool will be available for adult lap swimming from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday thru Friday. Again this year the Y will be sponsoring ladies water exercise classes on Monday, Wednesday and Friday's from 5:30-6:30. Registration is not necessary to do lap swimming but is required to attend the water exercise class. More information is available by calling the Y.

The swimming pool will be available for open swimming from 1-5 p.m., Monday-Saturday. Since the pool belongs to the city, the city council has set the rates

for the summer's open swim. Daily admission for children 12 and under is \$1.00 and 13 & up is \$1.50. Season passes are Children 12 and under, \$40.00, 13 and over, \$50.00; the family season pass is \$100.00.

During open swim it will be required that all children under 6 be accompanied by an adult. The adult may enter the pool area only if wearing a bathing suit, otherwise they may sit on the bleachers at the North end of the pool. This change in rules is for liability reasons.

The pool may be rented for private parties after 8:30 p.m. These parties must be arranged through the YMCA office.

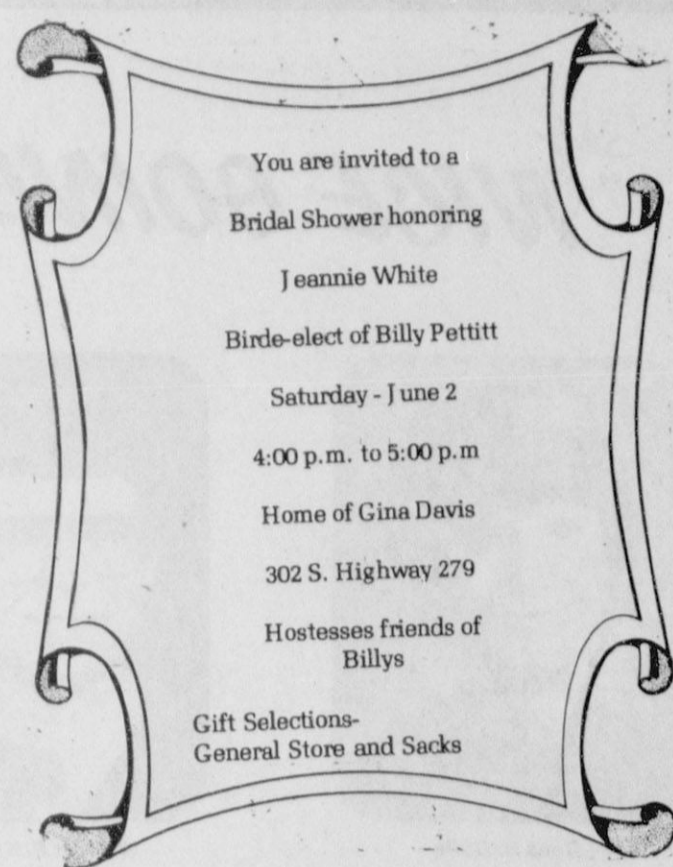

What else can I do?

You can provide accurate information to your children about drugs. To do this, you must know something about drugs. That doesn't mean becoming a drug expert, but it does mean having enough facts to support your views. Unfortunately, many parents wait until their children are involved in drugs before initiating a discussion. That's too late! You should talk with your children before there's a problem. As early as the fourth grade, your children may have some knowledge of the drug scene. Much of their information will be inaccurate and will tend to glamorize drugs. That's why it's important that you be prepared to set the record straight. And remember, don't make your discussion of drugs a one-shot event. Children need to be reminded often of where their parents stand on important issues such as drugs.

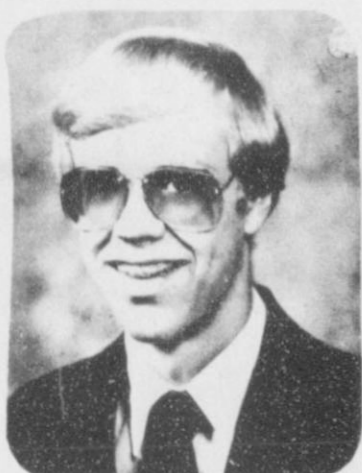
