Workday for farmers

Costs are increasing and prices are low, forcing farmers to operate on narrower dollar margins than in past years. These narrow margins make planning increasingly important. Errors are very costly when there is a low profit margin.

In order to help Hansford County farmers along these lines, we are holding a financial management workshop that will help crop producers develop 1983 crop operating budgets and annual cash flow. These will help identify low profit fields and crops plus allowing for changes in plans to try alternatives on paper before committing dollars to that crop.

The workshops are four nights with some midweek work required from each participant. The registration fee is \$89.00 per farm processed. There will be room for only 40 participants so reservations will be on a first come basis. Call 659-2136 or 733-2901.

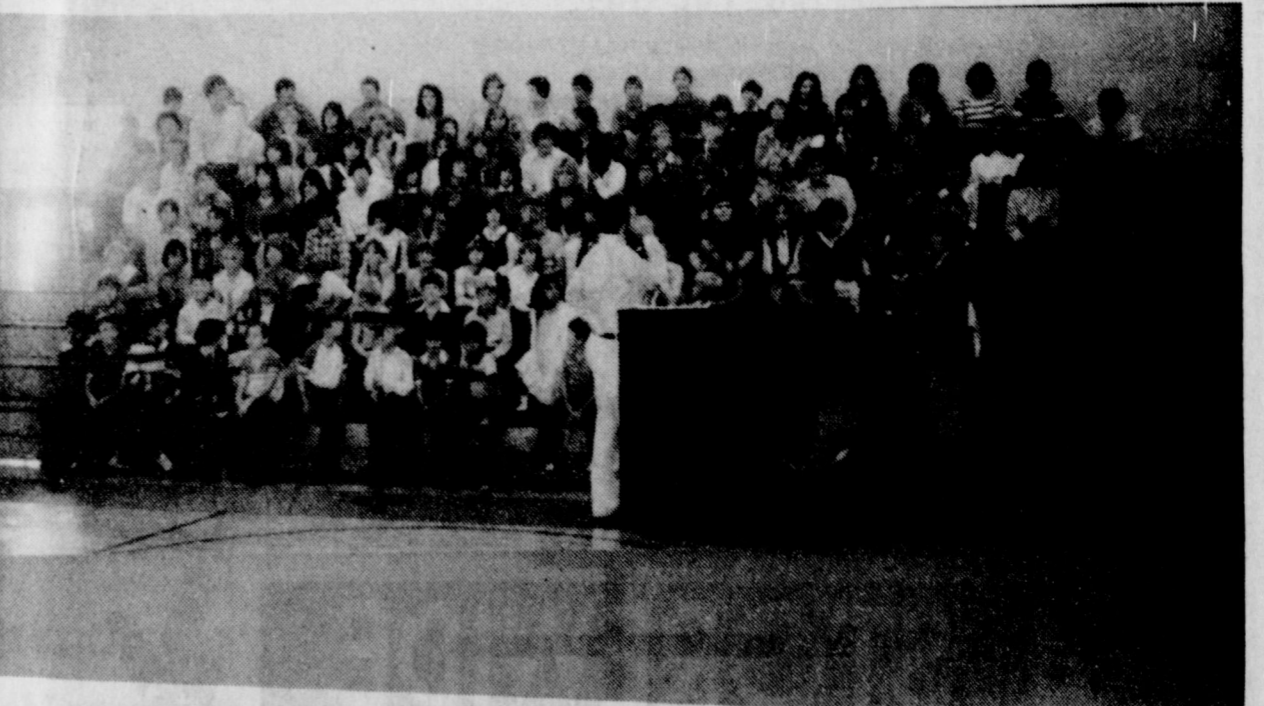

Payment of \$2,550 to Don



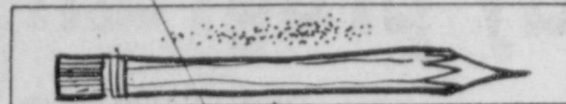

State standards met County jail approved again

There is no rejoicing in "cell-ville" but the taxpayers of Hansford County can breathe a sigh of relief...

The county jail has met certification standards once again! This is a unique accomplishment amid 240 counties with most of them "sweating out" variances until they can comply with the stringent standards required in Texas...

At a time when the neighboring county to the south -- Hutchinson -- was in turmoil resulting in the construction of a new jail facility, Hansford County complied at a cost believed to be the lowest expenditure of any county in the state.

Blakely to be awards banquet speaker

The twenty-fourth annual Hansford Soil & Water Conservation Bankers Award Banquet will be held at the Spearman High School Cafeteria beginning at 7 p.m., Tuesday, Nov. 16, 1982.

Speaker for the occasion will be James Blakely of Wharton, Texas. James commonly called Doc is a full time professional humorist. He has filled speaking engagements all over the United States. He is listed nationally by the Associated Clubs, Inc. as America's number one intellectual humorist.

Dr. Blakely's speech to the Bankers Awards Banquet will cover several important areas.

1. The decline of American productivity and how to correct it free through creativity.
2. How to be insubordinate when necessary without getting fired.
3. Converting an angry confrontation into a fulfilled experience.
4. A Las Vegas system of beating the odds against success in a soft economy.

5. Overcoming stress, job pressures, health problems and family strife with the most powerful emotional tool known more to women than men.

Blakely, a constant joker, claims his Ph.D stands for "post hole digger." He has written five books, the latest of which is DOC BLAKELY'S HANDBOOK OF WIT AND PUNGENT HUMOR.

"It's in its fourth printing," remarks Blakely. "The first three were kind of blurry." His weekly humor column, Pokin' Fun, is carried in 160 publications throughout the U.S. and Canada. The "Doc" quips, "My column is in the bottom of more birdcages than any other humorist on the circuit today." A constant barrage of quips, adlibs, jokes, and quotations earn him the customary fee of \$2,000 plus expenses for about 100 speeches annually.

"Last year I did 115," remarks Blakely, "and I can hardly wait to hear myself for the next one. I've got some new material that even I haven't heard."

"Doc" Blakely has been a member of the National Speakers Association for 8 years and holds a CPAE certificate of professionalism in that association. He was the first recipient of the award which is now shared by such notable personalities as President Ronald Reagan, Art Linkletter, Dr. Norman Vincent Peale and other prominent speakers.

NSA members are active across the U.S. and in other countries speaking primarily to corporations and industry associations on important subjects such as personal growth and development, leadership and sales training, and business management. NSA members average \$995.23 per speech and make 97.6 speeches per year serving clients from the largest multi-national corporations down to small local groups.

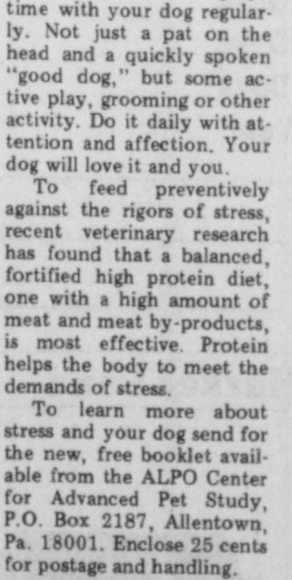

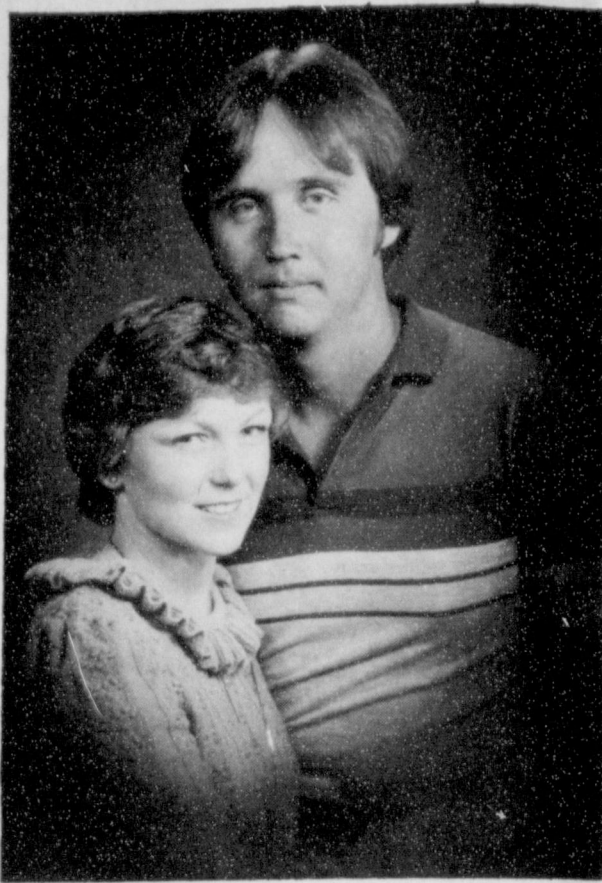
etched on it. It is known as a "Sunday Thimble" because women were allowed to sew with it all day Sunday and weren't supposed to use it on any other day.

California Avocado Scrapbook

Little Known Historical Treasures



Did you know that California avocados are native to Mexico. They first made their way to California in 1911 when Carl Schmidt traveled to Mexico to search for avocados of outstanding quality and the trees from which they grew. He brought several varieties back to California, but only one survived the freeze of 1913... thus it was named Fuerte, a Spanish word for vigorous and strong.

A California postman, Rudolph Haas, discovered the Hass variety with the help of his children. They preferred a thick pebble-skinned fruit which grew on a chance seedling and pointed it out to their father. In 1935, the Hass variety was patented. This variety rounded out the year-round availability of California avocados because it bore during the summer months, just opposite the Fuerte winter variety.

Today, California, which supplies 80% of all the avocados sold in the U.S., grows five well-known varieties for commercial purposes, although there are actually hundreds of California avocado varieties.

California's "avocado country" is a coastal region that spans from San Luis Obispo down to the U.S.-Mexico border. There are approximately 75,000 acres of avocado groves, and in 1980-81, California produced its largest crop in history at around 500 million pounds! Now that's a lot of guacamole!

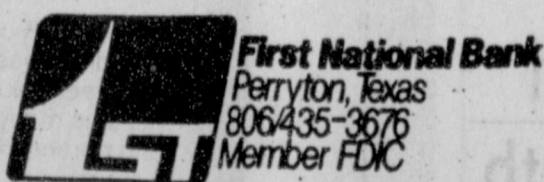

Tax analysis for 1981

AUSTIN--An analysis of the 1981 tax year, recently completed by the State Property Tax Board (SPTB), reveals that property taxes totaling over \$5.75 billion were levied in Texas by approximately 3,250 local taxing units.

School districts accounted for more than \$2.8 billion of the total tax levy, with school taxes up 15.5 percent from 1980. Counties increased taxes almost 23 percent, levying more than \$1 billion, while the levy for cities and towns topped \$1.2 billion, a 14.4 percent increase. Special taxing districts such as hospitals, utilities, junior colleges, rural fire protection districts and others increased tax levies 13.9 percent to \$677 million.

Kenneth Graeber, the State Property Tax Board's executive director, noted that the overall statewide increase in property taxes for 1981 was 16 percent, down slightly from the 19 percent rise in tax levy posted for 1980.

According to Graeber, property taxes levied during 1981 were the primary source of local government revenue for the 1982 fiscal year. They were used by the governing bodies of the various taxing units to provide services of benefit to the community such as public education, fire and police protection, street construction and repair, utilities and health care.

When analyzed on a per capita basis, the SPTB's report showed that 1981 property taxes totaled \$335.08 per person. When adjusted to a base year of 1970 for changes in the consumer price index, however, the real property tax levy for 1981 was \$143.06, compared to a real levy of \$129.71 in 1970.

Graeber pointed out that growth in the overall level of property taxes can be attributed to inflation, which has made services more expensive for local governments to provide, and the accelerating shift of population to Texas which has created a need for expanded and improved community services.

Although the primary source of revenue for local governments, property taxes as a percentage of overall state and local taxes have decreased in every year from 1970 to 1981 except for two years--1975 and 1976. Property taxes accounted for 37 percent of the total state and local tax burden in 1981, down from 43 percent in 1970.

The State Property Tax Board report looked specifically at how the 1981 school tax levy was allocated among the various types of property.

Business real and tangible personal property shouldered 32.3 percent of the school tax burden statewide, followed by single-family residences at 27.4 percent. Owners of oil, gas and other mineral reserves paid 15.3 percent; utilities, 6.4 percent; multi-family residential (such as apartments), 4.1 percent; and banks, 2 percent. Acreage land

accounted for 6.6 percent, while other categories had lesser percentages.

Homeowners received substantial school tax relief in 1981, as did owners of agricultural land qualified for productivity valuation. Homestead exemptions granted by school districts removed more than \$15 billion from tax rolls, and productivity valuation reduced the value of acreage land by over \$18 billion.

In addition to reviewing changes in tax levies, SPTB's annual report discussed the operation during 1981 of county appraisal districts.

County appraisal districts organized under the 1979 Property Tax Code were in the preliminary stages of operation in 1981, with approximately 80 county districts providing valuation services to one or more taxing units. Six of the appraisal districts had provided such services in 1980.

All but 15 of the 254 appraisal districts were providing appraisal services for 1982 to their local taxing units. The remainder delayed implementation until 1983 or 1984 under special provisions in the Property Tax Code.

Concerning the conduct of countywide reappraisals, some 143 districts, or 56 percent, reported that a reappraisal was in progress for 1982. Of the remaining 111 districts, approximately 80 did some form of reappraisal in 1980 or 1981. Others have plans for 1983 or 1984 reappraisals.

In the fall of 1981, appraisal districts statewide adopted 1982 operating budgets totaling \$111.4 million, or approximately 1.94 percent of the statewide tax levy of \$5.75 billion. The average cost for operation of appraisal districts statewide was \$14.30 per real property parcel.

AUSTIN, TEXAS--Dana Collins, a pen rider at McCloy Feedlot, Morse, Texas, today received the first-ever Texas Cattle Feeders Association (TCFA) Heroism Award.

Collins, an employee at McCloy Feedlot since April 1982, in June saved a fellow employee from being dragged by a horse. The \$500 cash award was presented here today during TCFA's 14th Annual Convention. Collins' quick action likely saved her fellow employee's life.

Co-sponsored by Ordway-Saunders Company of Amarillo, the TCFA Heroism Award is

presented to an employee of a TCFA member feedyard who takes action which saves a fellow employee from injury or death.

The Heroism Award is part of the TCFA Safety Program. The goal of the Safety Program is to reduce insurance costs for feedyards and to make feedyard employees more aware of safety hazards in feedyards.

Texas Cattle Feeders Association represents feedyards and cattle feeders in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico. TCFA members annually produce 20% of the fed beef in the nation.

Understanding Your Child

Your Child—In Need Of Special Education?

Having trouble in school, not doing as well as he might, he may be learning disabled. If your child is so diagnosed, what are your options?



Parents should be aware of the options available to them if their children are labeled "learning disabled."

Though programs vary, one principle does govern all schools. The law mandates that students diagnosed as learning disabled be placed in an environment which is least restrictive to learning. In simple terms, your child's placement should be as close to a regular class setting as is educationally feasible.

Special education counselors at Manhattan College, a 129-year-old private, independent institution for higher learning, point out there are four mainstreaming options. One is an itinerant teacher; second is a learning disability consultant; third is a resource room or resource center; and fourth is a self-contained class.

The itinerant teacher program is one which provides individualized instruction for a particular number of hours or days of the week. This tutoring supplements the regular curriculum. In smaller school districts the teacher often travels from school to school. In larger schools where there are more children requiring the service, the teacher's assignment may be more restricted.

The learning disability consultant works directly with teachers without interrupting the child's regular program of instruction. The consultant makes available her training, knowledge and materials so as to enrich the teacher's performance in individualizing the instruction offered to the pupils who have been labeled as learning disabled.

A popular alternative to the teaching of the learning disabled is the use of a resource room or resource center. This center may be found in each school or in a central location which is accessible to students from all the schools within a district. This program usually provides small group instruction, whereas the other options are more apt to be one to one.

The self-contained class is usually one consisting of fewer students and taught by a special education teacher. The children may either remain in this class for an entire day or be programmed into the "mainstream" for particular classes. It is advisable for parents to know their options.

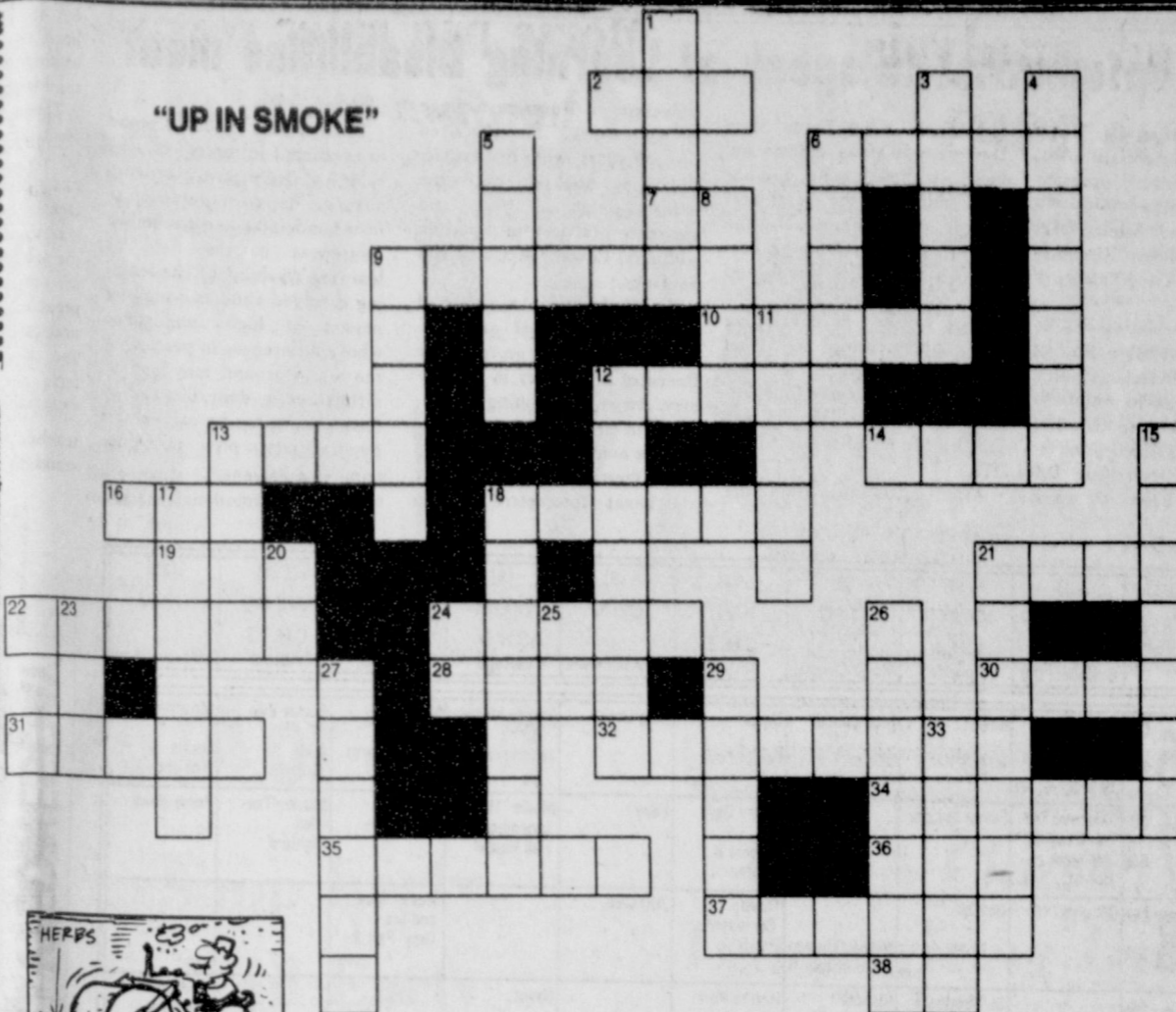

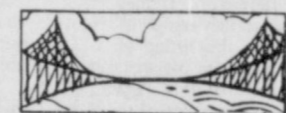

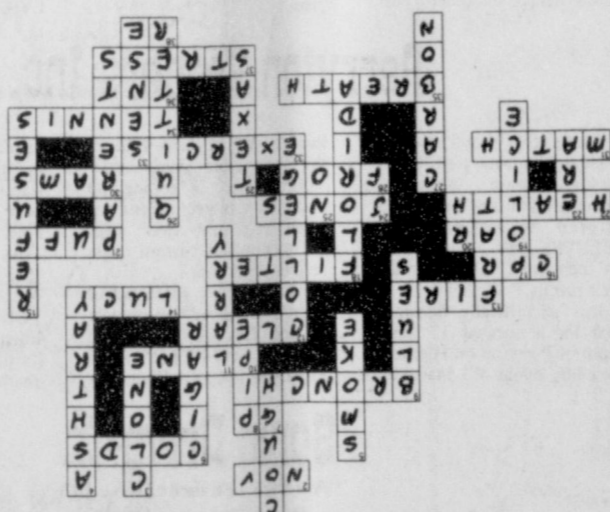

Noted optometrist to speak at Learning Disabilities meet

Noted optometrist Dr. Hugh A. Sticksel, Jr. of Amarillo will present the November program for the North Plains Association for Children and Adults with Learning Disabilities. His timely topic is *How Vision Relates to Learning*.

The monthly meeting will be held at the Fellowship Hall of St. Luke's Presbyterian Church at 5701 Brinkman in Amarillo, on Thursday evening, November 18 from 7:30-9:00 p.m. Personable, youthful Dr. Sticksel has been a guest

lecturer at West Texas State University on visual defects and how they affect learning, and has also addressed the Southwest Congress of Optometry and the Southwest Visual Training Forum as well as many schools and other associations. For his special services in developing and implementing a visual screening program in the Groom and Panhandle Independent School Districts, he was granted life membership in the PTA.

After graduating from the

University of Houston, College of Optometry, he practiced several years with his father, Dr. H.A. Sticksel, until the latter's death in 1969, and currently practices in Amarillo with Drs. Cowan, McCarty and Sansing.

Dr. Sticksel is a member of several professional organizations and has been on the State Board of Examiners in Optometry. An award-winning participant in the Scouting program, he was named in May 1982 the "Optometrist of the Year" by the Texas Optometric Association.

North Plains ACLD is proud to present lecturers of the calibre of Dr. Sticksel in order to advance its main purpose, to foster understanding and public awareness in the field of learning disabilities. The learning disabled child is usually a person of high intelligence whose differences in perceiving the world around him lead to difficulties in daily life and in formal learning; he can exhibit hyperactivity, poor coordination, impulsiveness, short attention span, emotional insecurity.

ity, and specific learning problems with reading, spelling, writing or arithmetic—or any combination of these problems! There is evidence that Einstein, Edison, Churchill and Leonardo da Vinci had learning disabilities. Perhaps because of latent brilliance, the LD child is a challenge to the family and the school. There is no one cure as yet but a variety of approaches. Knowledge leads to understanding and acceptance, and this is why North Plains feels the general public and especially every parent and teacher needs a better understanding of learning disabilities.

Great American Smokeout Nov. 18

COLLEGE STATION--More than 52 million Americans still smoke. Nine of every 10 of them contacted in surveys have said they would like to quit.

But giving up cigarettes isn't easy--and procrastination seems to reign, reports Dr. Mary Ann Shirer, health education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"Any needed behavioral change always seems easier to accomplish when someone joins with you in making the change. This is an ideal time to join the millions of Americans who intend to take a day off from smoking on Nov. 18, the day of the 'Great American Smokeout,'" suggests Shirer.

The Smokeout annually fo-

cuses public attention on cigarette smokers from coast to coast, Shirer reminds.

"It's their day! The Smokeout is an up-beat, good natured effort to encourage smokers to give up cigarettes for 24 hours, if only to prove to themselves that they can do so. Everyone enjoys watching and encouraging them while they try," she says.

During last year's Smokeout, three of every 10 cigarette smokers either cut down or cut out smoking for the day.

"Messiah" set for Nov. 28

The hot-tempered musician was talented within his field as a composer, but he was lucky as a fighter. It seems that he got into an argument with another musician and thanks only to a large button on his coat he lived to tell about it!

Yes, George Friderick Handel (1685-1759) was lucky that day, when an argument led to a sword fight, and his opponent's blade struck a coat button rather than running Handel through. And we today are lucky as well, because Handel went on to become internationally famous for as the composer of the oratorio "Messiah."

Handel was born the son of a surgeon in Halle, Germany and studied to be a lawyer. But his interest was so strong in music that at the age seventeen he became organist at Halle Cathedral. Five years later his first operatic composition, Rodrigo, became a great success in Italy. Handel moved for the second and last time to England in 1712 and in 1726 became a naturalized citizen under King George I. For more than 20 years he composed and produced operas as director of the Royal Academy of Music.

It was in 1728, when the English public became tired of Italian opera, that Handel began composing oratorios, which were operatic in music but designed to be sung by soloists and chorus with orchestra, performing in concerts without stage action.

In 1742 Handel experienced the highlight of his life when he was asked to give a series of concerts in Dublin, Ireland to benefit charity. It was then that he conducted the performance of "Messiah," which immedi-

ately won popular success. He had composed "Messiah" in less than 25 days in 1741. The oratorio was performed a year later in London, and as the singers began the "Hallelujah Chorus" King George II was so impressed that he rose to his feet, the audience did likewise, and a tradition was therein established which survives today.

During the last years of his life, Handel became nearly blind, but he continued to compose and direct his works. At his death he was buried in Westminster Abbey.

The music of Handel's "Messiah" has not diminished in popularity since its first performance, and some years ago became a traditional Christmas presentation. "Messiah" has been performed in Perryton for about 30 years now, and the next performance will take place November 28th. The performance is now an area-wide production, featuring over 125 musicians from the Panhandle of Texas and Oklahoma, including two dozen members of the Amarillo Symphony. Under the direction of Symphony Chorus director George Biffle this year, the performance will begin at 7 p.m. in the Perryton High School Auditorium. This year the performance will serve as both a community Thanksgiving service and an introduction to the Holy season, with a love offering taken to aid needy persons through the Perryton Ministerial Alliance.

The public is cordially invited and encouraged to attend this year's performance of Handel's "Messiah," an oratorio saved by a large coat button.

Shop Early, Mail Early

This year, the Postal Service is joining forces with the business community of Spearman in urging customers to shop early and mail early for the holidays.

Postmaster T. Ray Robertson has officially declared the start of the holiday shopping season by asking shoppers to shop early and mail early this year and to make certain that mail is addressed correctly (including ZIP Codes) and packages are wrapped correctly so that cards and parcels reach their destinations in plenty of time for the holidays.

"Normally, we handle about 6000 pieces of mail a day -- including cards, letters and packages, but during the holiday season, volume goes up to about 8000 pieces," the Postmaster says.

The key to successful holiday mailing is to mail early and correctly. Postmaster Robertson

says that includes planning now for gifts that must travel long distances by Christmas.

"Many overseas mailing dates -- including those for the armed forces stationed overseas -- occur this month. Mailers can get specific information on the interational dates by calling us here at 659-3313," Robertson said.

"Customers should also take care to write legible ZIP Coded addresses for both the intended recipient and the sender. Since mail sorting depends on the ZIP Code as well as the name of the particular city and state, the use of the correct ZIP Code will aid us in processing the mail.

"Last year, our customers helped us tremendously. They mailed early in the season and early in the day. We hope they will choose to cooperate with us again this year, so we both will have an enjoyable holiday mailing season.

This is a tradition the Union Church has had for more than 30 years. The proceeds of this dinner go to support various Missionary Projects and Mis-

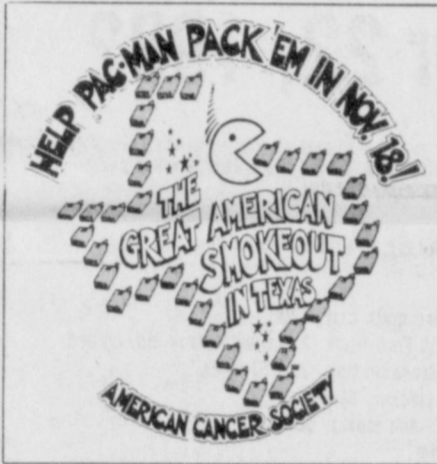
sionaries. One such project is the adoption of a Missionary Family for one year. They send them money on each family members' Birthday, their Anniversary and for the entire family at Christmas.

Shattuck hospital announces two important projects

Dr. H.B. Keith, President of the Board of Directors, has announced that approval for two important projects for Newman Memorial Hospital in Shattuck, Oklahoma, was received on October 27th from the Oklahoma Health Planning Commission. The two projects include the purchase and installation of an EMI 5005 C.T. Scanner and the construction of a helicopter. Extensive studies and interviews preceded this acceptance which will allow the hospital to proceed further as a highly sophisticated medical and emergency trauma center.

The EMI 5005 C.T. Scanner is basically a type of x-ray machine that scans your body with approximately 100 x-ray beams. A computer allows your physician to view the scan on a television. Newman Memorial Hospital will go a step further into modern technology because it will be connected to its consulting radiologists, the Springs Radiology Group in Enid, Oklahoma, by a slow scan television system that will allow the doctor in Enid to view the scan by telephone/video transmission of images. So, as the patient is being scanned, his/her physician at NMH and the consulting visual and verbal communication. Scanning services and benefits, which the National Health Institute recently stated as a significant patient need, previously have not been available to patients in this basically rural area.

The second service and benefit involves the immediate construction of a helipad as a Phase I heliport project. As a specialty and emergency trauma center, NMH receives many emergency patients, as well as patients with more complex health problems. Occasionally these patients must either be transferred to NMH from other hospitals or out to even more specialized care centers. In a continuing effort to safely accommodate current helicopter evacuation of these patients,

Shattuck's hospital will soon construct a FAA approved helipad.

Construction of the helipad is to be completed on December 15, 1982, and installation completion dates have been projected as March 1, 1983, for the C.T. Scanner.
