20th Anniversary To Be Celebrated

Cites P.M. Maize & Brandt Building as a Historical Structure State Senator-Elect Bill Sarpallus to Speak

The Fred Brandt Building was constructed in 1918 by D.E. Dillow for the merchantile partnership of P.M. Maize and his brother-in-law, Fred Brandt.

The original site for this building was at the townsite of Hansford, Texas, six miles west of Spearman. When the Santa Fe Railroad came through the Panhandle in 1919 the town of Spearman was established as the County Seat.

In 1920 the Maize-Brandt Building was moved into Spearman and in 1929 Mr. Brandt became the sole proprietor of the business and operated it until the 1950's. In the early 1970's Roy and Charlene Bulls bought the Brandt Building which now house Sack's Third Avenue. Kay Vernon owns and operates the present business.

A dedication service and reception will be held November 15, at 2:00 p.m. at the Brandt Building. More details will be in Thursday's paper.

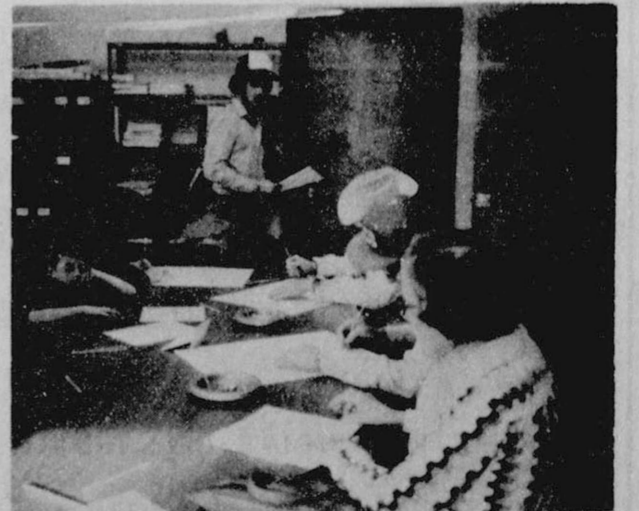

OUTSTANDING CONSERVATIONIST 1980 Erlis Pittman Morse, Texas

Erlis Pittman has been actively involved in the conservation of natural resources of Hansford County since 1936. It was at this time he was appointed to the Hansford Wind Erosion Conservation District. He served in this position until August 22, 1950, when the Hansford Soil and Water Conservation District was organized. Erlis then served as a District director on this board until January, 1953.

He, his wife Ethel, and two sons, Frank and Bill, own and operate farming and ranching enterprises in southwest Hansford County. These operations consist of approximately 2400 acres of dry and irrigated cropland and 3300 acres of rangeland.

Recognizing the need for irrigation water conservation, he has installed several miles of underground irrigation pipeline and a center pivot sprinkler irrigation system. Diversion terraces were also installed on portions of his sloping dryland cropland to reduce erosion.

Conservation of rangeland resources was another of his objectives. Livestock water ponds and water storage facilities were constructed. Range seeding was done to improve the quality grasses available for grazing. Cross-fences have also been installed to improve his grazing system.

This year we salute Mr. Pittman as Outstanding Conservationist. His pioneering efforts in the soil and water conservation movement have helped to preserve these precious natural resources for all of us to utilize now and in future years.

Mrs. Bert Sheppard, actively involved in the betterment of home and family life, has exhibited outstanding qualities of devotion, trust and leadership in this community through participation in Extension Homemaker Clubwork for fifteen years.

WAR'S GRIP LIFTED AND FIGHTING ENDS

FLAME DIES ON BATTLE FRONT AT 6 A. M.

REVOLT BREAKS GERMANY, REBELS FORM REPUBLICS

Terms Signed by Huns Leave Them at the Mercy Of Allies.

MOBS PARADE BERLIN, FIRE ON PRINCE'S PALACE

(By Associated Press) While the curtain was rolling down on the most stupendous tragedy in mankind's history, events were moving with terrible swiftness in Germany, the nation about which revolved the plot and counter plot of the drama. Berlin, Leipzig, Stuttgart, Cologne, Hamburg and Frankfurt are in the hands of the revolutionists who last week raised the red flag at Kiel. Germany's navy apparently is scattered into disjointed units, each seeking sanctuary in Danish ports or waiting in German harbor for the latest turn of event.

Crowds singing the "Marseillaise" are marching thru the streets of autocratic Berlin, and a soldiers' and workmen's council has taken over the government of the empire.

Wuerttemberg, Schleswig-Holstein and Hesse-Darmstadt have declared themselves independent republics, following the action taken by Bavaria last Friday. Wilhelm II of Wuerttemberg is reported to have abdicated. Saxony is said to be near a like declaration and the revolutionists are said to be in control at Dresden.

The republic of Poland has served official notice on Austria that Poland has annexed the crownland of Galicia.

(By Associated Press.) Paris, Nov. 11.—The situation in Germany today as far as it

can be ascertained from news arriving thru Switzerland, may be summed up as follows:

In Prussia the emperor is gone and a Socialist government in an undetermined form is in power.

In Bavaria and Wuerttemberg republics have been proclaimed.

KAISER MAY FACE TRIAL IN ENGLAND FOR MURDER, IS NOT SAFE IN HOLLAND

(By Associated Press.) It is suggested that William Hohenzollern is not safe from the consequences of his deeds, even tho he has fled to Holland. After the sinking of the Lusitania and during the early days of aerial raids on London he was three times indicted for murder in England. Under international law, it is said, requisition for his extradition may be made by England under the indictments still standing against him.

FORMER KAISER SEEKS REFUGE IN FAMOUS DUTCH CASTLE

(By Associated Press.) Washington, Nov. 11.—William Hohenzollern arrived Sunday morning in Holland and is proceeding to Middachten castle in the town of Desteeg, according to a dispatch received by the American arm general staff from The Hague, based on press reports in the Netherlands capital.

The dispatch, dated Sunday, said: "Press reports state that the kaiser arrived Sunday morning at Maestricht, Holland, and is proceeding to Middachten castle in the town of Desteeg, near Utrecht."

Both the former German emperor and his eldest son, Frederick William, crossed the Dutch frontier Sunday morning, according to advices from The Hague.

The former German emperor's party, which is believed to include Field Marshal von Hindenburg, arrived at Eysden on the Dutch frontier, at 7:30 o'clock, Sunday morning, according to Daily Mail advices.

Practically the whole German general staff accompanied the former emperor and ten automobiles carried the party. The automobiles were bristling with rifles and all the fugitives were armed.

The ex-kaiser was in uniform. He alighted at the Eysden station and paced the platform, smoking a cigarette.

Eysden lies about midway between Liege and Maestricht, on the Dutch border.

(By Associated Press.) The greatest war in history ended Monday morning at 6 o'clock, Washington time, after 1,567 days of horror, during which virtually the whole civilized world has been convulsed. Announcement of the tremendous event was made at the state department at the capital at 2:45 o'clock Monday morning, and in a few seconds was flashed thruout the continent by the Associated Press.

Details of the terms dictated by Marshal Foch on Monday forenoon to the German armistice delegates have not been given out, but it is believed they are of such a nature as to protect the world from a resumption of the struggle by the Germans. It is assumed that they call for the demobilization of Germany's army, the surrender of part of her fleet and the dismantling of the rest and the evacuation of occupied portions of France and Belgium and of Alsace-Lorraine. It is probable also that Germany has agreed to call home all her troops now in Russia and Rumania.

The terse announcement of the state department did not tell anything of the scene at Marshal Foch's headquarters at the time the armistice was signed. It was stated, however, that at 6 o'clock Paris time, the signatures of Germany's delegates were fixed to the document which blasted forever the dreams which embroiled the world in a struggle which has cost, at the very lowest estimate, 10,000,000 lives.

TEUTONIC MONARCHS BURIED AMID RUINS.

When the war began the Teutonic alliance was headed by two of the proudest houses in history—the Hohenzollerns and the Hapsburgs. Today, William II, of Germany, is a fugitive in Holland and Charles I, of Austria, while he still may be in his country, has been stripped of power and has seen his empire shattered. Ferdinand of Bulgaria, another of the rulers in the Teutonic combination, has fled from his country and Mohammed V of Turkey who also joined in the attempt of Germany to dominate the world, is dead, slain, it is said, by the hand of an assassin.

(By Associated Press.) Washington, Nov. 11.—President Wilson will read the terms of the armistice with Germany before a joint session of congress, Monday.

So few members had returned Monday from their election vacation that when word of the president's coming speech reached the capitol there was some doubt whether enough could be mustered for a joint session.

All members here were hastily called together, however, and arrangements made for a joint session at 1 o'clock Monday afternoon.

CRASH OF POST BOMBS FIRST AROUSES CITY AND HERALDS NEWS OF GREATEST OF DAYS

(By LUTE H. JOHNSON.) At 12:45 the flash came; the armistice was signed. At 12:46 the first bomb went up from The Post. It cracked upon a sleeping Denver. Denver woke up. As bomb followed bomb citizens tumbled from their beds; hotels began emptying their rooms into the corridors. Peace! At 12:47 the cry of the newsboy was heard on the streets. "The War is Over!" It was the headline of the first Post extra; it became the cry of the waking city. At 12:48 a bargeshead man came running. He stopped at

The Post window and whispered as a prayer: "The war is over." His boy is in France. In five minutes from downtown hotels and sleeping apartments, women and men began trickling to the streets, saying to themselves: "The war is over!" In five minutes it was a cry and a dozen half-dressed stood in front of The Post, dazed by the news, saying to one another as tho half believing: "The war is over!" All Roads Led to The Post. In ten minutes it was a stream—a stream that had the office of The Post for its focus. The voice became raised; it was spoken aloud: "The war is over!"

The whistles had taken up the chorus, windows had been thrown up and pistol shots began to crack; a whoop was lifted here and there, but most of all the stream kept growing, kept gathering from a wider area; reached further and further back into the city and flowed downtown. In fifteen minutes it was a flood. Men, women and boys appeared as if by magic; autos sprang into being; Fifteenth and Sixteenth were full of a moving, surging crowd. To the shriek of the whistles joined the ringing of the cathedral bells; auto horns took up the cry; the crack of The Post bombs had been echoed to the farthest bounds of the city. In twenty minutes it was a chering mass of humanity packing Champs street, the city alive and active. None could sleep. By

auto, on foot, men, women, boys and girls came gathering enthusiasm as they came: "The war is over!" The words that had first come from choked voices became lifted as an anthem. The prayer had become a song of praise. All cried it, it sang in the hearts. The mountains, grim sentinels of the ages, were being bombarded by the pantheons of a Denver gone mad with joy.

Tears Mingle With Laughter.

"The war is over!" How can anybody sleep cried gray-haired mothers who had come running to The Post, afraid to hope against hope, knowing yet it must be true since the bombs were the bombs of The Post. Tears mingled with laughter as they saw,

Christmas Mailing Tips Offered

With the Christmas mailing season just ahead, the Spearman Postmaster is offering some tips for customers to make sure their cards and packages arrive on time and in good shape.

In addition to shopping early, Postmaster Robertson urges customers to properly address cards and packages with the name, street number and name or post office box number, and the city, state and ZIP Code reserved for the last line. It's also a good idea to put a slip of paper with the recipient's name and address and your return address inside parcels. Be sure to include your return address including your ZIP Code on all envelopes and packages.

Postmaster Robertson also reminds customers to check the size of their envelopes before mailing Christmas cards. Letter size standards which went into effect last year require envelopes to be at least 3 1/2 inches high and 5 inches long to be accepted for mailing.

The Postal Service is also asking its customers to put an ounce of extra care into preparing packages for mailing. Parcels will arrive at their destination in good shape if mailers follow a few simple instructions:

1. Make sure the contents are well-cushioned and there is no

empty space in the box. Use crumpled newspaper around the item, on the bottom, the sides and on top of your gift. Foamed plastic shells and air pocket padding also are good cushions.

2. Brown wrapping paper and twine cord are not necessary. Wrappings can rip off, and twine can get caught in processing machinery.
3. Use sealing tape to close off and seal the box. Three types are recommended: pressure-sensitive tape, kraft paper reinforced with nylon or glass and filament-reinforced pressure-sensitive tape. Don't use masking tape or cellophane tape. They're no longer recommended due to past poor performance.
4. Use a smudge-proof ink for the address which should appear in the lower right-hand corner of the box. Write your return address in the upper left-hand corner. BE SURE TO INCLUDE THE ZIP CODE FOR BOTH THE ADDRESS'S ADDRESS AND YOUR RETURN ADDRESS.
5. Remove any other labels or addresses from the carton.
6. Mail early in the month and mail early in the day to avoid the rush.
7. Send irreplaceable articles, cash and all valuable items by registered mail.

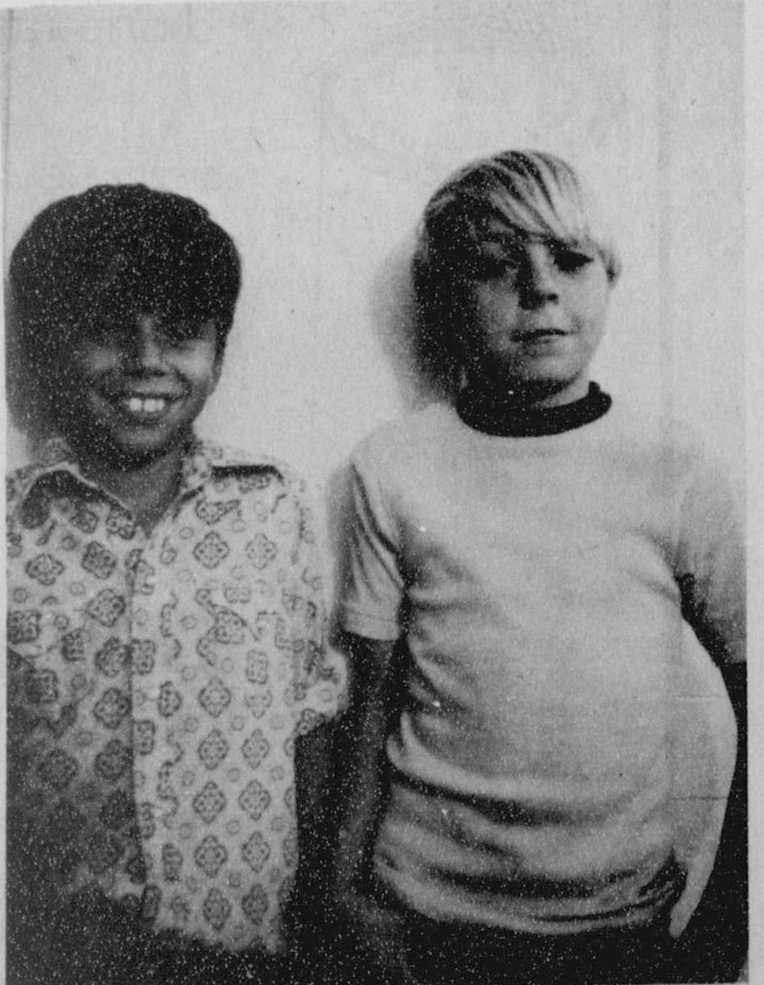

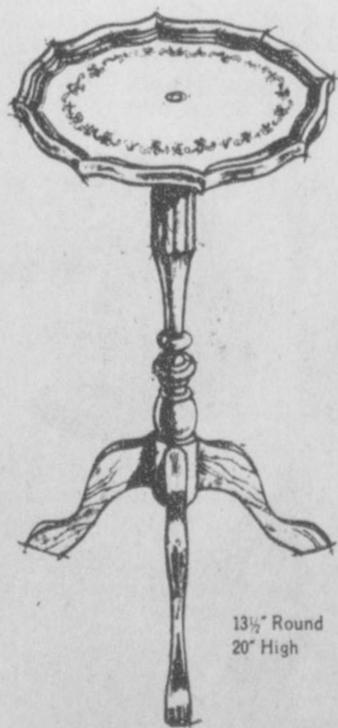
