



voluntary diversion could amount to an additional 30 percent. A bushel of wheat is worth \$3.26 at Hansford County elevators.

The cash payments and PIK grain represent the diversion of some 86,000 acres of Hansford County cropland from the production of wheat, according to ASCS figures. Martin said that 60% of this diversion was in PIK.

Grain producers will begin getting their PIK entitlements on July 1 and have until Nov. 30 to dispose of the grain.

Amount of PIK grain is computed on the established yield of a farm.

The payment will be either in grain the producer has under loan or in the grain reserve program, the ASCS executive points out. If the producer has no grain in either, he will harvest 1984 wheat

Texas farms as a whole gained in numbers and decreased in size between 1978 and 1982, but Hansford county farms decreased from 355 in 1978 to 315 in 1982, according to a recently released census of agriculture. The report, which was compiled by the Bureau of the Census in Washington, shows that the county lost some 37,000 farm acres.

A farm is defined as any place from which \$1,000 or more agricultural products were sold. Statewide, however, Texas gained almost 10,000 farms, increasing from 175,395 in 1978 to 185,026 in 1982. Texas lost over 5,000,000 farm acres, though.

The census report continues to go into interesting detail about the precise characteristics of the modern Hansford county farm. For example, the land from which crops were harvested decreased to 318,247 in 1982 from the 365,870 figure in 1978. Irrigated farms were down 198 in 1982 from the 242 figure on 1978. The low prices farmers receive for their products and the high cost of production is cited as the cause.

County farmers sold \$361.6 million in agricultural products with \$194.6 coming from crops, while \$167.0 million came from the sale of livestock or poultry.

The value of those declining number of farms has also increased dramatically, from an average of \$700,458.00 in 1978 to \$925,511 in 1982.

Family owned farms decreased from 285 in 1978 to 253 in 1982 with partnership farms decreasing from 43 in 1978 to 35 in 1982.

Operators in age group show that 14 farmers are under 25; 47, 25 to 34 years; 77 are 35 to 44; 65 are 45 to 54; 67 are 55 to 64 and 45 are 65 years and over. Average age of the Hansford County farmer is 48.2 years.

The county cattle industry followed the trend seen on the farms. The farms with cattle and calves dropped to 194 in 1982 from 211 in 1978. The number of cattle in the county also dropped from 203, 792 in 1978 to 167, 200 in 1982.

There was an overall decline in the number of farms harvesting corn from 73 in 1978 to 19 in 1982, and a drop in the number of bushels harvested to 454,055 from the 1,927,714 in 1978.


Farms raising grain sorghum declined to 196 from the 237 in 1978 bushels produced rose some however with 5,574,348 from 5,318,043 in 1978. There were 241 farms raising wheat in 1982 compared to 247 in 1982. More bushels were produced 3,538.050 in 1982 from 2,870,217 in 1978.

For other crops in 1982 there were 6 farmers raising oats for grain, 2 raising cotton, 2 raising soybeans, 57 raising hay.

The report also provides data of farm expenses, livestock and poultry purchased was \$104 million in 1982 off from the \$141.6 million in 1978. Feed for livestock and poultry was \$42,266,000 down from the 1978 figure of \$45,561,000. Commercial fertilizer cost farmers \$2,733,000 in 1982, and hired farm labor was up only slightly to \$4,077,000 in 1982 from the \$4,057,000 figure in 1978. Interest expense was listed as \$5,021,000 in 1982. Customwork, machine hire was up totaling \$1,759,000 in 1982 from \$1,659,000 in 1978. Energy and petroleum products showed a big increase in the period to \$8,245,000 in 1982 from \$6,493,000 in 1978.

Shuttle service will be offered from both churches beginning at 6:00 p.m. to take those who would like transportation to and from the Camp Meeting.




In January, 1984 the Hansford County Tax Office mailed new valid Voter Certificates to every registerd voter in Hansford County. These Certificates are blue in color.


One- Romans 3:10, In all of the world that God made there is no man who is good enough to make heaven on his own. Two- Romans 3:23, There is not







In the Boys Midget Division Chris Porter won first place in the high jump with a jump of 4-1. In the Young Men's Division,


Steve Burke won first place in the Shot with a throw of 51-6 3/4. Steve also won first in the discus with a throw of 155-6.

# **Texas residents** warned of fire dangers

Texas residents should be conscious of the threat of fire at all times. But, according to the Building Advisory Council of Texas, certain times of the year are especially hazardous in residential areas. The upcoming July 4th weekend is one.

"If you live in a neighborhoods with homes and apartments roofed with readily combustible wood shingles, you should be even more alert over this holiday weekend," says H.V. "Corky" Moss, President of the BAC. "Such roofing can easily be ignited by sparks or embers from other fires," adds Moss.

The BAC recommends that all residential roofing materials meet a UL Class A fire rating.

Although many city ordinances in Texas prohibit the sale of fireworks, people can and do find a source for fireworks during the tacting the already hot charcoal and instantly burn back up the stream engulfing your hand and flames.

Do not throw any "supposedly" extinguished cigarette onto the ground. Dispose of them in an ashtray or ground them into the pavement with your foot.

# Panhandle history book published

SPEARMAN, TEXAS 79081

The Panhandle-Plains Historical Society has recently published a book on a little known aspect of Panhandle history, according to Dianna Everett, Director of Publications. "The book, which is titled European Folk Islands in Northwest Texas, is basically an outgrowth of a traveling exhibit produced in 1982 by the Panhandle-Plains Museum and funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities. The exhibit featured history and culture of Germans, Ples, Czechs, Italians, Norwegians, and other European groups who settled in the Panhandle between 1890 and 1920, and it was on display in many of the ethnic communities in this part of the state," she said.

The new book summarizes and expands much of the information presented in the 1982 exhibit. It was edited by Dr. Bobby Weaver, Archivist at the Museum and also interim Curator of Ethnology. Weaver was director of the Folk Islands exhibit project, and he arranged for various historians to write articles on ethnic communities presented in the exhibit.

"Most Texans realize that there were Germans and Czechs who settled in the Texas hill

fifty Euopean folk settlements were established in northwest Texas, and each of these communities has an interesting history and sometimes still has something of an ethnic atmosphere," he added.

Regardless of what type roofing material you have on your home, you should still be especially cautious over this holiday weekend. The Building Advisory Council of Texas offers the following advice:

Cut dead foliage from last winter's freeze around your home. If you live in an apartment, request that the maintenance people do this. This will eliminate a potentially combustible source of fire near your home.

Do not burn trash without first checking with your local fire department. Many Texas cities have ordinances prohibiting your doing this. They also would have a central dump or special trash pick-up service you could use.

If your lawn is dry, water it well. This will eliminate a potentially combustible source for fire near your home by moistening the grass' root system to create a "buffer fire zone" around your home.

Do not pile or store combustible material such as grass cuttings near the house. Bags of dried grass clippings piled against the house or underneath an outside stairway are a definite fire hazard.

Do not leave outdoor charcoal or gas burners unattended. If you cook with charcoal, submerge the remaining coals in water after you finish. A slight wind blowing into the air intake section of the cooker can rekindle a flame in those supposedly "dead coals."

Do not use gasoline or kerosene to ignite charcoal when cooking outdoors. Special charcoal starter fuels are produced with a low flash point for safer use. And once the coals are burning, do not become impatient and add more starter. A stream of charcoal starter pouring from a container can flame immediately upon con-

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
