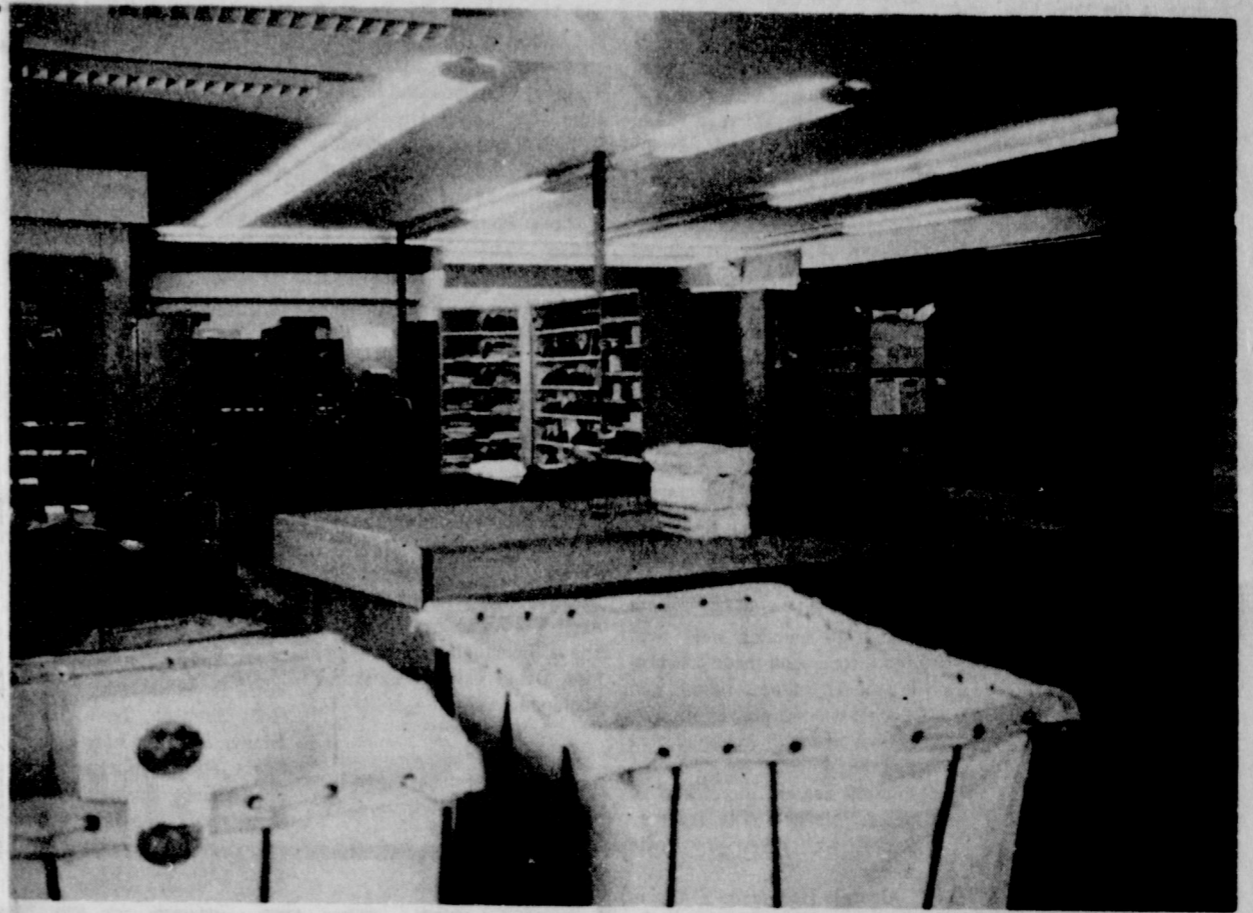

## Holy week services planned

"Hosanna! Blessings on Him Who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessings on the coming kingdom of our father David! Hosanna in the heavens!"

There is a Sunday Church School class for you on Palm Sunday and every Sunday at 9:45 a.m.

"The Lord's Discipline" will be the subject of Pastor Edward D. Freeman's Palm Sunday sermon at the service for the public worship of God at 11:00 a.m.

Henry and Mary Cornelius will be honored at a public reception at the church on Palm Sunday from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. on the happy occasion of their fortieth wedding anniversary.

Presbyterians join with First Christian, Faith Lutheran, and First United Methodist Church in our services this week, Wednesday, 7:30 p.m. at the Methodist Church; Maundy Thursday communion at 7:30 p.m. at the Presbyterian Church; Good Friday at 7:30 p.m. at Faith Lutheran; Easter Sunrise Service at 6:30 a.m. and First Christian.

High Schoolers class every Wednesday at 7:00 p.m. Presbyterians also join with all the churches in the Spearman Ministerial Alliance in a union Good Friday service at 1:00 p.m. at the Assembly of God.

There is a warm, friendly welcome at all services and activities of the First Presbyterian Church.

Sunday, April 8, is Palm Sunday. Palm Sunday was once known as "Hosanna Sunday. On this day all Christian churches remember Jesus' coming into Jerusalem on the Sunday before He died (Matthew 21:1-11; Luke 19:28-44; John 12:12-19), in fulfillment of the prophecy in Zechariah 9:9-12. The people cried, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Hosanna to the highest!" Hosanna means "save now." The people honored Jesus by throwing palm branches along His path.

Holy Week is divided into two

sections. The first, Monday to Wednesday, is a time of preparation for the second part of the week. "Spring cleaning" had its beginning during Holy Week. People carefully cleaned their homes to be ready for the rest of Holy Week and the Easter celebration. The second part of Holy Week, Thursday to Saturday, is given to prayer and special worship in the home and in the churches.

Spearman Ministerial Alliance is sponsoring its second annual Religious Arts Show during Holy Week, April 9-14, at the Hansford County Library. Artists are asked to bring in their works on Monday, April 9 at 10:00 a.m. They will be on display each day Monday through Saturday, 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon, 2:00 to 6:00 p.m. Artists are asked to pick up their works between 5:00 and 6:00 p.m. on Saturday.

The Rev. Frank Oglesby will be speaking at a union Holy Week service on Wednesday, April 11, at 7:30 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church. Maundy Thursday became known as the "Day of the Resurrection."

Maundy Thursday is often called "the birthday of the chalice (cup)." On this day we remember especially the institution of the Lord's Supper. The word "maundy" comes from the Latin "I command."

Maundy Thursday became known as the "Day of the Commandment." Churches thought about what Jesus had said when He washed the feet of His disciples (John 13:14). Churches remember that the Epistle twice states: "This do in remembrance of Me." (I Cor. 11:24, 25).

The Rev. Edward D. Freeman will give the communion meditation at a union Maundy Thursday communion service, April 12, at 7:30 p.m. at the First Presbyterian Church.

Sacred Heart Catholic Church will have a Maundy Thursday Mass of the Lord's Supper and foot washing at 8:30 p.m.

Good Friday comes from "God's Friday," the first English name for this day.

Spearman Ministerial Alliance will have a union Good Friday service on April 13 at 1:00 p.m. at the Assembly of God. The Rev. Frank Oglesby will deliver the sermon. All clergy attending will have a part in the service. Most businesses in Spearman will be closed from 1:00 to 2:00 p.m. on Good Friday to enable working people to attend this service.

Sacred Heart Catholic Church on Good Friday at 6:45 p.m. will have the Passion with homily, veneration of the Cross, and a communion service.

There will be another union Good Friday service at 7:30 p.m. at Faith Lutheran Church. Herb Hoff will preach the sermon.

Holy Saturday is the last day in Lent. It is a day on which we look forward to the joy of Easter. On this day the early church baptized those who had been taking instructions. Sacred Heart Church at 6:45 p.m. will have the Easter vigil, lighting of the new lights, and the mass of the resurrection.

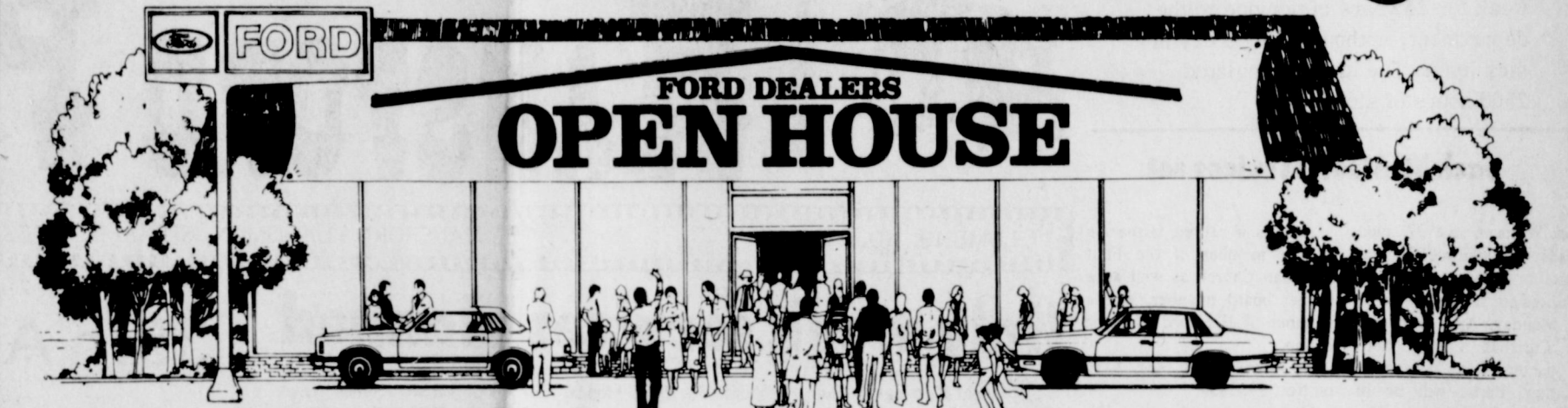

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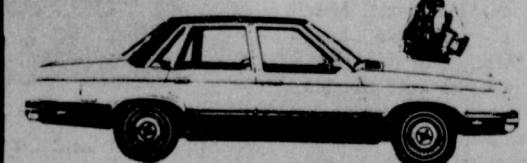

## New FmHA Farm Loan Rate

WASHINGTON--Details on loan programs affected by higher interest rates announced March 21 by Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland were given today by Gordon Cavanaugh, administrator of the Farmers Home Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture. Cavanaugh said the 9 and 9 1/2 percent interest rates on most programs will be effective beginning March 28. The interest rate for most loans was 8 1/2 percent.

Insured real estate loans will be made at 9 percent. These loans include farm ownership, emergency and economic emergency real estate loans, individual soil and water, individual recreation, grazing association, irrigation and drainage and Indian land acquisition loans. Interest on regular insured operating loans will be 9 1/2 percent. The new interest rate will apply also to natural disaster emergency and economic emergency operating loans used to pay for livestock, equipment, feed, seed, fertilizer and to make minor improvements to buildings and real estate. Interest on loans to "limited-resource" farmers will remain at 3 percent for initial farm ownership loans and at 5 percent for operating loans.

FmHA's natural disaster emergency loans for production losses will continue to be made at the 5 percent rate. Home mortgage interest, set at 9 percent in early February, will remain the same. Cavanaugh said he did not expect further increases in interest rates this year.

Bergland said Wednesday, "Interest rates are an important mechanism to help control inflation. The cost to the government for money has increased substantially in the past year. Continuing present rates would result in major losses to the government."

## Fat Cattle Up In Area

Sam Thomas, manager of agricultural development for Southwestern Public Service Company in Amarillo, has announced that 4,974,530 fat cattle were produced in 1978 in the 45,000 square mile area served by SPS. This is an increase of 600,680 or 13.7 percent over the previous year. The survey, which has been conducted since 1963, is quoted throughout the United States as the most authoritative source as to the production of fat cattle in the Southern Great Plains area.

"During the 1978 period, the feedlot capacity came to 2,728,400, which reflects a reduction of about 6,000 head over 1977. This also represents the consolidation of feedlots and the conversion to growing operations," Thomas said. On April 5th, 1979 Governor William Clements will "roll up his sleeves" to fight cancer...by signing a proclamation declaring April Cancer Control Month in Texas and by donating blood to the American Cancer Society's Blood for Cancer program.

4 1/2 year old Christopher Smardz will accept the proclamation on behalf of over 100,000 ACS volunteers working for 360 local ACS organizations in Texas. Christopher, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Smardz of Missouri City, is currently being treated for leukemia and is a recipient of the Blood for Cancer program.

Governor Clements will meet with ACS state leaders during the signing ceremony to highlight concurrent American Cancer Society fundraising and blood donor pledge drives being conducted during April.

The Blood for Cancer program is a cooperative program between the American Cancer Society and many Texas blood banks. Cancer requires the greatest number of blood transfusions of any disease known today. Changes and improvements in the treatment has meant cancer patients often require literally hundreds of units of blood or blood components. Combined with Chemotherapy and Radiotherapy advances, transfusion of blood has become a powerful new tool in the fight against cancer.

Blood donors recruited by ACS volunteers help create a fund of blood credits at local blood banks. The blood is available to any cancer patient at approximately one half the normal fee (due to the elimination of the recruitment expense). Blood for Cancer volunteers hope to recruit 20,000 donor pledges during the drive. Persons wishing to pledge a blood donation should contact their local volunteer unit of the American Cancer Society.

The fundraising goal of the Texas Divisions ACS for 1978-79 is \$6,500,000. The funds are used to support the Society's three part program of Research, Service to patients and Education. # Easter Eggs Rich in History

Dr. David B. Mellor, poultry marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says it's easy to see how the egg came to be a traditional Easter symbol. "The egg has long been a symbol of renewed life, especially in the pre-Christian spring festivals. In some faiths, it even symbolizes the beginning of the world."

"According to American folklore, Easter eggs really come to us from the Easter bunny. This tradition supposedly comes from Germany and France," Mellor explains. "Some French children still believe the rabbit runs to Rome to get eggs from the Pope."

Even though our custom of decorating and giving eggs at Easter is a symbol of resurrection, this custom actually started in China about 750 B.C., points out Mellor.

The specialist believes one of the most unusual eggs is the pysanka -- a Ukrainian Easter egg. The highly decorated egg is developed with stylus, beeswax, dyes, artistic ability, and a lot of patience.

"But no matter how you decorate your eggs, be sure to use pure food dyes and to prepare them properly so they are safe to eat," Mellor cautions. He offers these suggestions, taken from a leaflet, "About Eggs...Cooking in the Shell," available at any county

Extension office.

First, age eggs at room temperature for 24 hours before cooking to simplify peeling. Place eggs with small ends down during this period.

Prior to cooking, put eggs in a pan of warm water. This helps prevent cracked shells when eggs are placed in hot water.

Bring water to a rapid boil, using enough water to come one inch above eggs. Transfer eggs to boiling water with a spoon. Reduce heat to keep water just below simmering. Hold for 18 minutes.

Cool eggs promptly and thoroughly in cold water. This makes the shells easier to remove and helps prevent dark surfaces on yolks.

Be sure to use only clean, sound eggs--Grades Fresh Fancy, AA or A--for cooking in the shell," advises Mellor. "To prevent gray-green discoloration of egg yolks, avoid overcooking. Immediate plunging into cold water also helps prevent yolk discoloration."

### Insurance Corner

CHARCOAL AND CARBON MONOXIDE

Do-it-yourself barbecue chefs should to their barbecuing out in the open. Otherwise, warns the National Safety Council, what starts out to be a festive meal may result in a tragedy.

Many persons regard charcoal briquets as harmless to use indoors, never dreaming that large quantities of carbon monoxide can accumulate.

You need plenty of air to get rid of the poisonous gases from burning charcoal. Poisonings and even asphyxiations have been reported when briquets were burned indoors.

Some advice: Don't burn briquets in a garage or basement or any other enclosed area such as a porch, tent or cabin.

If you absolutely must use charcoal indoors, place it near an open window or door as a sensible precaution against accumulating carbon monoxide. If used in a fireplace make certain that the damper is wide open - not half way. It's the only way to be sure the lethal gases can escape.

### Agricultural News

Several area producers have inquired about controlling prairie dogs in their pastures and range lands.

Strychnine treated oats is the only recommended type of control for the prairie dog. To use the poisoned oats effectively, one should pre-bait the prairie dog towns with non-poisoned oats. The non-poisoned oats should be placed on hard dirt around each hole in the town. The oats should be monitored and after the non-poisoned oats have been cleaned up, usually in about three days, the poisoned oats should then be used to bait the holes in the same manner as the non-poisoned oats.

Baiting of prairie dog towns should be done prior to the greening of grass. After grass has become green, prairie dogs will ignore the grain for the grass.

Producers who wish to use poison grain for prairie dog control must have their certified private applicator license as strychnine is a restricted use pesticide. Producers should read and follow label instructions on this and other pesticides used.

**BLOAT IN WHEAT PASTURE CATTLE**  
Many area producers have indicated that they are planning on grazing out their wheat this year. These producers should be concerned about bloat in their wheat pasture cattle as conditions for this problem to develop are great.

Bloat is a major cause of death of cattle grazing winter wheat and is second only to shipping fever in total numbers lost. However, the economic loss is equal to or greater than that of shipping fever because of the size of cattle affected. In addition, the best producers, or those gaining the most weight, appear to be the first affected.

Some methods of prevention, their advantages and limitations are as follows:  
1. Roughage - Advantage - Stimulates rumen motility; reduces the amount of wheat consumed in given time.  
Disadvantage - unless close surveillance is kept some animals may not consume enough

roughage.  
2. Antibiotics: These do a preggy good job for awhile but the bacteria seem to become resistant after a short period and bloating starts again.

3. The inclusion of mineral or animal oil in ration has a prophylactic effect but expense and availability of sufficient quantities makes its use on large numbers a problem.

4. Surface Tension Reducing Agents and Anti-fothing Agents.

Detergents: Care should be used as some are irritating to the stomach.  
Poloxalene: Available in boatguard blocks, granules, and molasses liquid mix.

For treatment of bloat, producers should consult their local veterinarian.

Any area producer who is planning to graze out their wheat and would like to participate in a result demonstration on the prevention and causes of bloat in wheat pasture cattle, contact me at 659-2136 or 733-2901. Dr. Gene Cope, Area Extension Veterinarian, has two result demonstrations going on in the Panhandle for wheat pasture bloat that could be adapted to this area, also. The result demonstrations would require little time on the producers part and could prove very beneficial. If anyone is interested, give me a call.

Hansford County Library's Artist-Collector of the Month for April is Mrs. Doris Meyer of Gruver. Mrs. Meyer is a very accomplished eggery artist, and some of her exquisite eggs are on display at the library.

The art of egg decorating goes back to ancient days. Almost every nation has its Easter egg folklore, and when Christianity became established, the egg was adopted as a symbol of new life or the Resurrection.

The most fabulously decorated eggs were designed by Karl Faberge, a Russian jeweler during the reign of the last Tsar. In 1881 Faberge was commissioned by the Tsar to make a special Easter egg for

the Tsarina. She was so delighted with his creation that he continued designing his eggs encrusted with jewels for many years.

Mrs. Meyer became interested in the art of eggery about five years ago and has designed and completed approximately 130 eggs since then. She is self-taught in her art, having learned by reading, creating, experimenting, and doing.

Mrs. Meyer uses a variety of eggs from large ostrich to tiny finch eggs. She meticulously cuts out, hinges, paints, glues, sprays and decorates each of her eggs. Some of her decorating materials include costume jewelry, snake skin, bread dough, dried flora, fabric and

trimming. Her finished egg products range from jewelry and music boxes to necklaces, minute dioramas and other decorative items.

Mrs. Meyer is also displaying some of her paintings at the library. She works mainly in watercolor though she also does some acrylic and oil painting. She has studied painting under Ruth Hutton and Dr. Cabellero. She has had art showings at the XIT Museum in Dalhart and at the Square House Museum in Panhandle and has given countless programs to various clubs throughout the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles.
