

Blodgett is named VP of Texas cities league

Spearman Mayor Ralph Blodgett was named second vice president, Tuesday of the prestigious and effective Texas Municipal League at its annual conclave at San Antonio, placing him in sequence of eligibility to ultimately become president of the powerful organization.

Blodgett's vice presidency was announced with other officer elections at the annual banquet of TML; no mean recognition for a city the size of Spearman--nor for its chief executive.

West Texas fared well in the roster of new offices with Allen Henry, mayor pro-tem of Lubbock acceding to the presidency following Austin Mayor Carole Keeton McClellan.

First vice president is Luther Jones, mayor of Corpus Christi.

Officers are elected by the board of directors of TML. That panel, in turn, is selected by the general membership which empowers the board to select a roster of officers each year.

Mayor Blodgett and his wife, Joan, and six councilmen and their wives represented the city of Spearman at the meeting which actually began Oct. 24 with formal registration Sunday, Oct. 25.

In addition to Mayor Blodgett and his wife, registering for Spearman were Mayor Pro-tem Ray Ingle and his wife, Nancy; Bob Pearson and wife, Jackie; Jim Mercer and wife, Miriam; Ed Garne and wife, Alva; City Manager Jim Murray and City Secretary Donna Thomas.

Councilman Gerald Heinrich was forced to cancel his attendance at the last moment due to business pressures here.

Garner, Pearson and Murray attended the Financial Management Institute, Saturday prior to registration. Murray termed the institute most effective and noted the two Spearman councilmen had a quick grasp of the principles set forth in the session.

Following the official registration, Sunday, a number of learning experience workshops were offered on such subjects as liability issues, cities and their futures based on a 10-year plan and a comprehensive look at city relationships with the federal government--and one with a most provocative title: "Now What?"

Following the workshops, Sunday evening was given to a welcome from the host city San Antonio. Mayor Henry Cisneros of that city is a most striking example of the new order in municipal executives. He did not arrive at the mayor's office by political persuasion but by moving up through the ranks of city employment and service. He was the first recipient of a scholarship provided by TML and the first to be recognized for the outstanding use he made of the study-learning opportunity and his executive ability once the opportunity came for practical application of his training.

In addition to workshops and caucuses, the conclave was marked by a number of addresses by persons qualified by position and experience to speak on their chosen issues.

Sen. Lloyd Bentsen gave an update on federal issues with the meat of his address being the warning of more direction from federal government with less money forthcoming.

Washington Editor Hugh Sides spoke to the members of TML assembled on "What Makes Presidents Run" drawing from his wealth of "Washingtonia" from covering the capitol scene journalistically.

Steve Bell, star of ABC's "Good Morning America" had some very pithy advice to municipal officers: "Be as open as you can about policy. Don't be defensive about your programs!"

Tuesday afternoon--Bell spoke at the luncheon that day--was given to caucuses and the all-important meeting of the resolutions committee and its resulting action.

Treated by the resolutions committee were such items as annexation, cable television control, municipal fines, and two priority items: one at the state level and one at the federal level.

As regarding municipal fines, the resolutions committee favored a "permissive fine" program which would not dictate the establishment of fines but permit municipal court magistrates to levy fines up to \$500 each offense when deemed advisable--over the present \$200 limitation.

The panel felt TML should begin a campaign now to elicit from the next session of the legislature street improvement funds for municipalities based on the fact that the state's 10-million vehicles are operated chiefly in the cities rather than on rural arteries. The campaign was dubbed the "Pothole Relief Fund."

The resolutions committee also moved to urge the federal government to continue revenue sharing as a top priority, cutting out, if necessary, all other programs first.

Another priority that marked the entire meeting was concern over Proposition Four in the amendment category of the upcoming balloting. It was felt that public enlightenment on this subject had not been adequate and emphasis should be stepped up until election day. It was noted that some regional jealousies had hurt publicity on the issue and the voting public might not know that passing the proposition is an alternative to additional taxes to take care of a water crisis if this Proposition Four does not pass.

The city of Gruver was well represented at the annual TML meeting, too.

Attending were Mayor J.C. Harris, City Manager A.J. Ratliff and Councilman Roy Byrd. Ratliff said the trio attended a full schedule of sessions and found all to be most productive. He lauded the fact that program planning and problem awareness on the part of TML had not overlooked cities in the category of Gruver.

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'Trick-treating' a hazard

In summing up his report, Spearman Police Chief Ron Robinson spoke of his concern for "small fry" who will be on the Trick-or-Treat trail Saturday night. Since the PLAINSMAN will be in the hands of more than half its readers early Saturday, the Chief's concern is passed on in the form of a plea for parents to watch their trick-treating youngsters and others as well.

Chief Robinson noted that the usual legal speed limit in residential areas was actually too fast for darting children in twilight and darkness and urged extra care on the part of drivers in these areas of the city.

The reporting period of the Spearman Police Department--Oct. 22-29--was relatively quiet with about the usual number of citizen reports of traffic violations but no accidents...a welcome change from the previous period.

Friday, Oct. 22, officers quelled a domestic disturbance in the 400 block of S. Dressen.

Saturday, four juveniles were briefly detained for discharging B-B guns inside the city limits and then were turned over to their parents who were at the scene when officers responded to the complaint.

Sunday, a neighborhood dispute on E. Second St. regarding alleged excessive noise was resolved.

Monday, police investigated an incident of vandalism in the 700 block of Lee Dr. where a fence had been partially knocked down. The act was traced to three juveniles who have agreed to take care of damage costs in putting the fence back as it was.

Fortunately, response to the school alarm proved to be hardly more than a precautionary move and students were soon back in the building attending normal class schedules.

However, men and machines were in place in a "greased lightning" move that has become the trademark of Spearman firefighters to handle the major emergency of a high population building had there been a fire threat.

Texas Water:

It's up to you, Tuesday!

Texas water is at the crossroads! --And a lot of people are kicking up dust so the responsible voter can hardly see what direction to take.

Amendment Four on the ballot Tuesday would give positive direction to development of water in Texas--the most important state need to date.

Voters at the polls Tuesday will have to rescue this important chapter in the future of the state. Absentee voting is so miniscule it will hardly make a difference.

Briefly, Amendment Four would do three things:

It would raise the interest allowed on presently authorized bonds--\$200-million of them--now unsaleable in the current interest market...

It would create a loan guaranty program enabling lo-

cal communities to issue water project bonds at a lower rate because backing of credit would be by the State of Texas...

Set aside one-half the state's budget surplus every two years to create a priority "nest egg" fund to assist local government in financing of water and sewage projects and pay for vital research programs.

Opponents--who do not truly know why they are--cry danger of a tax increase further along.

Not so. The increase will come--to pay for water and sewage projects--if this water financing program is not voted Tuesday!

Two times before, Texans stood at the crossroads. Years ago, similar priority funding for education gave our young people the learning opportunities they now enjoy. Then, priority funding for roads and

highways gave Texas the finest highway system in the nation today.

Now, it is water.

Voters in this area certainly stand to win with Amendment Four!

It would provide almost immediate funding for the Palo Duro water project as well as local control of the entire project which would not be true with federal funding. Too, federal funding will delay the project two to five years just by dent of processing.

Texas voters provided an enviable school system. Texas voters built a superior road system throughout the state. Now...

Texas voters must create priority funding for adequate water and the systems to use it. Vote for Amendment Four, Tuesday!

The usual formal receiving line dissolved into clusters of persons talking informally with each cluster including one or more of the physicians and their wives. "Listening in" required little effort and produced an inspiring challenge to homelife. Especially the new doctors and the prospective couple studying in residency here were well informed about the community past and present and highly articulate in discussing their impressions and experiences to date.

Too, such listening-in disclosed that every doctor practicing the healing art in the community is highly informed and readily conversant on a myriad subjects beyond illness and the practice of medicine.

--Which pointed up the fact that these doctors and their wives make interesting and challenging friends beyond the need for their services in times of distress.

And that is the way the reception ended: with a large number of the lay people of the community leaving with new-found friends among the doctors and their wives completely removed from the reception rooms of their various offices.

The effort expended by the Chamber in general and Dr. Doug Steger, Chamber health and safety committee chairman in particular, in bringing off such a successful evening is to be highly commended--and perhaps encored in other areas of community service and participation.

Polling Places For Nov. 3 Election

Polling places for the Nov. 3 state election are as follows: Precinct #1, County Courthouse, Spearman; Precinct #2, Renner Ranch; Precinct #3, Gruver Elevator; Precinct #4, Gruver County Agri. Bldg.; Precinct #5, Spearman County Agri. Bldg.; Precinct #6, Spearman High School; Precinct #7, Oslo Church; Precinct #8, Absentee Voting, Courthouse; Precinct #9, Morse Community Building.

These polling places will be open from 7 A.M. to 7 P.M. November 3, 1981 for voting in the Special Election for the purpose of submitting seven proposed Constitutional Amendments.

Amendment No. 1 would authorize cities, towns, and other taxing units to encourage the improvement, development,

or redevelopment of certain areas through property tax relief and the issuance of bonds and notes.

Amendment No. 2 authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years as of November 15, 1981.

Amendment No. 3 is to allow the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the power to manage the expenditure of certain appropriated funds.

Amendment No. 4 authorizing the use of a portion of the excess revenues of the state for water development, water conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes; authorizing the use of

the state's credit, not to exceed five hundred million dollars, to guarantee the bonds of cities, counties, towns, and other units of local government in the financing of projects for such purposes; increasing the interest rate that may be paid on preciously approved but unissued, state bonds; and authorizing a program to retire state bonds.

Amendment No. 5 to provide for the inclusion of livestock and poultry with farm products as exempt from taxation.

Amendment No. 6 authorizing a political subdivision to provide property tax relief for owners of residence homesteads and changing certain property tax administration procedures.

Amendment No. 7 author-

ing the issuance of additional bonds to finance the veterans' land program and to increase the maximum interest rate allowable on veterans' land fund bonds.

Local ACS Services Available

The American Cancer Society in Hansford County announced today that it has a variety of services available to cancer patients without charge.

"Many people are unaware of all the services we can provide right here in this town," said Mrs. N.F. (Gus) Renner, Service Chairman. "And all that is required in most cases is written permission from the patient's physician."

Loan equipment such as hospital beds, wheel chairs, commode chairs and walkers are available as well as expendable items including dressings, hospital gowns, bed pads, pillows and other items.

"These are all in addition to our basic information and referral services," said Mrs. Renner. "And, depending on location, we also have several

rehabilitation programs including Reach for Recovery for mastectomies, esophageal speech lessons for laryngectomies, ostomy rehabilitation and related patient and family support groups."

The concept for these rehabilitation programs is the volunteer-to-patient relationship," added Mrs. Renner. "We have many volunteers who are themselves former patients and who are specifically trained by the Society to help other patients and even their families adjust to living with cancer."

Mrs. Renner cited that when most people think of the American Cancer Society, they relate the name to cancer research. "While it is true the ACS funds millions of dollars for cancer research, we are also a community-based organization providing many local services. These patient services as well as education materials of all types are just a few of the ways we can help."

NEWS OF HEALTH

As many as 60 million Americans may benefit from watching carefully the amount of sodium in their diets, according to the Commissioner of the Food and Drug Administration, Dr. Arthur Hull Hayes, Jr.



These Americans have high blood pressure. This silent killer can cause strokes, heart attacks or other serious health problems.

People often can control high blood pressure by cutting back on the amount of sodium they eat, Dr. Hayes points out. And people who take drugs for high blood pressure often do better when they also reduce their sodium.

Sodium can come from many sources. One is the salt shaker on the table.

But sodium also is contained in many processed foods. Dr. Hayes is asking the food industry to reduce the amounts of sodium they add to their products, and to provide consumers with more label information about sodium.

In the meantime, people who want to watch their sodium can discuss their diets with their doctor. And many supermarkets are providing more information about sodium to their customers.

CONFIDENTIAL REPORT: Multi-talented Rick Springfield is just one step away from becoming the new John Travolta. The Australian-born star is riding high in the pop music charts with his best selling single, "Jesse's Girl." And as Dr. Noah Drake on the leading daytime soap opera "General Hospital," he is one of the top heartthrobs on TV. But he still longs for the big breakthrough that will rocket him to the top, just as "Saturday Night Fever" did for Travolta. "When I hear people call me an overnight success, I have to laugh," Springfield, 31, told me. "I mean, this 'overnight' has taken me more than nine years." The handsome young actor-singer first came to America in 1972, after a brief fling with pop stardom in Australia. He made two unsuccessful attempts to hit the music big-time in the U.S. before turning his attention to acting. "I made the decision to succeed as an actor," he says. "I took acting classes and worked on losing my Australian accent. I knew I had the determination and self-discipline to succeed." After numerous guest spots on shows like "The Rockford Files," "Wonder Woman" and "The Six Million Dollar Man," Springfield landed the role in "General Hospital." "To be honest, I was never really a fan of the soaps," he admits. "But now I concede that there is more to them than I originally credited them with."

TV BACKSTAGE: Erik Estrada returned to work on the NBC series "CHIPS" after missing three episodes because of a contract dispute with MGM Television, said Bill Barron, speaking for the studio. As Estrada walked onto the soundstage, all eyes turned toward him and he said, "Remember me?" Barron said Estrada was greeted warmly by fellow cast members Larry Wilcox, Bruce Jenner, Robert Pine and Brodie Greer and the crew. Broadcasting's a new kick for Turner

After 16 seasons of pro football, during which he became the second leading scorer in National Football League history, it's difficult to think of Jim Turner as a rookie. Yet, that is exactly what the former kicker for the Jets and Broncos is in 1981 as a member of NBC Sports' NFL broadcast team.

Although the era of specialization has not spread from the gridiron to the broadcast booth, Turner, who kicked an NFL single-season record 34 field goals with the New York Jets in 1968, will be concentrating heavily on his speciality throughout the season, providing NBC-TV viewers with a better understanding of the often-decisive role of the foot in the game of football.

Turner, whose 1,439 career points is second only to the 2,002 scored by George Blanda, recognizes two distinct elements of the kicking game, one revolving entirely around the individual, the other pertaining to the team concept. According to him, the key to success for any kicker, be he placekicker or punter, is discipline. "The kicker must have the ability to erase everything else from his mind and concentrate on the job that he has only 1.2 seconds to complete," he says. "He can't be distracted by the elements, the crowd, or the oncoming defensive rush. Total concentration is essential."

Special snaps

While fans may have the impression that the kicker is going it alone whenever he strides onto the field, Turner stresses that, for the successful kicking specialist, it's not the full story. "Building a cohesive special team around the kicker can, and usually does, determine the relative success of your kicking game. Scouting and organization are vital, yet there must be unity and recognition of a common purpose. What good is a 50-yard punt if the coverage has been out-kicked?"

Often a figure overlooked by the fans, but certainly not by the placekicker, is the holder. Says Turner, who kicked 304 field goals

during his pro career, "There are only a handful of great holders in the NFL and it's more than coincidence that they have worked with the great kickers. In the past we had Babe Parilli, John Brodie, Len Dawson, Charley Johnson and Eddie Meador. Today the best holder is Roger Wehrli (St. Louis Cardinals), Matt Robinson (Buffalo Bills) is good, but is lacking the experience that will make him great."

The kicker's greatest adversary is weather, yet Turner maintains there are ways to overcome the negative effect of the elements. "Experience teaches kickers to compensate accordingly for various weather fac-

tors. The more experience, the better he is able to adjust his style to meet the conditions. Younger kickers should watch opposing home field kickers in their pre-game practices."

In the highly pressurized world of the NFL placekicker, Jim Turner put his theories into practice and delivered. Achievements such as scoring in 118 consecutive games, scoring a field goal in 28 straight games, and converting 221 consecutive extra points prove it. Now he's delivering those theories to NBC Sports' NFL viewing audience.





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Hansford will share in \$1.3-million project

Hansford county will be sharing with Hutchinson county in a \$1.36-million Farm-to-Market road improvement program, according to A.L. McKee, district engineer for the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission (SHPTC) at Amarillo.

The exact figure is \$1,359,269--the amount of a contract awarded D and H Paving of Guyton, Okla., for

the widening and resurfacing of FM 281 in both counties and the widening of the Palo Duro Creek bridge on this artery in Hutchinson county.

A total of 12.4 miles is involved in the two counties. In Hansford, work on FM 281 will extend from FM 760 east to the Ochiltree county line. In Hutchinson, it will extend from SH 136 east to SH 207.

Purpose of the work, accord-

ing to Engineer McKee, is to increase both traffic capacity and safety on this stretch of the state Farm-to-Market system.

The project will be under the direct supervision of Jay L. Hawley, SHPTC engineer at Borger.

D and H Paving was one of five firms bidding on the project.



Indoor Gardening

Herbs are an essential part of any home garden--they're fun and easy to grow. They can spice up your gardening as well as your food. One of the best known and most widely used herbs is sage, which can be used to perk up many of your home-grown vegetables, such as tomatoes, beans and eggplant. It grows easily from seed to about 24 inches tall. It takes at least two weeks to germinate.



You don't have to stop growing herbs just because it's cold outside. Herbs can thrive in indoor mini-gardens. Use your imagination when selecting containers. They can range from egg cartons to coolers. To hasten germination, cover container with a clear plastic such as "Glad" Wrap. Poke holes to allow breathing. Place the containers in a warm, moist place out of direct sunlight. Remove the plastic after herbs sprout.

When growing sage, take the stems and leaves for flavor before the plant blooms. Since sage is a member of the salvia family, be sure the seeds you get are the cooking-herb kind by noting the Latin name: *Salvia Officinalis*.



If you're cooking apples, bear in mind that one pound usually equals three medium-sized apples or three cups of sliced apples.



CAR CARE CORNER
Tips For More Safety, Economy, Convenience

For starters, beware of electric current leaks from your car's ignition cables or distributor. They will weaken the spark you need for proper ignition. Current can leak if there are cracks or carbon tracks in the distributor cap, or if the insulation or boots (the part that attaches the cable to the cap) of an ignition cable have hardened and cracked.



A quick check for leakage can be made by looking under the hood at night while the engine is running. If you can see a spark jump from a cable to the engine block, move the cable away from the engine and replace the cable as soon as possible.


FACTS & FIGURES

The first commercially successful color film process was kinemacolor, a two-color system using panchromatic film stock, and was developed in 1906 in England.



A new computer terminal allows the average office worker to create color slides for office presentations at a fraction of the time and cost of old-fashioned methods. The programmer simply types a slide design onto the CRT screen, changing the layout and information by simply entering keyboard commands. Once satisfied with the design, the programmer transmits the slide data via standard telephone lines to a Xerox Reproduction Center—and within 36 hours or less, quality finished slides are shipped back to his company. The process eliminates numerous time-consuming and costly steps that were used in the past for slide production, such as typesetting, photography, the use of color gels and dyes, overlays, opaquing, stripping-in, working with film negatives and so on. 
