\$750,000 boost to economy

New company purchases feedyard

C & M Land and Cattle Company are announcing the purchase of Hansford Feedyards from Carl and Dan Archer. The purchase includes the feedyards, feedmill and 705 acres of land.

The new business will operate under the name Colbert's Cattle Feeders, Inc.

Boyd Colbert, Perryton, will be the operator of the feedyard which is expected to be open in approximately 2 weeks.

The feedyard has been closed down for the past 2 years.

When the storm sirens blare and the radio warns that a "twister" is on the way, what can you do to improve your chances of surviving a Texas tornado?

For one thing, studies show that if you're in your house, you should stay right there. Only 3 per 1,000 people in houses hit by tornadoes are killed -- or, put another way, 99.7 percent survive.

This somewhat comforting statistic is especially welcome to the older workers enrolled in the Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb employment program, because most of them live and work in the northern half of the state so often assaulted by spring storms.

More than 20 Green Thumbers from 5 counties attended a training session at the Perryton Senior Citizen Center on April 3, and learned how they could save their lives if a tornado should come their way. Those attending from Hansford County were Alma Remy, Floydean Gatlin and Ernest Newcomb, also a sponsor from the museum. Helen Boyd

"In the case of severe storms, there truly is no place like home," said Green Thumb Director Diane Parrish of Waco, "provided your home is a sturdy house."

Parrish used a slide presentation to illustrate the kinds of tornadoes that can develop and to describe the techniques most likely to enhance survival. Slides of twisters that hit Lubbock, Waco, Wichita Falls, San Angelo, Clarendon, and northeast Texas were used in the presentaition.

According to Parrish, most tornado deaths result from head injuries caused by flying





1982 Budget was \$1,193,339. Ad Velorem Tax was 28% of Budget, and 1982 Sales Tax was 15% of budget.

The 1983 City Budget is \$913,801, Ad Velorem is 37% of budget, and 1983 sales tax is 20% of budget.

Street Repair comes from the General Fund and this year is budgeted for \$159,057. Our sales tax helps pay for our street repair along with Health & Sanitation, police. 

Workfare

The Florida legislature recently rejected a plan to require food stamp recipients to do some work in return for their welfare. The program is called workfare--and it has worked in California and elsewhere in earlier tests.

In Florida, the usual smokescreen objection carried the day this election year. That's the idea, contrary to the traditional work ethic and American heritage, that it's somehow demeaning to make welfare recipients work.

How and when did work for compensation become demeaning? The proposal specifies that only those of working age, physically able, be asked to contribute some of their time.

They would still have ample time to look for jobs--if they want them. They should be proud, not demeaned. by doing something for the money other people are working for, and giving them.

Herein lies the greatest spiritual and moral danger in western society today. It's the idea that the government owes everyone a decent living, that laziness or lack of ambition, must never be mentioned. It's as if such things didn't exist!

Those who mention this fact of life, unchanged for thousands of years, are branded hard-hearted, or not caring--the favorite phrase today. Everyone on welfare, we are to believe, really wants to work, is deserving, and must not be required to do anything for it.

This Alice In Wonderland line is exploited by politicians who win votes by "caring" so much. They care all right--about the votes, and the more on welfare rolls the more votes. The nation goes broke in the process of being so idealistic, in so many escalating social and welfare programs.

Senate Farce

The almost-total farce of the Senate debate over school prayer was unrecognized by many. Though activist members of the Senate were sincere, as were the thousands of good souls who demonstrated in Washington, there never was much chance anything would come of the effort.

The House was against any action this year. (It would require a two-thirds votes in both House and Senate for the amendment to begin the rounds.)

There's practically no chance 38 states would ratify any amendment--if by the most remote possibility one could be passed by two thirds of both houses of Congress.

The debate was mostly window-dressing. The best that can be said is that it focuses attention on the issue, could be the first step in a long battle over the years.

More likely, it's an exercise in posturing, politics and futility. The many good, impassioned emotional people who treked to Washington to help should keep this realistic concept in mind.


